

When you buy greens, in small or large quantities, take good care of them. When you get them home, remove any wilted or damaged leaves and then put the greens in the hydrator of your refrigerator. If your refrigerator has no hydrator wrap the greens in waxed paper or ventilated bags before putting them in the

refrigerator. Save the washing of the greens until you are ready to use them. Wash only the amount of greens you will use for the salad you are making. In this way, the greens you store are always dry and that is the way they need to be for the best keeping.
