








# Fertilizer Aided High Corn Yields

of Limestone, phosphate and potash raising 1957 corn yields on Dixon Springs Experiment Station plots from 8 to 75 bushels an acre.

Lowest yield of only 8 bushels an acre was on untreated land, says Lee Gard, University of Illinois Station researcher.



Tests plots show limestone, phosphate and potash contribute to corn yields,

Plots treated only with limestone have had 8 tons an acre applied over the past 20 years. The 1957 corn yield on these plots was 37 bushels an acre. This 29-bushel an acre increase for limestone alone resulted from an annual cost of only \$1.30 an acre, Gard points

Annual addition of 100 pounds of at a cost of \$2.50 increased corn yields another 13 bushels for a yield of 50 bushels an acre.

Putting on 100 pounds of 20% | Island, came Friday to spend a superphosphate at a cost of \$2 an acre increased corn yields on limed land 33 bushels for a total yield of 70 bushels an acre.

Last year's corn yield was 75 bushels an acre where limestone, phosphate and potash were added together at an annual fertility cost of \$5.80 an acre.

Most farmers will need a corn yield of at least 40 to 50 bushels an acre to "break even" under today's high costs of production. Plots in this test carried a fouryear rotation of corn, wheat and two years of alfalfa-bromegrass

### Use Chelated Metals As Plant Nutrients Scientists of the U.S. Depart-

ment of Agriculture and several States are finding out how growers can make specific use of chemically chelated metals to provide essential nutrients for fruit trees. ornamentals, and other plants.

In some soils, organic substances form natural chelates (keethat keep soil-contained metals water-soluble so that plants can absorb them. Although many soils contain adequate quantitie of nutrient metals, they often do not have sufficient natural chelates to make the metals soluble and available to plants.

Iron, combined with organic chemicals in the compounds known as chelates, is used frequently to treat chlorosis caused by iron deficiency, which results in yellowing of leaves and reduced production. This condition is common in many of the country's fruit-growing areas in which soils are deficient in iron or the iron is present in unavailable form. Commercial and expérimental chelates have also been found useful in combating other conditions in fruit trees caused by lack of essential nutrient metals.

Providing iron and other metals in the form of chelates is the newest method of supplying plants with such nutrients. Once, fruit growers drove iron nails into the trunks of trees as production dropped off and growers thought the trees needed a "tonic."

### **Build Dairy Success** Church, 10 a. m. Rev. Don On Healthy Herd

A healthy herd is essential to efficient, profitable dairy produc tion. But despite great strides made in control methods, disease organisms continue to cut production and eat up the profits in many dairy herds.

T. C. Blalock, dairy specialist for the N. C. Agricultural Extension Service, says the worst "thieves" are chronic diseases that slip in unnoticed and slowly eat away a cow's ability to produce efficiently.

The Lutheran Church of The Blalock says mastitis causes the largest losses. Acute mastitis is Good Shepherd- Rev. Edwin easily detected and readily destroyed; therefore, it receives prompt treatment. But the chronic form, caused by many different organisms, is often not recognized because few noticeable symptoms develop.

Damage to the secretory tissue occurs, however, and changes take place more or less gradually in the udder, depending upon the virulence of the infection. Eventually the cow becomes useless, but long before that milk drops in production and quality, and the cow becomes an economic liability to her owner.

It means better food for the same or less money. Do you find that a little hard to believe? Let us look at it this way: if we compare how much of our income goes for the same qualities and types of food over a period of years, then we can measure how we benefit. Starting with a set quantity and type of food, it took 23 per cent of the income to buy it in 1935. It took 19 per cent of the income to buy the same quantity and kind of food in 1941, and today it takes 17 per cent of your take-home pay to buy that same food. By this time you are probably saying "I still do not be-

The truth is, you probably are not buying the same type of food you bought in 1935 or 1941. You are now preferring your chicken completely cleaned for you; and you may even like to have it already cut up. Because you like to be efficient too, it is handy and time-saving to buy food with at least some of the work already done. Otherwise, how would you find time to do all the things that you do?

So the efficiency of other people does find its way into the shopping basket and you, as a food shopper, get full benefit of that efficiency.






