





When you want an economy dish, for example, everyone will enjoy Tamale Pie. Remember, too, for a large buffet type supper, it's an ideal main dish:

Tamale Pie (Serves 4) 11/2 teaspoons salt

3 cups water 1 cup cornmeal

1 medium onion, diced

1 green pepper, diced 3 tablespoons fat

34 pound ground beef

1½ cups canned, drained tomatoes

2 teaspoons salt

¼ teaspoon black pepper 2 teaspoons chili powder

Add 11/2 teaspoons salt to boiling water and bring to a rapid boil. Sift and stir in cornmeal. Cover and cook 45 minutes, stirring oceasionally. Cook onion and green pepper in fat until tender: remove from fat and add meat. Brown lightly. Add remaining ingredients and heat thoroughly. Pour half of cornmeal into greased baking dish; add meat mixture and cover with remaining cornmeal. Bake 35 minutes in a hot (400°F.) oven.






