

Two Placed on Probation in Circuit Court

Donald Gussell of Owendale stood mute when arraigned before Judge T. C. Quinn in Tuscola County Circuit Court, Saturday.

Mr. Gussell asked for an attorney, D. L. Williams was appointed and a plea of not guilty was entered by the court.

Mr. Gussell was charged with assault with intent to do great bodily harm after he threatened Leroy Hoag of Cass City with a knife.

Benjamin J. Poole, who pleaded guilty to breaking into the Caro Drive-In Theater, was sentenced to three years' probation with the first 90 days in the county jail unless he gets a job.

In addition, he will pay restitution of \$270 to the theater and \$185 to Wayne Southworth at \$15 per month. Court costs were set at \$75.

Leon Lambert, 23, of Caro was sentenced to three years' probation for breaking and entering the Warmier Store in Juniata Township. He was ordered to make restitution of \$220. After admitting to other robberies in court, he was ordered to make restitution of \$89.23 to Kamm Motor Sales and \$420 to Simms Junk Yard. Payments will be at \$20 per month.

Betty Lambert was awarded a divorce from Joseph R. Lambert. Alimony was set at \$10 per week and a dollar given in lieu of dower.

Wednesday, before Judge Allan Lidke of Scottville, Robert N. Phelps won a contested divorce case from Pauline E. Phelps. Custody of two minor children was left to the discretion of the friend of the court.

At the present time, a 13-year-old girl lives with her mother and a five-year-old boy lives with the father. Support payment for the children was set at \$10 weekly for each child. A \$500 property settlement was given Mrs. Phelps.

Seven names were suggested for the proposed new hospital in Cass City. A suggestion from Dr. H. T. Donahue was to have the word community in the name to differentiate from hospitals that handle indigent patients only.

Among the names suggested were Thumb Valley Community Hospital, Tri-County Community Hospital and Thumb District Community Hospital.

A name was also received from Warren Wood. He suggested that the name include the word "hub" to signify that the area is in the hub of the Thumb. The name was Hub Community Hospital.

Mrs. W. J. Wetters said that the word Thumb should be placed in the name of the hospital as no other state in the nation could incorporate the word in a name. Her suggestion was Michigan Thumb-Center Hospital.

The Tuscola County Supervisors accepted the low bid of Halsey, Stuart and Co. to purchase the \$890,000 bond issue for the Tuscola County Infirmary Hospital. The interest rate is 3.17432 per cent.

Total interest cost over the period of the loan will be \$200,300.

There were three bids received for the bonds which were opened by Fred Mathews, Tuscola County clerk.

Second bidder was First of Michigan Corporation which quoted an interest rate of 3.24805 for a total cost of \$204,952.03.

Third bidder was Livingston, Crouse and Co. and others with an interest rate of 3.4084 for a total cost of \$215,075.

Sign Contract
The board signed a contract with Auten Motor Sales for police cars for the county on a rental basis. Cost to the county will be \$138 per unit and includes all repairs, maintenance and operating expenses except charges for gas.

Appointed
Supervisor Archie Hicks of Novesta Township was appointed to the special hospital committee to fill the vacancy created when John McIntyre was elected chairman of the board.

Other Business
A resolution will be drawn for adoption by supervisors that protects any legislation that would take away from townships or local governmental units any money previously received from tavern, beer or liquor license sales.

A request by Sheriff William Tomlinson for another deputy was referred to a committee for study.

Collection of unpaid dog taxes will be handled the same as it has in the past, supervisors declined, after the question had been raised by Sheriff Tomlinson.

Each supervisor will contact the sheriff and make his own arrangements for the township he serves.

Supervisor Grover Laurie of Elmwood Township brought up the question of overloading of trucks on county and township roads. The matter was referred to the committee on roads and bridges for further information and study. The committee is to report to the board.

From the Editor's Corner

The excellent financial condition of Tuscola County was brought into sharp focus Wednesday when the bids for the bonds to finance the new Tuscola County Infirmary Hospital were opened.

The interest rate of 3.17432 is the lowest to be let in Michigan since rates started to climb sharply over a year ago. A representative of the company that bought the bonds said that he considered the bid a good one even though it was considerably lower than most in recent months. "The county is in excellent financial condition," he said.

It is pleasing to see so many church and civic organizations raising money to donate to the hospital fund in the village. With \$175,000 to be raised it will take a maximum effort by the entire area the hospital serves to go over the goal when the drive starts in a few months.

Meanwhile, plans for the building are proceeding on schedule now. An architect is expected to be hired tonight (Friday) and a survey of the site has been completed.

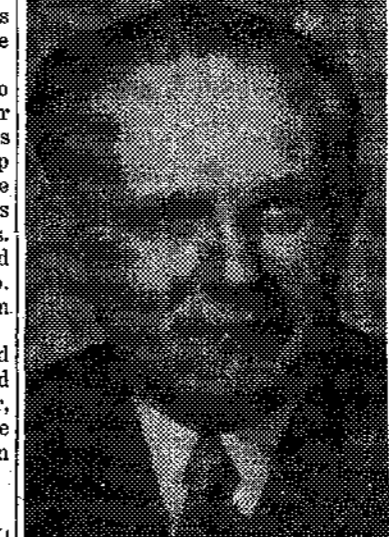
day noon he will address a joint luncheon meeting of the Vassar Rotary and Lions Clubs. In the afternoon he will meet informally with county leaders.

He served as president of the Association of Land Grant and State Universities in 1949-50. He is now chairman of the American Council of Education's Committee on Institutional Projects Abroad. In January 1953, President Eisenhower appointed Dr. Hannah as Assistant Secretary of Defense for manpower and personnel. He was granted a leave of absence from the University for this assignment. He resigned his defense post and returned to full time duty at MSU in August 1954. For this service he was awarded the Medal of Freedom.

In January 1954, President Eisenhower appointed him chairman of the United States Section of the Permanent Joint Board on Defense, Canada-United States.

Tips Offered for Best Spring Sewing

If you're planning to make clothes for spring and summer, it's worth your while to arrange for comfortable, convenient work space. How fast and easy the work goes may depend on the height of the cutting and sewing tables you use and the comfort of the chair you sit in, comments Mrs. Frances T. Clark, county home demonstration agent.

They felt having the machine needle 7 inches from the front edge of a table at least 19 inches wide added to their convenience. Most of the women like a U-shaped arrangement of sewing equipment. The most popular arrangement had an ironing board at sitting height at the worker's left as she faced the machine. On the other side they recommended a low table for tools and partially finished work.

In laboratory tests of sewing equipment, 24 homemakers found that cutting tables about 36 inches high and not less than 56 inches long made their work easier. Of course the height of the table or cutting board should be adjusted to suit the individual woman who will be using it. A sewing machine table 40 inches long and 28 inches high with a chair 16 inches high suited most workers.

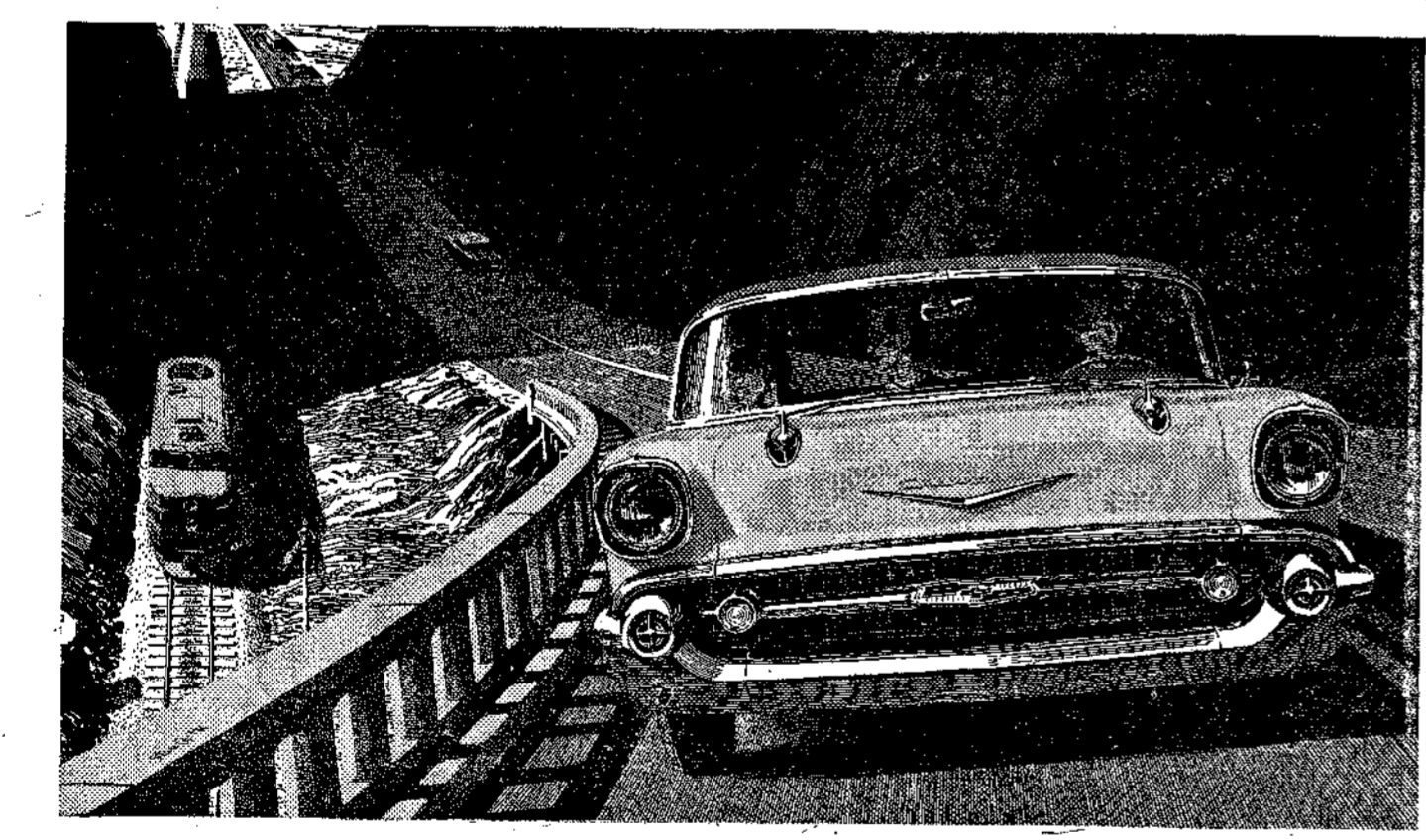

DDT Best for Shoot Moth Control

Most effective treatment for European shoot moth is DDT, reports Don R. Kebler, assistant county agricultural agent.

Entomology and forestry researchers at Michigan State University came to this conclusion after testing DDT along with several new organic insecticides at Kellogg Forest near Augusta. The tests revealed that emulsifiable and wettable powder formulations of DDT were equally effective in summer treatments (made June 22). However, the emulsifiable formulation was slightly more effective for the spring treatment (made April 24).

Also, two summer applications made at 10-day intervals were more effective than a single spray.

Both the spring and summer applications controlled the moth when carefully timed with complete coverage of susceptible shoots.

Recommended concentration is two to three pounds of actual insecticide as an emulsion or a wettable powder in 100 gallons of water or the equivalent in smaller quantities depending on the type of sprayer used. With hand sprayers it may be necessary to increase the concentration.

Agent Kebler urges Christmas tree plantation owners to make provisions for roadways for movement of spray materials and equipment. Air applications of sprays and dusts show little promise, according to the M. S. U. researchers.

Michigan Mirror News in Brief

Michigan Press Association Another look at Michigan's justice of the peace machinery occurred when Francis E. Barron, a Howell attorney, recently charged that JP's often conduct a "racket system" to collect fines and costs.

The justice of the peace operation has been controversial previously. Usually the issue involved is whether these elected officials are qualified to administer their jobs properly.

The new charges take a different tack. In a letter to State Bar Association President John W. Cummins, Barron took issue with the fact that some justices seem to make "too good" a living pursuing the duties of their office.

Particularly singled out are two Oakland County JP's, Willis D. Lefurgy of Waterford Township and Allen C. Ingle of Farmington Township. Both these men earned more than \$25,000 from their share of fees last year.

Lefurgy's case developed from charges made by the Automobile

Club of Michigan that Waterford Township police are conducting a "speed trap" along the busy Dixie Highway between Pontiac and Flint.

Last year's tickets produced more than \$100,000 income for Waterford Township. Lefurgy's share reached \$33,202.10, AAAA says.

"In my opinion, such courts are not courts at all, but merely a racket system for collecting fines and costs for the benefit of the justice and the township," Barron wrote in his letter.

This left the next move up to the State Bar. Officials of that group indicated that the charge would be carefully considered in its committees.

Julie Harris, Edgar Guest, Governor Williams, these are all familiar names to Michigan residents. Today, stories of Michigan actresses, poets, politicians and others who achieved success in their chosen fields are available for the asking. Recognizing that today's "names in the news" will be part of Michigan's history to

morrow, the State Library in Lansing embarked on a program to preserve personal biographies for future generations.

Some 1,000 biographies are already on file. Each is prepared by the "personality" himself. Each covers both factual material, and human interest sidelights that are often lost when a generation dies.

The library sends a form directly to "picked" personalities. This includes information and photographs of historical importance.

The collection is more than a Michigan "Who's Who." The goal is to preserve records direct from persons who have contributed to Michigan's development. A look through the biographies on file discloses many names not generally known, and many not recorded elsewhere.

The unique project began two years ago on a small scale. At first the library collected information only on elected state officials. Then the staff turned its attention to Michigan authors. Now, under the direction of Mrs. Esther Laughlin, the scope of the collection is enlarged. Names are secured through mention in newspapers, from directories and from suggestions of people throughout the state.

That's where you can help. Suggestion of additional names are welcomed by Mrs. Laughlin. Persons in business, in science, the arts, education and in every field are needed.

Send your suggestions to Mrs. Esther Laughlin at the Michigan State Library, 125 E. Shiawassee St., Lansing.

A royal tour awaits some Michigan Miss picked by County dairy committees as a candidate for the statewide Michigan Dairy Princess selection.

On May 7 and 8, county Dairy Princess winners from some 40 counties will gather at Michigan State University for selection of the state princess who will represent Michigan and dairy farmers and processors for the coming year.

"Interest in the event is very enthusiastic," says Charles Stone, State director for the American Dairy Association, the program's major sponsor. Competition among entrants for the County Dairy Princess contests is keen. In Huron County for example there are 44 girls entered.

The princess is selected in conjunction with the "June is Dairy Month" program sponsored by five statewide milk producer and processing groups.

The lucky lass picked in the May finals will find a busy year ahead of her. She will immediately tour the eastern United States as an ambassador for Michigan Week. The trip will

take her to Washington, D. C., and New York City.

Later, her summer will be filled with trips to county celebrations and fairs. Her biggest event comes in October when Michigan Dairy Princess will travel to Chicago to compete with entrants from all over the U. S. for the title of National Dairy Queen.

Last year's festivities drew 37 candidates, with the present reigning Princess, Louise Lagoy, chosen from Calhoun County. Murial Goodrich of Walkerville was the runner-up.

All entrants at the Lansing finals will receive gifts, corsages and trips around the state's capitol.

AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE NO. 42 AN ORDINANCE RELATIVE TO THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A DOG POUND AND THE APPOINTMENT OF A POUND-MASTER, AND THE CONTROL OF DOGS WITHIN THE LIMITS OF THE VILLAGE OF CASS CITY, MICHIGAN.

The Village of Cass City ordains: that section 6 of said ordinance is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 6. No dog shall be released from the pound unless the owner or person entitled to demand the same shall pay the pound-master the sum of three (3.00) dollars for their care and custody as a fraction thereof, and one (1.00) dollar a day for each ensuing day, for the care, custody and feeding of such dog on the part of the pound-master. For all dogs not claimed within seventy-two hours after being impounded, the pound-master shall be liable for the cost of the care and feeding of such dog on the part of the pound-master. The pound-master shall file a monthly report with the clerk of the Village showing the number and sex of all dogs impounded during the month, the description of the same and the names of the owners thereof. The pound-master shall have the authority and the powers of a police officer when in the exercise of his duties as pound-master. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after the date of the regular meeting of the Common Council of the Village of Cass City on the 28th day of March, 1957.

Big School Districts More Efficient Says Robert Fox

The task of getting school districts on a more efficient and financially sound basis is an extremely important one for education in Michigan.

So says Professor Robert S. Fox, director of the University School at The University of Michigan.

"At the present time we have too many small districts without adequate tax basis or pupil population to support the services that are essential," says Professor Fox. "But this doesn't mean that, given an adequate school district, you have to move all the children into a central school. Under certain circumstances, where transportation difficulties exist or where the community life is such that there is a need for a school building as a center, it may be

wise to leave a fairly small school serving the people.

"Especially in the Upper Peninsula where distances between communities are much greater," Professor Fox says, "Many small schools will undoubtedly need to be continued. In these cases, we need to be concerned with getting the most efficient possible school district as an operating base and to equalize educational opportunity by the use of both state and federal funds."

He stresses that rural people are going to have to look unemotionally at the desirability of having their own community school. "The statistics are very clear at the moment that, across the country as a whole, rural children have less adequate education measured by variety of opportunities, specialized classes, caliber of teaching, provision for youngsters with special problems, as well as buildings and equipment."

Professor Fox points out that it doesn't make good sense to prop up these inadequate school districts by pouring into them money from state or federal funds.

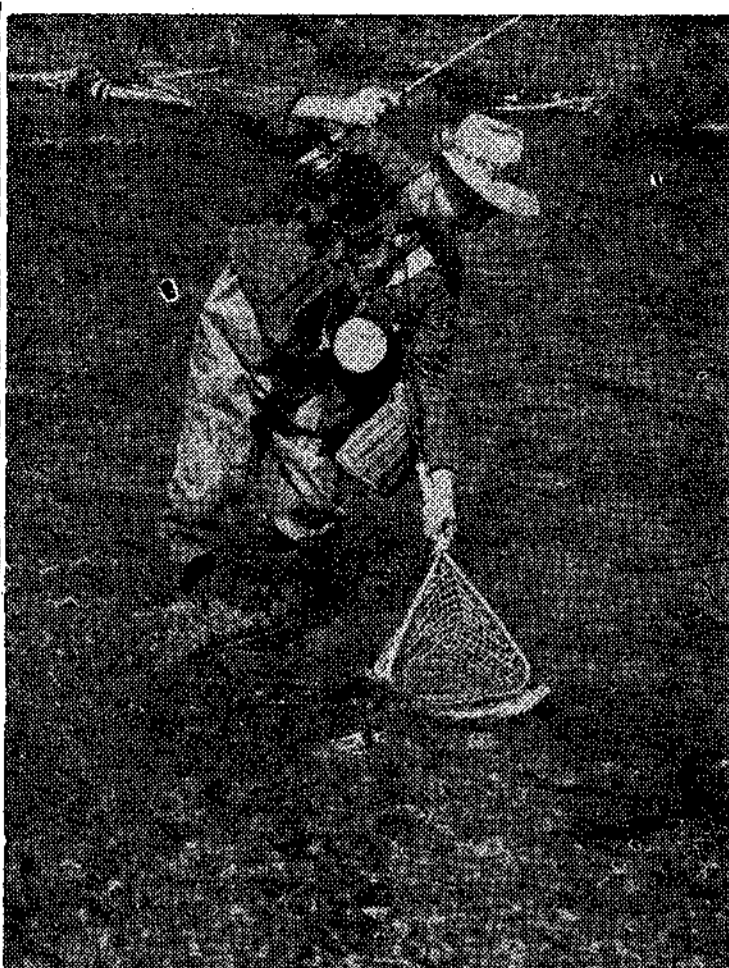
What to do then? He suggests two alternatives: 1) Small districts may combine with larger districts so the tax base is adequate and the number of pupils served is large enough to justify a variety of services; or 2) The county, or some other intermediate unit between the district and the state, may be given some responsibility for providing services which cannot be provided by the district itself.

According to the educator, the picture in the small schools is not all bad. "There are some communities that do have excellent small schools," he says. "At the same time, it may be that this same community, if it got behind a larger program, could be even more effective."

What about transportation? Professor Fox admits this is a real problem, particularly at the lower elementary level. "However, our means of transportation are improving to the point that it's not nearly the hardship it once was to travel some distance."

He declares the farmer is right when it comes to taking pride in his school. "It's desirable that he feel close to it but he must be forward looking about the best administrative unit for providing good schools. "Communities are changing. We are more inter-related and in the interests of efficiency it may well be that for rural communities the school unit should be a larger one than it was originally," he says.

Contracts Must Be Signed by April 15

Farmers have until April 15 to sign Conservation Reserve contracts to begin this year, according to Chas. E. Eckfeld, county office manager of the Tuscola County ASC Committee.

He urged that all farmers sign their contracts as soon as possible before the deadline to avoid the last minute rush. The deadline date originally was set at March 15, but the extension was granted to give farmers a better opportunity to plan their operations for the period of the contract and to relieve pressure on the county offices.

The Conservation Reserve program is the long-range program of the Soil Bank. Under it, farmers may sign contracts to take general cropland out of production and divert it to soil and water conservation uses, tree plantings and wildlife protection for periods of three, five or 10 years.

Under the five and 10-year contracts, farmers may earn payments of 80 per cent of the cost of establishing a conservation practice. All farmers who take part in the program will receive annual per-acre payments for land in the reserve for the periods of their contracts if they remain in compliance with the program.

The April 15 deadline applies only to the 1957 Conservation Reserve program. The signing for contracts to begin in 1958 is expected to start late next summer or early fall.

Farmers who need advice in planning a Conservation Reserve program for their land should consult their county ASC office this week.
