Name Hofmeister Elmwood Twp. Supervisor

Milton Hofmeister, Elmwood Township farmer, was appointed Elmwood Township supervisor to replace Grover Laurie, who has resigned to accept a position on the county highway commission. The action was taken Friday at a meeting of the Elmwood board.

Mr. Hofmeister will assume his new duties Jan. 1, the effective date of Mr. Laurie's resignation.

Mr. Hofmeister came to Gagetown in October, 1948, from Bay City. He works 160 acres, 80 of which he owns. Born in Sebawaing April 28, 1915, he married the former Leona Vera Pearce Feb. 25, 1939. The Hofmeisters have four children, all at home.

Mr. Hofmeister has been a director of the Elmwood-Elkland Farm Bureau and served as chairman of the Parent-Teacher Club of Gagetown.

When Mr. Laurie takes over as a member of the road commission he will have completed 12 years as supervisor of Elmwood Township. During his service to the township and county he served as chairman of the County Board of Supervisors in 1953-54.

Cass City area residents were involved in four automobile accidents this week. Two persons were injured in the crashes and cars damaged in the collisions.

Stanley Anker of Cass City suffered a fracture of the left shoulder and laceration over the left eye when he lost control of his car Sunday morning at 7:15 o'clock. He was treated at Caro Community Hospital.

Mr. Anker told officials of the Tuscola County Sheriff's Department, who investigated, that he went to sleep while driving on M-81, about four miles north-east of Caro.

The car went out of control on a curve in the road. Mr. Anker travelled for some 170 paces off the roadway and crashed into a stone and tree by the roadside.

The Anker car was badly damaged.

Fredericks Accident

Mrs. Aurey Fredericks escaped serious injury as her car was completely demolished in an accident at 8:45 a. m. Thursday, Dec. 4, on Cemetery Road, four miles south of Cass City.

Mrs. Fredericks was on her way to work when she lost control of her car after passing a schoolbus and rolled over three times, ending in a roadside ditch.

Mrs. Fredericks was treated for multiple bruises and shock at Pleasant Home Hospital.

The accident was investigated by Marshall Bill Wood and Bad Axe State Police. Mrs. Fredericks was ticketed for excessive speed for conditions.

Friday Accident

Two cars were damaged but the drivers escaped injury in an accident on Main Street in Cass City Friday morning.

Cars driven by Fred Pinney of Cass City and Arthur Morell of Ubyly collided nearly head-on. Marshall Wood said that Mr. Pinney had entered Main Street from Maple Street and Mr. Morell was traveling 35 to 40 miles per hour on Main Street at the time of the accident.

Mr. Morell reported that he attempted to brake his car and his foot struck the gas pedal at the same time and he was unable to avoid hitting Mr. Pinney.

Car Hits Trees

Willard Burdon in Fatal Auto Accident

Willard A. Burdon, 41, of Gagetown was instantly killed at about 12:10 a. m. Saturday when he lost control of his car on the Owendale Road, just south of the Huron County line, and crashed into a tree.

Bad Axe State Police Troopers Joel Gorzen and James Tageson said that the car evidently left the roadway at high speed, struck a tree, broke it off and then rolled against another tree some 15 feet away.

The car was jammed so closely to the second tree that rescuers experienced difficulty removing Mr. Burdon from the car.

The wrecked car was discovered by Charles Mayer, superintendent of Owendale-Gagetown Community Schools.

Death was caused by a skull fracture and a crushed chest. The car was completely demolished in the wreck.

Mr. Burdon was born Oct. 10, 1917, on a farm in Brookfield Township near Gagetown, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Burdon. He married the former Joyce Ricker Sept. 9, 1939, in Gagetown.

Mr. Burdon was a prominent dairy farmer with one of the leading dairy herds in the Thumb area.

Surviving, besides his widow, are: two daughters, Betty and Lynn, and two sons, Paul and Ronald, all at home; a brother, Richard, of Gagetown, and a sister, Mrs. Don De Noyelles of Caro.

Rosary devotions were held at the Hunter Funeral Home Monday evening and final rites held Tuesday morning at St. Agatha Church in Gagetown. Rev. Glenn William Cronkite officiated.

Burial was in the St. Agatha Church Cemetery.

Sentence Cox For Fraud in Bogus Marriage

Elwin Ellis Cox, 21, of Cass City was given a suspended two-year prison term Monday and placed on probation for four years in U. S. District Court in Bay City for cheating the government in a marriage fraud.

When a Seabee, Cox claimed marriage to a man, John Goodshot, 21, who posed as a woman, to secure dependency checks.

Judge Frank A. Picard ordered Cox to restore to the government \$548 in dependency checks. Goodshot, who pleaded guilty to the fraud, was given two years' probation in Denver Nov. 21 and ordered to take psychiatric treatment.

Judge Picard asked Cox Monday if he had broken the "marriage" off. When Cox said that he had, the judge said that it might call for a divorce and that Cox should see a lawyer.

Million Dollar Beet Payment Slated Monday

Gilbert Smith, manager of the Caro plant of the Michigan Sugar Company, announced this week that the first 1958 sugar beet payment will be distributed Monday.

The payment will be \$9.25 per ton, Mr. Smith said, for 173,347 tons harvested and will amount to \$1,037,977. A government payment of \$2.32 per ton is scheduled in January and another payment will be made in April. Final payment for 1958 beets will be in October.

Although the exact total payment will not be known until sugar is sold, the payment will at least equal the total 1957 payment of \$13.31 farmers received for beets.

Helped by a favorable growing season, farmers broke all existing yield records. The average at the Caro plant was 16.58 tons per acre, as compared to the top previous season in 1954 when a 15-ton average was posted.

Mr. Smith said that about half of the 1958 sugar crop has been processed.

The Cass City Red Hawks proved that they will be the team to beat in the Thumb B Conference as they rolled over Frankenmuth Friday night, 55-24, in a loosely played game at Cass City High School.

It was apparent that it was the opening game for both clubs as neither team was able to find the basket and the game was marked by erratic shooting.

The Eagles were able to convert only six of 52 shots from the field for a feeble .115 percentage. The Hawks were better with a .287 average on 23 out of 80 attempts . . . but neither percentage will win the average game.

Cass City displayed its tight aggressive defense that characterized last year's champions and demonstrated that they will be tough to score against again this year.

Coach Irv Classman started an all-senior team against Frankenmuth. Bob Holcomb and Fred Leeson were the forwards, Bob Tuckey was at center and Forrest Walpole and Newell Harris at the guard slots.

Tuckey dominated the rebounding on both boards for Cass City with an assist from Holcomb who showed marked improvement in that department in the season's opener.

With just four minutes left in the first quarter it looked as if neither team was going to do much scoring. Cass City had just one field goal and the Eagles three free shots.

But in the final four minutes Cass City came to life and hit for 13 more points as Leeson canned a pair from close in and Harris added a pair of set shots from outside the foul circle.

Cass City will not play again until Tuesday, Dec. 16, when they are slated at Mt. Pleasant in what always is one of the toughest games of the year.

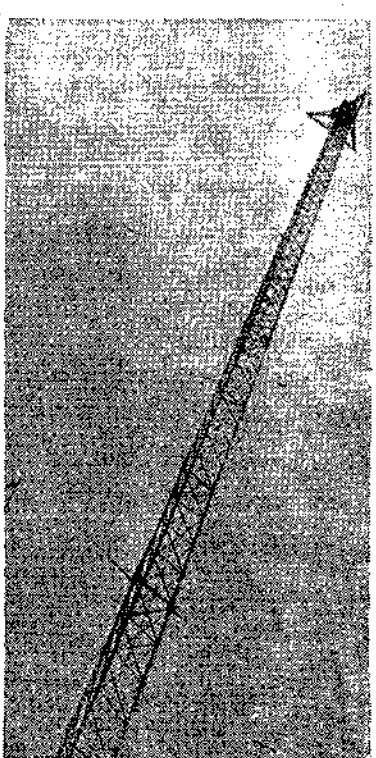
From the Editor's Corner

With thanks to many of our readers and to Rudy Petzold of the Tuscola County Advertiser in Caro, we have learned just what the tower at Ellington is for.

A clipping and picture from the Advertiser indicates that the 300-foot tower is a Bell Telephone Microwave tower, part of an x-way to make a special path for voices and other communications.

There are four of the towers in the Thumb area. Besides the one at Ellington, there is one south of Bad Axe; another near Vassar and Birch roads intersection, and a fourth at Port Austin radar station.

The current system utilizes one of the new types of radio equipment designed by Bell Telephone and engineered to handle some 100 message circuits. These include normal voice message circuits as well as teletype, tele-



graph and other types of communication media.

A description of the tower as carried by the Advertiser reads: "The angle-iron frame tower reaches 300 feet into the air. Six concrete blocks of cement, buried about four feet, anchor the 12 half-inch steel cables which hold the huge structure erect."

"The entire tower with its two reflecting screens rests on a pad of cement about six feet square and is held in balance by six guy wires from the top, another three about 100 feet from the top and three more about 100 feet off the ground."

"It has red lights for aircraft warnings at night. Huge screens about 15 by 15 feet are at the top. The screens have a metal plate covering the entire surface with a pipe framework holding it in place."

It must be frustrating for reporters of the Saginaw News and Bay City Times to have to go through all the motions of preparing a newspaper for nothing.

At the pageant preview we noticed that representatives of both papers, who are out on strike, did a complete job even though the chances are that their work will never get into print.

They took scans of pictures and complete notes of the entire proceedings. Unless the strike is ended within the next two days all of this work will, of course, be wasted.

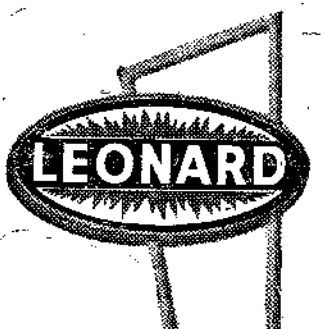

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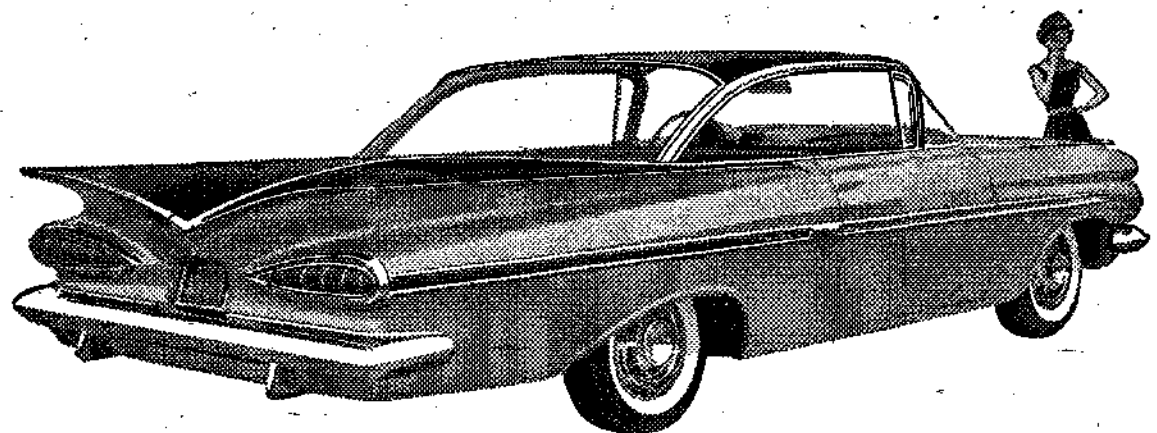


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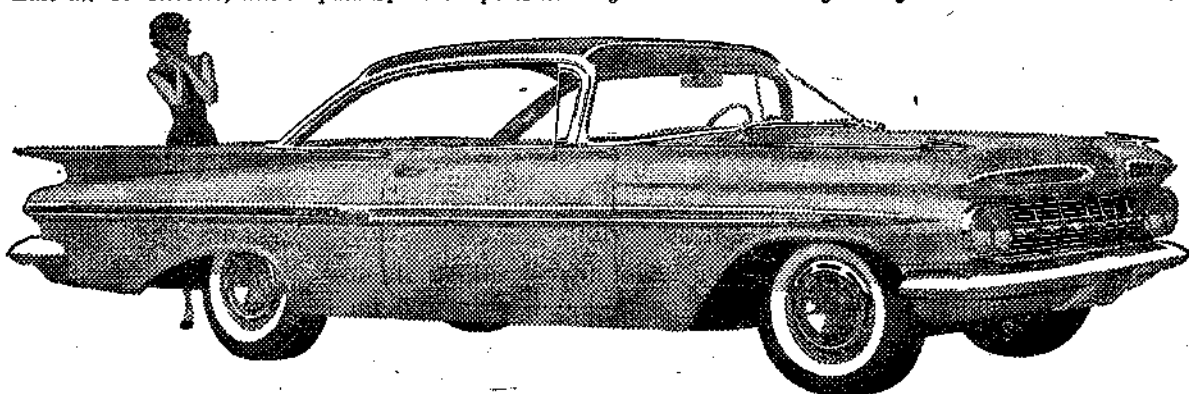

Home Extension Agent's Corner

Frances T. Clark
County Home Demonstration Agent

On December 5 (Friday) at 8 p.m. there was a preliminary re-holstering meeting at the home of Mrs. Joe Young, Reese.

The Gagetown area held a re-holstering workshop on December 8, 9 and 10 at the home of Mrs. William Ashmore. This workshop was open to any interested person.

The winter council meeting will be held December 11 (Thursday) at 2 p.m. in the Courthouse. The guest speaker will be Mr. Don Kehler, extension agent in agriculture.

The Wells extension group is packing Christmas boxes for the local shut-ins and older folks in their community.

It is much too early to say "Merry Christmas" but it is not too soon to be thinking what you need for holiday food preparations. On your shopping list, you are likely to have nut-meats or nuts-in-the-shell.

Nuts are making news as a plentiful food this year. The supply of English walnuts is extra heavy this year. The pecan crop, like the walnut crop, is both bigger than last year and bigger than the average for the ten-year period, 1947-1956. Filberts also will be in abundance. The news for almonds is different. This year's crop is far below last year, and the ten-year average.

These four nuts, English walnuts, pecans, filberts and almonds, rate high with Americans. Knowing their expected supply and price can help you choose among them for holiday cooking.

Since English walnuts, pecans and filberts are abundant, you may wish to use them generously. Put them in the nut bowl for the traditional end to holiday meals. Or, add them to salads, breads, rolls, sandwich fillings, poultry stuffings, puddings and ice cream. Shelled nuts keep well in an air-tight container in a cool dark place. Nuts in shell keep better than shelled ones. Salted nuts do not keep as well as unsalted nuts.

Shelled nuts keep well in the home freezer if packed in a tight container. Small usable amounts to a package are helpful. Brazil nutmeats are more easily removed whole if the nuts are completely frozen first.

Agent Tells How to Choose Cookbook

A cookbook is a very welcome gift for a woman who is new at the responsibility of preparing three daily meals for a family. But... how to choose a good one... that is the question. Mrs. Frances T. Clark, county extension agent in home economics, makes some helpful suggestions in answer to the question.

A basic cookbook should include a description of the measuring techniques necessary to get the best results when using recipes in that book. Look for a listing of equivalent measures... for measuring techniques as well as for substitutions that might have to be made in ingredients. For example... how to substitute cornstarch for flour as a thickening agent... or, how to use all-purpose flour in place of cake flour and still get good results.

Look to see if you can read the recipes easily. Is the print of reasonable size? Are the illustrations clear and easily understood? Illustrations in a cookbook are sometimes the best help in showing the finished food product as well as the procedures to get the best results. Ask yourself... do the pictures or sketches show "how-to-do-it"?

A big help... in a cookbook for a beginner... are suggestions for menu planning, especially

guides for planning well-balanced meals. Suggestions for menus for various occasions are helpful if included in the cookbook... for example, menus for bridge luncheons, lunch-box meals, picnics, buffet meals, holiday meals, weddings, anniversaries and other special occasions.

Here are some things to look for in the book itself; a section in the beginning telling how to use the book effectively; an index which is extensive so that you don't have to "rack your brains" for the proper word to look under; a durable cover that is easily cleaned... washable is best; pages that are not "tissue thin" but sturdy enough not to tear through repeated turnings; pages that lie open and flat without the book snapping shut so that you lose your place in the middle of a cooking procedure. Another feature liked by all cooks is space for writing in new ideas and recipes. And there you have just a few of the desirable features to look for in choosing a basic cookbook for a beginner in preparing meals for her family.

New Conservation Reserve Contracts In Effect in April

New conservation reserve contracts, now being signed by farmers in Tuscola County, will become effective April 15, 1959, according to Charles B. Eckfeld, County Office Manager of the Tuscola County Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

All conservation reserve contracts require that the land included be devoted to grass, trees, or a water or wildlife conservation practice. If the conservation practice to be used on the designated land is performed before April 15, the contract becomes effective at the time the practice is started.

This means that 1958 crops on land put in the conservation reserve this fall can be harvested before the contract goes into effect. In addition, the land put in the Reserve for the first time this fall may be grazed until the contract goes into effect. After the contract goes into effect the farmer agrees to refrain from harvesting Christmas trees and ornaments from conservation reserve land on which forest trees have been planted.

MICHIGAN MIRROR NEWS BRIEFS

Michigan is recovering slowly but surely from the "great recession" of 1958.

But the impact and its ripples reaching to every corner of the economy linger on. Men are going back to work in the automobile factories, but it may be months or years before full recovery will result in full employment.

The state unemployment compensation fund ran low during the period and the prosperity of individual workers and their families suffered. Although the trend is now reversed, it will take time to recover.

Hardest-hit of governmental functions was the public welfare system and taxpayers will be paying that bill for months.

Nine counties ran out of money before Dec. 1 and called upon the state to support their entire welfare programs. The largest county to that point was Muskegon, the city that several years ago became the classic example of economic distress for the nation. Counties normally pay up to 70 per cent for welfare services, with the state paying 30 per cent.

First signs of trouble came during the spring when the welfare caseloads dropped, but much less than in other years. Generally more jobs are available in the summer, but last year there were fewer such opportunities.

The situation worsened steadily. Now the state welfare officials are predicting a deficit approaching \$15,000,000.

They already have asked for a combined federal-state-local program totaling \$179,474,204 for 1959-60, a jump from the inadequate \$125,490,359 available during this fiscal year.

Price of special programs, including direct relief, services to the blind, and other welfare functions, will soar from \$55,494,500 to \$61,955,380.

Costs of state institutions under the social welfare department will increase from \$4,226,310 to \$6,420,706, most of the hike going into a new Boys Vocational School at Whitmore Lake.

This is just one phase of state government that will need more money during the next fiscal year.

Mental health officials are anxious to ease the overcrowding in hospitals; the state's prisons are jammed and a sitdown strike at Jackson was attributed to the low budget for food.

Public health services need expanding to care for an increased caseload; the state's public colleges and universities fear they will lose key faculty members unless they get a salary raise.

That is the background, a partial picture, of the problems faced by the 1959 legislature, which is already split between House and Senate, Republicans and Democrats, urban and rural.

The scene is complicated by a new campaign to revamp the state's tax structure, a plan by an income tax proposal which is bound to become controversial.

There may be proposed a doubled tax on beer, now taxed at \$1.25 per barrel, and other levies. The only safe wager as the 1959 session gets under way is that, while some of the problems will not be solved, some will be. The right answers may not always be found, but the 144 lawmakers will have had every opportunity to earn their \$5,000 salaries by summer.

Michigan's Department of Labor is a misnomer.

For years, it has been confused with the State Labor Mediation Board, the Workmen's Compensation Department and the Michigan Employment Security Commission (MESCC). The department neither mediates labor disputes, handles claims from injured

workers or arranges weekly benefits for those who are out of work. Actually, the department's major task is industrial safety.

It conducts inspections in factories, enforces regulations concerning elevators, handles claims for back wages and performs a large number of services both for the industry and working man.

Another of its functions is to enforce the state's child labor law. Before a child under 18 can work for money, he must have the approval of the state labor department.

Life flows on like a river—sometimes smoothly and majestically, sometimes over rapids and waterfalls, churning itself into foam—sometimes through beautiful forests, lush fields, or barren deserts.

Healthy babies have been born to mothers as young as 6½ years, and as old as 62.

 - 1 egg
 - 2 cups sifted enriched flour
 - 1 cup rolled oats, quick or old-fashioned, uncooked
 - 1 cup finely chopped nuts
- Whole cranberry sauce

- Beat butter and confectioners' sugar until creamy. Add vanilla and egg; beat until smooth. Add flour; mix well until blended. Stir in oats. Shape dough into 30 balls; roll in chopped nuts.
- Place on ungreased cookie sheets. Make a thumbprint in each cookie; fill with cranberry sauce. Chill. Bake in a slow (325°F.) oven about 15 minutes.

- Spiced Tea**
(Serves 12)
- 1 cup water
 - 1 cup sugar
 - 2 teaspoons black tea
 - 2 mint leaves
- Spiced Apples**
- 3/4 cup lemon juice
 - 3/4 cup orange juice
 - 2 quarts boiling water
- Boil water and sugar together for 5 minutes, add tea, mint and apples. Cover and allow to steep for 10 minutes. Strain, add fruit juices, boiling water and bring to a boil. Serve warm. If desired place in a punch bowl with one or two oranges (small) studded with cloves into bowl.

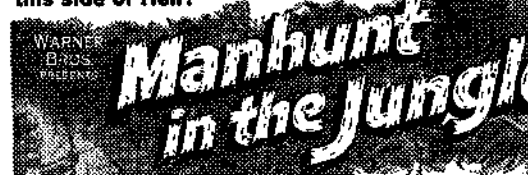

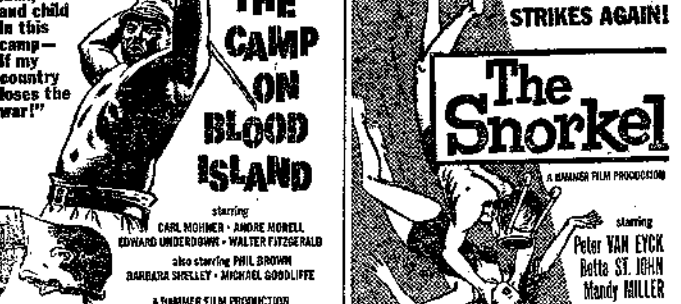

Plum Pudding Is A
Traditional Dessert

Christmas is a holiday full of tradition so it's nice to have the traditional dessert: plum pudding, called by some suet pudding or even boiled pudding since it's cooked by steaming.

The recipe given here is for a large quantity, but it keeps well when tightly wrapped in foil and kept in a cool place. Serve only small portions as it's rich and spicy.

Holiday Plum Pudding
(Makes 5 1/2 pounds)

1 1/2 cups raisins, light or dark
1 cup seeded raisins
1 cup currants
1/2 cup preserved orange peel
1/2 cup cut candied cherries
1 cup cut citron
2 tablespoons grated orange rind
1/2 cup fruit juice
4 eggs
1 cup roasted unblanched almonds
1 cup fine dry bread crumbs
2 cups finely chopped suet
1 1/2 cups chopped apple
1 cup sifted all-purpose flour
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon each cinnamon and allspice
1/2 teaspoon each cloves and nutmeg

Rinse raisins and currants and drain between towelling. Add peel, cherries, citron and orange rind. Let stand in fruit juice while mixing batter. Chop almonds and sprinkle over fruit. Beat eggs well and gradually beat in sugar. Blend in crumbs, suet and apple. Sift together flour, salt and spices and stir into egg mixture. Pour batter over fruit and fill well greased fruit molds or two 1-pound coffee cans and one No. 1 can. Cover with a double thickness of heavy foil tied around top. Place in Kettles with one inch of boiling water. Cover closely and boil 6 hours, adding water occasionally. A pressure cooker may be used to cut down on cooking time. Follow manufacturers' directions. Cool pudding in cans, turn out, brush with fruit juice and wrap in foil. Reheat by steaming before serving.

Whipped Cream Sauce: Beat 1 egg until fluffy and thick, then beat in 1/2 cup sugar slowly. Gradually blend in 1/2 cup butter, melted, with 1 teaspoon vanilla extract. Fold in 1 cup heavy cream, whipped. Dust with nutmeg.

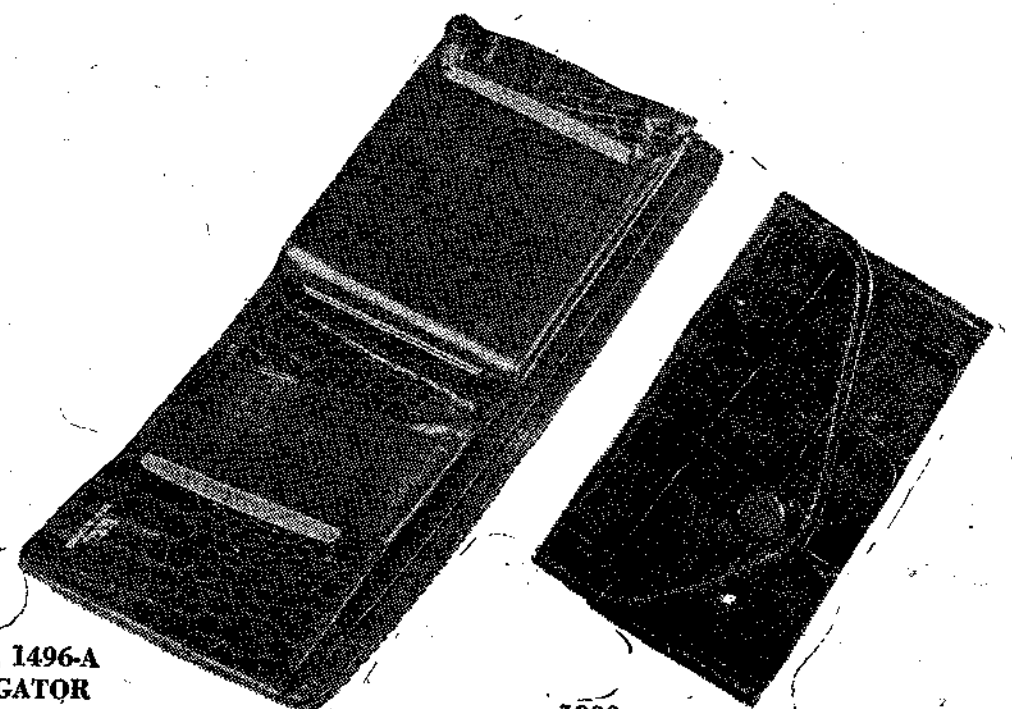
