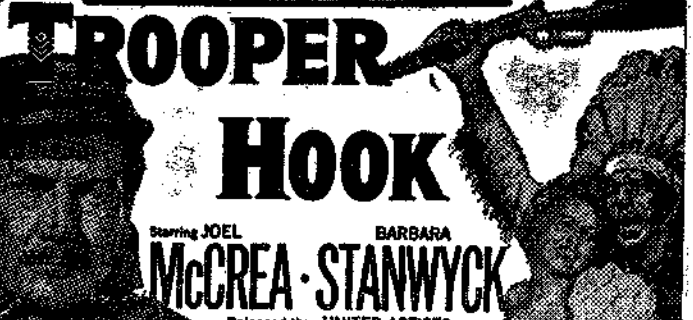

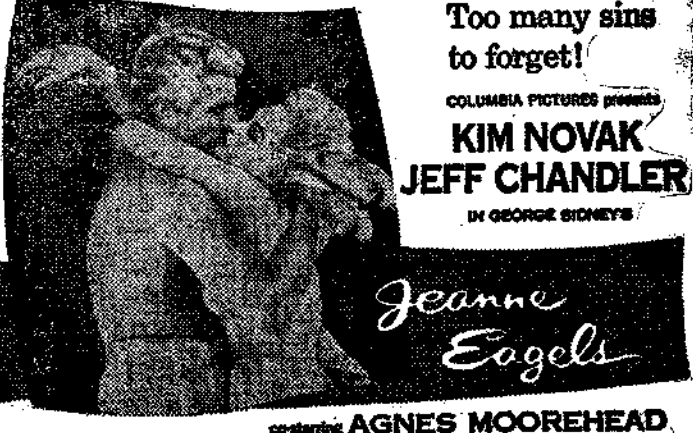

M.S.U. farm crops researchers tested about 225 different corn hybrids in 12 counties throughout Michigan this year to provide facts for recommending rates and varieties for certain areas.

Increase Profit With Corn Dryer

Drying your corn at harvest can make it worth 17 to 20 cents a bushel more at the elevator than if you take the moisture dock. Besides that, the saving you can make on picking losses by harvesting earlier will all but cover the cost of drying and handling, reports Don R. Kebler, assistant county agricultural agent.

According to Bob Maddex, extension agricultural engineer at Michigan State University, that's the experience some Michigan farmers have had when they swung over to shell corn harvesting and batch drying with heated air.

One of the most important advantages of this harvesting method is that picking losses are cut back because corn can be harvested at about 30 per cent moisture. This reduces shelling and ear dropping.

Every week harvest is delayed after October 15, a bushel per acre will be lost, so at least 7 per cent more of the yield can be saved with early harvesting. On a 60-bushel crop this would be a saving of slightly over 4 bushels per acre, worth about \$4.50. The cost of drying and handling runs from 7 to 12 cents a bushel so it would cost from \$4 to \$7 to dry 60 bushels.

If you're not sure you would like heated air drying in the long run, you might give it a try this fall by hiring a custom operator. Some farmers who own dryers and corn combines have been doing the work at about the cost of owning and running your own rig. If you have a small acreage of corn, hiring a custom operator may be the cheapest every year.

If you are planning to feed your corn and want to use a dryer, dry the ear corn with unheated air. This system takes less investment and has lower operating costs. Total cost of ear corn drying will run around 3 to 4 cents a bushel. However, ear corn drying doesn't work out well if you plan to sell corn in winter or put it under lean, because you can't depend on fall temperatures to stay warm enough to get the job done on time. With feed corn you can remove enough water so it won't spoil during the winter and then finish the drying in the spring when the air warms up.

Some other advantages of drying with either method are: better working conditions because the crop can be harvested before fall rains begin; more acres can be handled with the same number of men and one set of machinery; machines operate better when corn is at 26 to 28 per cent moisture than when it is below 22 per cent.

Farmers can expect hog prices during the first half of next year to average at least as high as they were during the same period this year, say Michigan State University farm economists.
