Hawks Return to Cage Wars Tuesday

Although the Cass City Red Hawks are leading the league and are undefeated in Thumb B Conference competition, Coach Irv Clasenman is not entirely satisfied with the squad's performances in early season.

The team has been good on defense but has yet to find the range in shooting. In their only loss of the year, against Mt. Pleasant, and against Caro in the last game before the holidays, the Hawks have not hit from the field or the foul line with consistency.

Despite this, the team will reign as heavy favorites to defeat Bad Axe when they return to the hardwood Tuesday, Jan. 6, at Cass City High School.

The hatchets have been defeated by Caro and hold a victory over Vassar. Most observers who saw the Caro game felt that Bad Axe should have won.

The Hawks' victory over Vassar demonstrated that the team can cause any quintet in the league trouble on certain nights. Cass City's lack of scoring punch can be seen by a glance at the records. After three games, Fred Leeson is leading the squad with 35, an average of about 11.7 per game. Bob Holcomb has only 22 points for an average of a little over seven per game and Forrest Walpole has collected 23 points in the three contests.

Alex Lopez, who did not earn a starting berth in the first two games, is second in team scoring with 25. Ron Copeland, who has yet to start a game although he has seen action in every contest, has hit the meshes for 21 points. Bob Tuckey who is the Hawks' rebounder has only nine points so far this year.

Following Tuesday's game, the Hawks will travel to Marlette Friday to face the Red Raiders in what is annually one of the high spots on the schedule for both teams.

Home Agent Tells Tips for Using and Storing Cheese

For nearly 4,000 years, cheese has been a favorite food of people all over the world. According to Mrs. Frances T. Clark, County Extension Agent in Home Economics, cheese is not only good to your budget, but it also is an excellent source of animal protein and so can be substituted for meat.

The cheese you buy is either a natural cheese, a process cheese, or a process cheese food. Each serves a different purpose in your menu. Natural cheese, such as cheddar, contains almost all the protein, butyrate, sugar, and minerals of the whole milk from which it is made. Process cheese is made by mixing one or more cheeses. This type of cheese slices easily and melts without curdling or becoming stringy. Process cheese food or spreads are somewhat like process cheese, but they have more moisture and less fat and milk solids. Sometimes seasonings and relishes are added for variation.



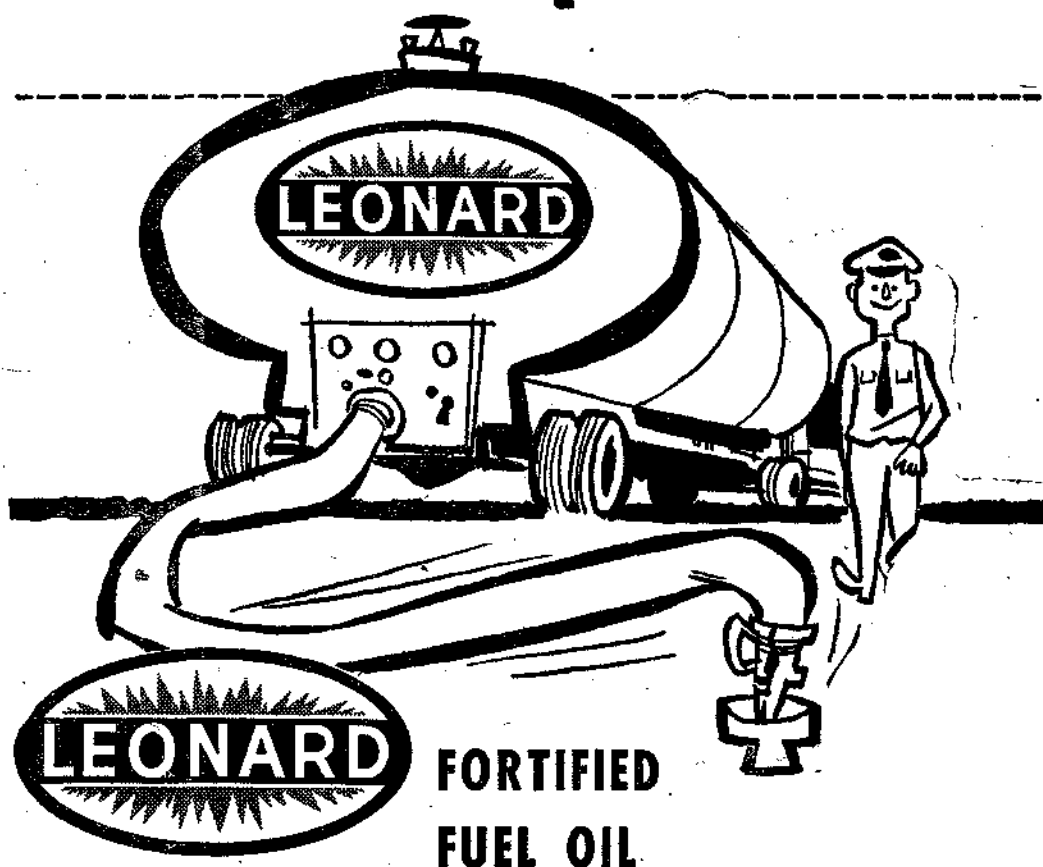

Uncle Tim From Tyre Says:

Dear Mister Editor:

I see by the papers where Mr. Bernard Baruch says "hard work is the only way of defeating inflation." He goes on to say everybody has got to work hard or inflation will ruin us. That little piece spoiled the whole day for me.

Mr. Baruch is an adviser to Presidents, and I'm wondering where he gets all them un-American ideas. Certainly we'll avoid inflation if everybody works harder, and if everybody goes to jail there won't be no crime on the outside. What Mr. Baruch is advising is about like telling us we ought to burn down the Capitol to get rid of some of them Congressmen that got to Washington by mistake.

We're getting entirely too many strange ideas in this country. If Mr. Baruch wants to work harder, let him do it. It's a free country, and I'm all for him. But I got better ideas on how to cure inflation. For instance, some of them folks in Government could get out of the public trough and do a half a day's honest work at someplace else. We got about four million folks on the Federal payroll and there ain't more'n half of 'em that does a honest day's work once a week. They been lapping up the milk so long without cutting any hay for the cow that they think everybody else is doing the same.

I see, for instance, where the Government rents about 11 per cent of all the office space in the city of Indianapolis and about 10 per cent of all the of-

fice space in ever large city in the United States. They have filled up Washington, spread out into Virginia and Maryland, and now they is crowding into all parts of the country. And in ever office they got 'em stuffed to the rafters with Government workers.

With all due respect to Mr. Baruch, I don't aim to work no harder till them Congressmen start squeezing our Government into a little less space and with a little less office help. He says that inflation may take a turn for the worse by Spring. In case Mr. Baruch ain't had no experience in agriculture, I can advise him that Spring is the time of year when it's hard to tell the plant from the weed, and when grass and corn look about alike and I'm going to continue my system of waiting to see which is which afore I set out to sweat over the problem, inflation or no inflation.

Good Farm Records Help at Tax Time

Income tax reporting and farm business analysis is greatly simplified when good farm account records are kept. This is the report of Don R. Kebler, Tuscola county extension agent in agriculture.

By keeping accurate farm business and inventory records, any farmer has his yearly farm business figures right at his finger tips when it's time to file income tax reports.

The best part of accurate records is the ease and simplicity with which anyone can keep them. Another advantage is that with an accurate, up to date inventory book, a farmer need not list each depreciable item on his income tax report. All he need do is enter the total depreciation as one figure on the 1040-F. In other words, enter the total annual machinery depreciation on one line, the total improvement depreciation on another, and the total purchased livestock depreciation on a third line.

Add the three lines together and the sum is the total depreciation for the farm business. A notation may be made below these three lines to the extent that the complete listing of items in this section can be seen in the farm's inventory record book. This is acceptable when records are kept in a Michigan State University four-year continuous inventory book.

Kebler also mentioned that a complete farm record system would be invaluable for analyzing the farm business.

Both M. S. U. farm income and expense, and inventory books are available at your county extension agent's office for 25c each. Also some of the banks have them available to their customers. Stop in and learn about this record keeping system.

Taxes on farm real estate in Michigan climbed to an all-time high last year. The average tax was \$154 per acre.

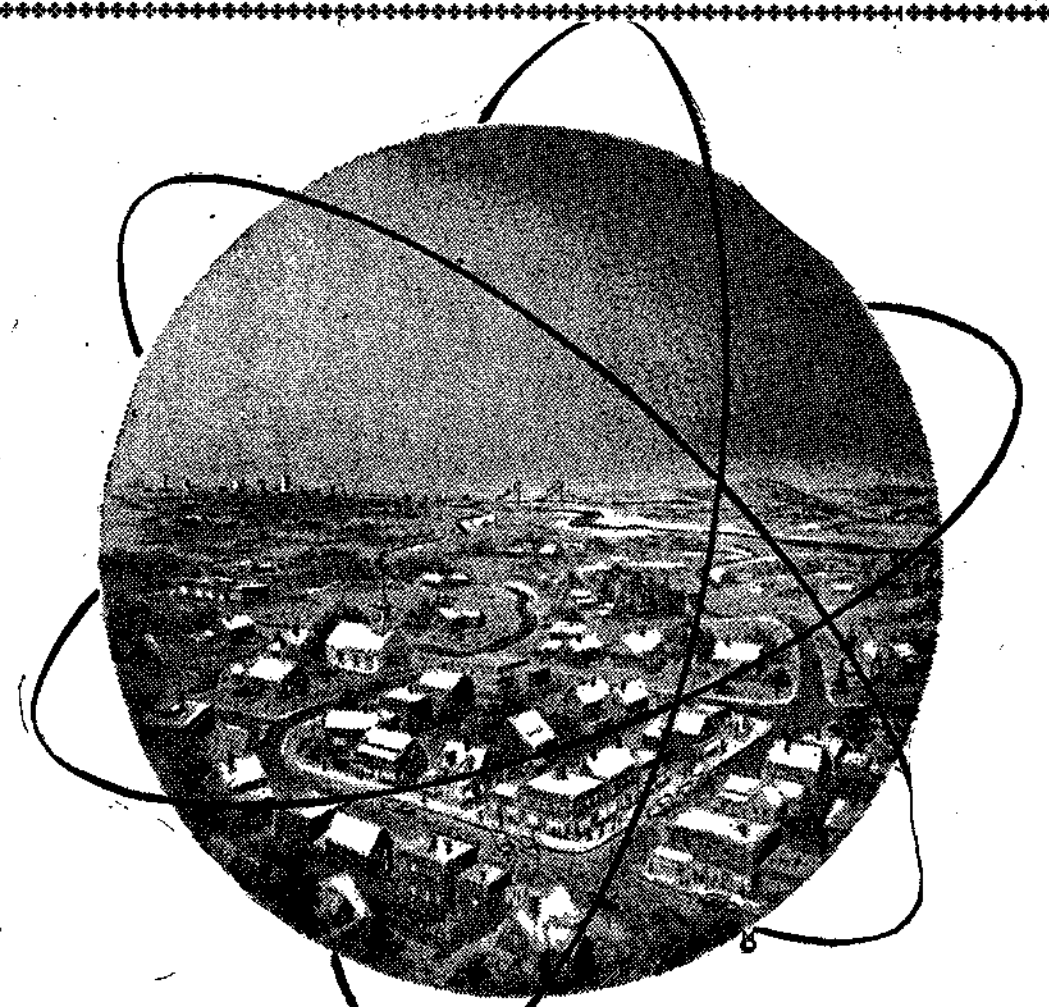

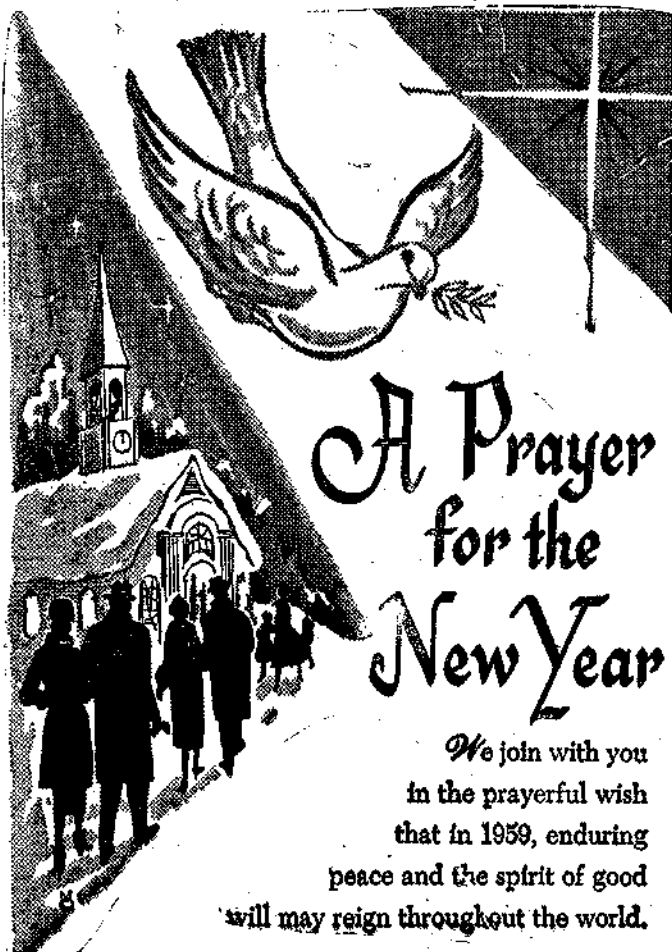

Michigan Mirror News In Brief

By Elmer E. White
Michigan Press Association

Detectives in laboratory smocks, armed with microscopes and cameras are fighting crime in Michigan.

They are the scientific arm of the law, working closely with the famous Michigan State Police, county sheriffs, local law enforcement agencies and the courts.

From fingerprints, footprints, blood samples, a stray pawn ticket stub, the scraps and debris of crime, they trace violence to its source.

In Michigan, the State Police and the State Health Department each has crime laboratories which work together.

Commissioner Joseph A. Childs has organized a team of highly-specialized scientists from both and from his special investigation squad to speed to the scene of a crime and start looking for the criminal.

Every policeman in Michigan has access to the service.

The science of crime fighting in Michigan goes a step farther than laboratories, too. Bulging files contain the records and pictures of every person arrested. These are used constantly, often

providing the first clue.
When a bank is robbed and witnesses are confused or non-existent, the detectives go into the files for any possible link in past crimes, for any scrap of information that will point to suspects.

The files are carefully guarded against misuse.

In an effort to prevent this, the legislature passed a law in 1951 and strengthened it in 1958. Included is a requirement that the arrest cards and records be returned to those who were released without prosecution or acquitted. This provision creates chaos and, law enforcement officials contend, impedes justice.

A special committee of law enforcement officials will seek either repeal or modification of the law when the 1959 legislature convenes.

The original purpose of the 1951 law was to prevent police information from being used against a man or woman later if he were never proved guilty of a crime.

The police committee wants to keep the records in the files for future reference, but restrict the use of the information to police agencies.

An alternative proposal would provide that the return of the arrest information would not apply in any case in which the accused had a prior conviction; except a traffic offense, or where he was involved in a sexually-motivated crime.

The committee is composed of the Michigan Associations of Chiefs of Police, sheriffs, judges, justices of the peace and prosecutors and the attorney general's department, as well as the state police.

Each year it makes proposals designed to help them enforce the laws and protect Michigan's 7,500,000 citizens.

For 1959, the committee will also propose that the chemical test for drunk drivers be legalized to

the point where it will be accepted as court evidence.
The committee will repeat its plea for establishment of the responsibility of a motorist in proceeding after halting for a stop sign. Police believe he still should yield the right of way.

New proposals would prohibit the use of concealed weapons by the military or the Michigan National Guard unless authorized by these agencies in the performance of their duty.

Others would:
Increase the concealed-weapons registration fee from \$2 to \$3 when issued by a city police department, with the additional dollar going to the city. The state and county now each get \$1.

Strengthen the state gambling law by providing penalties for misdemeanors in combination of

with terms and fines up to \$500, increasing them for subsequent offenses.

Broaden the state narcotics law to cover three drugs now covered only by the federal law.

Suggestions from other agencies were also passed on by the Michigan committee.

They would allow persons between 14 and 17 to attend a licensed, reputable dance hall, give the state attorney general the power of subpoena in investigations, and set up machinery to extradite mental patients who flee to other states.

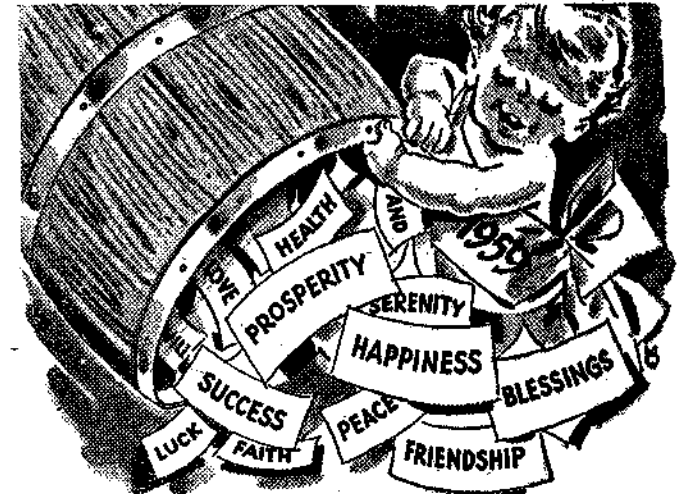
