Two Injured in Four Area Crashes

Name Hofmeister Elmwood Twp. Supervisor

Milton Hofmeister, Elmwood Township farmer, was appointed Elmwood Township supervisor to replace Grover Laurie, who has resigned to accept a position on the county highway commission. The action was taken Friday at a meeting of the Elmwood board.

Mr. Hofmeister will assume his new duties Jan. 1, the effective date of Mr. Laurie's resignation

Mr. Hofmeister came to Gagetown in October, 1948, from Bay City. He works 160 acres, 80 of which he owns. Born in Sebewaing April 28, 1915, he married the former Leona Vera Pearce Feb. 25, 1989. The Hofmeisters have four children, all at home.

Mr. Hofmeister has been director of the Elmwood-Elkland Farm Bureau and served as chair-man of the Parent-Teacher Club of Gagetown. When Mr. Laurie takes over

as a member of the road commission he will have completed 12 years as supervisor of Elmwood Township. During his service to the township and county he served as chairman of the County Board of Supervisors in 1953-54.

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THE DAILY GRIND

The daily grind can really get you down.

> Tuscola County veterans are "unalterably opposed" to any tampering with the Michigan Veterans' Trust Fund, it was decided at a meeting of county veterans at Caro Wednesday evening.

The veterans said that they notifying Governor G vere Mennen Williams of their stand in answer to reports that veterans were resigned to liquidation of the fund.

Members of the trust fund committee in the county are: Chairman Lloyd Jackson, of VFW; Linton Terbush, Caro. of the American Legion, and Robert Profit, Cass City, of the Disabled American Veterans. Mrs. Gerald DeBoer of Caro is the authorized agent and Mrs. Walter Scholbert of Caro, Michigan stenographer. Members of the committee point to some of the achievements made possible by the fund money when they tell of the \$17,137 given to needy veterans in Tuscola County - since 1946. "With few exceptions," they said, "this money was spent right in the county for financial obligations incurred by veterans and their families confronted with emergencies beyond their control."

Committee members also report that the state would lose several million dollars if the bonds were cashed today, ahead of maturity.

They also said that the program now uses only interest on the money and that the state will eventually have all of the principal money returned.
