

Parking Meters Discussed at Council Meeting

An informal discussion of parking meters in Cass City was held at the regular monthly meeting of the village council Tuesday evening in the Municipal Building.

An expression of opinions by council members indicated that the majority of the members are for installation, although no direct action at this time was suggested Tuesday.

Advantages of the meters, the council feels, are more parking space available, more orderly parking and the removal of merchants' cars from valuable parking space on the street.

Parking meters would necessarily require better off-street parking, it was suggested by Trustees Cliff Ryan and Warren Wood.

The installation of the meters would also require another man on full time duty on the police force.

It was brought out that most merchants in Cass City are now opposed to meters, although the council feels that no business would be lost because of the meters.

Sewage Disposal
Grease waste in the sewer system has caused trouble at the disposal plant and the council took steps Tuesday to correct it.

They instructed Nelson Willy, in charge of the plant, to contact a man from the State Health Department to make suggestions and help draw an ordinance.

Waste from Eria's slaughterhouse has caused much of the trouble, Village Engineer William Schram reported. Richard Eria, one of the owners, informed the council that he is ready to take any steps advised by the visiting expert to correct the situation.

Other Business
The parking lines on Main Street will be repainted and the angle and width of the lines will probably be changed.

A request by Howard Bacon for a fence on village property in front of his house was denied by the council.

Deadline for School Board Nominees June 15

The newly consolidated Cass City School District will hold its first election July 8 and the school board announced this week that the terms of two board members are expiring this year.

The district uses the nominating petition and general election ballot to elect members. School board posts are open to any qualified elector of the district.

All persons who are registered for general elections are automatically registered in the school district. Persons desiring to register should do so with their township clerk.

A candidate must have 25 signatures on his nominating petition to be eligible to have his name on the general election ballot.

Deadline for filing nominating petitions is June 15.

Slow Machine Delivery Delays Tusco Opening

Authorities at Tusco Products in Cass City announced this week that many applications were received last week end but that they still need more and are taking them at the plant now.

Full production at the plant is expected to start within two months. At the present time, a few persons are working on temporary equipment, processing an order for floor mats for cars.

The opening of the plant has been delayed by the lack of new machinery that has been ordered but not yet delivered by manufacturers.

Council Still Studies Raise For Village Crew

The problem of salaries for village employees is still to be settled after a report was made by the committee in charge, Trustees Mrs. K. I. MacRae and Andrew Bigelow.

The committee made a careful study of the amounts received by employees and the amount available for salaries. Their conclusions were that a three percent raise was all that could be afforded by the village.

Employees had asked for 10 cents an hour and the three percent would be about four cents an hour. Village hourly employees now receive \$1.40 per hour.

However, because of the number of hours worked by members of the crew, some of the hourly employees are receiving more money than Village Engineer William Schram, who is on a salary basis.

Trustee C. R. Hunt said that any system that paid less to the top man than others needs correcting. He also pointed out that he felt Mrs. Wilma Fry also was entitled to a substantial raise.

Trustees concurred with this viewpoint.

President B. F. Benkelman Jr. then threw the whole matter back to the committee for further study with the provision that any raises decided on would be retroactive to June 1.

Softball Returns to Cass City

For the first time in several years organized softball will be played in Cass City, it was revealed this week by Ken Eisinger, business manager, and Carl Kolb, manager, of the new team.

The Cass City Merchants will play in a five-team traveling league and all of the Merchants' home league games will be played on Wednesday evenings, under the lights at the Cass City Recreational Park.

Local fans will have an opportunity to see the Merchants in action in a non-league encounter tonight (Friday) at 8 p. m. when the team is scheduled to play Bad Axe.

The Cass City Gavel Club is sponsoring the opener and proceeds will go to the club's fund for rebuilding the truck.

Congressman Robert J. McIntosh announced late Tuesday afternoon that carrier postal service in Cass City will start in about 90 days.

In a wire to the Chronicle he said that the postal department has approved the new service pending procurement of new equipment and arranging of details for the carrier service.

A survey of the community was made in mid-April by Postal Inspector R. A. Wiedauer who reported at the time of his investigation that conditions were favorable and that home mail delivery was likely in the village.

Activity for home mail delivery was first started when the Chronicle reported that, since Cass City had grown to nearly 2,000 persons, carrier service might be possible in the village.

For about a year, no action was taken on the project. Then, early this year, the Chamber of Commerce started a drive that was proven to be successful.

Petitions were placed at strategic spots in the community. The signatures were forwarded to the department and the survey of the community made.

Although the population was slightly under what the department considered necessary, other factors such as good sidewalks and streets influenced the inspector to make a favorable report.

If plans, as established by the postal inspector, are followed there will be two routes in Cass City. Mail will be delivered twice daily to the business district and once to all homes in the village.

Two Large Silos On Donahue Farm

Two of the largest silos in the Thumb area are now under construction at the farm of Dr. H. T. Donahue of Cass City.

The two silos will have a combined capacity of 778 tons of silage. Each is 20 feet in diameter and 50 feet high.

Feed is removed from both silos automatically. The feed is dropped by a machine to an auger which carries it some 60 feet to the feed box for cattle.

In addition to the two new silos, a smaller silo already on the farm will also be used.

Silage for the three units will be raised on the Donahue farm, according to present plans.

Kindergartners Enroll June 5

Mrs. Lucy Starmann, teacher, announced this week that the annual enrollment of students entering kindergarten next fall has been scheduled for Wednesday, June 5, at 1 p. m. in the kindergarten room of Cass City Schools.

Mrs. Starmann reminds parents that students must be five years old by Dec. 1 to be eligible to enter school in the fall. Parents must bring birth certificates at enrollment time.

County Hospital Construction to Total \$755,044

The Tuscola County Board of Supervisors accepted low bids for the construction of the Tuscola County Nursing Home in Caro last week. The building will be constructed at a total cost of \$755,044.

Low bidder from among eight general contractors was the Englehardt Construction Company of Bay City. Their total bid was \$464,840. Base bid of the company was \$432,000. Alternates in construction made the total bid higher. Base bids from the contractors ranged from Englehardt's low to a top of \$514,600.

Bay City Plumbing and Heating was low among three mechanical bids received with a bid of \$175,000. Ervin Electric Co. of Saginaw bid \$54,800 for the electrical work on the building. Seven other bids were received.

Two bids were received for installing the elevator in the building. The Otis Company's bid of \$14,785 was low.

Kitchen equipment will be furnished by Ruslander and Sons, Inc., of Buffalo, N. Y. Their bid of \$19,898 was the lowest of five received.

Insurance for the new building will be handled by the Osgerby Insurance Agency of Caro, the supervisors decided.

More Water for 7th Street Residents

Village Engineer William Schram reported to the council Tuesday that there is no water pressure on Seventh Street from Seeger Street west.

The area also does not have adequate fire protection, the council decided. For this reason, a four-inch main and another fire hydrant will be installed this summer.

Total cost of the project is estimated at about \$1,800.

Grant MSU 4-H Scholarship to Gary Don Jones

Gary Don Jones, son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Jones of Decker, has been awarded a Michigan State University 4-H Scholarship, it was announced recently by authorities at the college.

The scholarship provides for tuition of \$68 per term or \$816 for four years as long as Mr. Jones meets the scholastic requirements of the grant.

Proposed storm sewer work on Main Street will be delayed a year as the council made plans Tuesday night for more extensive work on the street with financial assistance from Federal aid money. The decision was reached at the regular council meeting at the Cass City Municipal Building.

Trustee C. R. Hunt reported that money is available for approved construction, but it is too late for any action by the State this year.

Mr. Hunt reported that no funds would be available for a piecemeal operation as contemplated by the village. If aid money is to be received a complete job on the remainder of Main Street would be required.

The work will include installing adequate drainage, resurfacing the sides of the street to the edge where curb and gutter will be installed.

After considerable discussion, the council felt that they may be able to do the work for as little as a third of the total cost. Aid money would come to 50 percent of the total cost of the job and property owners, if two-thirds of the owners agree, will pay one-half of the cost of the curbing alone.

Send Request
Because the Highway Department considers work for future years in July, trustees passed a resolution saying that they would like to do the Main Street work with Federal Aid. The request is expected to be sent to the Highway Department next week.

Supervisors Send Resolution to Highway Dept.

The Tuscola County Board of Supervisors passed a resolution at their regular May meeting last week saying that the county wishes to retain a contract between the County Road Commission and the State.

Supervisors said they felt it was in the best interest of the county to continue an agreement that has been in force here since 1941. The agreement provides that the county will be paid for maintaining state trunkline highways within the county.

The resolution will be presented to Highway Commissioner-Elect Fred C. Makie and Gov. G. Mennen Williams in person by Fred Henderson and David N. Andreychuk.

The resolution was submitted to the supervisors by the roads and bridges committee: Conrad Mueller, Quentin Howell, Carl Lindsay, Howard Slafter and Archie Hicks.





BULEN TALKS Cars

One of the first big changes in automobile tires came in 1922 when they introduced balloon tires. They were big, fat doughnuts with pressures of only 12 pounds or so and you could ride over curbs as if they were only ordinary bumps.

Why aren't they around still? Well, they had their disadvantages. They developed shimmy, instability, drag and they were hard to steer. Aside from that they were fine.

The more recent big news in automobile tires has, of course, been wrapped up in the word "tubeless." Their speedy introduction by the tire industry, and their adoption as standard equipment by the auto manufacturers, helps answer, I think, those critics who say car makers aren't interested in safety.

An interesting sidelight in the tubeless tire situation is that their introduction put a damper on the style-trend towards wire wheels. Wire wheels can be used with tubeless tires, but it's more difficult because with tubeless tires the rim becomes part of the tire, so to speak, and must help keep the air inside. So the points where the wire sticks into the rim must be carefully and permanently sealed.

It has been much easier, therefore, to use metal discs painted to look like wire wheels.

The great advantage of the tubeless is that it rules out the chance of the tire pinching the inner tube and causing a blowout. And most of the other ways to get a blowout are also eliminated. Also, there is no friction and heat developed between the inner tube and tire.

A sharp object stuck in the tubeless tire won't cause an immediate flat, but it should be removed as soon as you spot it. The hole then should be plugged. Or, if you have the self-sealing kind, the tire will do this itself.

The wear on tire treads is often a good barometer of how your car is acting. When you're in next time, let us take a look.



Michigan has counted its blessings and recognized the progress of its state again.

Each of the state's 7,500,000 citizens could be his own public relations man from May 19 to 25, preaching the glories of living in Michigan to the world.

As the week started, engineers announced that the state's two peninsulas had been spanned for the first time in history by steel beams—the framework of the Mackinac Straits Bridge.

With an overall length of 26,444 feet, the dream of linking the Upper and Lower peninsulas will be realized next November.

It is just one of the highlights

of the week set aside each spring to advertise and promote Michigan.

The state's vacationland, surrounding more than 11,000 inland lakes, the growth of the resort industry to a \$500,000,000 business—plus other uncounted millions in tax money left in the state by resorters—was heralded as a major factor in the economy.

"All of us should be proud of our achievements, and in that pride should find strength to make ours an even more wonderful state," said Gov. Williams' proclamation.

Another part of the pride of Michigan is wrapped up in the \$500,000,000 highway program scheduled during the next three years, \$200,000,000 of it set for next year.

Great advances have been made in the care of mentally retarded children, the rehabilitation of prison inmates and the safeguarding of the health of the public.

Air travel has expanded and airports have improved to meet the need, while the St. Lawrence Seaway promises to make Michigan a world trading center.

Each of the seven days of Michigan Week was a special promotion.

Spiritual Foundations started the week Sunday, May 19, and the next day, mayors and village presidents from all parts of the state exchanged cities and villages for the day.

Tuesday was Hospitality Day, emphasizing the "natural friendliness" of the Michigan home.

Wednesday told how citizens make their living—with tributes to industry, business and other methods.

Thursday was Education Day

Some of the subjects which Siems studied were: grass waterways, contour farming, soils, farm ponds, terracing and drainage.

This intensive training will enable Siems to do a better job of providing technical assistance to farmers in the Tuscola Soil Conservation District.

A Packaged Fruit

Opening packages is always fun, and one package that little children especially enjoy unwrapping is a banana. This wholesome, clean, luscious fruit is good for youngsters or oldsters.

Bananas are available every month of the year, but from now until about mid-June, the quality is excellent, and the price often around 2 to 4 cents per pound lower than winter prices. There are usually three bananas to a pound. Buy them partially green if you do not plan to use them right away. They will ripen in a bowl at room temperature. If they are yellow, tipped with green, they are only partly ripe and just right for baking; broiling and frying. Cooking brings out a very different, very rich flavor.

When fully ripe, bananas are easily digested. Bananas and milk make a fine flavor team. The team is nutritionally balanced, with a banana furnishing about 15 per cent of the daily requirement for Vitamin C and 10 per cent of Vitamin A.

Bananas should not be kept in the refrigerator because they will turn brown without ripening. But if they are fully ripe, put them in the refrigerator for a day or two to slow up over ripening.

Bananas are harvested green; the whole plant is cut down. (No, there is not such a thing as a banana tree.) The stem where the bananas are attached grows out over the top of the plant and holds the fruit fingers pointed up. Most bananas come from Central and South America.

Song writers were nomenclating bananas in the early twenties with "Yes, we have no bananas," and these days you are hearing the colorful "Banana Boat Song."

Here is a delicious and nourishing way to serve bananas, either with or between meals—a Banana Milk Shake.

Banana Milk Shake

1 fully ripe banana
1 cup cold milk

Peel and slice banana into a bowl and beat until smooth and creamy. Add milk and mix thoroughly. Serve cold. Serves 2 medium size drinks.

Local schools will get all the money in state aid they believed they were guaranteed a year ago.

The legislature advanced the payment of \$24,000,000 from the primary school interest fund from July 1 to April 30 to make certain local school budgets would balance this year.

Last year, the schools said they believed they would get enough to pay \$190 per pupil from their automatic two-thirds of the state sales tax.

Do Not Clip Lawns Too Short Says County Agent

Whether you are making a new lawn, or taking care of an established lawn, cutting height is important for each grass variety. This is especially true for shaded lawns where mowing is often too close, according to Alfred Ballweg, Tuscola County agricultural agent.
You will get a better turf where the grass is growing in competition with shade trees if you mow your lawns as recommended until about June 15, then put your lawn mower away. Bring it out only if the summer conditions are so unfavorable that the grass becomes unsightly.
Such shaded lawns are in heavy competition with trees and shrubs for food and water. Open lawns have their problems as well for they are exposed to the hot summer sun and suffer the danger of drought.
Ballweg points out that such lawn grasses as Kentucky bluegrass and red fescue should be cut at 1½ to 2 inches in height when grown in open sunny areas. When these grasses are grown in shade, cut them at 2 to 2½ inches in height.
Merion bluegrass, another popular grass, can be cut at ¾ of an inch but grows better when cut at a height of 1½ to 2 inches.
To help you in establishing a new lawn, or in caring for an established lawn, your county extension office has the following folders available without charge: Making a New Lawn, folder F-211; and Care of an Established Lawn, folder F-212.

New Program For 4-H Members

A new award program for 4-H Club boys and girls in Tuscola County was launched at a meeting on May 15 during the annual 4-H Club Agent's Conference, according to an announcement by Bill Muller, County 4-H Club Agent. Details of the 4-H Key Club Award were explained to approximately 100 county 4-H Club agents and other extension personnel by Russell G. Mawby, Assistant Director of Extension, 4-H Club Program and Milo Margenau, vice-president of Cities Service Oil Company. This new program is offered through the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work and is sponsored jointly by the Michigan State University Cooperative Extension Service and by Cities Service Oil Company.

It is also to encourage boys and girls to continue their work in 4-H. Awards in this program are gold keys mounted on bracelets for the girls and tie clasps for the boys. Each award is engraved with the name of the recipient.
In addition to the gold keys, each recipient is provided with a framed honor certificate of award. Those who win this award become life members of the Michigan 4-H Key Club. The awards are limited to the top 4-H Club members in the county and based on their 4-H record of achievement.
This new program has already been installed in Oklahoma, Minnesota, Kansas, Indiana, Illinois, Connecticut, Louisiana, Tennessee, Missouri, Virginia and North Dakota. Plans are being made to extend this program to a national basis.
The first awards will be presented at the county achievement meetings this fall.




