Gifts of Food Make Very Merry Holiday Magic

THERE'S no nicer way of expressing thoughtfulness, real affection and ingenuity than giving a gift of food made with your own hands.

- Chocolate Ring 1/2 cup milk 1/2 cup sugar 1 1/2 teaspoons salt 1/4 cup shortening 1/2 cup warm, not hot, water 2 packages or cakes of yeast, active dry or compressed 2 eggs, beaten 5 cups sifted enriched flour 1/2 cup sliced maraschino cherries 1/2 cup chopped citron



Yeast dough filled with chocolate filling, formed into a ring, then frosted with confectioners' sugar icing, makes a lovely present for giving at Christmas time or a nice treat for your own breakfast during the holidays.

Scald milk. Stir in sugar, salt and shortening. Cool to lukewarm. Measure water into large mixing bowl; sprinkle or crumble in yeast. Stir until dissolved. Stir in lukewarm milk mixture. Add beaten eggs and 3 cups flour. Beat until smooth. Add cherries and citron.

Stir in remaining flour. Turn dough out on lightly floured board. Knead until smooth and elastic. Place in greased bowl; brush top with soft shortening. Cover. Let rise in warm place until doubled in bulk, about 1 hour. Punch down and turn out on lightly floured board. Roll out to an oblong, 14x18 inches. Spread with chocolate filling and roll as for jelly roll. Seal edges firmly. Place on greased baking sheet in form of circle. Seal ends, and cut through 1-inch slices with scissors. Turn each slice partly on side, pointing away from center. Cover with towel. Let rise until doubled in bulk. Bake in a moderate (350°F.) oven 40 to 45 minutes. Ice top while warm with confectioners' sugar blended with milk and vanilla.

Chocolate Filling: Combine 1/2 cup cocoa, 1/4 cup evaporated milk and 1/2 cup sugar in saucepan. Cook until thickened, stirring constantly, about 2 minutes.

Teen-Agers Reveal Young Skin Look

There's a new look in classrooms these days. Teen-age faces are pert, pretty and powdered. However, the look is unpowdered. It's a nature-fresh, young skin look.

The glow of this look comes, of course, from sound food habits, adequate sleep and an exercise program carried out with a thrice daily beauty break routine. This is little enough time spent to achieve that "born-to-beauty" look which is so desirable.

First foundation for any beauty's day is a skin-rinsing washing, with lather supplied by the finger tips and then rinsed off with many splashes of cold water to tighten the skin and keep it fresh looking.

Beauty Break Mid-day calls for another beauty-break. You need just five minutes. It's time enough for a thorough cleansing with sterile white cotton balls dipped in baby oil. (Small size bottles can easily be carried in the purse along with some of the balls in a glitter sprinkled rhinestone box or wrapped in cleansing tissue.)

This cleansing disposes easily of the morning's make-up and complexion-dulling dust. Use the balls with upward strokes until the skin looks fresh and clear. Press on a complexion-matched powder with another cotton ball, allow to set, then wipe off the excess. This serves to give the skin tones a lasting, fresh look.

Teen-agers with oily skins may want to repeat this treatment after getting home from school, leaving off make-up until the evening.

Michigan Mirror News in Brief

Michigan's shortage of doctors, dentists and other medical personnel was underlined in a report submitted to the governor by a 24 member commission he appointed to look into the matter.

Wilbur J. Cohen of the University of Michigan School of Social Work, who is chairman of the committee, reported that this state, which ranks 10th in wealth and personal income, ranks 35th in its supply of physicians.

National average is one doctor to each 1,761 residents, said Cohen. Michigan has only one doctor for each 2,000.

National average for nurses is 259 per 100,000 people. Michigan has only 200, his report showed.

Only sound solution to the situation seems to be the graduation of more doctors. Cohen's report urged that facilities for medical training be expanded rapidly at Wayne State University where a minimum expenditure would permit an increase in student load, and the early construction of a third medical school in the state.

Education has become Michigan's top political and practical problem.

It will come into sharper focus during the 1958 session of the legislature when schoolmen and lawmakers will seek solutions to

problems which are largely financial.

Interwoven into the money issue is the new emphasis on education as a cold war weapon for the nation.

Sputnik makes its point even before it becomes an important military weapon.

Republican legislators estimate that education costs through high school grades, the area covered by the school aid formula, will cost \$41 million more next year.

It will take that much to make up a \$2 million to \$6 million deficit in the school aid fund this year. Another \$14 million is needed because of an expected 70,000 student enrollment increase and to replace the \$25 million raised this year only by cigaret and liquor taxes.

Legislators feel that the liquor and cigaret taxes, levied as an emergency maneuver to guarantee schools \$190 per student this year, cannot be extended beyond the June 30 expiration date.

The sales tax revenue is down from last year, further reducing the automatic two cents on the dollar spent which goes to the schools. The third cent goes to the state treasury.

Demands have developed for a greater emphasis on science subjects since the Soviet Union launched its Sputnik, the earth satellite.

Dr. Lynn M. Bartlett, state superintendent of public instruction, told one group that the Russians are concentrating more on physics and mathematics in the high schools than the United States does.

His answer is more money for schools, higher salaries for teachers and a reassessment of curricula.

Dr. Samuel M. Brownell, superintendent of Detroit schools, calls for governments on all levels to determine who has the responsibility for improving schools.

He said that the Federal government, the states and local committees "all are pointing fingers at each other," demanding more participation and more help without attempting to solve the problem themselves.

Higher education also will be asking for more money and help this year.

Both the University of Michigan and Michigan State University state they need more if they are to provide the education in science and other fields that students need.

John A. Hannah, president of MSU, said the institution needs help if it is to "achieve the near-miracle the American people expect of us."

House speaker George VanPursem is urging the legislature to work as a "nonpolitical unit" in solving Michigan's "economic climate" dilemma.

He pointed to the industries

which have left the state in the last year, claiming they could obtain a Utopia of lower taxes and labor costs elsewhere.

Van Pursem, in the forefront of the campaign to blame the loss of jobs and industry on Williams, urged that the legislature start picturing Michigan as a good place to do business.

"We have an almost-unlimited water supply, good transportation and other factors," he said.

Older workers may be better suited for many jobs in automated plants, a recent University of Michigan Press publication declares.

The want ads are newsy, too.

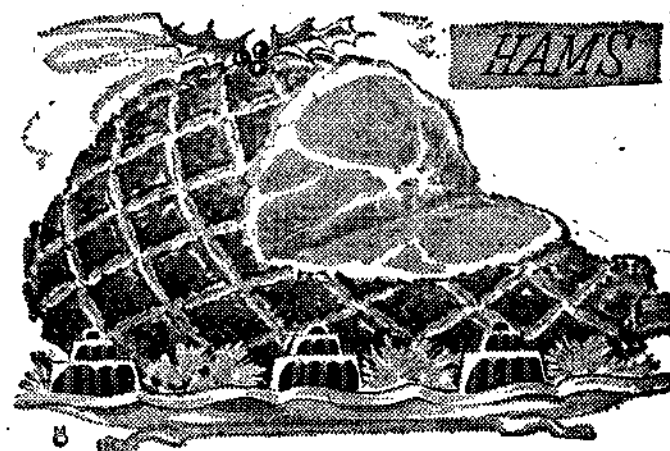

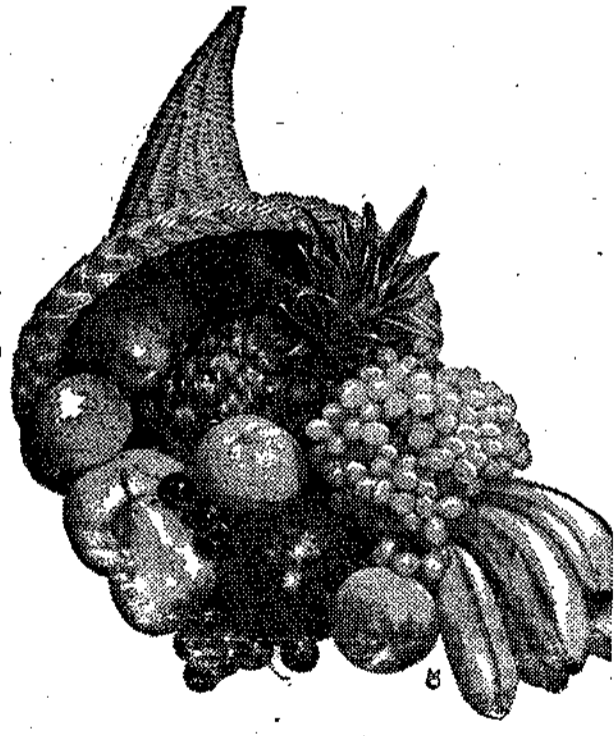

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
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
