There is an abundant supply of proilers and fryers being offered to the homemakers at this time of the year. The succulent birds may be fried, broiled, barbecued or roasted. When you buy frying chickens, allow two-thirds to three-fourths pound per serving. Allow one-quarter or one-half chicken per serving if you are purchasing broiling chickens.

For something different in fried chicken, I thought you might like this recipe: Deviled fried chicken. Dip disjointed frying chicken in flour. Then dip in beaten egg to which 1/8 teaspoon prepared mustard and % cup vinegar have been added. Next, dip the chicken in paprikaseasoned dry bread crumbs. Saute in fat. If you like the flavor of onion, saute some onions in the fat before you fry the chicken. Fry coated chicken to a golden brown, cover and simmer until fork tender. It's the prepared mustard, vinegar and paprika that "devils" the chicken. Then to really top the meal of deviled chicken, have angel food cake for dessert






