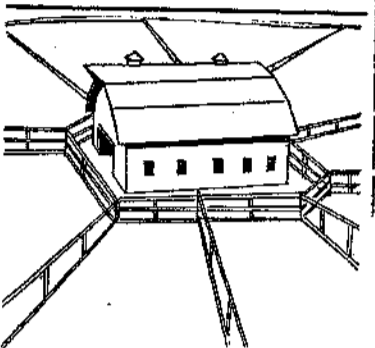


Pie Shaped Lots Aid Management

Pie-shaped corrals may be the answer to many management problems for dairy operators planning new farm layouts, the U. S. Department of Agriculture says.

A recent survey of dry-lot dairies in California, conducted by agricultural engineers Thayer Cleaver of USDA's Agricultural Research Service and C. F. Kelly of the University of California's Agricultural Experiment Station at Davis, reveals that time and work can be lessened by use of this corral arrangement.

In the pie set-up, the milking barn is located at the hub, and the



corral sides jut out from it like the spokes of a wheel. Feed troughs are located around the outside of the pie. Primary advantage of this arrangement is that it eliminates much of the walking and gate control necessary in conventional rectangular corrals.

While too few dairies have been studied so far to permit definite conclusions, the preliminary survey indicates a considerable advantage in pie-shaped lots where other conditions on the farm remain constant. Gains in efficiency with this type of layout are influenced by size of milking herd.

The investigators found that approximately one-third of the operator's time in getting the cows from the corrals to the milking barn is spent driving the cattle out of the corrals.

And New Chemicals Cure "Sore Head"

Filarial dermatosis of sheep—also known as elaphorhiza, or "sore head"—can be cured, the U. S. Department of Agriculture reports. Two compounds, ET-5 and piperazine, gave complete cure of even the most advanced cases of the disease in USDA tests.

This rare skin malady affects sheep grazing above the 6,000-foot level on summer ranges in the western United States and Canada. Although it now infects less than 1 per cent of domestic sheep, there are indications that the disease is spreading.

Filarial dermatosis is caused by a worm parasite related to the nematodes responsible for elephantiasis in humans. The microscopic larvae live in the skin, causing raw, bleeding lesions of the head, feet, and abdomen, which result in lameness and blindness.

USDA veterinarian Harry E. Kemper first discovered, described, and successfully treated the disease some years ago. More recently, Dr. Harold O. Peterson, a parasitologist at the Albuquerque, N. Mex., laboratory of USDA's Agricultural Research Service, has proved the value of the two fast-acting, easy-to-use remedies now available for other veterinary purposes.

A single injection of ET-57 directly into the rumen of an affected animal can cure it. Adding piperazine to the sheep's drinking water for 3 days or administering it as a single drench proved equally effective.

Portable Silo



Despite 1957 drought, economical portable silos did an excellent job of preserving silage at Windy Acres farm at Millmont, Pa. Spoilage was less than three per cent in the flexible vinyl silos, and no special preservatives were used. Main cause of spoilage is oxidation—chemical reaction of fodder with oxygen from the air. Vinyl film retards spoilage by blocking passage of oxygen air from outside air into the silo. But carbon dioxide gas given off by silage escapes through the vinyl film.

Storing Wheat May Prove Profitable This Year-Eckfeld

With the wheat prices taking their customary harvest time dip, wheat growers with plenty of farm storage stand to benefit in more ways than one, according to Charles B. Eckfeld, county office manager of the Tuscola County ASC Committee. A Department of Agriculture study of the wheat situation shows that in recent years wheat has dropped to a seasonal low during the June-August period— as much as 35 cents below the price-support level, the county manager said. The report indicates that the seasonal decline is likely to be greater than usual this year because of the big crop, reduced price-support rate and large production on farms not eligible for price support.

"Having plenty of farm storage definitely pays," Mr. Eckfeld emphasizes, "and those farmers who looked ahead and obtained additional storage will find that what they save on their wheat crop by postponing marketing in many cases will help pay for the cost of the extra storage."

Clayton Emigh Dies In Royal Oak

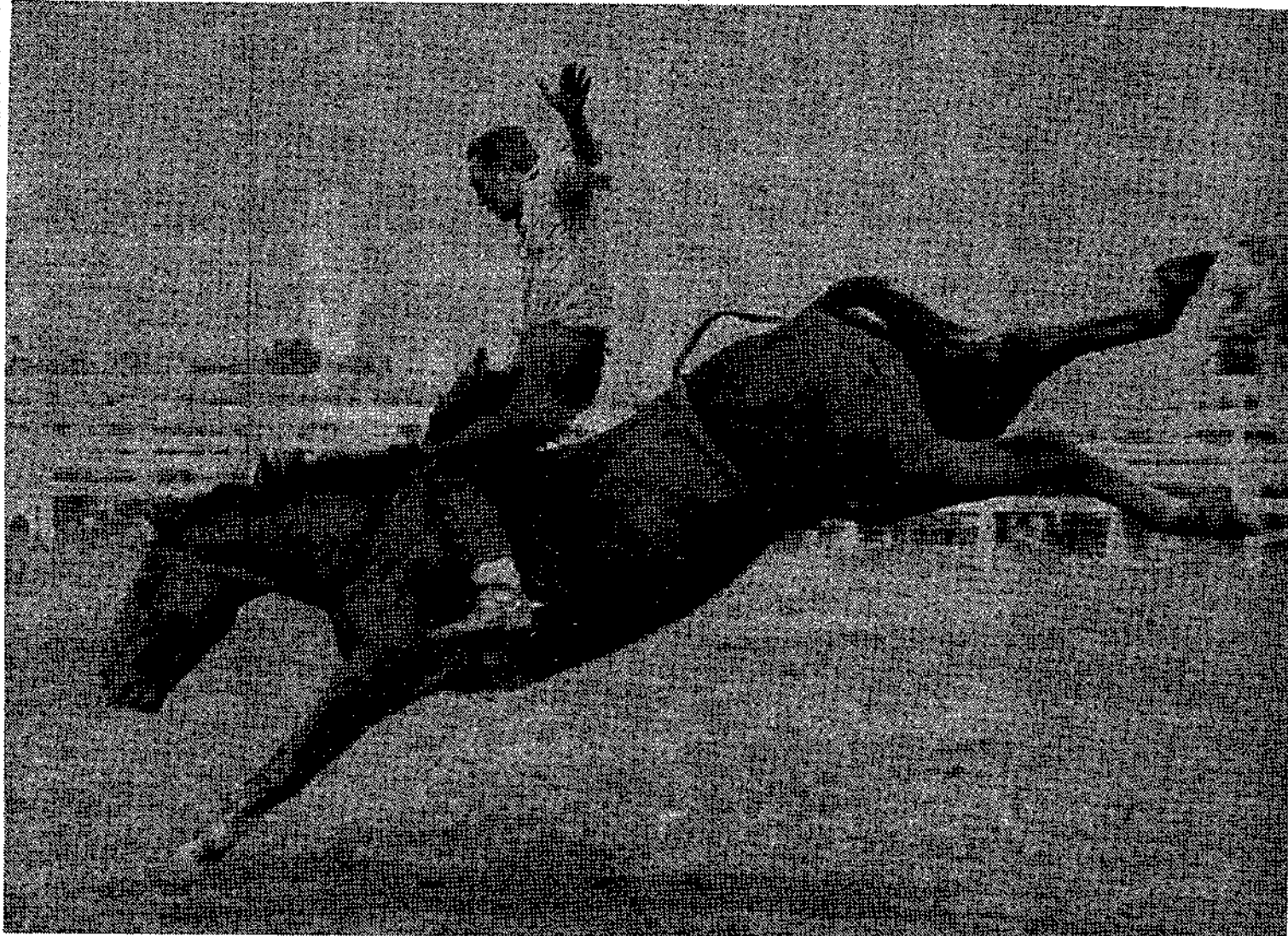
Clayton Emigh died Monday, July 14, at Beaumont Hospital in Royal Oak, where he had been a patient three days.

Michigan Mirror News In Brief

Sentiment is already beginning to jell on the issue of a constitutional convention for Michigan more than four months before the November election.

The issue goes on the ballot automatically but the results are

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much less certain. If approved, the state will call a constitutional convention the next year to rewrite the basic law of the state. The last wholesale re-write was in 1908.

It has been changed by amendment 63 times since then. Dozens of other proposed changes have been rejected by the voters.

Republicans are split on the issue of whether to call a convention. One side of the party -- suspected to be the majority -- believes more amendments can be voted to make the desirable streamlining changes.

This would retain the basic 1908 document under which Michigan lives but add features to fit it to modern society.

On the other hand, Paul D. Bagwell, the Republican candidate for governor, is using a 1908 Oldsmobile in his campaign to dramatize the need for a new constitution.

Still other Republicans are indifferent because by using the present method of selecting delegates to a constitutional convention -- three from each senatorial district -- they would keep control of its product.

Democrats would like a new constitution, but... They feel the method of selecting delegates, with the Senate in control of Republicans, would be undesirable. They would like a method of dominating the new constitution by changing the way delegates are chosen.

Democrats claim, on the heels of sweeping election victories in the past 10 years, that they con-

stitute the real majority. They blocked enabling legislation during the 1958 session, arguing that some fairer method should be devised. Democrats favored choosing delegates according to House districts.

The argument goes back to the 1962 constitutional amendment which created the "balanced legislature."

In theory, the Senate was to be given 34 seats based on area and the House 110 seats based on population.

However, the amendment kept the moiety clause, a headache for popular parties since governments were first invented. It works this way:

The state is divided into 110 districts according to population. Any district with one more citizen than the minimum required is given another seat.

Democrats feel this grants unequal representation to the rural Republican areas. They delight in stating that the minority Democrats in the legislature represent more people and obtained more votes than the majority Republicans.

Republicans fear that some of the most cherished of the present constitution's amendments would be altered or dropped from whatever new document the convention drafted.

Republicans would like to keep the "balanced legislature" and most leaders of both parties want to retain the basic tenets of state civil service.

Agent Tells Recipe For Quick Sauce

Home economists are always looking for ways to save today's busy homemaker a few minutes of her time. According to Mrs. Frances T. Clark, county extension agent in home economics, they have come up with a white sauce mix that makes it possible for you to have white sauce in a jiffy.

You'll find this mix on your refrigerator shelf, not on your grocer's counter, says Mrs. Clark, because you make it yourself. Here are the ingredients for two quarts of mix. They will make a gallon of white sauce.

One pound (two cups) butter or substitute; two cups sifted all-purpose flour; one and one-half tablespoons salt; one pound (four cups) nonfat dry milk.

To blend, use either pastry blender or an electric mixer.

medium speed for five minutes. The mix will be granular in texture and creamy in color. It packs well in jars or other containers. Keep it covered in the refrigerator.

To make the mix into sauce, just add the desired amount of mix to hot water in a heavy saucepan or double boiler, then heat and stir to blend, and cook until it thickens. Use one-half cup of the dry mix — packed — to one cup of hot water for about one cup of medium-thick white sauce.

RESOLUTION

At a regular meeting of the Township Board of the Township of Grant, Huron County, Michigan, held at the Grant Township Hall on Monday, June 30th, 1958. Present: Robert Osborn, Gilles Brown, Ephraim Knight, Clark Sowden and Bruce Eicker.

BE IT RESOLVED by the Township Board of the Township of Grant, Huron County, Michigan, that the Township of Grant enact an ordinance to regulate and license junk yards in the following form:

AN ORDINANCE

To regulate and license junk yards and places for the dismantling, wrecking and disposing of junk and/or refuse material of automobiles and to protect the public health interest and general welfare of the township; to provide penalties for the operation of the same without a license and for violation of any rule, regulation, or condition.

THE TOWNSHIP OF GRANT, HURON COUNTY, MICHIGAN, ORDINANCE:

Section 1. The term "junk" as used in this ordinance shall be deemed to mean any automobile or any of the component parts thereof when used for purposes other than transportation and from which salvage parts or material may be obtained for sale.

Section 2. No person, firm, or corporation, or the agents thereof, shall engage directly or indirectly in the business of junk or establish a junk yard for the storage thereof within the corporate limits of the Township of Grant, Huron County, Michigan, without first having obtained a license therefor from the Township Board.

Section 3. No junk yard or place for the storage or accumulation of junk shall be established or operated within 1000 ft. of any surfaced, macadamized, or concrete highway in said township, nor shall any junk yard or place for storage or accumulation of junk be established or maintained within 1000 ft. of any public park, cemetery, school, or church in said township.

Section 4. No such junk yard or place for the storage or accumulation of junk shall be established or operated in said township until the applicant therefor shall have enclosed and surrounded such property with a properly painted tight board fence at least 8 ft. in height, and erected in such a manner as to conceal the interior of the premises from view. All applicants licensed under this ordinance shall continually maintain said fence in good and proper painted condition.

Section 5. No such person, firm, or corporation, shall operate such junk yard unless he shall first have filed an application for a license in writing with the township clerk. Such application shall contain the name or names and addresses of interested parties or stockholders, if the operator thereof shall be a corporation. Such application shall also contain an agreement on the part of the applicant to accept the license if granted upon such terms, conditions and regulations as shall be prescribed by the township board and by this ordinance.

Section 6. In addition to the conditions herein before imposed the township board, upon the issuance of a license, may require the licensee to operate said business so as not to create a nuisance and may prescribe such other rules and regulations as will be in the best interest of public health and the general welfare of the inhabitants of the township, provided however, that such regulations shall be set forth in writing upon the license so granted.

Section 7. Every person violating any of the provisions of this act shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, punishable by imprisonment in the County Jail for not more than 90 days or by fine of not more than \$200.00, or both such fine and imprisonment.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this ordinance shall become effective upon publication in the Cass City Chronicle for three consecutive weeks and by posting in five conspicuous places in the township.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the effective date of this ordinance shall be July 29, 1958.
