Fairgrove Dairyman Leads DHIA Tests

Leading the list of herds producing 30 pounds of fat or more per cow during February is that of Henry Bublitz & Son of Fairgrove with 12 registered Brown Swiss cows averaging 1263 pounds of milk and 43.8 pounds of fat. In second place is the registered Holstein herd of Dolan Sweeney of Uby, producing an average of 1292 pounds of milk and 43.5 pounds of fat. In third place is the registered and grade Holstein herd of Lavern Engelhard of Unionville, with an average of 1242 pounds of milk and 45.7 pounds of fat. Standing in fourth place in this class is the registered Holstein herd owned by Ben Loeffler of Reese, producing an average of 1284 pounds of milk and 45.0 pounds of fat. Other herds averaging over 38.0 pounds of fat are those owned by Milton Schian, Vassar, 42.5 pounds; Max Cooper, Kingston, 42.4 pounds; Ray Sattelburg, Unionville, 38.8 pounds; Willard Burdon, Gageton, 38.5 pounds; Clarence Landenberg, Akron, 38.7 pounds, and Maynard McConkey, Cass City, 38.3 pounds.

In the 305-day records class, 30 cows produced 374 pounds of fat or more, led by a registered Holstein cow, age 5 years, Pietje, owned by Clayton Rohlfis & Sons of Fairgrove and producing 17,890 pounds of milk and 583 pounds of fat. A registered Holstein cow owned by V. J. and Clare Carpenter of Cass City stands second in this class, producing 15,970 pounds of milk and 580 pounds of fat. In third place is a registered Holstein cow owned by George Foster of Postoria, producing 13,650 pounds of milk and 570 pounds of fat. Other dairy herd improvement association members having cows producing over 500 pounds of fat in this class are Bruce MacRae, Cass City; Harry and Royce Russell, Gageton; Loren Brady, Unionville; H. T. Donahue, Cass City, and E. G. Golding, Cass City.

Werner List of Vassar is the owner of a registered Holstein cow, Maid, age 4 years, which stands in first place in the 60 pounds fat or more class for the month of February, producing 95 pounds of fat. In second place is a registered Brown Swiss cow, Addie, age 5 years, owned by Henry Bublitz & Son of Fairgrove, producing 93 pounds of fat. Other herd owners, having cows which produced 80 pounds or more fat in this class are Dolan Sweeney, Uby; Maynard McConkey, Cass City; Max Cooper, Kingston; Lavern Engelhard, Unionville; Milton Schian, Vassar.

Cass City was defeated in the opening round of the regional Class "B" tournament at Flint Thursday when they bowed after a gallant battle with Flint Tech, 80-69.

The game was closer than the final score indicates. The Hawks were within four points of the Flint squad in the final period.

Tech's ability to convert free throws and their accuracy from the field spelled defeat for Cass City. They converted 42 per cent of their shots from the field and 27 of 37 charity tosses.

In the final night when Tech lost to Flint Kearsley, the Tech quintet missed six of eight free throw tries that cost the squad its victory.

Both teams scored well in the first quarter. With John Meininger scoring nine points, Cass City netted 18 for the period while Tech was chalking up 20 points. Jackbos hit on four shots from outcourt to pace the attack for the winners.

In the second period, Meininger was removed because of four fouls and Cass City went into a pressing defense. The press surprised Tech into making numerous errors, but the Hawks fouled frequently and Tech was deadly from the charity lane in the quarter.

They converted 13 of 14 tries to go with four buckets to rack up 21 points. Cass City countered with 16 points and trailed, 41-35, at the end of the period.

The Hawks gained a point of the margin back in the third quarter as they notched 16 points while Tech was picking up 15.

Cass City's last bid to pull the game out of the fire faded in the middle of the fourth period.

Tech started fast breaking down the court to avoid the press of Cass City and proved successful as they rang up several easy buckets to pull the game out of reach of Cass City.

Meininger led the Hawk attack with 20 points. Dick Hanby collected 16 points and Bob Martus 14 points. Jim Johnson had 11.

The loss ends another season for Cass City's cagers. Second place in the conference and another district title on the record makes it another in a long string of successful seasons for the school.

From the Editor's Corner

Since the article about the crackdown on shoplifting in the village appeared in the Chronicle several weeks ago, merchants have reported less shoplifting in the village.

Several of the offenders have been caught and appropriate action taken by Marshal Steve Orto. Merchants on Main Street say that they are determined to stamp out the stealing and are remaining vigilant in their efforts to apprehend the thieves and turn them over to the proper authorities.

Their efforts should be applauded by parents. Besides helping themselves, they are doing much to discourage potential shoplifters from stealing and getting into trouble.

The incident of the shoplifting proves a conviction of most newspapermen and such eminent police authorities as J. Edgar Hoover of the FBI who claims that the harsh light of publicity is one of the principal deterrents to crime.

Persons who think that covering up crimes by not printing them is helping the individual are not supported by the facts.

The need for driver training in schools was never more graphically illustrated than in Bad Axe in the last two weeks. A total of five teen-age youths have been killed in accidents in the Huron county seat area. Four of the deaths can be traced to faulty driving by individuals involved.

A continued rigid enforcement of the law and driver education in our schools may enable Cass City area to keep fatalities at a minimum.

Mrs. Douglas Takes WSCS Office

Mrs. Earl W. Douglas, Cass City, was installed Mar. 15 as secretary of promotion in the North Central Jurisdiction Women's Society of Christian Service. The installation came at the climax of the society's three-day annual meeting in Central Methodist Church, Detroit. She will serve for a four-year term.

The North Central Jurisdiction WSCS has a membership of more than 532,000 Methodist women—the largest of any of the church's six jurisdictions. It includes the states of Michigan, Indiana, Ohio, Illinois, Iowa, Wisconsin, Minnesota and the Dakotas.

Kingston Seeks School Addition

The Kingston school board will present a proposal for an addition of six rooms to the Kingston Rural Agricultural School to electors sometime in May, it was announced this week.

The board said that statistics prove that the additional rooms are urgently needed. They anticipate an increase of 60 students in the next three years, based on the school census.

Included, besides the plans for the new addition, is a plan for modernization and better equipping the present structure.

Lack of space is one of the major problems of the district, the board members said.

Unanimous Vote to Annex to Cass City

Hillside School (Elmwood number six, fractional) became the first district to annex to Cass City School this week when district electors voted unanimously to become part of the new consolidated Cass City District.

Electors balloted on three propositions: to annex, to raise tax limitation and to assume pro rata share of the bonded indebtedness. Thirty-four voted in favor of the first two propositions and 30 for the third proposition.

Hillside School is located seven miles west and a half mile south of Cass City and the children in the district have been attending Cass City School for 12 years.

Hillside is the first of 11 districts to be voting on the same propositions within the next 30 days. Officers of the district are John Graham, president; Wallace Zimmerman, secretary, and Mrs. Hilda E. James, treasurer.

Dates for elections for four other districts have been scheduled. Heron School will vote Saturday, Mar. 23. McConnell School will vote Monday, Mar. 25, and Dickout School's election is set for Friday, Mar. 29. Wright School district will vote Wednesday, April 3.

Charles Watson Cited for Work in Air Force

Mr. and Mrs. Vern Watson received a letter of commendation this week from their son Charles' commanding officer. Charles is soon to complete an enlistment in the Air Force and is stationed at March Air Force Base, California.

The letter received reads in part, "It is my privilege to inform you that on March 12, I had the pleasure of presenting your son Charles with the 'Outstanding Airman's Achievement Award.' The award, presented semiannually, goes to the airman who is considered the most outstanding in his organization. Each recipient has successfully competed against several hundred other airmen for the achievement.

The letter closed with this statement, "May I congratulate you for your son's significant attainment which has reflected great credit upon himself and the United States Air Force."

3 Escape Injury In M-81 Accident

Three cars were involved in an accident Friday afternoon on M-81, four and a half miles west of Cass City. No one was injured but the cars were damaged.

The accident occurred when a car driven by Derek Romain, 16, of Caro attempted to pass two cars ahead of him and one of the vehicles ahead, driven by Henry DeSmith, attempted to pass a three-quarter ton truck. Passengers in the truck were Joe Frederick and LeMarr Herr of Cass City.

Romain's car hit the rear of the DeSmith car and pushed it into the truck.

Bids for County Infirmary Bonds Slated April 10

Bonds to finance the \$890,000 county nursing home will be sold Wednesday, April 10, when sealed bids will be received at the County Clerk's office. Bids will be opened and read at 2 p. m.

Bidders must accompany their bid with a certified check for \$17,800 and the right has been reserved to reject any and all bids.

Maximum interest rate of the issue is five per cent. Bids must be made in multiples of a quarter of one per cent.

Green Advocates Raise in Liquor Taxes for Schools

Rep. Allison Green (R-Kings-ton) said this week he would introduce a measure to increase taxes on liquor and beer sales to provide supplemental aid for schools.

"This state-aid proposal has a number of features," Green has said. "First, it proposes to establish the state-aid pattern for the 1957-58 school year at \$190 per pupil. Second it grants the Department of Public Instruction authority to pay out the present year's bill on a basis of \$185 per pupil. Third, it provides additional state revenues through increases in the liquor and beer taxes now being collected in Michigan."

Green said the proposal, which has "all the backing my former proposal does and then some," would increase the tax on beer by \$1.25 a barrel and place a five per cent gross tax on liquor.

He said the payment of \$185 per pupil for the current year probably would cause a deficit of between \$10 million and \$14 million but the new revenues would pay that back.

The hike in beer taxes, which doubles the levy on beer, would net the state about \$7 million annually, Green estimated. He predicted the five per cent gross tax on liquor would net about \$8.5 million a year.

"We realize the taxpayers are now over-burdened and we are sympathetic to this fact," Green said. "On the other hand, we feel it is short-sighted economy to cripple our fine school program in Michigan. We feel that property tax is carrying as much tax as can possibly be expected in view of bond issues, special millage, equalization and other factors. So we proposed the liquor and beer taxes, which will not hit at property."

Green said state aid to schools for the current year was cut to \$135 per pupil because "it does not seem wise to promise more than we can possibly deliver."

Industrialist Richard C. Andree of Port Huron, vice-president of the Yale Woolen Mills, has been elected a director of The Detroit Edison Company.

The addition to the company's board was announced by Detroit Edison President Walker L. Cislser following a directors' meeting on Monday.

Neglects Small Children

Mrs. Bombard Found Guilty by Jury

It took a Tuscola County jury only 26 minutes to find Mrs. Thelma Bombard guilty of neglect and cruelty to children after hearing the facts in a case that started Wednesday morning and was concluded at 3:47 that afternoon. The jury returned the guilty-as-charged verdict at 4:13. Judge Arch presided.

Mrs. Bombard was indicted when she left her three children, two, three and four years old, with her mother during the Christmas holidays.

She left on a Friday and returned on a Sunday to check the children. She found that her parents had left them in the house at Quinciassee alone.

She then went to Sebawaing and Saginaw and failed to return to check the welfare of her and a neighbor's children until the following Tuesday.

Mrs. Bombard will be sentenced Mar. 30 after a pre-sentence investigation by John Humm.

Judge T. C. Quinn heard several arraignments and domestic cases in court Saturday.

Alexander Knoll pleaded guilty to uttering and publishing a check for \$127.60 at Cass City Oil & Gas Co. in Cass City. A pre-sentence investigation was ordered and sentence will be passed Mar. 30.

Three men pleaded guilty for breaking and entering in the nighttime residence of Henry Schriber of Almer Township. The three, James E. Smith, Howard Kleinsmith and William Donovan, all of Caro, will be sentenced Mar. 30. The Friend of the Court will make a pre-sentence investigation.

John's home is on the island of Crete. His home was destroyed in World War II and his father was executed for underground activity.

The mother works as a field laborer and the income for the family is less than \$10 a month, according to Foster Parents' Plan.

John is a lively boy with brown hair and sparkling blue eyes. A sixth grader in the local elementary school, he is a good student and would like to continue his education to become a teacher.





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Use Forage Crops For More Profit

Michigan dairy farmers are not making greater use of forage crops despite the fact that such crops can do an excellent job of lowering feed costs and thus increasing net income.

Acres of crops for hay and pasture have stayed about the same for the past 15 years, according to C. R. Hognlund, farm economist, and M. E. Tesar, farm cropsman at Michigan State University.

Poor quality of the forage produced and low yields have discouraged some farmers from making greater use of forage crops, according to Alfred Ballweg, county agricultural agent.

Many farmers have not been satisfied with the yields of the companion crops needed to establish seedings. Two adjustments can be made to increase yields of companion crops; change the method of harvest, or use a different companion crop.

For instance, oats harvested as silage yields twice as much feed nutrients as when harvested for grain, making oats more nearly competitive with corn.

Proper timing in harvest is extremely important to the making of top quality oats silage, the MSU specialists point out. The harvest period for oats silage is rather short compared to legumes. Earlier harvest as a result of making oats silage generally improves the stands of legumes.

Dairymen may also increase forage production by seeding alfalfa-bromegrass in oats in August and then grazing or harvesting the forage in October. This method may be somewhat less profitable, particularly on highly-productive soils, than the oats silage method. But, it may be well adapted to farms where extra work is needed to reduce serious weed problems before legumes and grasses are seeded and it gives good stands.

The specialists offer two suggestions for different companion

crops; Sudan grass to be harvested for silage, green-chopped or pastured, and wide row corn.

Sudan grass, grown on heavy soils and harvested for silage, yields about twice the feed value as oats harvested for grain. The success of a seeding made in Sudan grass depends on mid-May seeding and harvesting the grass silage in early July before it offers too much competition for light and moisture for the new seedlings.

Seeding in Sudan grass harvested for silage appears to be less profitable than seeding in oats used for silage on the less productive soils. The risk of obtaining good seedlings is higher. However, Sudan grass may be a more attractive crop for a farmer following a green chopping system, because of its mid-season production.

Using wide-row corn as a companion crop appears to be the most profitable on highly-productive soils when forage yields are at least 90 per cent as good as those established for in oats for grain.

Experiments have shown that forage yields of seedlings established in wide rows (60 inches) were only six per cent lower than those established in oats. Seeding in corn is not recommended for lighter soils.

Michigan Mirror News in Brief

The terms "Qualified Engineer" and "Registered Engineer" may be battled around in front of Michigan's Supreme Court if John C. Mackie, Democratic candidate for state highway commissioner, receives the voters' approval for that office.
Currently, the Michigan Society of Professional Engineers (MSPE) is doing a slow burn because Mackie is not registered as an engineer. MSPE contends that according to Michigan law, this makes him ineligible for the highway post.

An MSPE attempt to force Democrats to select a new candidate for highway commissioner failed when the state Supreme Court refused to issue an order to Secretary of State James M. Hare to keep Mackie's name off the April 1 ballot.

The Mackie-MSPE dispute appears to be heading for further legal tests if the Democratic candidate is elected.

Robert E. Childs, attorney for the professional engineering group, says he assumes the court refused to rule on the issue before the election because the usual method of ruling on a candidate's qualifications is to wait until after he is elected.

Charge of "politics" were leveled against the suit by Democratic State Central Committee

Chairman Neil Staebler. Childs refutes the statement saying, "A. C. Friel, president of the MSPE, has instructed me that the suit must be brought against any man running for highway commissioner, regardless of political connections, if he isn't a qualified, registered engineer."
The bone of contention centers around the word "registered." Mackie holds a degree in civil engineering from Michigan State University. However, he is not registered as an engineer. At present he is a registered surveyor at Flint.

Main basis for filing the original suit (and for any future legal action should Mackie be elected) is a 1937 law which requires the highway commissioner to be a registered engineer. This in turn is supported by a ruling of the Attorney General in 1945 that county road commissioners must be registered engineers.

If Mackie were elected and then disqualified, the appointment of a successor would be up to Governor Williams.

Michigan's new teen-age driving law is off to a flying start according to reports from schools around the state.

Since Feb. 1, no person under 18 can qualify for a license without an approved course in driver's education.

Few complaints have been re-

ceived from parents or students that the new law is creating any hardships, says Norman E. Borgerson, deputy superintendent of the State Department of Public Instruction.
All schools have successfully instituted the program. Prior to the adoption of the law in February some of the larger schools were afraid they could not provide adequate facilities. However, these fears did not materialize, Borgerson states.

About 68,000 students will receive the required course by the end of 1957. Many experts believe that driver education is a contributing factor in the reduction of accidents Michigan experienced during the first two months of the year.

As the pioneer in this compulsory driving education, Michigan is being closely watched by other states contemplating the adoption of similar legislation.

Some changes are suggested for the present law. The Michigan State Safety Commission had heard recommendations that:

1. All students who have driven a year or more under temporary permits be granted a license without the formal training.
2. The mandatory \$3 fee for a driving permit be eliminated.

This fee can be collected when the student applies for the regular license, Borgerson suggests. At present, the \$3 is returned to all those who take the course but do not choose to apply for a license.

One conflict exists with present driving regulations.

Under the training program a student is eligible to take instruction any time after his 15th birthday. Some students complete the course within eight weeks after they become 15 years of age. Law then prevents them from driving for the next 44 weeks until they reach 16.

The Department of Public Instruction is recommending a change to grant restricted permits to any "graduate" of the driver training course.

Photographs may soon be necessary on Michigan driver licenses if a proposed bill meets with favorable legislative action. Currently, the State Highways Committee is taking testimony on the proposal which would require that a motorist's photograph be imprinted on his license.

Trade groups and safety or-

ganizations are generally in favor of the bill. Retailers, bankers and liquor licensees point out that driver licenses are often used for identification of customers. They believe a photograph would assure positive identification.

Retail spokesmen also believe bad check passers, who often rely on stolen or counterfeit licenses, would be greatly deterred.

Big questions to be answered are how much would such a program cost and how can it be handled efficiently? No information exists at present because other states do not require photographs.

Sidney H. Woolner, deputy Secretary of State, suggests that such a program be put on a trial basis. By limiting the requirements to only a few counties at first, costs and administrative problems could be determined. Beyond this single reservation Woolner said the Secretary of State's office recognizes the soundness of the proposal and endorses the basic idea.

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


