polio shot and about 50 per cent nave had their second shot. There are no records of the numher of children who have received their final shot, as it is adminis ered by private physicians. Mrs. Stevens said that general

physical condition of the children is determined by examination early in the year. Special emphasis is placed on teeth, hair and hearing of the students. Mrs. Stevens told of a scalp







County Tests Show Genesee Wheat Tops Other Strains

The County Extension office, in cooperation with Alvin Humpert of Reese in Denmark Township and the Farm Crops Department of Michigan State University, conducted comparative yield checks on Genesee, Yorkwin and Dawbul varieties of wheat. According to Alfred Ballweg, Tuscola County agricultural agent, two plots of each variety were planted on September 24, 1956-All plots were harvested July 24 with a combine. The total grains harvested from each plot was then weighed. The average weights converted to bushels for each variety are as follows: Genesee, 61.5 bushels per acre; Yorkwin, 56.4 bushels per acre-

and Dawbul, 54.5 bushels per acre. The gross return per acre for

each variety of wheat at the price of \$2.00 per bushel would be \$123.00 for Genesee, \$112.80 for Yorkwin and \$109.00 for Dawbul. Wheat growers are reminded, however, that these are results of one year's trial and on

one farm. Yield differences correspond very closely with previ-ous tests conducted by the Farms Crops Department at MSU. They also correspond closely with the results of several years of testing at Ontario, Canada, where

Dawbul originated.

Tips for Removing Fruit Stains Offered

"Pour on boiling water" is a long familiar rule for taking fruit stains out of washable clothing or linens. But boiling water may damage some fabrics, cautions Mrs. Frances T. Clark, county home demonstration

agent. According to U.S. Department of Agriculture research on fabric care, boiling water removes some special finishes on cotton and shrinks Dynel and some woolens. It may also fade

or affect the texture of silk. Using cool water is safer, Mrs. Clark points out. Cool water may be used on any fabric that won't water spot. If the stain is mostly on the surface, you may be able to sponge it off with a damp cloth. Or, lay the stained fabric, face side down, on a pad of cleansing tissues or on an absorbent cloth and force water through the stain with an eye dropper or small syringe. This is to remove the stain without getting much of the surrounding fabric wet. It may be the best way to treat a fresh stain on a


wool garment, for example.

But if the fabric is washableespecially if it's going into the laundry anyway, give it an overnight soak in cool water. Start by working the stain between the hands to soften the fabric and loosen the fruit particles. After soaking, rub on soap or synthetic detergent and wash it. Rinse thoroughly. If a trace of stain still remains, a mild bleach

may be needed. Use bleach diluted in water. Avoid chlorine if there's a chance that the fabric. has a resin finish. Many "wash-
