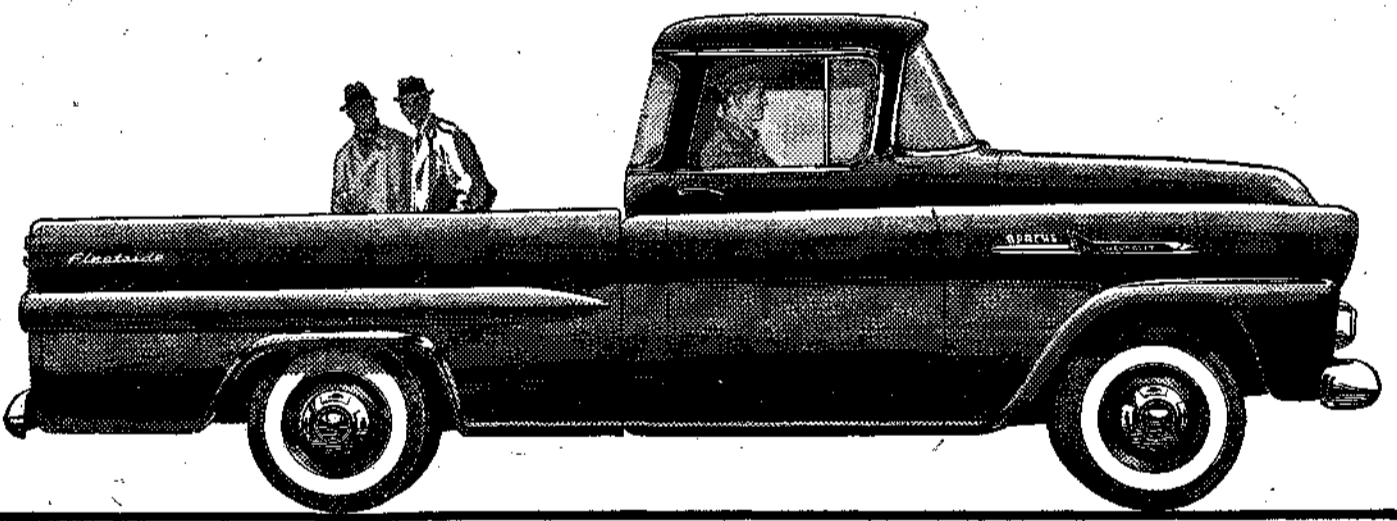
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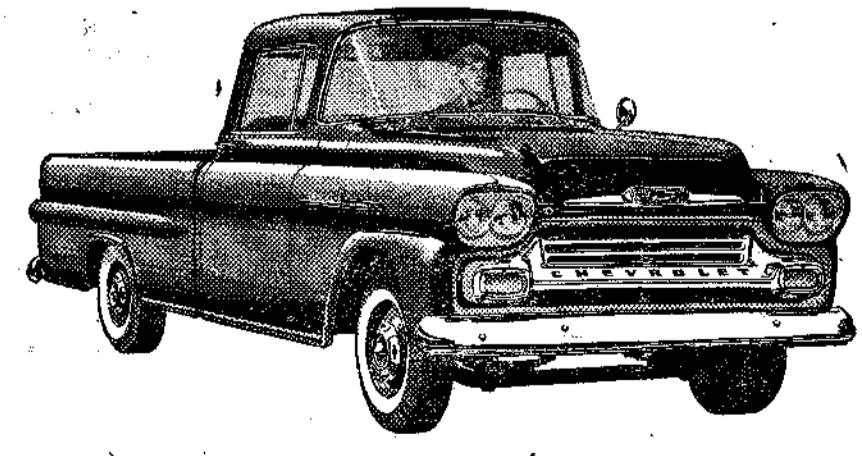

State Traffic Deaths Down in February

February became the 21st of the last 23 months in which there was a reduction in traffic deaths in Michigan. Provisional figures compiled by the State Police show 85 fatalities, or 11 fewer than the toll of 96 in the same month last year. The record is considered all the more remarkable in that the toll a year ago was 27 under the previous five-year February average of 133. For the first two months of this year there has been a saving of 37 lives compared with the same two months of 1957. There were 95 deaths in January against 121 in the same month last year, a reduction of 26. It was the first time since 1948 that deaths in both January and February were below 100. In that year 89 died in January and 64 the following month. March also has started out auspiciously. There were six killed the first week end—Friday, the last day of February, and Saturday and Sunday. Twenty died in the same period a year ago. The state's goal this year is a reduction of 10 per cent in the death toll of 1,519 in 1957, or 152 lives.

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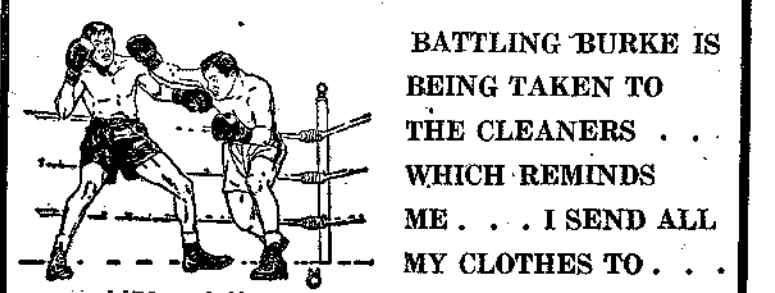
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OIL CHANGES: HOW OFTEN?
We car dealers are just human the same as you (no remarks please) and though we practically live with these four-wheeled monsters we sell we never will know all the answers to the questions that plague us about them.

Take that old chestnut for instance: "How often do you REALLY have to change oil?" Well, I've read the oil company ads too, but to really get the technical reasons I cornered a petroleum engineer the other day, and his explanation I figured, would make sense to all of the other car drivers who've wondered about it the same as I have.

Rule number one, he said, is that there IS no standard rule, despite the sales propaganda, because no cars are driven the same under the same conditions. If you've just driven through a dust storm - for instance - change your oil as soon as possible after because you're bound to have picked up a lot of dust particles in your oil that act like sandpaper to your cylinder walls and your filter probably hasn't stopped them all.

That's one reason for changing - dirt in your oil. But the second is most important - and harmful - especially since you can't see it and your oil filter can't stop it, it's called 'dilution' and it happens every time you start a cold engine. Some of the gasoline entering the combustion chamber condenses and runs down the cylinder walls as liquid. This mixes with the oil in your crankcase and eventually thins it to the point where it can no longer properly lubricate an engine at normal temperature.

If you only use your car for start and stop city driving you should change your oil as often as every 500 miles, but if you're using it only for long drives, such as salesmen frequently do, you may go as far as 5,000 and even 10,000 without a change.

How often you change is up to you, of course, but we hope you'll lean a little on the careful side. That's because we'd like to be given the pleasure of selling the old buggy when you decide you want to move up to a newer one and a tight, well-kept engine is the only kind we want to pass on to our customers.

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Agent Tells How to Brighten Furniture

By using linseed oil and gum turpentine, you may be able to brighten up varnished furniture that has taken on a dull, cloudy look, suggests Mrs. Frances T. Clark, county home demonstration agent. Cloudiness caused by a poor quality varnish cannot be removed without removing the varnish. But, says Mrs. Clark, if the finish was dulled by smoke, dust and grease—as may happen in any home—then linseed oil and gum turpentine should successfully renew it.

Clean the varnished surface first. Do one section at a time using one teaspoon gum turpentine and three teaspoons boiled linseed oil in one cup hot water. When the mixture gets cool, mix another batch. Rub on with a soft cloth or use very fine steel wool if the surface has been neglected for a long time. Wipe the surface with a clean cloth wrung out of warm water, and follow by rubbing with a dry cloth.

Then you can restore the finish with a 3/0 steel wool pad dipped in equal parts of raw linseed oil and gum turpentine. Apply very lightly and carefully, especially on the edges, to prevent the steel wool from cutting. Wipe off with a dry cloth—the cloudiness should be gone. Make sure you have boiled linseed oil for cleaning and raw lin-
