





Seeding in Sudan grass harvested for silage appears to be less profitable than seeding in oats used for silage on the less productive soils. The risk of obtaining good seedings is higher. However, Sudan grass may be a more attractive crop for a farmer following a green chopping system because if its mid-season production.

· Using wide-row corn as a companion crop appears to be the most profitable on highly-productive soils when forage yields are at least 90 per cent as good as those established for in oats for grain.

Experiments have shown that forage yields of seedings es-tablished in wide rows (60 inches) were only six per cent lower than those established in oats, Seeding in corn is not recom-mended for lighter soils.
