County 4-H Clubs Report Busy Year

The Tuscola County Extension Department this week released their annual report showing the activities of their organization last year. It was a busy 4-H sea-

There is a total of 57 4-H clubs in the county that provide activities for some 514 boys and 665 girls. Not all of the 4-H club members come from farms, the report indicates. There are 332 farm boys and 435 farm girls in the program. But there are also 130 boys and 123 girls from rural nonfarm homes and 52 boys and 107 girls from urban homes. The real problem in weight control is to decide how much extra fat has been stowed away; then decide how much time you want to take those extra pounds off.

The bulletin "Counting Calories" lists foods within the five basic nutrition groups. 

Food Prices Lower

Food shoppers can look forward to retail food prices that are a little lower in 1959 than in 1958, reports Mrs. Frances T. Clark, county extension agent in home economics.

There is not any real hurry for getting all the menus planned for 1959, but a look ahead and let forewarned be forearmed. If you take note of foods that will be in abundant supply in 1959, you can (1) cut food buying expenses, or (2) you can save enough money by taking advan- Phone 95 tage of the abundant supplies to be able to treat the family to the extra eating pleasure of their favorite foods; foods that may be served more often than you were able to serve them in 1958.

Mrs. Clark reports that supplies of pork, poultry, potatoes and fresh vegetables are expected to be larger and prices lower than they were in 1958. This will be true at least during the first part of 1959. Since weather conditions affect the production of fruit, vegetables and nuts, forecast cannot be ventured much beyond the present marketing year which ends in mid-1959.

Still further decline in pork prices is expected. The 1958 fall pig crop was up an expected 14 per cent. Starting about the middle to the latter part of January, this crop will start to market. Beef prices will stay about as they were in 1958. U.S. choice

grade will be the largest supply of beef, and this has some special effects. For instance, ground beef will probably still be 49c to 59c a pound for ground beef cannot be made from top grade beef and still sell for 40c a pound. South 2 Blocks of Ford Garage Since food costs are fairly low, farmers have held back cows (the source of 40c per pound ground beef) for "just one more calf" or restocking herds.

Increased broiler production for 1959 is not positive, but is expected, according to Mrs. Clark. Average prices will be about the same as in 1958, maybe somewhat higher in the last half of 1959 than in the last half of 1958. Turkey production will be slightly smaller, but will be balanced by the large end-of-theyear stocks on hand, so supply and price should be about the same as in 1958.

Supplies of dairy products will be ample to meet the needs of consumers at about the same level of retail_prices as in 1958. Egg prices in 1959 are likely to average lower than in 1958. By the end of 1959, a moderate cutback in replacement of laying flock is expected; with decreased layers, production will be smaller and egg prices a bit higher at the end of the year.

With the exception of citrus fruits, canned and frozen fruits and vegetables will see us through the early part of 1959. Processed stocks of citrus are low, but relief will come when the new packs start rolling to mar-

Mrs. Clark reports that the redictions for fresh fruits are: more apricots, sweet cherries, tart cherries, plums and pears. Productions of grapes and cranberries are expected to be about the same as in 1958 with smaller crops of apples and peaches.

Since bad weather cut fresh vegetable production last year, it can be safely said that unless bad weather overtakes us again, there will be more fresh vege tables available in 1959. The 1958 fresh vegetable production was the smallest in a decade.

Collapsible Tank **Versatile on Farm**

Space Saver, Cuts Transporting Problem

A 1,000-gallon capacity, collapsible tank, that can be mounted on a stake truck for transporting water or liquid fertilizer, yet can be rolled into a cylinder only two feet in diameter, is proving a versatile piece of agricultural equip-| ment.

Constructed of nylon fabric coated with a special synthetic rubber compound, this farm-use tank is a new version of Firestone's Fabritank which the U.S. Marine Corps and oil companies use when the transportation of metal tanks would be impractical.

By using this tank the farmer can truck the water for insecticide spraying machines to the fields, eliminating the need for moving



Collapsible tank is used here to carry water for diluting concen-

east of the Chronicle building the spraying machine back to a central storage tank every time it needs refilling.

The tank-has proved valuable to farmers who must drive a considerable distance to town in order to purchase liquid fertilizer. The tank in its collapsed state can be carried in a small bundle in one corner of the truck. The necessity of deadheading into town is eliminated since the unused portion of the truck bed can be loaded with

The tank for the farm use weighs 225 pounds. When full it is 6 feet wide, 21/2 feet high and 121/2 feet long. It collapses into a cylindrical bundle about seven feet long and two feet in diameter.

Loading is through a fitting at the top. It is unloaded by gravity through a fitting at the rear near the bottom. A pump could be used

Wheat-Grass Hybrids Combine Best Features

Wheat capable of protecting the oil, resisting insects and diseases, yielding a forage crop after normal grain harvest, producing high-protein grain, and having high tolerance to drought is the goal in prosoect of a long-term hybridization program being conducted by U. S. Department of Agriculture agro-

The program began in 1923 when in ARS plant breeder crossed wheat with wheatgrass and other similar grasses. It took 12 years of letermined effort to create the original crosses. Another 23 years of further breeding were required to produce the present encouraging hybrids and still more work is required before seed will be available.

These hybrids, although not yet of commercial quality, should be available within the next few years n quantities suitable for experimental field trials. By this time the plant breeders hope to have combined the desirable characteristics of these plants into fixed varieties.

C. A. Suneson ARS agronomist, vorking in cooperation with the california Agricultural Experiment Station at Davis, has used the original crosses to develop a true verennial wheat that may lead to commercial varieties capable of producing crops for as many as four years without replanting.

Post Repair

Pipe fence posts that rust off at the base can be repaired to last for years.
