Sample counts of live borerssource of devouring hordes that may hatch during the coming year if weather is favorable-were made by agricultural agencies in 27 States last fall.

For all States surveyed, average borer numbers decreased from 147 per 100 plants in 1955 to 105 in 1956.

Borer populations have been building up in the East and declining in the North Central States since 1954. Six of 11 Eastern States reporting in both 1955 and 1956 .recorded important increases in 1956, with the average for all 11 States rising from 75 borers per 100 corn stalks in 1955 to 130 in 1956. Heaviest concentrations were found in New Jersey, Rhode Island, Delaware, New York, Virginia, and Pennsylvania. Among eastern States, only Maryland re-ported a pronounced decrease under 1955.
