On Market Soon

A new easy-ironing and quickdrying cotton, resistant to damage from rot and heat will be making its market debut in the future. According to Mrs. Frances T. Clark, county home demonstration agent, the treated fabric has been made by a pro-cess developed by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The "fully acetylated" cotton s heavier, but faster drying than ordinary cotton. It is also stronger and more heat and rot resistant. It looks like untreated cotton, but is more harsh feeling. Researchers hope that adding softening chemicals to the treatment may eliminate this harshness. It can be dyèd a full range of colors and shades and is not affected by solvents that dissolvé some synthetic fibers.

Mrs. Clark tells that pleats that will withstand considerable wear and creasing can be ironed into the new fabric with a dry household iron at the temperature setting for wool. After washing, the pleats are easy to re-set, although they may be ironed flat and new pleats ironed

Berry Time

The blue skies of July and August bring along one of Michigan's specialty crops—the blueberry. About half of the crop goes to the processing plants to eappear later as canned or berry pię.

The fresh cultivated berries come to the market in pint baskets, usually covered with cellophane. They should be plump, clean and firm with no moisture on them. They keep better than many other berries, so you can use a few at a time for muffins, etc., and keep the rest in the refrigerator. They will keep about 10 days with refrig-

Late July and early August is good time to buy blueberries for freezing. The fully ripe, blue black ones are best. Sort the berries and remove any sticks, leaves, crushed or unripe fruit, wash gently, then drain. If you plan to use them for pies or salads during the winter, just dry pack and freeze. For fresh fruit desserts of any

kind, cover with a 40 per cent syrup and freeze. Whichever way you choose, remember to leave a one-half inch space at the top of the container to let them expand when they are frozen. Seal and freeze berries immediately and store at 0 degrees or below.

Even the weight-watchers can enjoy blueberries, only 42 calories in half a cup. Good for all the family, too, because they supply both iron and vitamin C. How about some blueberry pancakes with brown sugar for breakfast? M--M--?

which eat the wool. It's the moth larvae which do that. The flying moth will, of course, be laying eggs that do damage later, but you can be certain damage has already been done if you go into your closet and see a flying moth.

Moths can't last if you take proper precautions. They can't get started either if you're vigilant about putting away something which has been washed or drycleaned and then moth-proofed. It's that simple.

Home Precautions Any woolens which can be washed you can take care of yourself. Wash them in the usual manner for wool, that is, with mild soap or detergent and water which is tepid or with cold water and a special wool soap. When it comes

to rinsing you add the newest

mothproofer to the rinse water, a preparation containing 25% DDT.

Check the label on the bottle for proportions. When you're storing blankets or woolens you can sprinkle the mothproofing flakes or crystals between folds of the woolens. A one-pound box is enough for mothproofing

the contents of a large storage box. Any boxes used for storage should be tightly sealed with gummed tape. Metal boxes which are used should lock tight.

If' you own a cedar chest, you can forget about moths as long as your woolens are clean before you place them in the chest.





Field Crops Tour Mrs. Adah Cummins and son Scheduled Aug. 15

The annual Tuscola County field crops tour has been scheduled for Thursday, August 15, beginning at 10 a. m., according to agricultural agent Alfred Ballweg. Tuscola County farmers are invited to join with their neighbors and take in all or any part of the tour. There will be some real interesting farm production practices to observe and an opportunity to answer many

Tour schedule is as follows:

Stop No. 1-Walter Hecht farm,

% mile south of M-46 on Brad-

leyville Rd. Here we will see the results of the new miracle chemical "Simazin" on corn with no cultivation. Stop No. 2—Robert Aldrich farm on Vassar Rd. and just south of Reinbold Rd. Here we will have a real opportunity to look at a field of Sanilac beans along side of a field of Newfeld 211 separated by 4 rows of corn. Stop No. 3-Elmer Goetz farm, VanBuren Rd., 1/2 mile south of Reese. Pennscot, the new red clover, will be compared with Mammoth clover grown in the same field. Stop No. 4, 1:30 p. m. -Harold and Roy Hickey, farm located 3 miles west, 1 mile north and 1/2 mile west of Fairgrove. Here we will see (after walking in the field ¼ mile), a small area of a field of sugar beets almost completely destroyed by nematodes, the 'king of the pests.' Let's learn more about these crop robbers. Stop No. 5-Ellis Aldrich farm, 1 mile north and % mile west of Fairgrove. On July 15 Ellis seeded broadcast in his corn 10 lbs. sweet clover and 10 lbs. of rye grass. This has become an accepted practice on the Aldrich farm and one that more farmers should use. Stop No. 6-Milton and Glenn Bender farm bean field at junction of Fairgrove and Unionville Rds. Here we will see a field of Michelite and Sanilac beans growing side



Michigan Press Association Democrats are now embarked on their first complete operation of state government for the first time in two generations. Gov. Williams voiced a warning:

'We are on the spot to produce. We welcome that. To the top six administrative offices won in 1956, the Democrats added the department of

public instruction and the state ighway department last spring. The party celebrated by staging the first spring inauguration eremonies in Michigan history.

Taking office were Dr. Lynn M. Bartlett, new superintendent of public instruction, Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie and Chris Magnusson, new member of the state board of educa-

Williams spoke of a "mandate of the people," and said the victories at the polls meant that the public wanted Democrats to build their highways and administer the education of their

It was made plain that major policies and decisions would be made in a position not too far away from the office Democrats have held for almost nine years -that of Williams.

The Democratic take-over in Michigan was a step-by-step pro-

Williams shocked Republicans in 1948 when he handily defeated former Gov. Kim Sigler, bringing in with him his own iieutenant governor John Connolly and Atty. Gen. Steven J.

Roth and Connolly fell by the wayside two years later, but Williams remained—alone but in a commanding position as chief

Came 1954 and Williams won again with his full fall slate, leaving only the department of public instruction and the highway department still in the hands of Republicans. Last spring, the full sweep was

completed. "Now we've got no one to fight with, except the legislature (still Republican controlled)," aid one Democratic Chieftain.



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
