

## \$100,000 Hospital Drive Under Way

Includes Hospital Site

### Council Accepts Plat For New Subdivision

The village council accepted a plat for Hills and Dales Number Two subdivision at its regular meeting at the Municipal Building Tuesday night.

The plat includes several lots and the site of the new hospital. Included was the right-of-way for a new road to be known as Hospital Drive.

The road will run on the north, west and south sides of the hospital and connect with Hill Street, which is located on the east side of the hospital site. With the new road, the hospital will be completely circled with a road.

The plat was presented by M. R. Auten, spokesman for the owners of the Hills and Dales subdivision.

#### New Roof

The bid of John Bohnsack and Son of \$621.70 for a new roof on the Municipal Building was accepted. Work will be started as soon as weather permits.

Another expenditure authorized by the council was \$54.50 for a clam shell for cleaning catch basins. The tool was purchased on the advice of Village Engineer William Schram, who said that a demonstration convinced him that it would materially speed the cleaning operation.

Two members of the village police force will have better police clothing. A complete uniform was authorized for William McKinley and new trousers okayed for Ed Antnes.

#### Deny Requests

Several requests were denied by trustees Tuesday. Warren Kelley of Cass City Floral requested permission to place a sign pointing towards his shop on the corner of Main and Leach Streets. The request was denied.

At the request of Detroit Edison, the replacing of some 57 village street lights, now served with 1000-watt bulbs, with 2500-watt bulbs was discussed.

The Edison Company said that it is getting more difficult to get the 1000-watt bulbs and wants to make a gradual change-over to the larger size.

### Walt Goodall Ships Six Purebred Sheep to Ecuador

Six purebred Corriedale sheep raised by Walt Goodall are on their way to a new home in Ecuador, South America.

The sheep are part of a contingent of 125 from Michigan that is being sent in the CARE program through Michigan State University.

The sheep were taken to MSU where they were examined by veterinarians and sheep experts at the University before being accepted to ship.

The sheep left the Goodall farm Thursday, Sept. 19, and were sent by rail to Florida. From Florida they will be sent by air to their new homes. Because of air travel, only young sheep were shipped. Mr. Goodall sold five ewes and a ram.

The Corriedales were selected, Mr. Goodall said, because it is a grazing and flocking breed.

The sheep will go to farmers in mountainous country and these characteristics are expected to make them thrive in Ecuador.

All junior high games will start at 7 p. m. and reserve games will start at 7:30 p. m.

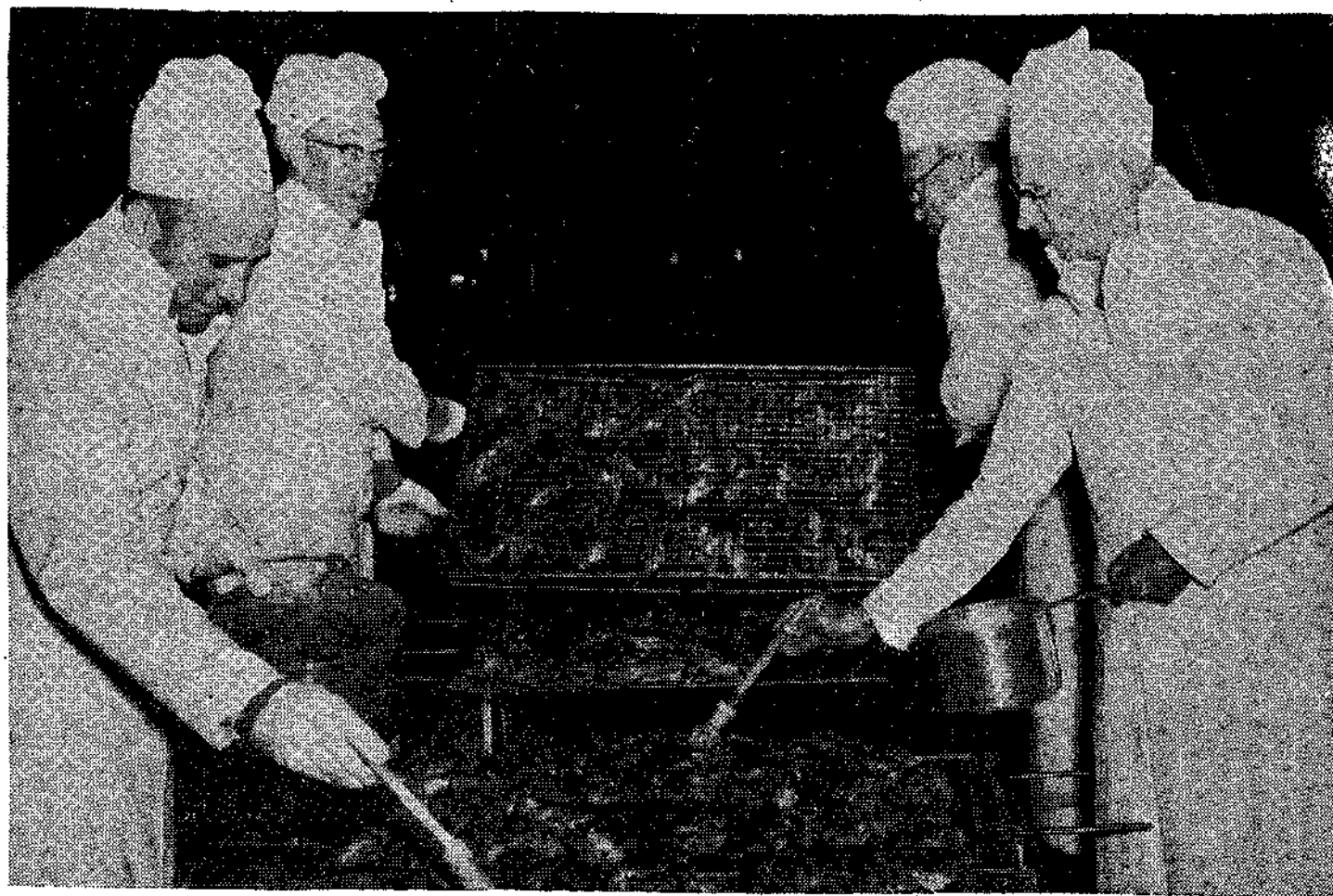

It was released this week by Almer Krueger, president of the Cass City Area Pageant Association, that National Geographic will not publish the Cass City Christmas pictures in its magazine this Christmas.

We sincerely believe that the rejection of the story will be taken in the proper spirit by the many persons in the community who work to make Christmas a success in the village.

Although publicity is always easy to take, it is not the primary purpose of the Pageant and of Cass City's Christmas.

Whether or not the community's efforts receive national publicity, the pageant and the displays are still seen and appreciated by thousands and thousands of persons each year.

It is for this that the effort was first, and should continue to be, expended.

The letter from Bob Moore, National Geographic photographer in Cass City, reads:

Dear Al:

I have just returned to home base after a three-month, 16,000-mile trip by car through our American Southwest. Upon my return to the office I was keenly disappointed, as I know you and all the people in Cass City will be, to learn that the Cass City Christmas Pageant will not be included in the December issue of the National Geographic Magazine.

After carefully considering the series of photographs we made on the pageant, our editor in chief regretfully came to the conclusion that the pictorial presentation was not sufficiently outstanding and dramatic for publishing in the magazine. Part of the difficulty may be in the fact that the spiritual quality of

#### After 14 Years

### Rev. Vender Leaving Presbyterian Church

In a letter read at a congregational meeting Sunday, Rev. M. R. Vender resigned as pastor of the First Presbyterian Church in Cass City, effective Jan. 12, 1958. He will have completed 14 years as a pastor of the church.

In his letter of resignation Rev. Vender said: "While regretting to terminate so happy a relationship as has existed here . . . it is with mingled emotions that I request the congregation of the church to join with me in requesting Flint Presbytery to dissolve the pastoral relationship as of Dec. 31, 1957."

Rev. Vender also explained that he wanted to be free to accept a part-time position in another Presbytery under the liberalization provisions of the Presbyterian Church for retired ministers.

The congregation selected Arthur Holmberg, Mrs. E. G. Golding Sr. and Mrs. C. M. Wallace as commissioners with Rev. Vender to present the matter to Flint Presbytery at the fall meeting in Harbor Beach Tuesday, Sept. 24.

The session and congregation agreed to the request, but asked the pastor to continue until after the annual meeting Jan. 12, 1958. Rev. Vender agreed to the request.

Rev. Vender said that he had been officially invited to serve as minister of Christian Education and assistant pastor of an 800-member church in Marietta, Ohio, in Athens Presbytery.

He was asked to come July 1 or Sept. 1, but members of the church agreed to wait until Jan. 15.

### Three to Face Narcotics Charge In Circuit Court

Herman Jackson, Alice Davis and Armstead Rhodes are in jail waiting trial in circuit court on charges of illegal possession of narcotics.

They were bound over to circuit court for trial after a preliminary hearing before Justice Bates Wills in Caro.

Jackson and Rhodes are in the Tuscola County jail in Caro and the woman is in the Saginaw jail.

Testifying at the hearing were Vassar Police Chief Gordon Carter, Detective Walter Sokol of the State Police racket squad of Detroit and Orrin K. Grettenberger, state director of Narcotics and Drugs of Lansing.

Four capsules of heroin were found in the Jackson and Davis car the morning of Friday, Sept. 20, when the arrest was made.

Acting on a tip, officers arrested Rhodes of Vassar for selling narcotics. Edward L. Kendrick, 29, of Flint was given marked money at the Bridgeport Post of the State Police.

He drove to Vassar and purchased six capsules of heroin and delivered them to Detective Sokol in the railroad yards near the Rhodes residence.

Rhodes was arrested and the marked money was found in his wallet.

### No Federal Control Of New Hospital

Many persons mistakenly believe that because the hospital will receive Federal funds it will be Federally dominated. Actually, the only interest the government has is in providing funds for adequate facilities.

Administration, all policy decisions and the management of the hospital affairs will be handled by a local board appointed by the village president and approved by the council.

There will be no representative of any governmental unit with an office in the hospital.

### Hawks Win Opener At Clio Friday

Cass City battled to a 9-6 lead in the first half and grimly held on to its margin through a scoreless second half to open the 1957 grid season with a victory in the rain and mud at Clio.

The victory avenged the only loss of the season last year for the Hawk eleven, defending Thumb B Conference champions.

With the nonleague decision over Clio under their belts, the Hawks are now ready for the coming league schedule, which starts tonight (Friday) at Vassar.

On the basis of preseason estimates Cass City will reign as favorites in the game.

Coach Mike Yedinak said Monday after reviewing the game, that the Hawks were helped by penalties assessed against the Clio eleven. Clio was penalized 65 yards, many of them at crucial moments for Cass City.

Yedinak singled out Ray Fox and Clayton Neiman for turning in fine games. Fox looked good and Neiman was credited with the most tackles in the game for Cass City.

Cass City roared into an opening quarter lead, when with fourth and a yard to go, Bob Walpole burst over center and galloped 59 yards for a touchdown.

Clio came back to tie the game in the waning moments of the first period. They took a punt on the Cass City 89-yard line and on the first play Bud Murdock

An estimated 150 captains and lieutenants attended the kickoff dinner for the \$100,000 hospital campaign at Cass City High School Monday evening.

Workers in the drive learned the complete details of the hospital and the impending drive from Fred Wigen of Saginaw, architect; Joe Homminga, of the office of hospital construction and survey in East Lansing, and members of the Cass City Hospital Board.

Mr. Wigen told the members that usually the architect is called before sponsoring groups after the hospital is erected.

He told members that the proposed new hospital will be built for ready expansion and will include all of the necessary services needed in hospital. Preliminary sketches call for a two-level building with all services on the first floor and patients' beds on the second floor. He complimented the community on its selection of a site, saying that it is ideal for building, in a quiet location and readily visible from all sections of the village.

Mr. Homminga reminded the workers that each dollar collected will be matched by Federal funds.

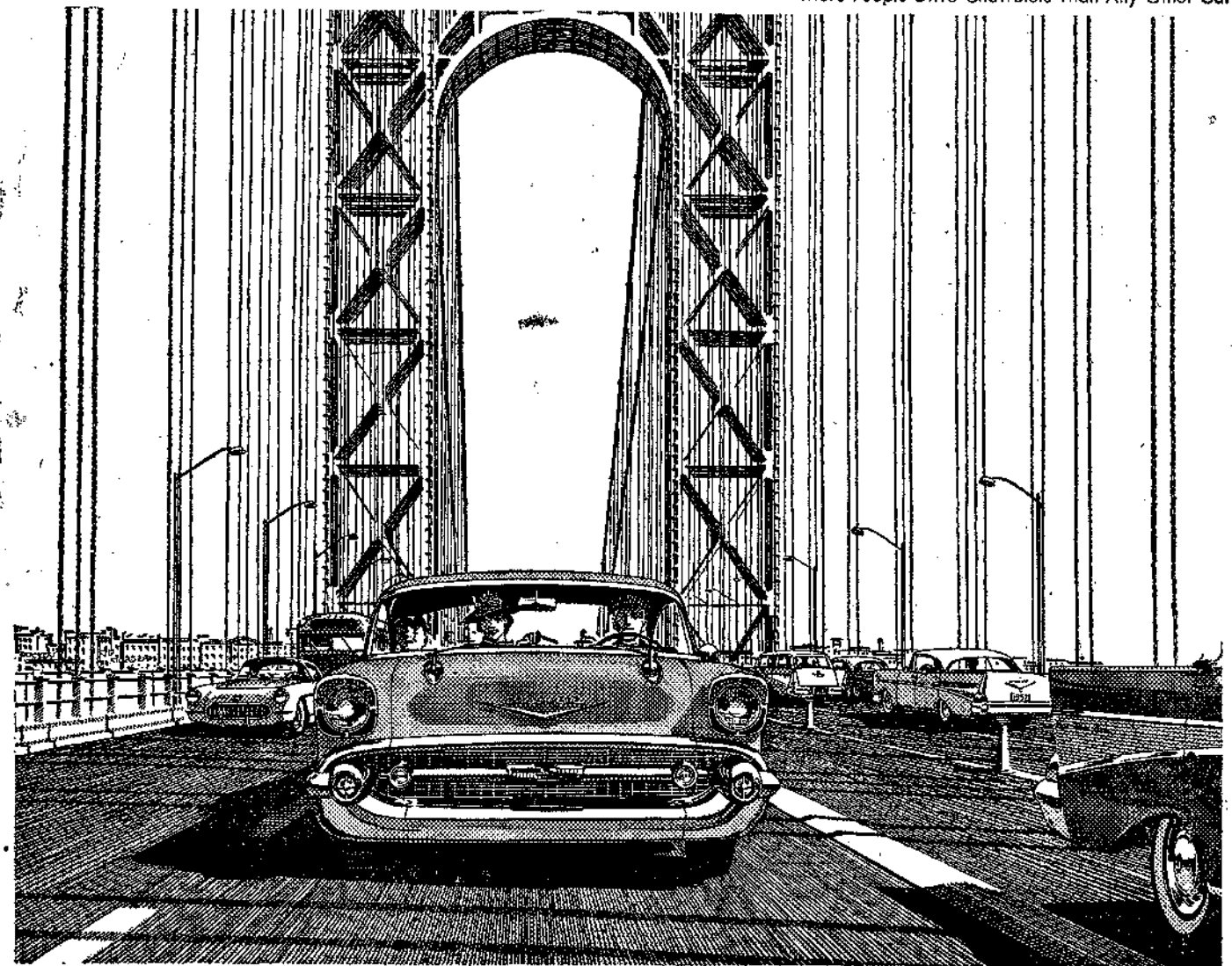

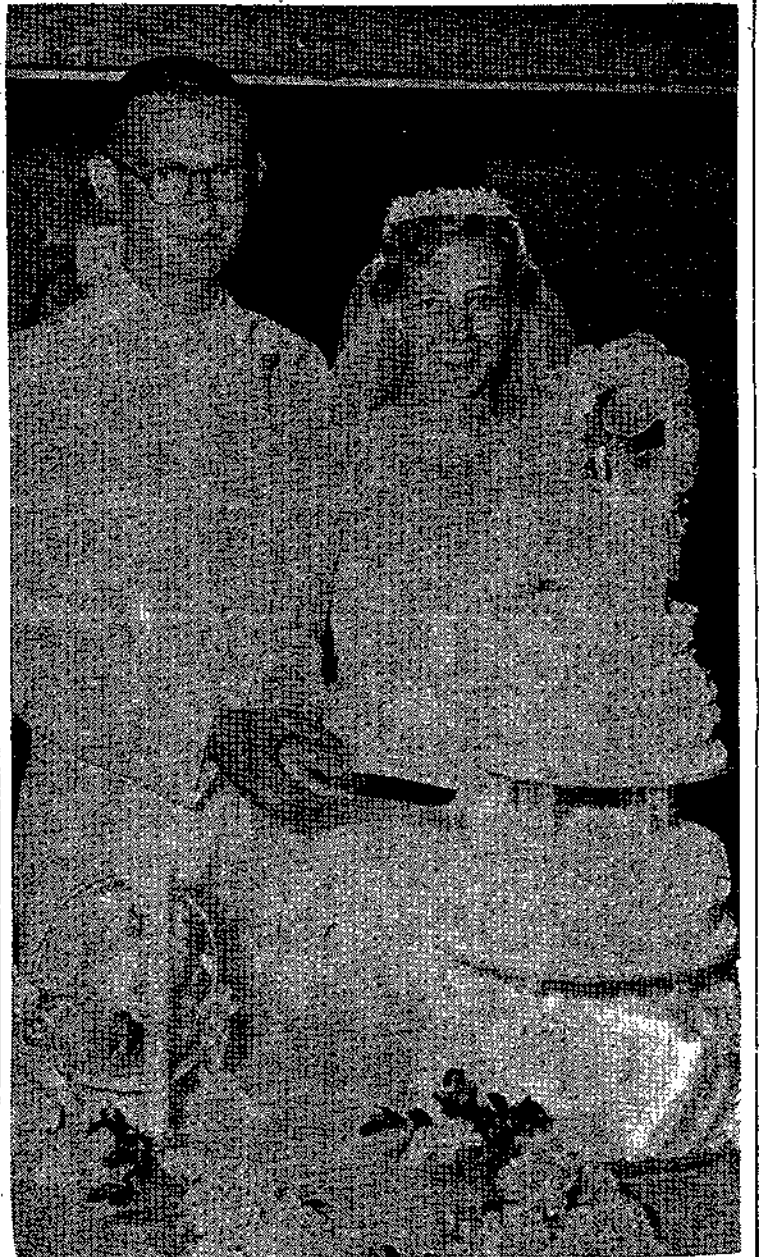

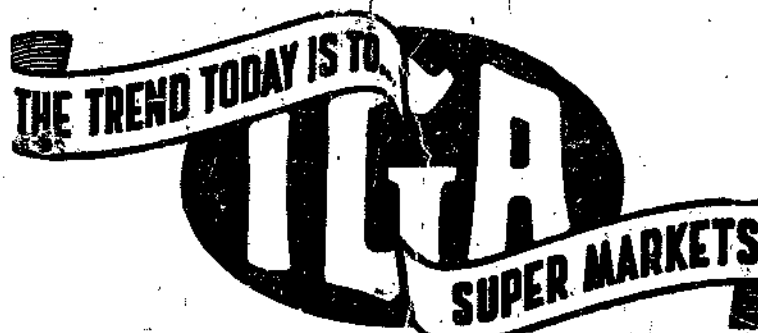

# MICHIGAN MIRROR NEWS BRIEFS

Republicans are looking for a carload of candidates for governor.

The party made motions toward the "Big Switch" at a Mackinac Island rally of leaders originally expected to designate one or two potential candidates.

When the questions came, John B. Martin, Jr., of Grand Rapids—once a Republican auditor general and later candidate for other posts—sizzled.

"If you mean when are a few men going to select the party's candidate for 1958, never," he snapped.

Martin is the Republican National Committeeman and the organizer of the Mackinac Island meeting. Postmaster General Arthur Summerfield did not attend.

Martin's election to the top party organization position was seen as a rebuff to Summerfield's leadership of the past.

Party speculators figure House Speaker George M. Van Puurse, a young Zeeland lawyer, might be the choice to run against the Democrat. Everybody is convinced it will be Gov. Williams.

Rep. George Sallade, of Ann Arbor, is an announced hopeful. There are others, none of whom have gotten enough of a nod to rise above the others.

Van Puurse was handed a summer speaking tour on behalf of the Republican legislature. He turned the job over to others when his voice gave out, and the campaign has been quieter since.

Williams, meantime, has the advantage of incumbency and the element of surprise working for him. He doesn't have to announce what he's going to do next year.

Best bets now are that Williams will go for another term as governor, with Lt. Gov. Philip A. Hart opposing Senator Charles Potter for the U.S. Senate.

Potter, whose strength next year will depend, in part, on the strength of the party organization and its candidate for governor, sides with Martin's idea.

He opposes the idea of picking a gubernatorial candidate now.

It has been done in the past and Republicans have lost, taking nothing away from Williams.

The late Mayor Albert E. Cobo, of Detroit, was drafted. Donald S. Leonard was a front-runner from the start two years before.

Fred Alger was handpicked before Leonard and Harry P. Kelly, now on the Michigan Supreme Court, was recalled in 1950 after the Kim Sigler defeat to Williams.

Kelly had won before, had served as governor, and was the No. 1 vote-getter. He lost.

This time, Republicans contend, the push should be toward a young man who has never lost an election, one the party can unite behind.

Maybe the switch will work—nothing else has in the past decade.

The next general election will be held Nov. 4, 1958.

Whether there will be another telephone rate increase this year is in the hands of the Michigan Public Service Commission.

Michigan Bell Telephone Co. has asked for a re-hearing of its original request for a \$125,000,000 boost, after the commission approved the \$2,335,000 several weeks ago.

William M. Day, company president, said the increase fell far short of the needs of the company to expand and improve its services.

Efforts are being made again to sell state-owned property under the Great Lakes to private citizens.

The property was dedicated more than half a century ago to be reserved for hunting and fishing and other recreational activities.

Private developers have filled in parts of the lake near the shore for their own purposes. The state, still working under the law, has taken more than 30 in to court.

The reasoning is that some of the land is no longer needed for its original purpose and, by selling or leasing it, the state can be assured of a constant and continuing income.

The proposals will be made to the 1958 legislature.

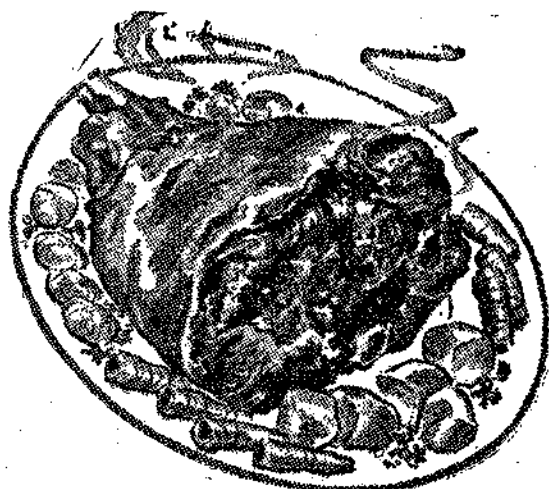

## Home Extension Agent's Corner

### Unsung Heroes

Have you ever stopped to think how the food we eat is protected before we buy it?

The unsung heroes of the market basket who, in their quiet way, safeguard the food we buy are the food and drug inspectors, federal, state and local. The personnel of the Division of Foods and Standards of the Michigan Department of Agriculture are constant guardians of our health (and our pocketbooks!) as they enforce the state laws.

All foods come under their protecting eye; as an example, let us follow the beef you purchased recently at the food store. Let us start at the farm and follow it to your market basket.

To insure the wholesomeness of meat, slaughter houses and packing plants are inspected to see that sanitary conditions prevail. The cleanliness of the storage areas at the markets is also inspected. Checks are even made at locker plants to see that proper freezing temperatures are maintained for fast freezing and frozen food storage.

The health of animals slaughtered is indicated by an inspection label stamped in purple on the fat. A federal stamp is required for meat that enters interstate commerce. The local slaughtered beef may bear a state or local marking.

When the farmer sells a steer and as it is bought and sold all along the way to you, accuracy of weight is important to the honesty of the sale. Scales are inspected regularly by the state to assure their accuracy. Checks are made also to see that packaging materials are not included in the weight of the meat.

False labeling, false advertising and misrepresentation are illegal practices that can be confusing and costly. Laws governing these practices permit home-makers to shop with confidence in the honesty of statements made about a food.

To further safeguard our health, hamburger and sausage laws regulate the percentage of fat and other ingredients in their composition. We can buy hamburger knowing that by law it cannot contain more than 30% of fat, the rest must be all beef.

This is one story about one food that finds its way into our market basket. Other foods that round out our daily menus also come under the watchful eye of the Department of Agriculture. Fruits and vegetables are graded for quality, poultry products are inspected, and all places where food and drink products are manufactured, prepared, stored, offered for sale or sold are governed to assure our health and economy.

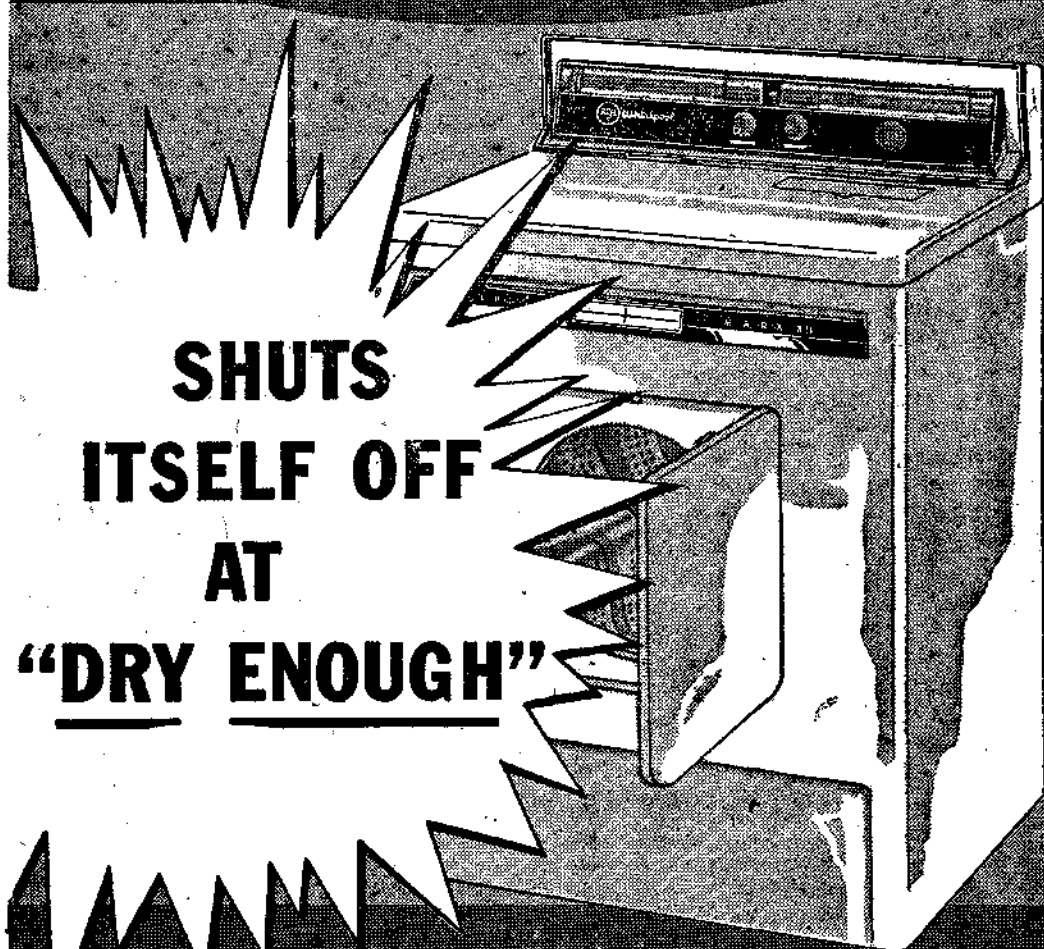
