## TB Seal Drive Slated in County

The annual drive for funds in the fight against tuberculosis will open in Tuscola County when some 6,200 homes in the county will receive Christmas seals through the mail.

It is part of the campaign that will seal seals mailed to every community in Michigan.

Authorities of the Michigan Tuberculosis Association point with pride to the advances made against TB pointing out that the death rate has been cut 94 per cent in 50 years.

However, they are quick to point out that the battle is not won. TB still kills more persons than all other infectious diseases combined . . . syphilis, polio, meningitis, diphtheria, smallpox and many others. About 10 new active cases are found every day in Michigan, most in advanced stages.

Compacency kills in the battle against TB, they said.

## Hawks Impressive in Victory at Bad Axe

The Cass City Red Hawks played one of their best games of the season Friday night to defeat an air-minded Bad Axe eleven, 26-12.

The Cass City attack was featured by the passing of Jim Johnson and the pass receiving and running of fleet Forrest Walpole.

Cass City scored its first marker midway in the first period when Johnson intercepted a Hatchet aerial on the Bad Axe 48.

The Hawks moved on the ground to the 28 where on fourth down Johnson passed to Walpole after faking a place kick.

The play moved the ball to the five. Johnson sneaked over the six points from about a yard out two plays later. Ed McConkey's try for point was good.

The Hatchets moved back into contention when they scored on the first play of the second quarter.

Archie McDonald took Cass City's kickoff and raced to the Hawk 31. Passes by Jim Sternberg moved the ball to the half yard line from where Sternberg pushed across. The try for point was missed.

The Hawks converted a break into their second touchdown. Chuck Wright recovered a fumble on the Bad Axe 35. After moving the ball to the 22, Cass City scored on a pass in the flat from Johnson to Walpole. The score at the half was 15-6.

Score Again  
The Hawks used the airplanes to score their third touchdown of the game. It was the Johnson to Walpole combination that clicked again. Walpole took the pass over the center about 10 yards beyond the line of scrimmage and outran the secondary in a 62-yard scoring dash.

Bad Axe made it 20-12 on a series of pass plays. Three straight times, Sternberg hit his receivers with fourth down and long yardage needed for a first down. His last fourth down pass covered 19 yards and was good for the touchdown as John Blackstock received the scoring heave.

Midway in the final period, Cass City scored its final touchdown of the game. Forrest Walpole swung off tackle and went 52 yards to paydirt.

Coach Mike Yedinak said that the entire team played well Friday. He singled out Johnson, Walpole and Tom Hullen for outstanding work on offense. It was Hullen's first game at fullback for the Hawks.

On defense Coach Yedinak praised Jack Hartwick, Gordon Peters and Clayton Neiman for outstanding performances.

## Explain Finances of New School District

The financial facts of the new Cass City School District were explained to members of the district Monday evening at the first meeting of the Home and School Council at the Cass City Elementary gym.

Mr. Campbell pointed out that the assessed valuation of the district is \$8,669,072 . . . original estimates placed the valuation at \$8 million.

He said that the school's operating tax of 7.2 mills is the lowest in the county. No other school has less than eight mills. Supt. Campbell said that the rate would probably go up in future years.

Cass City's debt service tax is the lowest of any high school district in the county at the present time.

Mr. Campbell was introduced by Council President Barney Hoffman.

Principal Arthur Holmberg told the group of the need of science in today's world. He introduced Grade Principal Mrs. Marie Murray, who told of activities in the grades.

The group enjoyed musical entertainment and refreshments were served.

## Cass City Ranks Fourth in County School Enrollment

Cass City has the fourth largest enrollment in high schools in Tuscola County, it was revealed this week by W. A. Scott, county superintendent of schools.

Total enrollment in public schools in the county this year is 10,408 pupils . . . 227 more than the 10,181 who were in school last year.

Caro has the largest enrollment of any county high school. They have 1,554 pupils. Vassar is second with 1,310 pupils and Millington, third, has 1,256 pupils. Cass City has 1,124 pupils, Scott said.

Other districts in the county operating high schools have the following number of students: Akron, 444; Fairgrove, 566; Kingston, 469; Mayville, 913; Reese, 430, and Unionville, 686.

Among the larger districts operating eight grades are Deford with 192 pupils, Gageton with 149 students and Tuscola with 111.

There are 47 districts in the county operating schools, Scott reported.

These figures do not include some 985 students in seven parochial grade schools in the county.

**Report Shows Less Deaths in October**

October, one of the worst traffic death months of the year, showed a saving of 28 lives on Michigan highways on the basis of provisional figures compiled by the State Police.

The death toll in October of 1956 was 144 as compared with 116 in the same month this year. The latter figure is subject to some revision upward with final reports.

Final figures for September show that 128 persons were killed and 5,049 were injured in 14,571 accidents.

It was the lowest death toll for September since 1946, when 123 lost their lives. Compared with September of last year deaths decreased 24 per cent, injuries were down less than one-half per cent, while accidents dropped eight per cent.

For the first 10 months of this year deaths number 1,223, a saving of 220 lives or 15.2 per cent under the total of 1,443 for the same period last year.

The goal for the state this year was a reduction of at least 10 per cent, or 174 under the toll of 1,747 in 1956. Unless there are sharp reverses in November and December this target should be substantially exceeded.

State Police warned, however, that the coming two months are also among the worst, with December being especially deadly because of the combination of bad weather and the holiday season. They urged drivers to renewed effort to avoid accidents.

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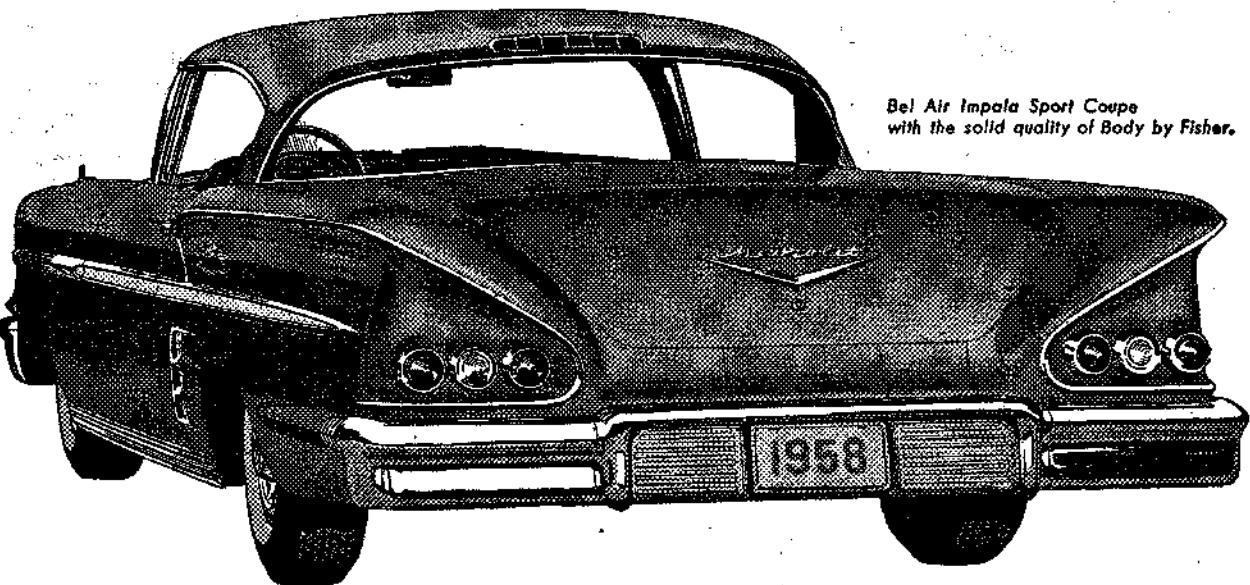

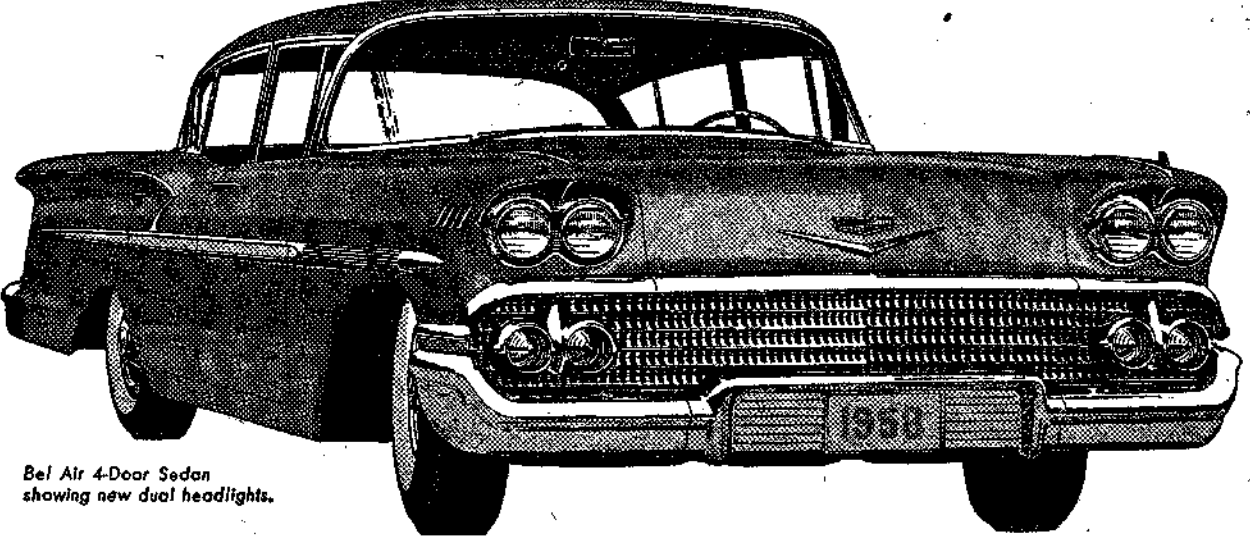

**MICHIGAN MIRROR NEWS BRIEFS**

1958's state ag program was formulated when representatives of most of Michigan's farm industries met with members of the Agriculture Commission to decide the issues, and later the same day with Gov. G. Mennen Williams to present their ideas.

Greatest need, according to the group, seems to be for a law which has been proposed every session for nine years: The need for a method of grading and identifying top Michigan grades. This has been known as "Seal of Quality" bill or "Michigan's Best".

Farm representatives were unanimous in their support of the idea, and a little frustrated that its provisions have not become law long ago. They seemed to think that the bill failed in other years for lack of lively support rather than active opposition.

Person after person stated that they believe the seal of quality idea had almost solid, if undemonstrated, backing in their particular branch of agriculture. All joined in the hope that the bill can be passed this year without becoming involved in partisan politics.

Other important proposals include a law granting subpoena powers to the Director of Agriculture. At present a hearing can be called to investigate charges of dishonest or irregular proceedings and witnesses cannot be ordered to appear.

In several recent instances, the key witness in a case decided against testifying, and the whole issue had to be dropped.

Commercial sprayers would be brought under control by terms of another proposal. At present the Department of Agriculture cannot regulate those who for hire spread weed killer, insecticide or pesticide.

Other recommendations concern weights and measures; licensing improvements, cutting of Christmas trees, labeling and slaughter houses.

Universities and colleges are feeling the onslaught of a new flood of students loosed upon them by the expanding popula-

tion and the demands that it be educated.

The problem of money and space for higher education to cover the demands will be top priority in the 1958 legislature.

Nobody is certain how many millions will be sought this year, but leading legislators who understand the situation believe the need will make a real problem.

Educators have been asked to present a united front to the legislature and Gov. Williams with its new organization of state university and college presidents and governing board members.

This group was organized after Williams asked them to come up with a total plan for higher education in Michigan.

The legislature has been studying the same subject for three years.

Another legislative plan has been to "decentralize higher education," providing two-year colleges at the local level -- along the lines of the present community and junior colleges -- and making the present four-year colleges into advanced study centers.

Michigan State University, governed by the state board of Agriculture, was forced last fall to limit its enrollment to 22,500 because of overcrowding.

The University of Michigan stated that without more facilities and personnel it cannot do the kind of educational job it would like in the future.

National figures repeat the charge that the United States is turning out engineers and scientists at a rate slower than Russia. They said Russia's earth satellite was the result.

The situation revived the plan of Dr. Harlan H. Hatcher, president of the University of Michigan, some years ago that the nation should develop a pool of brainpower -- much like the armed services.

This group would be the warriors in the field of science and technology.

Two new ideas have been proposed by Rep. William I. Bower-

**Record Feed Grain Supplies Available**

Feed grain supplies are at record levels this year, reports Alfred Ballweg, County Agricultural Agent.

Nationally, farmers produced an estimated 7 per cent more feed grains than last year. This year's production topped the previous record set in 1948 by 2 per cent.

Large crops of barley and oats last summer and an expected huge sorghum grain harvest this fall account for the increase. The sorghum grain crop is estimated at 614 million bushels—two and a half times the production in 1956.

Most of the increase in sorghum grain acreage is in the western edge of the corn belt and the plains states. Expanded production will keep corn from moving into these areas. This will leave corn available to eastern corn belt and Michigan feeders. Dry new corn will probably be priced around 95¢ a bushel during November in Michigan.

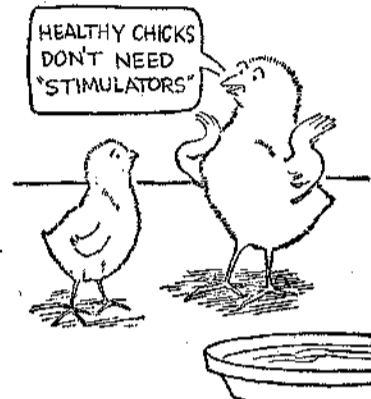
### Healthy Chicks Get By on Own

#### Antibiotics Are Not Required, Tests Show

Growth stimulators and antibiotics have their place in the poultry industry, but healthy chicks can get along without them very well, according to a recent study at the University of Illinois College of Veterinary Medicine.

Dr. J. O. Alberts, E. F. Reber and C. E. Schoettie, all of the College of Veterinary Medicine; H. M. Scott, Department of Animal Science; and the Illinois Agricultural Experiment Station cooperated in the study. It is another example of basic research designed to help Illinois farmers keep pace with developments in nutrition and disease control.

Dr. Reber, who reported results of the study, said that the researchers wanted to learn the organ weights and the composition of organs and bones of healthy chicks at various ages. The chicks

were not fed any growth stimulants, and yet they weighed an average of 1 1/2 pounds at six weeks and three pounds at 10 weeks of age. These are considered "good" gains, according to Dr. Reber.

He explained that research of this type provides data that serve as a valuable base line for nutritional and disease studies. Knowing the "standard" values aids researchers in defining "abnormal" values.

#### Don't Be Careless With Insecticides

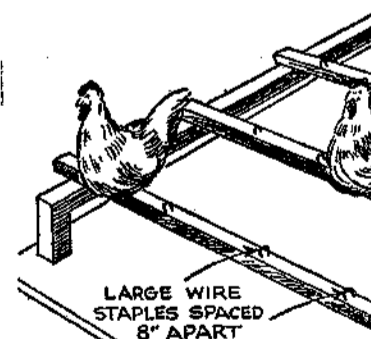
Dr. Richard Bradley of the University of Illinois College of Veterinary Medicine points out that improper use of insecticides can be dangerous to both the farmer and his animals. There is little danger, however, when insecticides are used at recommended rates for their intended purposes.

Dr. Bradley says that lindane, one of the most commonly used sprays for livestock, rates about halfway between "dangerous" and "safe" on the toxicity scale of the common insect sprays and powders.

If you should get lindane on your skin, wash the area immediately with soap and water. If lindane is accidentally swallowed, induce vomiting to empty the stomach, take two tablespoons of Epsom salts and call your physician.

Dr. Bradley offers these suggestions for handling insecticides: read all labels on packages and follow them exactly; wear protective clothing and change to clean clothing after a spraying job; store all insecticides in original packages, away from food and feed-stuffs and out of reach of children and animals; dispose of containers by burning or burying them; call a physician immediately if someone is known or suspected to be poisoned; administer proper antidote.

#### No Crowding



Poultrymen say that crowding of hens on the roosts, especially when feathers are wet with rain or snow, is apt to cause colds or roup. To prevent crowding, one farmer used long wire staples, which were driven into the tops of the roost, about 8 in. apart. Hens settle down in the spacings between the staples.

**Live Yeast Has No Feeding Value**

Feeding live yeast to dairy cows to increase milk production or feed efficiency is a waste of time and money, reports Alfred

Ballweg, County Agricultural Agent. Tests at Michigan State University this past year show that feeding live yeast under controlled conditions has no effect on milk production, butterfat test or feed efficiency. Work at seven other experiment stations in this country and Germany supports the M. S. U. results. Don Hillman, M. S. U. extension dairy specialist, says that some farmers have claimed better results when they fed live yeast to their cows. Hillman says it's difficult to tell how much of the reported increase can be attributed to the psychological influence of good salesmanship or how much to other changes in the herd such as fresh cows, nearly dry cows or different feeds.

**B Vitamins May Help Tired Feeling**

Are you often tired and "on edge" rather than good-natured? It's possible that B vitamins in your meals affect your disposition, points out Mrs. Frances T. Clark, county home demonstration agent.

Vitamin B 1 or thiamine is one of the most important of the B vitamins. It helps you have an optimistic outlook and promotes a good appetite, digestion and elimination. Thiamine helps prevent fatigue and nervous irritability, too. It is really the "spark" that releases energy from food to the body machine.

Thiamine is not stored by the body so you need a supply every day. Many foods contain only small amounts of thiamine, but well planned meals with a variety of foods will add up to the day's needs. A good way to insure a steady supply is to use whole grain or enriched bread, flour and cereals.

High temperatures and alkalis, like soda, destroy thiamine, so cook meats and cereals at low temperatures. Never use so much soda in baked goods that you can taste it.

Often much of the thiamine is thrown out with cooking water, so cook vegetables in a small amount of water and make good use of the cooking water. You can use it in gravy, soup and for liquid in hot dishes.

If you'd like to test your meals for thiamine, ask for the new bulletin "Your Thiamine Tally" from your county extension office in the Court House, Caro.

Saving is a mighty fine habit, but don't save all your good deeds for the future.

**Variety Menus**

Anyone who plans variety for the menus knows, you gotta have heart and tongue and liver and other variety meats. Maybe you don't have the heart to venture out with variety meats because you've never tried. Your dependable cookbook holds the cooking secret, but here are some extra herbs. Don't neglect the herbs and spices... they accent the delicate flavor of the meats. Tongue needs two to three hours simmering time, and then you can serve it hot or cold; slice it and make lunchbox sandwiches, remember the horseradish mustard, heart can be simmered for one to three hours and then braised, baked or eaten as is. It is delicious when stuffed and baked. When you choose liver, lamb and calves liver may be pan fried, but pork and beef liver are usually better when you braise them. Variety meats have a heartening effect on the budget; except for smoked tongue and calves liver, a cost for a serving from variety meats is only 5c or 10c. Have a heart with your menus, and tongue and liver

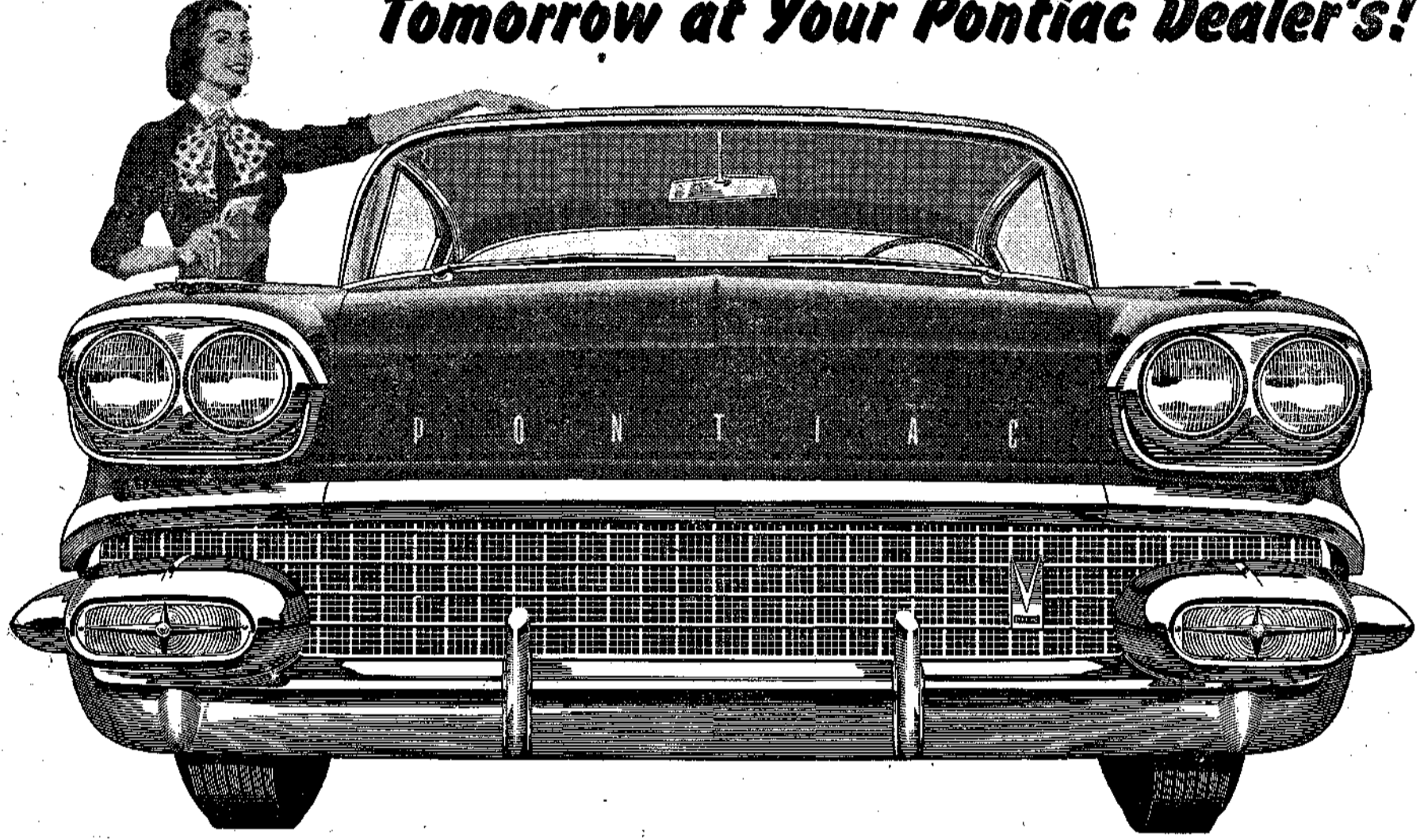

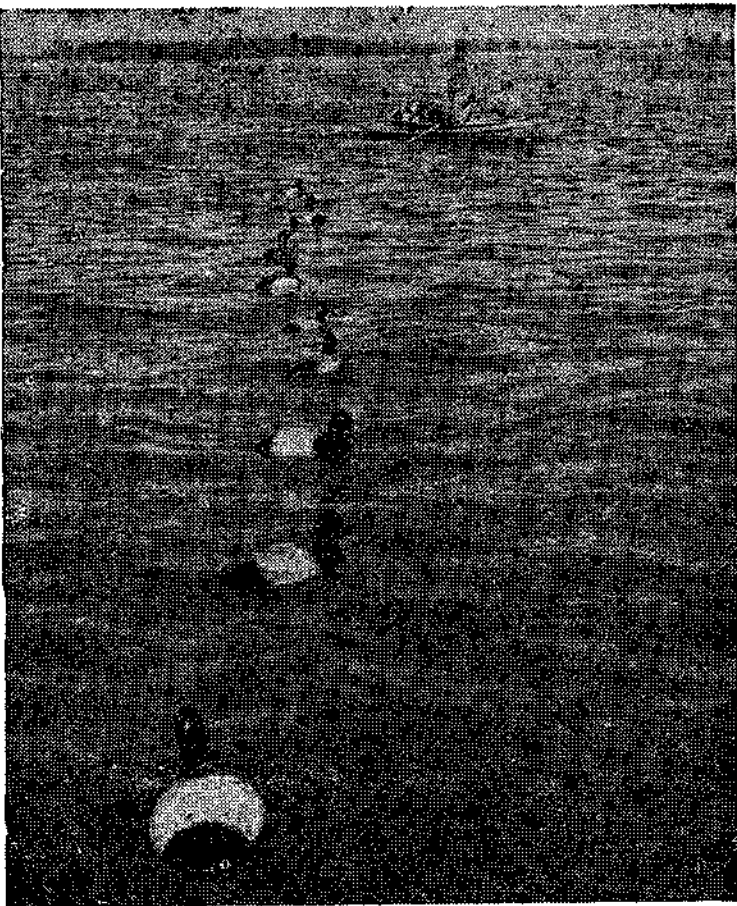
Dallas Nichols Heads Evergreen 4-H Club
