

A bulletin giving results of the 1955 and 1956 over-state trials for different corn hybrids is now available at the County Cooperative Extension Office, according to Alfred Ballweg, county agricultural agent. The title of the bulletin is "Corn Hybrids Compared" and prepared by E. C. Rossman and George E. Carter, farm crops department, Michigan farm crops department, Michigan State University. Tuscola County corn growers will be interested in the results of the trials conducted on the Walter Reinboldt farm, located in Saginaw County. Per cent moisture, bushels per acre and per cent lodging are compared for about twelve different companies selling hybrid seed corn in this area of Michi-
