Home Agent Tells Tips for Using and Storing Cheese

For nearly 4,000 years, cheese has been a favorite food of people all over the world. According to Mrs. Frances T. Clark, County Extension Agent in Home Economics, cheese is not only good to your budget, but it also is an excellent source of animal protein and so can be substituted for

The cheese you buy is either a natural cheese, a process cheese, or a process cheese food. Each serves a different purpose in your menu. Natural cheese, such as cheddar, contains almost all the protein, butterfat, sugar, and minerals of the whole milk from which it is made. Process cheese is made by mixing one or more cheeses. This type of cheese slices easily and melts without curdling or becoming stringy. Process cheese food or spreads are somewhat like process cheese, but they have more moisture and less fat and milk solids. Sometimes seasonings and relishes are added for variation.

I hope that your family likes cranberries as well as my family does because there is an abundant supply this year. Since cranberries are easy to freeze, it will give you a good opportunity to stock the home freezer with cranberry sauce or other conserves for the coming year.

The best way that I know of freezing cranberries is simply to put the fresh berries in freezer bags or other containers without sweetening. Seal and freeze. For this method, you will want to use firm berries with glassy skins. After you have removed any stems or soft berries, wash and drain the cranberries and place them in packages. These are now ready to use in any recipe calling These are used constantly, often for cranberries.

Cranberries may be put in igid containers and covered with cold 50 per cent sirup if they are to be used for cranberry sauce. To prepare this sirup, dissolve 4-3 4 cups of sugar in 4 cups of water. When you are ready to make the sauce, simply cook the berries briefly until they are just tender.

To prepare frozen cranberry ouree, add 2 cups of water to each quart (1 pound) of berries and cook. When the skins have popped, press the berries through food mill or strainer. Place the puree in rigid containers, making sure that you have space for expansions at the top. Seal and freeze. This puree may be served when slightly thawed, or it may be cooked for a few minutes until it thickens a little.

In allowing for expansion in freezing, you will want to have 1/2 inch at the top of a pint freezer container. A little more head-space will be needed for narrow-type containers.




