Winter is the season for citrus fruit, and the December holiday season and the fresh orange and grapefruit go well together. About 76 per cent of the fresh grapefruit crop and around 64 per cent of the fresh oranges move from the citrus groves to the breakfast or dinner table from November to June. For the best at the most reasonable prices, buy citrus fruit in season. This brings us right up to some

citrus facts. What do you know about grapefruit sizes? Size is one reason why you might pay one price for, a dozen oranges one week and another price the next week. What about sizes? When you read in the ad or find Florida grapefruit marked 36s, 46s or 54s, then you know that size grapefruit will be extra large or jumbo (as they are sometimes marked). Large size are called 64s, medium 70s and 80s, small 96s. These numbers indicate the

For example, if you see 96 size grapefruit advertised, you know they will be small, because 96 of them are packed in a case. Another food market might be selling 70 grapefruit, so you can expect to pay a little more, but you will get a little larger grape-



Check Farm-Stored Grain for Damage

If you have farm-stored grain under price-support loan, now is a good time to give the grain and the storage building a thorough inspection, according to Charles they are very similar to the I want a road torch if you have B. Eckfeld, county office manager of the Tuscola County Agriservation Committee.

Mr. Eckfeld pointed out that in the rush of fall work some farmers may not have had time to make inspection of their grain storage structures. An inspection now is particularly important since the owner is responsible for the quality and number of bushels of grain put under price support. With that responsibility in mind, Mr. Eckfeld recommends checking roofs and walls of buildings in which grain is stored. If small openings permit birds and mice to gain access to the grain, substantial damage will result.

Although insects in grain are usually not active during the winter, the county office manager suggests that samples be taken and checked for insects. If insects are present, farmers should see their county agricultural agent for recommendations on fumigation.



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

The State Police are urging drivers to do even better than the low record of only three traffic deaths in Michigan, none of them on rural highways, over the New Year's holiday last year and say it can be done.

"Drivers have proved they can save lives and what better way to start the New Year than with no fatalities," says Commissioner Joseph A. Childs.

To help make it a safe holiday, all available troopers will be on duty. Intensified patrols will start at noon Wednesday, December 31, and carry through on extended 10-hour shifts until 6 a.m. Thursday, January 1. Detectives will perform desk duty to release uniform officers for adlitional patrols.

The State Police will be assisted by 50 National Guardsmen and the same number will work with sheriffs' departments.

Tips for Reporting Farm Income Tax

Farmers filling out their federal income tax reports need to take particular care in making out the 1040-F form, According to Don Kebler, Tuscola County extension agent in agriculture, an improperly filed 1040-F report can result in a lower retirement income from social security,

In other words, an acceptable income tax report may not be acceptable for social security pur-

Many farmers, for instance, have been entering capital assets on the 1040-F form instead of on the 1040-D form where they belong. Livestock income entries are most often made incorrectly. For instance, any livestock kept longer than 12 months and used for draft, breeding or dairy production when sold or involuntarily converted must be entered on the 1040-D form, These are capital assets and are subject to capital gains or loss declarations. These animals are not to be entered on the 1040-F schedule.

The farmer only pays income tax on 50 per cent of the gain when using the 1040-D, and declares all the loss. If the sale of these animals was entered by error on the 1040-F schedule, the perator would be paying income

tax on a 100 per cent basis.

The schedule 1040-D is used in he same manner for farm ma-

chinery building, too. It is well to remember that a person's social security payments and credits are based entirely on the net farm income as reported on the 1040-F schedule. Gains or losses recorded on schedule D are not entered for social security urposes.

Many farmers have learned to their dismay that, upon applying for social security pension, their monthly checks are less than previously believed.

A hint for keeping more accuate records of capital assets and for ease of filing income tax rerate records of capital assets and for ease of filing income tax reports, is for the farmer to set up good inventory record, says The only big change in this

year's income tax reporting is the new 20 per cent depreciation alowable on equipment purchased in 1958. Other than this, the income tax rules are the same as

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
