## Select Corn Hybrid Fitted to Climate

Picking out the right corn hybrid from among the large number our seed dealers have to offer can be a job. One of the easiest ways to cut down on this number to be considered is to look only at those hybrids which have been adapted to the climatic or crop zone of the state in which it will be grown, believes Alfred Ballweg, county agricultural agent.

A corn which is fully adapted to any one of these zones if planted near the normal date, could be expected to mature before the first killing frost date. This would be a full season crop.

During the past couple of years many farmers have gotten caught with high moisture corn in the field. In many cases the season had been pushed. Problems with handling wet corn have helped to stir up interest in the "early" maturing hybrids.

Maturity dates are relative. An early hybrid in one zone is not necessarily early in another zone, said Ballweg.

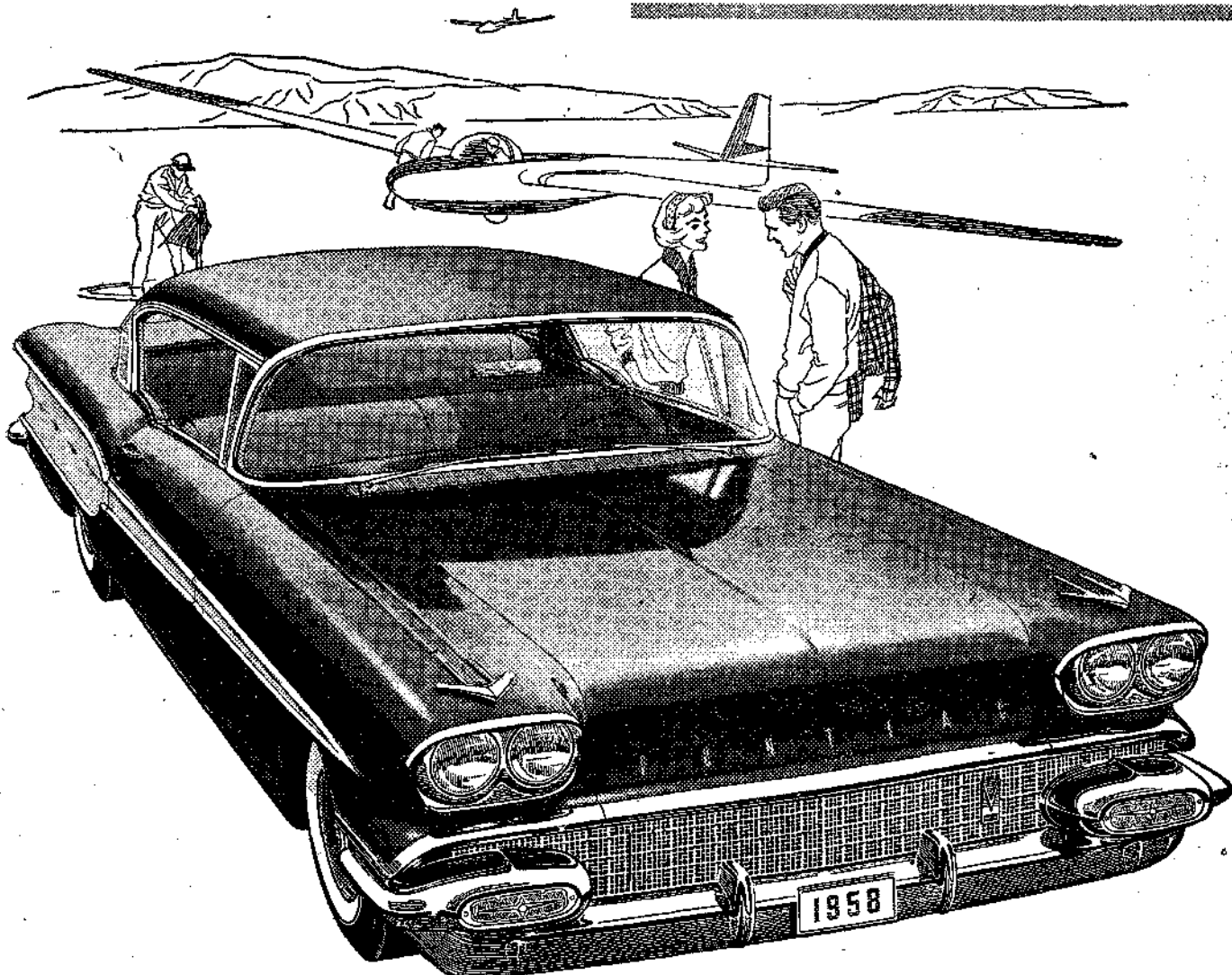

## First Enterprise Tells History of Thumb Fire of '81

An eyewitness account of the great Thumb fire was recorded in the first issue of the Cass City Enterprise printed Thursday, Sept. 8, 1881.

A copy of the paper, carefully preserved, was brought to the Chronicle by Arthur Atwell.

The article on the fire says "We write amid smoke and cinders of the most terribly ruinous fire that ever visited the Huron peninsula of Michigan...from all directions come reports of the finding of the blistered and charred remains of men, women and little children. It is estimated that no less than 800 human lives have been destroyed in the three counties."

The fire had been burning for two weeks, the editor reported, before it got out of hand. His account reads, "During Sunday and the two following days Cass City was in imminent danger. The fire approached with unaccountable rapidity from the south and west." Cass Cityites fought for three days and only an adequate supply of water saved the village.

The paper listed several communities that were hard hit. Paris, in Huron County, listed 40 dead and Argyle listed 12 to 15 dead.

Also listed in the same issue were many of the farm homes destroyed in the Cass City area.

## Tips for Best Use of Fertilizer

Cured fertilizer will stay in good condition for several months if properly stored in a dry place, say Michigan State University soils specialists.  
 Lawns can be fertilized in the spring. But to avoid "burning" the grass, it's best to put the dry fertilizer on before green growth starts, according to Michigan State University turf specialists.

Plow-planting corn not only saves money on seed bed preparation costs but yields are a little better, report Michigan State University soils specialists. In 1957 comparison tests, plow-planted corn yielded an average of 11 bushels more per acre over conventional methods.

Sheep raisers, keep a sharp eye on ewes for signs of lambing paralysis. Symptoms include weakness, stiff gait and difficulty getting up and down. Michigan State University livestock specialists say to get medical help at the first sign so rest of flock doesn't become infected.  
 Fall turkey prices will be slightly lower this year, believes a Michigan State University farm economist. Expected heavy placement of poulters now through June will push fall supplies up.

## Extend Loan Period For Farm Storage

The United States Department of Agriculture has extended indefinitely the farm storage facility and mobile dryer loan programs, Charles B. Eckfeld, office manager for the Tuscola County ASC, announced today.

Farmers may obtain loans for wheat, corn, oats, rye, barley, soybeans, grain sorghums, dry beans, rice, peanuts, cottonseed and flaxseed.

Farmers in Michigan may also borrow up to 80 per cent of the costs for storage structures that are approved by the ASC. Loans can run for five years and the first four equal payments be made a year from the date of the loan. Interest is four per cent per year.

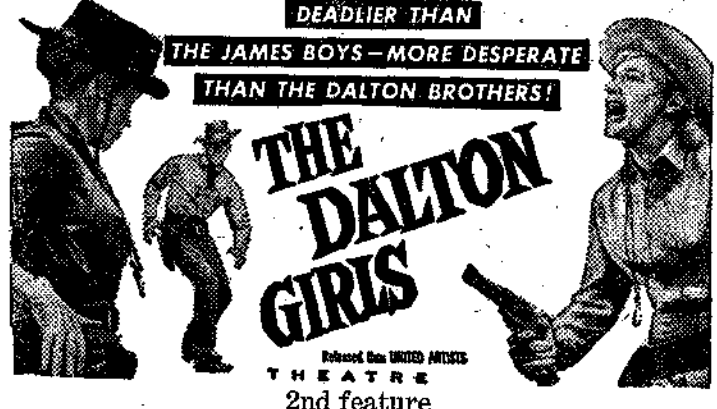

### Cut Costs to Build Low Priced Homes

Cost cutting can help supply the good, low-cost housing the United States really needs, according to a Michigan State University specialist.

The selling price of the average house constructed is too high for the average income, contends Byron M. Radcliffe, director of the four-year residential building curriculum at M.S.U.

"The average income is around \$5,000, limiting to \$12,500 the price of a home a prospective buyer with this prospective income can purchase," Radcliffe declared. He pointed out that only 27 per cent of U. S. houses built up to mid-1957 were at or below this price.

He said 44 per cent of new houses cost \$15,000 or more, taking an income of at least \$6,000 before an FHA-insured mortgage could be obtained. Yet only one third of American families have this income.

Because builders cannot control labor and materials prices, Radcliffe feels cost cuts in construction methods and techniques are the best answers in providing additional housing.

Some of his suggestions: eliminate the basement and save \$1,500; centralize plumbing to save extra materials; use "tilt-up" walls, built flat on the slab and then put up into position as nearly complete as possible; use dry wall, ready-built windows and other such components whenever possible; cut material and time waste.

"It has been demonstrated by the more progressive builder that a very substantial sum of money can be eliminated from the selling price of the house," Radcliffe asserted.

### Less Traffic Deaths Recorded in March

Provisional figures compiled by the State Police show a 20 per cent reduction in traffic deaths in Michigan during March as compared with the same month a year ago.

There were 94 reported fatalities, or 23 fewer than the 117 in March of 1957.

It was the 21st of the last 24 months in which deaths have gone down.

For the first three months of this year there has been an accumulated reduction of 54 deaths, or 16 per cent under the same period last year. There were 25 lives saved in January and six in February.

The State Police added a note of caution in pointing out that the March reduction in deaths was actually accomplished in the first 15 days, when 26 lives were saved. In the remaining 16 days the death toll was three more than in the comparable period last year.

This was taken as a warning that with the arrival of warm weather and increased traffic, drivers will have to do even much better if the state is to achieve its goal of a 10 per cent reduction in deaths in 1958 under the toll in 1957.
