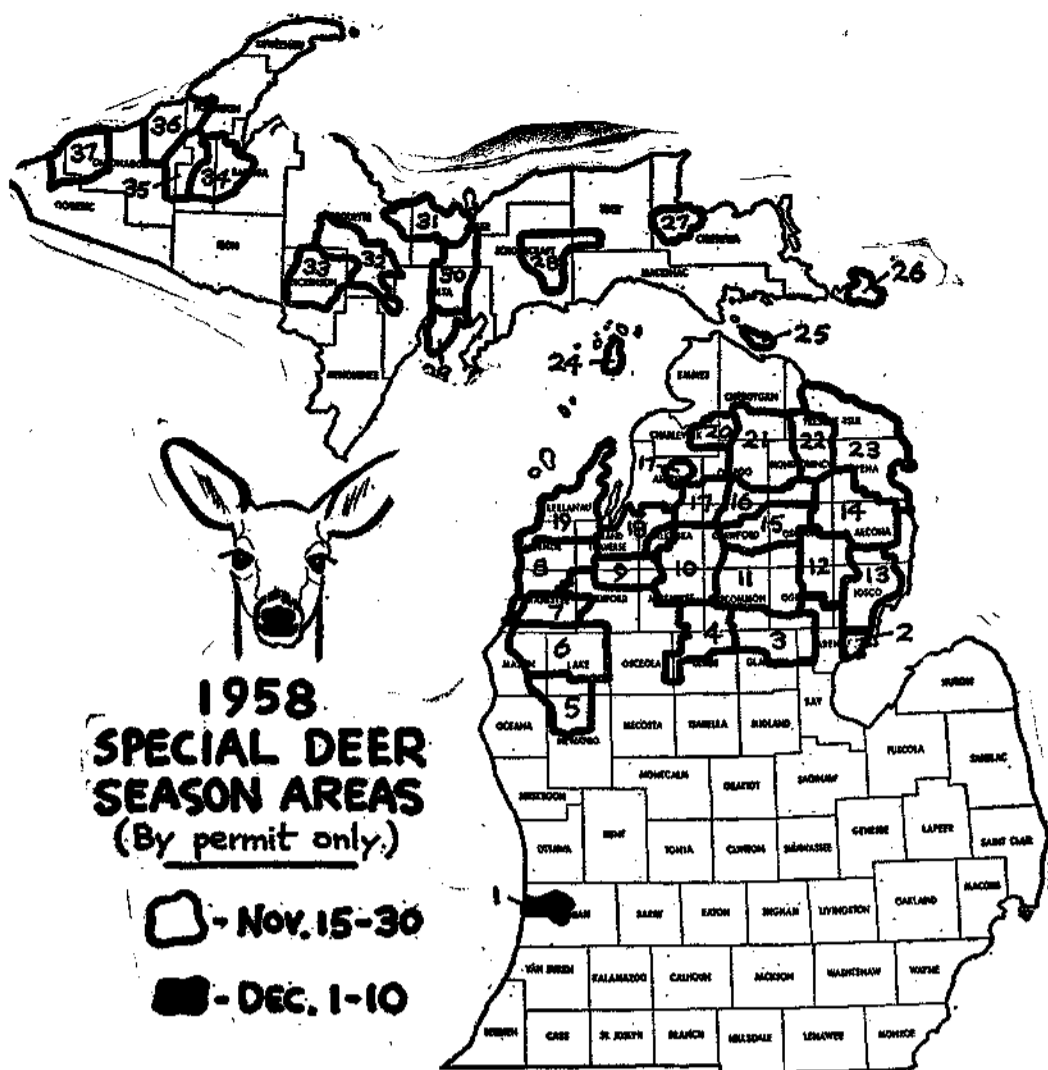

Each permit is valid for only one area.

## MICHIGAN MIRROR NEWS BRIEFS

Modern Michigan is in the throes of an almost accidental move to make the city the basic form of government.

Through numerous annexations whole townships are disappearing inside the city limit signs. For better or for worse several metropolitan areas are growing rapidly.

Flint is fighting in the courts to adopt two nearby towns and parts of eight townships; Battle Creek has elaborate annexation plans; Holland is making news with similar ideas.

The Citizens Research Council of Michigan has urged that the four fashionable Grosse Pointes—Grosse Pointe Farms, Grosse Pointe Woods, Grosse Pointe and Grosse Pointe Park—near Detroit be merged to provide single services at least cost than now.

Supporting and opposition forces have their own valid arguments.

Taxes, of course, are the major issue from the standpoint of every citizen's pocketbook. Annexing to a city area can be quite a tax jolt to either of the

groups, but usually the annexed area feels the increase as new or improved services become available.

Local government is centralized by annexation as it wipes out the older basic form of township government. Resentment goes deep in smaller government offices. "But it's silly to have three fire departments when one will do," said Tilden Mason, of the research council.

In preference to annexation, a number of smaller towns and townships are working to consolidate into a new and separate metropolitan or city unit.

Another phase of the problem, most prominent in school districts, is the indebtedness of the annexed and the annexing units.

Cities are generally unwilling to take on the bonded debts of a smaller annexed area. Smaller units are not eager to join bigger areas where the public debt is large and thus help pay it off.

A centralized government in the hands of a responsible executive has been a goal of reformers on the state level for years.

The research council's reports and recommendations to the legislature all have pointed the way. Reformers won a major victory last year when the sharply-divided legislature finally approved a bill to give the governor power to reorganize the administration.

Political parties are trying to give the Teamsters Union to each other.

The donation battle started when Teamster Boss James E. Hoffa fell from Democratic grace in 1952. Democrats have since complained that Hoffa wanted to

take over their party.

For years, until the 1952 split, the teamsters supported Democrats. Reports show that Hoffa's support still was present for Democrats that year.

Democrats said that Hoffa supported former Republican U. S. Senator Homer Ferguson during his last unsuccessful campaign and lent help to others in the party.

Republicans retorted this year that Wayne County Prosecutor Samuel Olsen and others accepted money for their campaigns from the union. Olsen received \$11,000.

A Senate committee in Washington released the list, showing others in the past few years have partaken of teamster bounty to campaign for election.

Governor Williams, in support of a resolution at the party convention in Grand Rapids, ordered Democratic candidates to shun teamster help this year.

Republicans followed the next week with a similar resolution. They also condemned Hoffa's help along with aid from UAW President Walter P. Reuther and other union leaders.

Williams said in his campaign that the Republican attempt to give Hoffa back to the Democrats has been unsuccessful.

Republicans claim Hoffa never left the Democratic camp. They also point out that the only teamsters elected to the House of Representatives have been Democrats.

Perhaps no one will ever know even unto election eve just who Hoffa is supporting, if anybody.

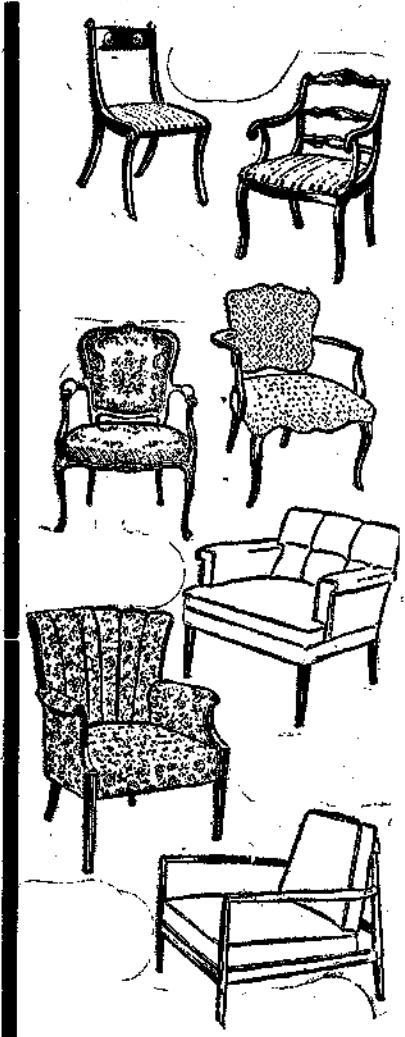

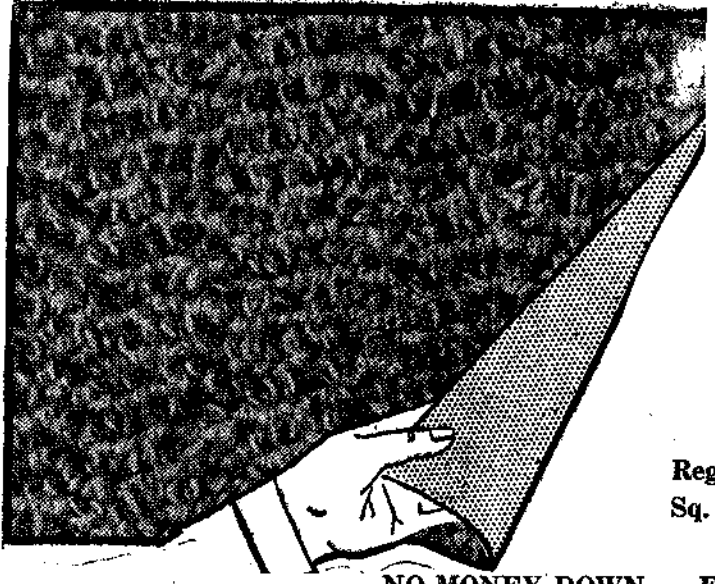

### Home Extension Agent's Corner

Over two hundred women braved a rainy night to come to the home demonstration extension women's open house at Mayville High School. The guest speaker, Mrs. Robert Stratton, spoke on the rural women of Japan. Mrs. Stratton spent a year as a teacher to the Army service personnel's children, and was located in a rural area of Japan. The talk was very well received. The Mayville group sponsored a coffee period following the meeting.

The secretaries, treasurers and the council members have held their officers' training school. The chairmen and vice-chairmen will have their training school on Tuesday, September 23, in the Courthouse at 2 p.m.

The first project leaders' lesson will be held on September 25 and 26 — Section I will come in on the 25th and Section II will have their lesson on the 26th. Both of these meetings will be held in the office of the Detroit Edison Company at Caro from 12 noon to 4 p.m. This lesson is entitled, "Entertaining Graciously."

As I have contacted different groups of people, I wonder how many realize that they have some misconception about food. I would like to list some facts or fancies that have come to my notice — so each of you check on your own food facts. Food sense, not nonsense, is vital. Misinformation is often passed from one generation to another, from one neighbor to another. This encourages poor eating habits and deprives the believers of adequate nutrition. Following are some fancies, and the facts.

Fancy: Canned vegetables have less nutritive value than fresh, cooked vegetables. Fact: The nutritive values of canned and the freshly cooked product are dependent upon the nutritive value of the original food and the method by which it has been prepared.

Fancy: It is dangerous to leave food in a can that has been opened. Fact: The United States Department of Agriculture says research shows it is safe to keep the food in the original can after it has been opened. It is important to cover the can and to keep the food refrigerated. A few acid foods may dissolve a little iron from the can, but this is not harmful or dangerous to health. Another container, such as a dish on your cupboard shelf, might even have bacteria on it, which could cause food to spoil. Cans and foods are sterilized in the canning process.

Fancy: Cakes made from standard recipes cost less than those made from mixes. Fact: "Home-made" and mix cakes usually cost about the same. In some cases, mixes are even less expensive. When comparing costs, compare not only the total cost of the ingredients, but the cost of baking plus your precious time, too.

Fancy: Shoppers have little influence in the markets. Fact: You control the markets by the purchases you make. Each dollar spent in the grocery store is a "vote" cast for food purchased. Buying you do today is shaping the pattern for what you will get tomorrow. Buying intelligently not only gives you better food for your money but it promises you more of what you want in the future.

Fancy: Only high quality vege-

tables and fruits are a good buy. Fact: Generally speaking, the waste in preparation of wilted, decayed, immature or over-ripe products is less than the best quality fruits and vegetables. So the best quality is less expensive in the long run, though not in the original price. However, lower quality produce can be a good buy for some uses. For example, scarred or poorly shaped apples can be used in sauce and pies to an advantage.

Fancy: Comparing various products to judge their value is not worth the time and effort. Fact: Saving a few cents on an item may seem unimportant at the time, but small savings on single items become big savings on your total grocery bill week after week. Substituting similar foods which are lower in price is an intelligent approach to lower food costs and wise shopping.

Fancy: Dairy products are expensive. Fact: Dairy products give a higher percentage return in necessary food values than they cost in percentage of food money. When you spend 15 per cent of your food budget for dairy products, you actually buy 80 per cent of your family's nutrition needs.

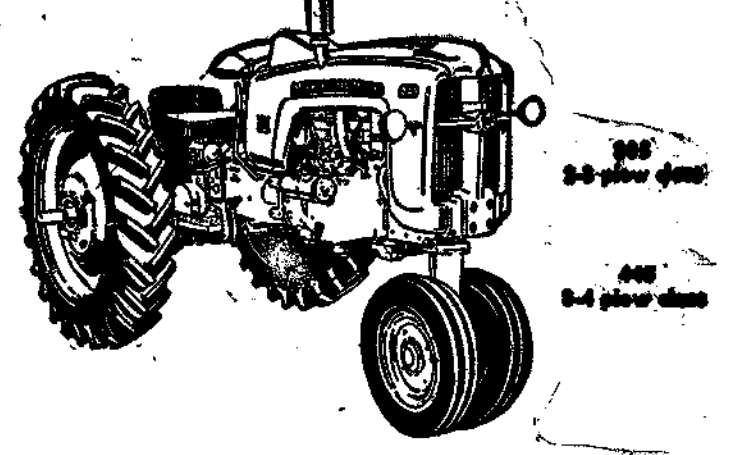

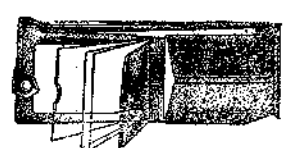

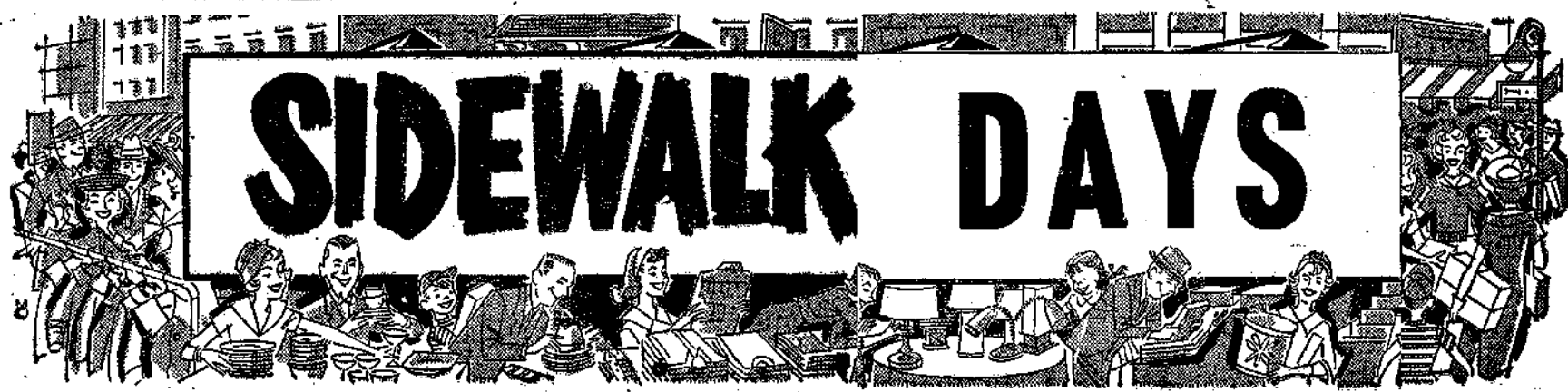
