# Some Poultrymen Work Too Long


#### Equipment, Larger Flocks Cut Labor

Many poultrymen actually need to work only a fifth as long as they do now, according to R. N. Van Arsdall, USDA economist at the University of Illinois.

His studies show that such timesaving measures as increasing size of flocks, adding machinery and equipment and rearranging poultry buildings and equipment can cut annual labor per 100 laying hens from 250 hours to 40 or

Feeding and watering take about a third of the usual chore work with laying flocks, Van Arsdall says. With hand methods, these jobs take about 42 hours annually per 100 hens. Mechanical equipment in large operations can cut this time to 3 hours. Gathering, cleaning and grad-

ing eggs take the most time.



You wouldn't walk a hundred miles—if you could help it. Yet, this is how far the average poultryman walks each year, just going to and from the laying

Mechanical washers and graders can cut this job from about 100 hours annually per 100 hens with hand work to about 40 hours. Flock size may be the deciding

factor between egg profits and losses. You'll need at least 1,000 hens to get full advantage of laborsaving equipment and methods. Unless you can make use of unused labor and buildings, 500 hens may be the least number that will make you any money.

#### Spraying or Dusting Means Better Crops


Even with the best of harvesting and curing methods to preserve carotene and protein in our hay crops, the utmost in feeding value or market grade is seldom possible unless insecticides are applied properly with power dusters or sprayers.

Power sprayers and dusters are thus becoming standard hay-making equipment alongside the modern mowers, field choppers and balers. As with any effective insect poison, farmers must follow directions so that the material used leaves behind it no injurious residues. Recommended chemicals kill the pests quickly without danger and toxic compounds being secreted in milk, eggs or the meat from animals that eat the forage.

The list of damaging forage crop bugs is long. Every region has its destructive hay field pests which are best controlled by special insecticides that the state college authorities and manufacturers recommend as being efficient and safe.

Grass and legume forages are attacked by myriads of armyworms, grasshoppers, leafhoppers, spittlebugs, lygus bugs, alfalfa weevils, and clover seed weevilsas well as aphids and sometimes borers. Prior to the "spraying era" the stem and leaf quality of our usual hay crops suffered untold injury, which the best of curing and storage could never over-

Protect tractor from winter winds and use recommended cold weather thermostat in cooling system. A cover over radiator will telp tractor warm up faster.
According to Bob White, Agricultural engineer at Michigan State University, cold engines

wear excessively, waste fuel and develop less horsepower. He reports that at a 40 degree F. operating temperature cylinder wall wear is almost 30 times more than at a 180 degree

F. operating temperature. Fuel consumption at the 40 degree temperature is about 36 per cent higher than the higher temperature. An engine running at 180 degrees will develop about 13 per cent more horsepower
