

Need \$26,000 More To Build Hospital

Distribute 43 Baskets in Cass City Saturday

The Cass City Junior Woman's Club, with Mrs. J. D. Tuckey as project chairman, handled 43 goodfellow baskets for delivery to deserving homes in the Cass City area Saturday morning.

Money for the distribution came from Elkland Township Community Chest funds. The baskets cost \$195 this year.

Although only two more baskets were distributed Saturday than the 41 brought to homes in 1956, spokesmen for the group said that the baskets were larger as were the families of the homes that received the gifts.

The baskets contained groceries and individual gifts for some 70 children, purchased by Community Chest funds, and toys, furnished by the Cass City Lions Club.

Plan Three Square Dancing Courses At High School

A check of money and pledges received in the Cass City Community Hospital drive reveal, that \$26,000 more is needed to put the drive over the top. A total of \$400,000 is required for the village's share.

The figures were released at a meeting of the hospital board Thursday evening at the municipal building.

Authorities said that two larger donations of \$5,000 each are likely and that another \$6,000 is due from other sources... leaving \$10,000 needed to complete the drive.

The formal drive will be completed Jan. 18. At this time, all the collection records will be reviewed and an attempt will be made to secure the rest of the funds from persons not contacted or who may be able to increase their pledges.

The board also said that anyone who desires to make a pledge and donation who has been overlooked in the drive can do so by contacting M. B. Auten, treasurer, at the Cass City State Bank.

Last Year? Cass City is fortunate to have been approved for Federal Hill-Burton funds which pays 50 per cent of the costs of the construction of the hospital. Many competent observers feel that 1958 may be the last year that money will be allotted for the program.

A pledge of \$25,000 from Kresge Foundation also hinges on the area's ability to raise the last \$10,000 needed.

boughs laden with gleaming baubles.

- Date Diamonds**
(Makes 20)
½ cup sifted enriched flour
½ teaspoon salt
½ cup rolled oats, quick or old fashioned, uncooked
½ cup brown sugar
¼ cup shortening
1 egg
½ teaspoon vanilla
½ cup chopped nuts
½ cup chopped dates
½ cup flaked coconut
Confectioners' sugar

Sift together flour and salt in a bowl. Stir in oats and brown sugar. Add shortening, egg and vanilla. Beat until smooth, about 2 minutes. Stir in nuts, dates and coconut. Spread in greased 8-inch square pan. Bake in a preheated moderate (350° F.) oven 20 to 25 minutes. Cool in pan. Cut into 20 diamond-shaped bars. Lightly sift confectioners' sugar over the top.

- Cranberry Punch**
(Makes 7½ cups)
4 cups cranberry juice cocktail
1 6-ounce can frozen lemonade concentrate
¼ cup orange juice
To the lemonade concentrate, add 3 cans of cold water. Stir in cranberry juice (may be purchased bottled) and orange juice. Serve in cups with cinnamon sticks.

Molded Salads Will Make Table Pretty

When you're entertaining buffet style, the choice of foods has to please the eye as well as the palate. For this purpose, molded salads in refreshingly lovely colors or tints and beautiful molds can serve nicely.

Plan the salad and the platter before you actually start working on the salad so you can be certain it will lend enchantment to the table.

Here are two seasonal salads which will tempt your guests:

- Frozen Cherry Salad**
(Serves 6)
1 No. 2 can light cherries, pitted
½ cup diced pineapple
½ cup sliced bananas
½ cup chopped pecans
½ cup mayonnaise
1 3-ounce package cream cheese
½ teaspoon salt
Combine fruits and nuts. Blend together mayonnaise and cream cheese. Add salt. Combine fruit and nut mixture. Mix thoroughly. Pack in refrigerator tray and freeze. Cut in squares and serve on crisp lettuce.

- Cranberry Freeze**
(Serves 8)
1 1-pound can jelled cranberry sauce
½ cup whipping cream
2 tablespoons lemon juice
½ teaspoon almond extract
1 cup cottage cheese
Salad greens
Soured cream
Cut off a ¼-inch slice of cranberry sauce; reserve for garnish. Whip cream until stiff. Beat cranberry sauce, lemon juice and almond extract with a fork until smooth. Add cheese; beat with rotary beater until smooth. Fold in whipped cream. Pour into a mold and freeze. Unmold on greens and garnish with soured cream topped with cranberry sauce. This salad is best if allowed to soften slightly at room temperature before serving.

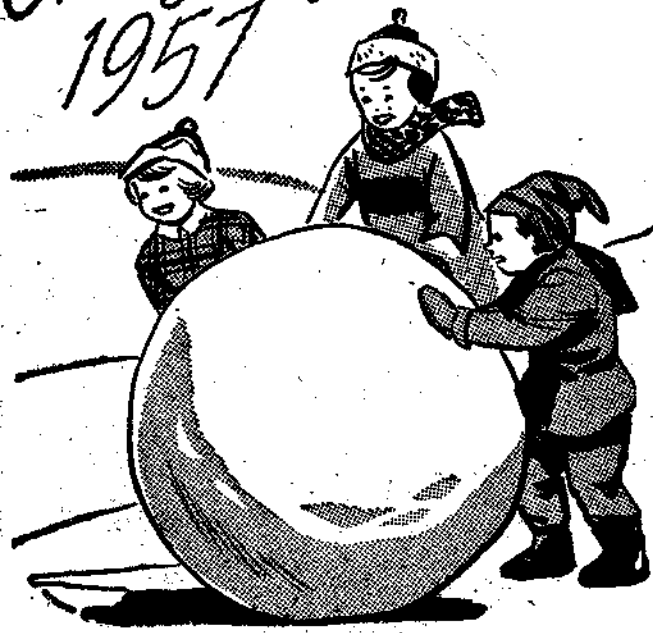
We of Cass City are really fortunate people. There is very little unemployment here. We are told that business-wise, it is one of the best towns in the State.

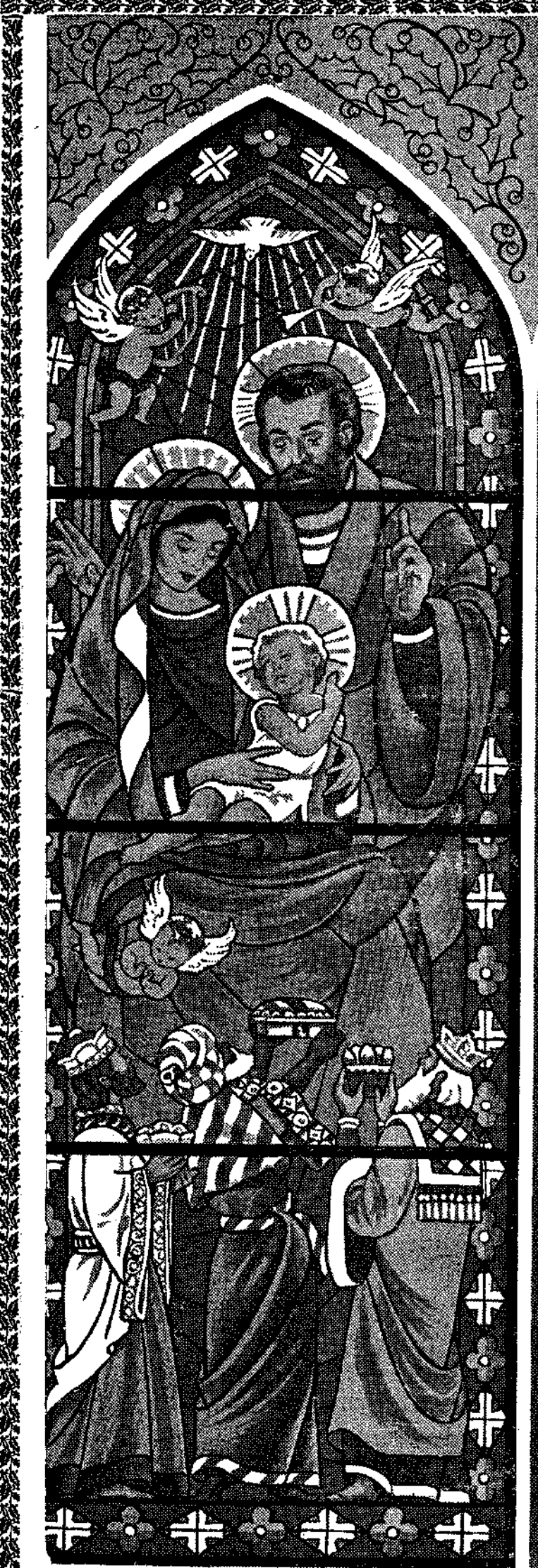

Bobcats Provide Sport Hunting



Bobcat hunting season in the lower peninsula got underway December 15 and extends through March 15. The wily cats, considered game animals in the lower peninsula, provide winter hunting enjoyment for Michigan nimrods and their dogs. In the upper peninsula, however, bobcats are bountied animals and may be taken at any time of year.

4-H Leaders at Safety Workshop

4-H electrical project leaders had an opportunity to learn safety precautions with the use of power tools at a recent workshop held at the Caro Detroit Edison office.

Bill Muller, County 4-H Club Agent stated that Cecil Smith, C. B. R. with the Detroit Edison Company, gave a very interesting demonstration on what would happen if electrically powered tools are not properly grounded.

Leaders from several county 4-H electrical clubs also gained knowledge in the use of Uranium as a source of power for creating electricity.

New lamp kits were introduced by Miss Higgins, Home Service Advisor, and the agent stated that kits for 4-H club members would be available from the club office.

Mr. Blenford Campbell, electrical project chairman, conducted the meeting and gave a practical demonstration on drilling holes through decorative bottles for constructing lamps.

Miss Higgins announced the continuation of the 28 Detroit Edison scholarships of \$300.00 each for 1958-1959 school year.

Club members enrolled in the 4-H electrical projects for 1958 can obtain information on these scholarships from the 4-H Club office or Detroit Edison Company in Caro.

Chimneys Primary Cause of Fire

The high fire rate season is upon us. We are in the heavy heating and electrical use months of the year. And this means there are more chances for fires to get started in our homes, says Alfred Ballweg, county agricultural agent.

According to Dick Pfister, extension farm safety specialist at Michigan State University, heating hazards usually involve faulty chimneys or stove pipes. He recommends you inspect these items and make necessary repairs and adjustments.

Electrical hazards usually result from overloading of wiring. Check to see that the proper sized fuse is being used. Pfister says no more than 15 amp fuses should be used in most wiring although some newer houses can use 20 amp fuses because they have number 12 wiring.

Next to heating and electrical hazards is trash. It is kindling for sparks to start fires. Removing trash promptly will prevent most fires, safety specialists agree. Other than trash, there is little around the house that sparks can set afire.

Pfister also recommends all members of the family know how to escape the home in case of fire. He says this would prevent much loss of life due to home fires.

Tips for Making Holiday Snacks

Be prepared for New Year's -- have jiffy snacks on hand in case friends drop in, suggests Mrs. Frances T. Clark, county home demonstration agent.

Make a snappy dunk and serve it with potato chips so you can nibble while you chat. For the dunk combine 1 package onion soup mix with 2 cups sour cream. Heap the mixture into a bowl and serve with potato chips or a variety of crackers.

For a little heavier lunch you might like "Nippy Cheese Toasties". To make them, grind together 1/2 pound sharp cheddar cheese, 1/2 cup stuffed olives, 1/8 cup green pepper, 1 small onion, and 1 hard cooked egg. Stir into this mixture 1/2 can tomato soup and 1 tablespoon melted butter.

Cut 6 hamburger buns in half and butter. Spread cheese mixture on the buttered buns, and place under the broiler. Broil about 10 minutes or until the cheese becomes puffy and light brown. Serve with a relish tray of fresh crispy vegetables.

For a tasty beverage that's not too sweet try this one with a tomato juice base. Combine one large (46-ounce) can tomato juice, 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 1 teaspoon horseradish, and 1 teaspoon grated onion in a sauce pan.

Slice 1 lemon, decorate slices with cloves and toss into the tomato juice. Bring the mixture to a boil. Simmer 15 minutes and serve it hot.

Burial was in Lakeside Cemetery in Port Huron.



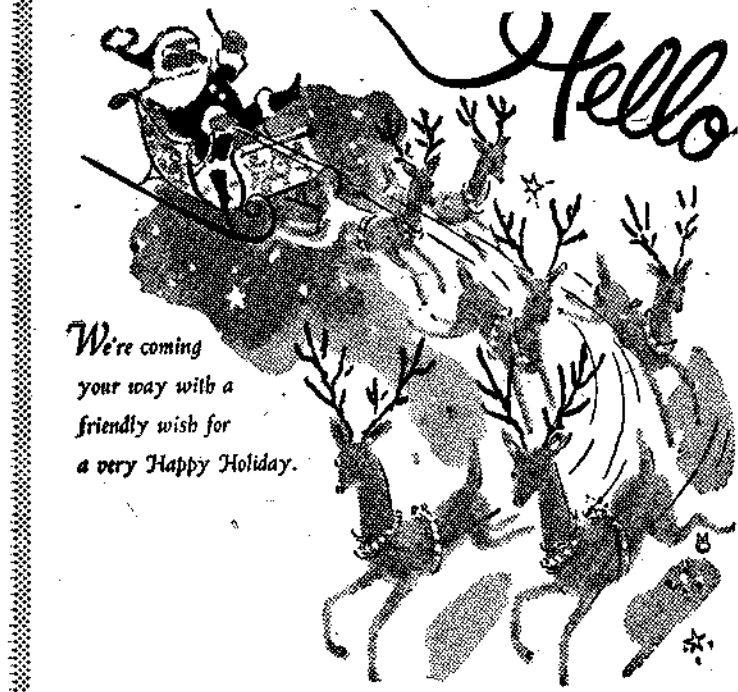

If you say, "That's a great idea, but my fireplace is an eyesore," then you probably should make some improvements around that hearth that will give you the enjoyment it's designed to afford.

It may take only a bit of cleaning, perhaps minor remodeling such as a few feet of ceramic tile and a little imagination to transform the fireplace into a thing of beauty.



Holidays are an important picture taking event so you can record scenes like this which can be re-lived over and over again with snapshots or movies. A handy supply of bulbs, batteries and film will help save the moments that become more priceless with the passing of time.

Perhaps the bricks need scrubbing or the hood needs polishing. Once you've taken care of these, there are several other things which can be taken to keep the glorified hearth really glorious.

New Accessories

That holiday check might come in handy for providing the proper basic tools for the fireplace: poker, tongs, spade and brush. If these are worn out or blackened beyond proper cleaning, why not give the family a present of new ones. These four tools should be handy but inconspicuous. They can be hung or placed on a stand. If the stand is of polished brass or a gay color, it can contribute much to the decor of the room.

If a room has a fireplace, then it is the center of interest in the room. If there are accessories above it, they should be simple and well planned. If yours are not, then perhaps a new brass bowl to be filled with fruit or nuts is the answer. Candelabra with slender tapered shades to the trick. Fuel and Kindling

Easily-Served Ham Stars for Dinner

You'll have something to sing about if you prepare an easy-to-serve ham for your Christmas feast. With gift opening and the flurry of lots of people and excited children it helps to have a ham decorated and sliced even before it's baked to give easy serving.

Your butcher will slice and tie a canned ham for you if you shop for it in plenty of time. Then decorate it the day before Christmas and you need only heat for an hour or two before dinner. That makes it easy!

Baked Glazed Ham

1 canned ham, sliced and tied
1 cup brown sugar
2 tablespoons prepared mustard
2 cups apricot juice
Apricot halves, maraschino cherries

Arrange ham in baking pan. Mix brown sugar and mustard to a paste with spoon and spread over top of ham. Fasten fruit on top with toothpicks. Pour syrup around ham and bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) about 1½ hours, depending upon size. Remove ties before serving.

Here's a sweet-sour, spicy sauce to serve with the ham:

Raisin Sauce

½ cup seedless raisins
1 cup water
4 whole cloves
½ cup brown sugar
1 tablespoon cornstarch
¼ teaspoon salt
Pinch of pepper
1 tablespoon butter
1 tablespoon lemon juice

Cover the raisins with water; add cloves and simmer for 10 minutes. Mix brown sugar, cornstarch, salt and pepper. Stir into raisin mixture. Cook, stirring constantly, until slightly thick. Add butter and lemon juice. Simmer for a few minutes longer. Serve hot with ham or roast pork.

Fighting the Lamprey



U. S. Fish and Wildlife workers, conducting lamprey control experiments in Michigan streams, fill a spray rig which feeds a lamprey poison into the stream. In its first test the chemical destroyed young lampreys before they could mature and move into the Great Lakes, but did not harm game fish. Since invading the Great Lakes, sea lampreys have seriously reduced lake trout populations.

Traffic Safety Films Available at MSU

Selected educational films on traffic safety for the use of the new County Driver Safety Schools being established in Michigan are offered by Michigan State University's Highway Traffic Safety Center and the Audio Visual Center.

One of the many available films points out to the adult motorist that the attitude of the driver is the major factor in causing accidents. This film, "The Case of Officer Hallibrand," is a dramatic presentation of five types of violators and their behavior in breaking safety practices.

Safety practices for starting, stopping and driving on ice are depicted in the film, "Don't Skid Yourself."

These films are especially recommended as teaching aids in the new County Driver Schools.

Because of their treatment of specific driving problems and driver attitudes with which these schools are concerned, they are also suitable for other types of public education programs in traffic safety.

The recommended films for driver schools are part of the extensive film collection of the Highway Traffic Safety Center and cover all phases of traffic safety for children and adults. Films are 16 mm sound and range in running time from a few minutes to half an hour. Many are in color.

A small rental fee to pay for handling charges is made. Films may be requested through the Highway Traffic Safety Center or ordered directly from the Audio Visual Center at Michigan State University. A catalogue is available upon request.

Michigan Mirror

This year Michigan is getting an early start with a special week May 4-10 to count its blessings. Previously, the promotion period came later in May.

The chesty robin will be joined by the symbol of the new Mackinac Straits Bridge as signs of the state's 1958 Michigan Week.

Water and education will be the dual themes of the 1958 celebration and theme, "It's Great to Live in Michigan," will be retained.

Dwight Stocker of Kalamazoo said the education side of the theme will be emphasized inside the state and the water attractions of Michigan will be stressed beyond its borders.

"Education appeals to everyone in Michigan and water appeals to residents of other states where that resource is not so plentiful," he said.

Edward J. Hekmatt of Grand Rapids has been named general chairman of the 1958 event which will picture Michigan as a state of business and industry, a playground and "a good place to live."

Chicago is the "villain" in a court drama with six states demanding that the city return the water it drains from Lake Michigan for sanitation purposes.

Involved are Michigan, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Ohio, Pennsylvania and New York—all protesting the loss of lake levels which threaten to damage hopes for the St. Lawrence Seaway.

Chicago started taking out of Lake Michigan more than 50 years ago for two purposes.

The city used 1,500 feet per second for the Chicago Sanitary and Ship Canal to make it navigable. That has been the restriction since 1930.

Unlimited pumpage also has been used to run through the City's sanitation system. After it is used, the water goes into the Mississippi river through the canal.

Atty. Gen. Thomas M. Kavanagh said the loss of the water to Chicago also threatens to reduce the value of resort property in bordering states, and hurt the development of electric power.

In addition, the states are asking that other cities bordering the Great Lakes, including Milwaukee and Toronto, be required to return the water they use for sanitation.

Justices of Michigan's Supreme Court are taking long strides in exercising their discretionary control over lower courts.

They have scheduled a series of meetings with the judges of circuit courts to provide closer coordination of the state's judicial system.

The first meeting, at Saginaw, brought a blast from Justice Eugene F. Black, who charged that Wayne County judges are taking excessive vacations and allowing their cases to backlog.

It started a furor, with judges denying their schedules of vacations are reducing the effectiveness of the bench.

The second meeting, with Upper Peninsula judges at Marquette, brought only a criticism of the state parole board whose policies, it was charged, keep state prisons overcrowded.

Observers stated that the Marquette meeting was less spectacular because Justice John Voelker, who presided, held a closed meeting with the jurists before letting the public listen.

He defended the move as "the right of judges to get together."

Educators at the University of Michigan are ready to accept the challenge of Russian scientific advances with a special institute to carry the fight into the public school system.

The proposal, by a science advisory committee to Dr. Harlan Hatcher, of the U-M, was accepted by the Board of Regents.

The 1958 legislature will be asked for \$2,870,000 as the first-year budget for the institute.

Dr. Hatcher said the institute would combine the talents of scientists in varied fields to concentrate their knowledge and training on education of youngsters in science.

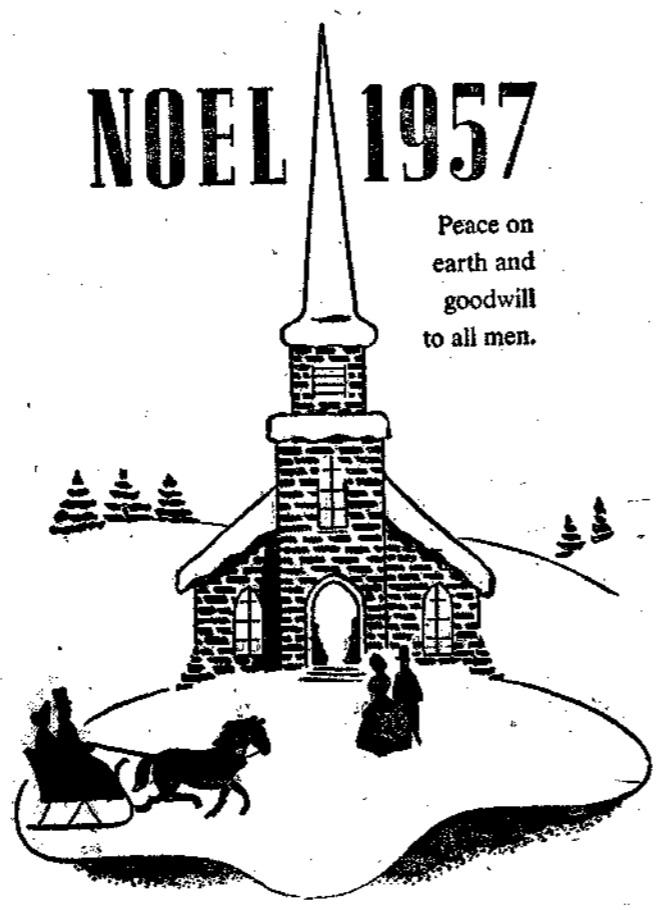

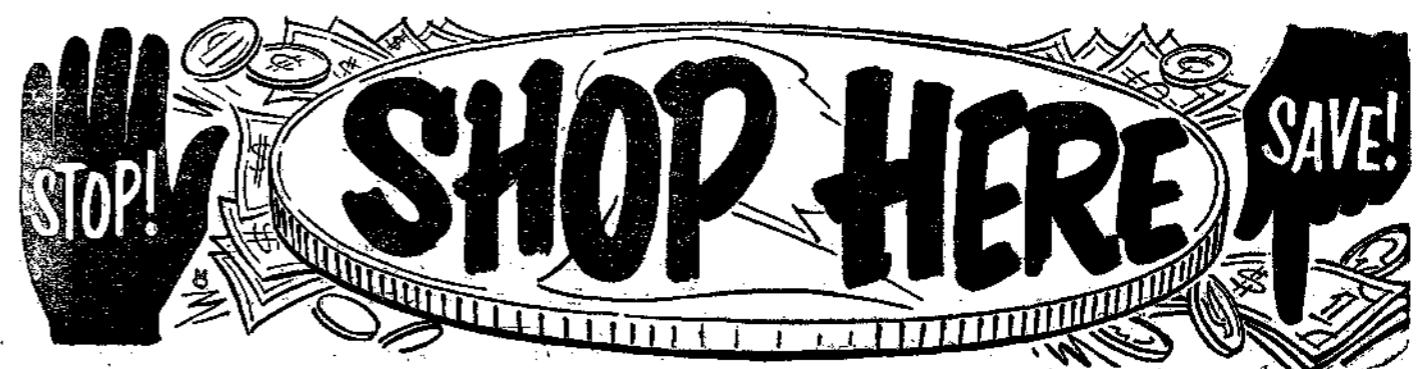

Holsteins Complete Production Records

Holsteins owned by two area dairymen have completed outstanding production records, according to an announcement made this week by the Holstein-Friesian Association of America.

Valleyrest Trailwood Burke, a three-year-old Holstein owned by Dolan Sweeney of Uby, produced a total of 19,494 pounds of milk and 673 pounds of butterfat. The cow was milked twice daily for 354 days.

Valleyrest Trailwood Bold Jane, also owned by Mr. Sweeney, produced 15,102 pounds of milk and 613 pounds of butterfat as a two-year-old. The cow was milked twice daily for 348 days.

Gilbert Davis' Holstein, Clay-acres Pansy Dan, was milked twice daily for 361 days and produced 19,532 pounds of milk and 798 pounds of butterfat as a four-year-old.

Testing was supervised by Michigan State University and the Holstein organization.

MMPA Tells Price Of November Milk

Premium returns to dairy farmers of the Detroit market totaled over \$706,000 during November, a report to the sales committee of Michigan Milk Producers' Association reveals.

The premium represents additional returns over Federal Order prices established for the market. There were 12,340 shippers in the Detroit market and average gross income per farm was \$564 before deductions for transportation, dues and advertising. This averages 35c to 50c per hundred depending on the location of the producer.

Base price for the month was \$4.71 per hundred, six cents over October. Excess price was \$3.48 per hundred which includes a 20c per hundred seasonal premium on Class II milk. Average price for all milk in the Detroit market was \$4.60.

The report shows that sales were up 3.1 per cent over November of 1956 and 1.48 per cent over October of 1957.

Production totalled 149,884,000 pounds which is an increase of 4.7 per cent over November of 1956 and down 4 per cent from October of this year.

Average prices in the outstate markets for November show the Valley markets at \$4.71; Jackson, \$4.67; Battle Creek, \$4.66; Holland, \$4.58; Muskegon, \$4.53; Chippewa County, \$4.47; Grand Rapids, \$4.38; Marquette, \$4.22; and Ironwood, \$4.21.

Manual Explains Powers and Duties Of Township Board

"The Michigan Township Board," a handy pocket-sized manual just published at Michigan State University, should prove to be of value to citizens interested and involved in local government.

The manual details township board powers, duties, modes of procedure and parliamentary rules in an easy-to-read outline for ready reference.

The manual does more than just examine existing legal dispositions. It reflects an examination of how actual legal rules are being applied in Michigan. It combines the law, traditions and day-to-day practices of the boards.

Prepared under sponsorship of M. S. U.'s Governmental Research Bureau, the manual was written by James and Marilyn Blawie, a husband and wife team formerly on the university staff.

D. Hale Brake, president of the Michigan Institute of Local Government, and William D. Dennison, secretary-treasurer of the Michigan Association of Township Supervisors, participated in the project. Many township board members were interviewed.

"Township offices generally are not full-time jobs," Mr. Brake pointed out, "so people holding them normally do not have time for extended research and reading. The most useful function of this manual will be to provide a simple and direct statement as to what boards can and cannot do in reference to definite problems, such as cemeteries, parks and fire service."

Farmers Have Two Choices for Filing Income Tax

Farmers have two choices in filing income tax returns for 1957, according to the Internal Revenue service of the U. S. Treasury department.

They can file a return and pay the tax due by Feb. 15, 1958, or they can file an estimate of the tax due and pay by Jan. 15, with a deadline of April 15 for filing the return itself.

A farmer is defined by income tax laws as any individual who receives at least two-thirds of gross income from farming.

The Farmers Tax Guide, available free of charge at the Internal Revenue offices or the County Agricultural Agent, describes what forms are to be filed and the procedures for filing.

All farmers whose gross income is \$600 or more must file a return on Form 1040 and also must file Schedule F, showing farm income and expenses. Farmers cannot use short form 1040-A.

Farmers who own their own land or farm rented land must file a form 1040 in order to pay a self-employment tax if their gross income is \$400 or more. This tax assures income in later years to the farmer or his survivors. Farmers whose income is less than \$400 may elect to pay the self-employment tax.

Noise-Making for New Year's Not A New Custom

Up-to-date as it may seem noise-making—including blowing horns and beating drums—was an old American Indian custom for celebrating New Year's Day.

So it's stated in Andrew J. Blackbird's "History of the Ottawa and Chippewa" in the possession of The University of Michigan Historical Collections.

Blackbird, who writes about the life of his people in their settlement near Little Traverse Bay in the 1830's, was the son of an Ottawa chief and had been educated by French missionary priests.

He writes: "My people used to observe many holidays, particularly Christmas, New Year's Eve and Corpus Christi. On New Year's Eve every one of the Indians used to go around visiting the principal men of the tribe, shooting their guns close to their doors, after screaming three times, 'Happy New Year's,' bang, bang, altogether, blowing their tin horns and beating their drums.

"Early on New Year's morning, they would go around among their neighbors expressly to shake hands with one another, with the words of salutation, 'Bozhoo' (closest the Indians could come to the French 'Bonjour'), children and all. This practice was kept up for a long time, or until the white people came and intermingled with the tribe.

"I thought my people were very happy in those days, when they were all by themselves and possessed a wide spread of land, and no one to quarrel with them as to where they should make their gardens or take timber or make sugar.

"And fish of all kinds were so plentiful in the harbor. A hook anywhere in the bay and at any time of the year would take Mackinaw trout, as many as one would want. And if a net were set anywhere in the harbor, in the morning it would be loaded with fish of all kinds. Every big council of the Indians was transacted in the village of Little Traverse."

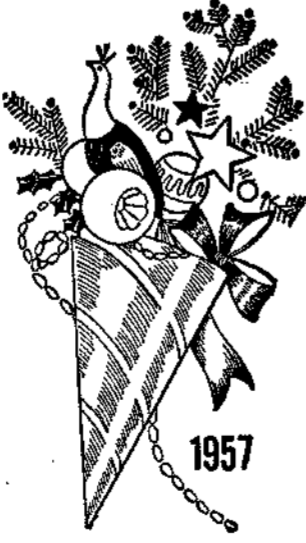

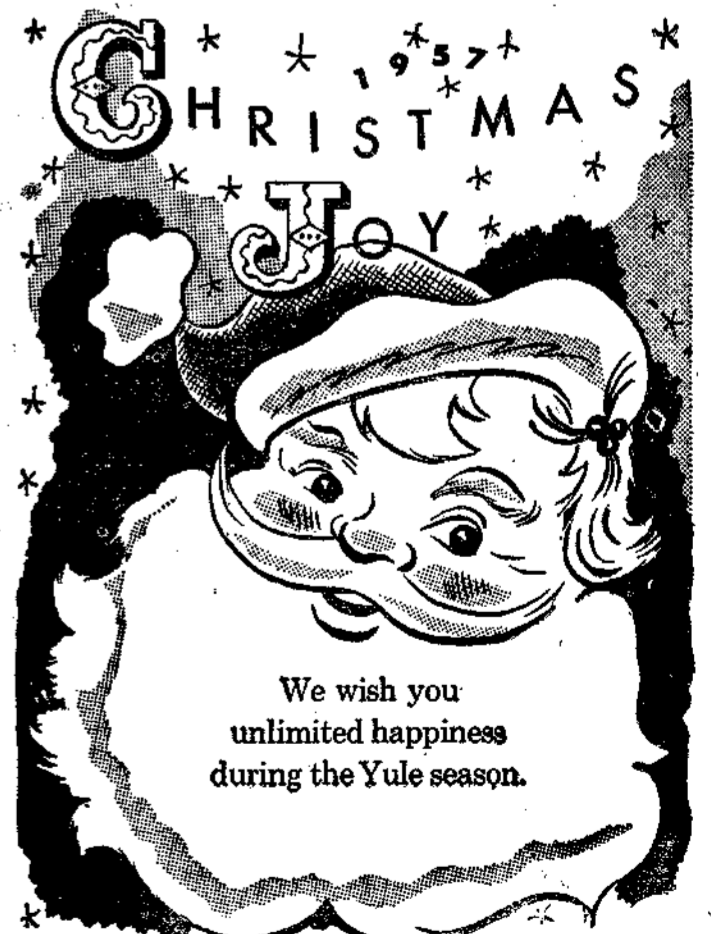
