Judge Quinn had been forced to recess the one-man grand jury during the last month due to the pressure of court work in his own circuit in Lapeer and Tuscola counties.

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After 22 Years in Business Dupuis Announces Sale of IGA Store

G. B. Dupuis will end 22 years in the grocery business in Cass City Monday when Bruce W. Frantz of Aigonac will take over the business here.

The new owners purchased the store from the Dupuis last week and the effective date of the transfer is Monday. The sale includes the building, stock and fixtures. Terms were not disclosed.

Mr. Dupuis said that he was forced to sell his business because of a heart ailment. Doctors have prescribed complete rest for at least a year.

The Dupuis opened their store here Oct. 1, 1935, and purchased the store building in 1942. Mr. and Mrs. Dupuis said that they have purchased a home near Singing Bridge, East Tawas, and will make their home there.

Mr. Dupuis expressed appreciation to all his friends and patrons during his many years in the community and said that he feels the new owners will continue with the service that has been established in the store.

The grocery business will not be a new experience for the new owners. Mr. Frantz operated a smaller store in Aigonac before moving to the village.

Mr. Frantz is married and has three children.

School Still in Class "B" After Classes Altered

The Michigan High School Athletic Association has changed the class limits for B, C and D schools again this year, but the reclassification will have no effect on Cass City.

Class "B," which Cass City competes in, has been changed from 375-899 pupils to 400-899 pupils. At the present time there are 481 pupils in the top four grades in Cass City High School.

The change in limitations will have one effect. Marlette, which was just about ready to enter the "B" ranks, will now be able to compete in class "C," as it has in the past.

The division line in enrollments places nearly all of the teams in the "Thumb B" Conference just over the line in Class "B" where they compete with schools with twice the enrollment of conference schools.

More fortunate are Marlette and Sandusky which can continue to compete in Class "C" where they will rank with the largest schools of the class in the state.

She was brought to trial after she allegedly left three children unattended in a Quiancasse home from Saturday until Tuesday, New Year's night.

Witnesses for the state included: Georgia Willett, who said she found the children unattended and called the police; Margaret Kane, a registered nurse who said that the children were in filthy condition; the three children, who testified how long they were left alone; and Pedro Alvario, who said that one of the children came to him and said that they were out of fuel oil.

Members of the jury were Paul Thorp, Emory Orr, Ethel Linzer, John Valentine, Edward Raymond, Glen Ostrander, Delphine Hill, Clayton Rohlfis, George Hanes, Oscar Stein, Louis Severance and Leon Coleman.

Earlier this year the daughter of Mrs. Burgett, Thelma Bombard, received a prison sentence on an abandonment and neglect charge. Following the trial of Mrs. Burgett, her husband, George, is scheduled to be tried on the same charge at a date to be set.

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
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


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Long Illness Fatal For Mrs. Ruth Smith

Watch for Disease in Poultry Flocks

All laying flocks should be vaccinated against Newcastle disease and infectious bronchitis before they are sixteen weeks old, according to S. C. Schmittle, Michigan State University poultry specialist.

On most Michigan farms, chicks should be vaccinated against Newcastle disease when between two and four weeks of age. A bronchitis vaccination along with a Newcastle booster should be given at 16 weeks.

But, if either bronchitis or chronic respiratory disease have bothered growing birds in your area, Alfred Ballweg, county agricultural agent, suggests vaccination against Newcastle and bronchitis at four weeks. Boosters with both vaccines should be given when the chicks reach 16 weeks.

Agent Ballweg points out that if either Newcastle or infectious bronchitis has been on your farm in recent months, you should vaccinate all chicks as soon as they arrive.

If both diseases are uncommon in your neighborhood, vaccinate against both diseases when birds are between twelve and sixteen weeks old.

In a flock of less than 500 birds, Newcastle vaccine can be applied directly to the birds. Infectious bronchitis vaccine should be applied by the intranasal method in a small flock.

In a large flock, vaccines can best be applied in drinking water and directions must be followed to the letter.

Do not use the dust or spray method when vaccinating replacement pullets near a susceptible laying flock. Ballweg also warns against wing-web vaccination for Newcastle under these conditions.

Birds should be vaccinated only when they are in good health. Another rule is: two vaccines with live virus should never be given at once unless one is a booster.

In laying flocks, vaccines with live Newcastle or bronchitis viruses should not be used unless the threat is great.

Flocks treated by spray, dust or drinking water must be re-vaccinated every four to six months.







Grading on the 3 1/2 miles of state highway between Cass City and the junction of M-81 and M-53 is nearing completion and Contractor E. B. Schwaderer plans to start pouring cement for the span of concrete highway next Tuesday. The cement work is expected to be completed within a month.

Both parties agree that the voter has it in his power in 1958 to alter Michigan's government. There have been numerous proposals in the past, including the adoption of the Nebraska system of a one-chamber legislature. Or a generous convention could legalize bingo, a proposition defeated in 1954; it might add a member to the Supreme Court to end 4 to 4 decisions.

Democrats charge that a constitutional convention will be peopled by Republicans because traditionally, outstate voters send Republicans to the Senate. Republicans retort that the voters approved the reapportionment amendment in 1952, thus tacitly agreeing to the procedure for electing delegates to a constitutional convention.

Despite their hold on the Senate and the makeup of a convention, the Republicans are fearful that any rewrite of the constitution might upset the reapportionment process. Civil service, in effect since 1941, has a growing number of critics, and its champions fear the way Michigan hires its 27,000 employees would be changed.

Democrats already are fighting for another system. The 1952 amendment created the "balanced legislature," with the House (110 members) representing people or population and the Senate (34 members) representing areas.

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MICHIGAN MIRROR NEWS BRIEFS

Voters will get a chance in 1958 to rewrite the constitution which has guided Michigan's state government since 1908.

Whether to call a constitutional convention will automatically go on the November, 1958 ballot.

Dozens of major amendments have been made to the constitution in the last 50 years, including state civil service, sales tax distribution, and reapportionment of the legislature.

The latter, adopted in 1952, is the crux of a new fight between political parties and will, in effect, determine the makeup of a constitutional convention if the voters order it.

Under another section of the constitution, a convention to write the basic law is composed of three delegates from each state senatorial district.

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One major point: No legislator may be a delegate to a constitutional convention, placing Michigan's government for a time squarely in the hands of the governed.

And, under the present constitution, the voters have a chance to vote automatically for or against a constitutional convention, every 16 years.

Experts in local property valuation will help fix property tax rates next year. Gov. Williams has signed into law a bill reorganizing the state board of equalization to include two new members, recognized experts in the fields of rural and urban property tax assessment.

The bill was sponsored by Senator John P. Smeekens (R-Coldwater), a former member of a county board of supervisors who listened to the woes of local taxpayers.

"We will now have men on the board who know the local problem," he said. The two new members will replace the state auditor general and the director of agriculture. Enactment of the law came too late for the change to take effect this year. The board approved a 10 per cent across-the-board increase, totaling \$70,000,000 in new local property taxes.

Prison troubles again plague Michigan. There are no riots at Jackson State Prison, no mass escapes from Marquette State Prison, and reforms are quiet at Ionia State Reformatory.

This time the trouble is at the Detroit House of Correction, where the state houses all its women prisoners and a number of male trustees. The state corrections commission has asked for an investigation of conditions following a sit-down strike by the women and Detroit penal officials have agreed.

In addition, Corrections Director Gus Harrison is worried about overcrowded conditions at all prisons. The total inmate count is expected to reach an all-time high of 10,500 next year.


