Irl Baguley, director of Tuscola County Social Welfare Department, asked the Tuscola County Board of Supervisors for \$10,000 to finance the remainder of the year in the welfare department.

Mr. Baguley told supervisors that the increased cost of running the department reflected the recent unemployment in Michigan and said that in January, February and March costs about doubled. "Most of these people work in Genesee and Saginaw counties" he said, "and live in Tuscola County and are our responsibility."

The \$10,000 will bring the total welfare costs of the year to \$122,000.

Mr. Baguley estimates that the cost will be greater next year. He has asked the supervisors for \$182,000 for 1959. Because of the opening of the new County Nursing Home, the figure is an estimate. "You can be sure," Baguley said, "if there is any money left we will not needlessly spend it."

Members of the Social Welfare Board were present at the meeting. Mrs. Gladys Witse, chairman, told supervisors that the department would be ready to move into the new nursing home sometime next month. There will be an open house at a date to be selected.

Members of the board and supervisors discussed accepting sealed bids for farm buildings and land that was formerly used by the welfare department. It is probable that bids will be taken between now and Jan. 1.

**Children's Aid Society**

A report of the Children's Aid Society for the year showed that cases in the county cost \$1,891.76. The department received \$171.74 in fees and net cost of the program was \$1,220.02.

**Bank Deposits**

The committee on finances is investigating funds placed on deposit. The funds have been previously placed with two Caro banks. The county funds do not draw interest.

**Tourist Council**

Chairman Shuford Kirk appointed Harold Cook as a member of the advisory council of the East Michigan Tourist Association. He authorized Supervisors Draper, Golding and Reavey to attend the Association meeting at Bay City today.

**Other Business**

The Tuscola County beekeepers were granted \$400, a standard allotment in recent years.

When the Social Welfare Department rooms are moved to the new nursing home, the space will be used by county officers.

Supervisors accepted the offer of the village of Caro to place seats on court house grounds. The placing of the seats will be under the direction of the buildings and grounds committee.

Court house Custodian Sherman Ogden was granted a two-week vacation during deer season and \$50 authorized to hire extra help to replace him.

## \$6,500 for Chest Drive Volunteers Strive To Reach Goal

Some 97 volunteer solicitors are now at work collecting pledges and money in the Elkland-Novesta Community Chest Drive. The workers will be trying to top a quota of \$6,500 to meet the requirements of the agencies served.

The budget figure is up \$1,500 from the 1957-58 quota of \$5,000. The increased quota takes into account the addition of Novesta Township to the area, covered for the first time this year with the Elkland Chest.

The drive was launched with a kickoff dinner Thursday night when captains and solicitors received instructions and pledge cards. An estimated 70 persons attended.

The volunteer workers have until Nov. 3 to complete collections when the drive officially closes.

**O'Hara Visits in Cass City Friday**


James G. O'Hara, Democratic candidate for congress, was a visitor in Cass City Friday as he conducted a tour of the Thumb area last week.

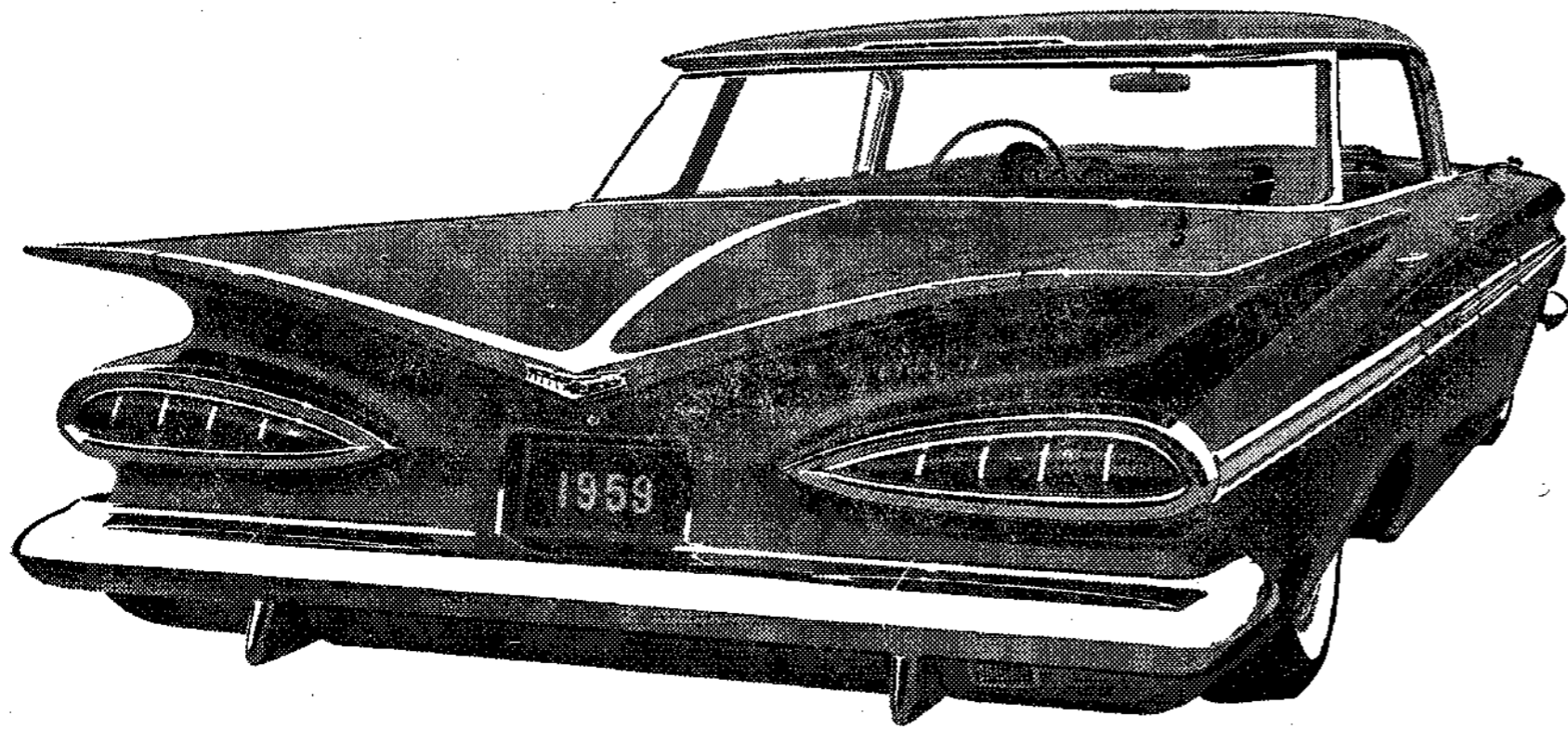

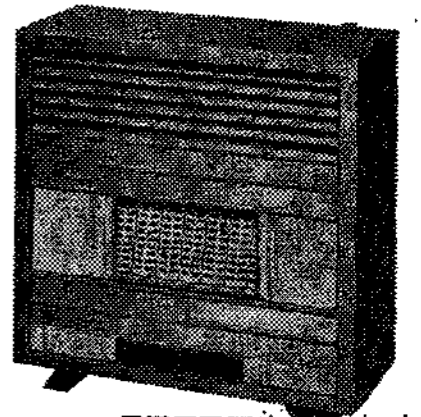

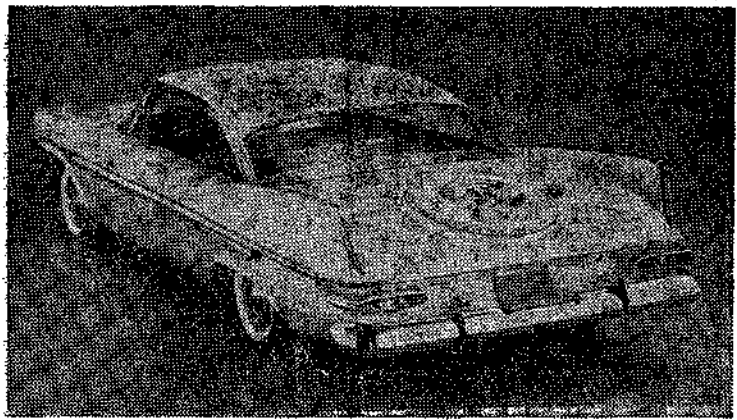

Explain Vote for Corn Referendum

Any resident of Tuscola County who produced corn in 1958 or was entitled to share in the 1958 corn crop will be eligible to vote in the corn referendum November 25, Mr. Charles B. Eckfeld, County Office Manager of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office, announced today.

An owner-operator, cash tenant, standing rent or fixed-rent tenant, a share tenant or sharecropper or the landlord of a share tenant will be eligible to vote. The landlord of a standing rent, cash rent or fixed-rent tenant will not be eligible.

In addition, Mr. Eckfeld said, there are three other groups of eligible voters:

(1) Any operator or landlord of a farm for which a 1958 corn allotment was established even though corn was not planted;

(2) Any person who planted corn in 1958 but did not harvest it, and

(3) Anyone who placed corn allotment land in the Soil Bank in 1958.

The purpose of the November referendum will be to determine

whether the present corn program should be changed for 1959 and later years to a new program in which there would be no acreage allotments on corn and price supports would be determined on a different basis.

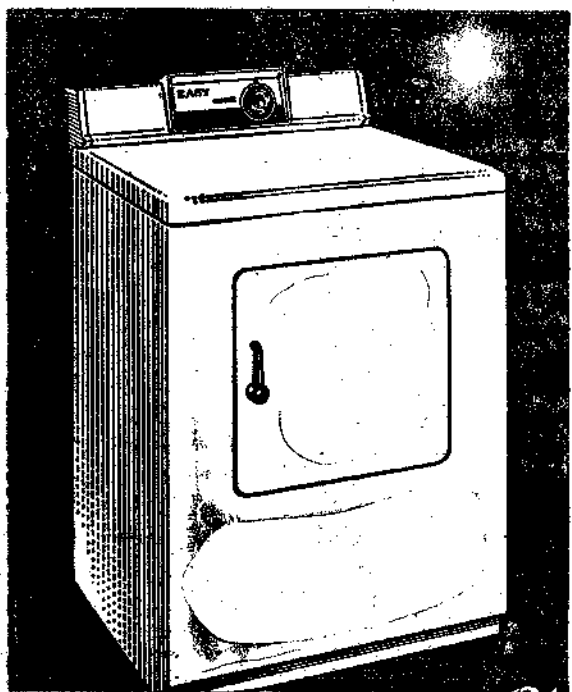

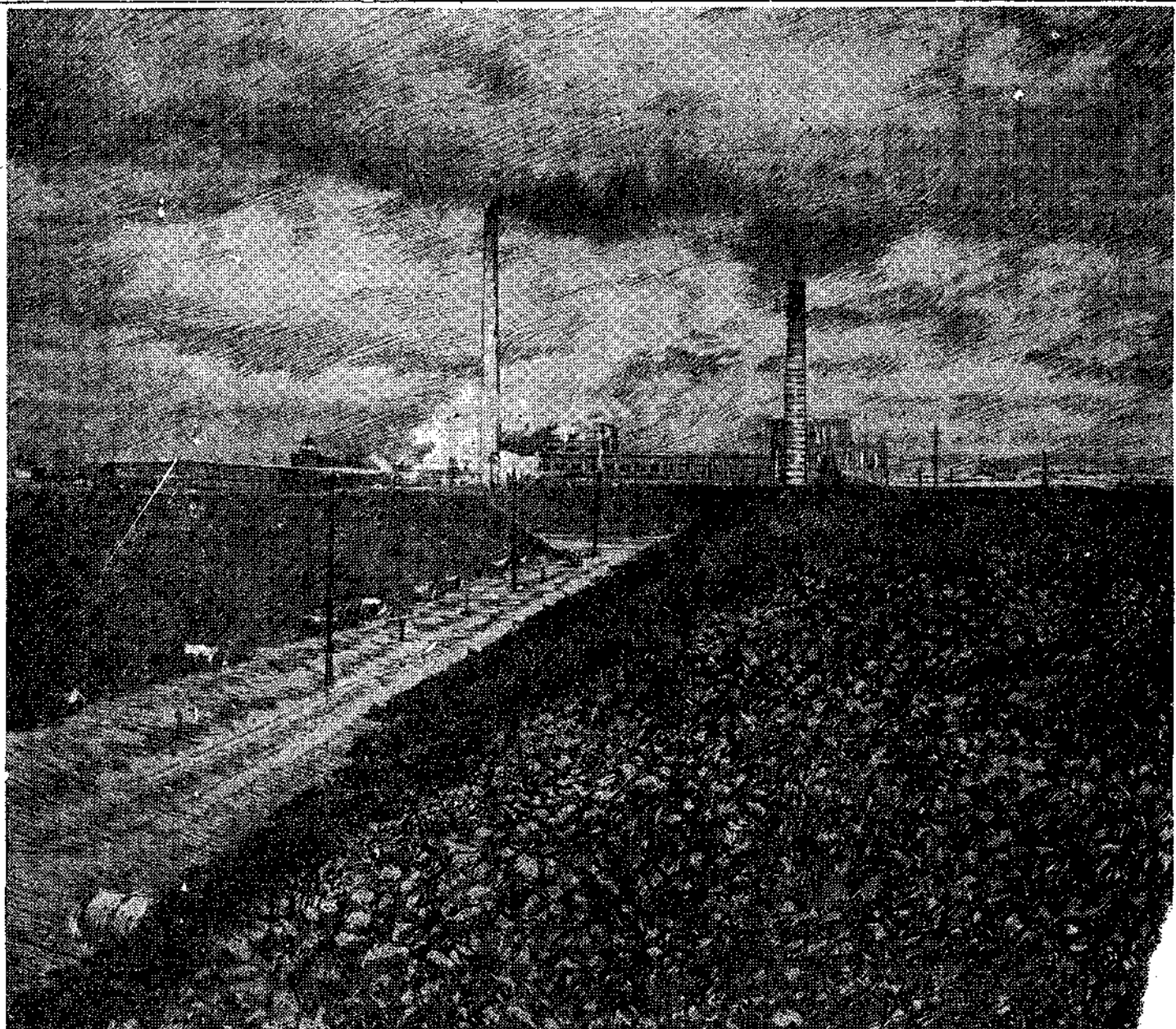

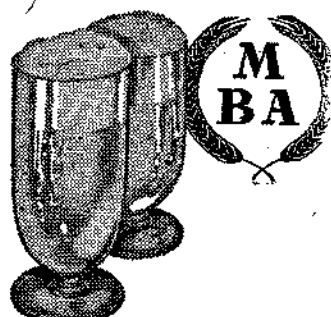

### MICHIGAN MIRROR NEWS BRIEFS

Money can buy Michigan's most compelling needs. The problem is where to get the money.

Leaders in every field of government repeat before legislative committees that more cash will make the difference between inadequate and satisfactory services.

In an election year, political parties are blaming each other. Democrats insist on more spending for needed services. Republicans refuse to spend money the state doesn't have.

The best explanation from an administrator caught in the middle came from Charles F. Wagg, state mental health director, who said that, despite emergencies, lawmakers did not give him an extra dime.

"There just isn't an extra dime," he said.

Legislators, who have been studying the state's revenue structure for two years, plan major proposals for new and revised taxes for the 1959 session.

They believe a personal income tax could be passed, one which economists call "the fairest possible." This is a hot subject and at this time lawmakers carefully quote others without committing themselves.

Republicans and Democrats agree some changes must be made.

Perhaps a boost on the \$1.25 per barrel tax on beer. The intangibles tax increase is expected to start another fight.

With current revenue falling \$10,000,000 behind estimates for the year; with the economic situation adding to welfare rolls; with the growing population demanding services, new taxes are almost a certainty.

"We can't go on spending money we don't have forever," said one legislator.

Symptoms of the money crises are visible on every side.

Part of the story came from Controller James W. Miller, who said that 274 building projects -- those costing \$20,000 or more -- are still on the planning boards.

These will cost about \$286,000,000. Money has been provided for only 195 of the projects and payments must be kept up to finance them, estimated to cost \$101,000,000.

Miller said the projects have been delayed so long that they will have to be re-planned just to recognize technological advances in building construction techniques.

Probate judges are demanding quick action to house and care for 1,500 mentally ill children on waiting lists for state mental hospitals.

Public health officials are fighting for more money to keep their services at the present level for a larger number of people.

Corrections officials are viewing overcrowded prisons with alarm. A major building project at Ionia is half-completed.

Scores of schools in Michigan are borrowing against anticipated school aid to keep operating this year. The debt will be taken out of payments to be made early next year and later.

What will happen at that point is anybody's guess.

The legislature guaranteed \$190 per pupil as the school aid formula last winter. They feared -- and their fears came true -- that there would not be enough money to pay the shot.

Dr. Lynn M. Bartlett, state superintendent of public instruction, blames the legislature for "callous irresponsibility" for not giving the schools more.

Other scores of schools are borrowing huge sums to build new classrooms. Future generations will still be paying the bills on bond issues when their grandchildren are in school.

Legislators, trying to make ends meet, have declared moratoriums on new building for the past two years.

But this is 1958, another election year.

Candidates will take to the trail before Nov. 4 blaming each other for the problem.

When it is all over and the legislature convenes in January and politicians are in office for their two-year terms, the short, terse phrase will come back to haunt them:

"There just isn't an extra dime."

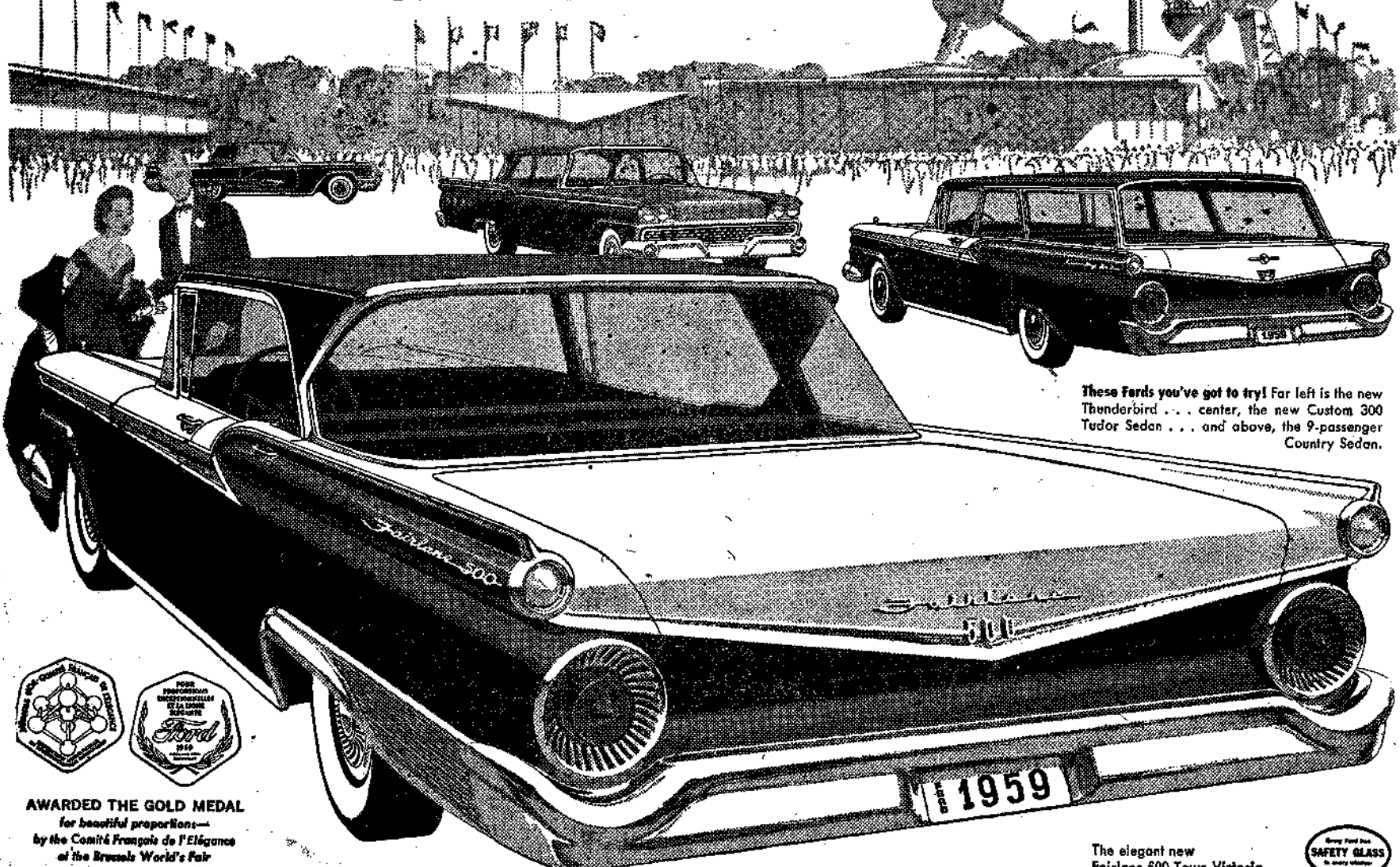

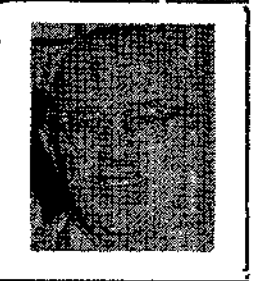

### New Material For Insect Pest Control

**Bayer 21/199 Added to Approved Pesticides**  
The U. S. Department of Agriculture has recommended the use of Bayer 21/199, commercially available as Co-Ral, for control of certain livestock pests. This material has been accepted for registration under pesticide regulation laws. It may be used with proper precautions on beef cattle for the control of cattle grubs, horn flies, lice, ticks, keds, and screwworms, and on swine for the control of lice and screwworms. The USDA recommendation adds Bayer 21/199 to several materials recommended for control of these pests. Bayer 21/199 should not be applied to sick animals or calves less than 3 months of age. Sixty days must intervene between the last application and slaughter. It is not recommended for use on dairy cattle or milk goats, since it is known to secrete in the milk for a week to 10 days following treatments. As with other insecticides, no tolerance has been established in milk. When applied externally as a single spray treatment, Bayer 21/199 is absorbed and acts systematically to kill 75 to 100 percent of young cattle grubs in the animal's tissues. It is a potent contact insecticide against ticks and horn flies and provides protection for two to three weeks. Usually a single application will provide a high degree of control of sheep, goat, and cattle lice as well as sheep keds.

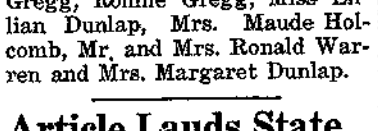

### Package Grain, Silage Predicted in Future

The small-scale livestock or swine producer will soon be able to purchase bags of top quality high moisture grain and silage through commercial channels in quantities commensurate with his needs. This is the prediction of Dr. M. E. Muhrer and Richard Bloomfield, agricultural chemists at the University of Missouri, who found that high moisture grain and silage can be stored and preserved successfully in bags made of polyethylene plastic tubing. Previous attempts elsewhere to successfully package and preserve high moisture grain and silage in conventional type bags had failed because stated Muhrer and Bloomfield, complete spoilage occurred when air entered the package. When the two Missourians began their research, polyethylene tubing was used because it met the conditions for a good silage making container: one that allows gas to escape but doesn't allow air to enter. The preliminary results reported by the agricultural chemists indicate that silage made and preserved in bags of odorless polyethylene is highly palatable to all types of farm animals that ordinarily consume silage.

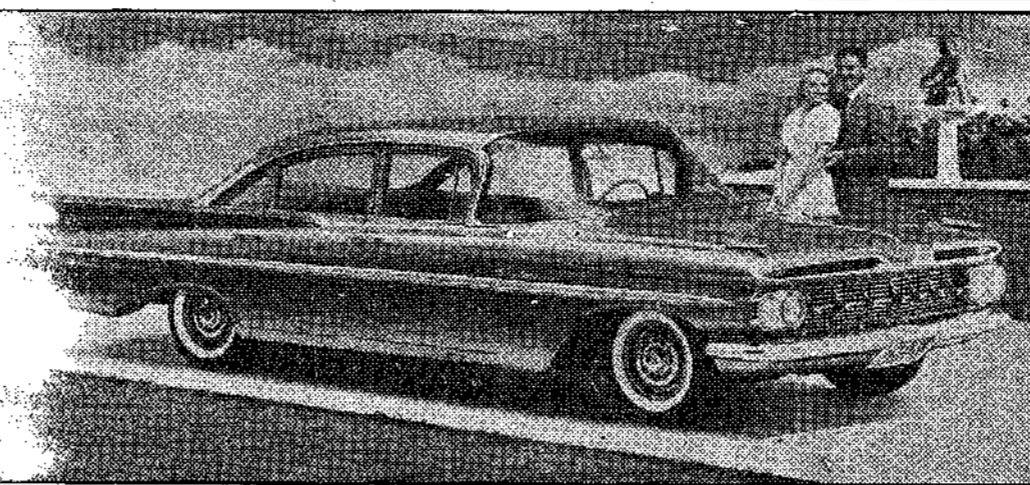

## Spray Now to Kill Fall Weeds

Tuscola County farmers who have a problem with quack grass, yellow rocket, field pepper grass, bull thistles, dandelions, etc.,

should give serious thought to a fall spray program, reports Alfred Ballweg, county extension director. Control quack grass with dalapon this fall and avoid temporary chemical residue next spring. Apply about 10 pounds of Dalapon per acre during the last

half of October or before the quack grass stops growing. Plowing one to two weeks after spraying helps improve the kill. Do not plant anything on the field this fall. Spring spraying is all right for some crops. However, never spray in the spring if corn or beans are to follow immediately. Residue will damage the crop and set it back.

Yellow rocket can be controlled in new and established red clover fields and established alfalfa fields with a spray of MCP amine the last part of October or first part of November. Use one-half pound per acre of the MCP amine. Do not use this material on new seedings of alfalfa. It will damage the plants.

Field pepper grass and mustard can be controlled this fall with a spray of MCP amine at one-half pound per acre. This same treatment will also control yellow rocket.

On non-crop land and along fence rows where wild carrot is a problem, spray with 1 pound of 2, 4-D per acre for control. Clean up permanent bluegrass pastures of bull thistle, dandelions and other weeds with a fall spray of 2, 4-D at 1 pound per acre. If only a limited area is sprayed, do not pasture for a few days. If the pasture area is big, no delay is necessary when sprayed at the recommended rate, said Ballweg.

Self-sufficiency has never been known to secure efficiency.

**Complete Plans for Fall Crops Show**

At a recent meeting of the 4-H Crops Committee plans were made for the annual fall crops show Nov. 4.

The show will be sponsored by the Farmers Co-op Elevators of Caro and Akron. Winners of beans, wheat, oats, barley, ear corn and shelled corn samples will be presented with trophy cups.

Two youngsters will be awarded an expense paid trip to Chicago early in December in recognition for their achievement in 4-H Crops work.

The show is held annually in conjunction with the 4-H Fall Achievement program where some 1,100 boys and girls will receive pins and certificates indicating that they have successfully completed another year of club work. In addition to the pin and certificate awards, county medals for outstanding accomplishments in project work and activities will be presented to 50 club members and 4 members will receive the 4-H Key Club Award for overall achievement in 4-H Club work.

Club members exhibiting crops at the fall show are to have their samples in the Caro Elementary School auditorium, located on east Frank Street by noon of the 4th. Judging will take place shortly thereafter.

**Deaths Down Again On State's Highways**

September was the ninth consecutive month this year to show a reduction in traffic deaths under the same month of last year, according to provisional figures reported by the State Police.

There were 117 fatalities, a reduction of five or four per cent under 122 in September of 1957. It was the fifteenth consecutive month in which reductions were reported.

Delayed reports of deaths, however, may add to the number for September, but it will still be an excellent record in comparison with the monthly average of 173 fatalities in September during the five-year period from 1952 to 1956. The latter year was the turning point in the improvement record.

For the first nine months of the year the total now stands at 941 deaths as compared to 1,104 in the same period last year. This is a saving of 163 lives, or 14.8 per cent.

It is the lowest recorded since 1945, when 729 died during the same period. This was a war year when gas rationing reduced travel.
