gests always using a wool press cloth next to the right side of wool fabrics to prevent shine. Wool should never be pressed dry ---always use steam.If a reg ular dry iron is used, press on the wrong side with a press cloth of a heavy lintless cotton material like drill. The cloth should be dampened to make steam. With

a steam iron, a lightweight cotton press cloth can be used on the wrong side of the fabric. In either case, the wool press cloth must also be used next to the right side of the garment.

When pressing seams in a wool garment, brown wrapping paper placed between the seam and the garment prevents an imprint of the seam allowance on the right side of the garment.

Take care not to overpress a wool garment, Miss Erler cautions, and keep the weight of the iron off the fabric.

For ideas on accessorizing a costume, 4-H members can consult current fashion magazines for the latest ' trends. Blending tones of one color or using contrasting color accents are popular trends this year. One warning when using contrasting accents is to keep the colors from becoming spotty. A red scarf with a navy suit, hat and shoes is more effective than red scarf, hat and shoes with the navy suit. Choosing accessories that are appropriate for their age and keeping them simple are other considerations 4-H'ers should keep in mind.
