What's the soil's primary crop? Microbes, says an Oregon State College scientist, who won the 1958 OSC campus research award for his work with soil microorganisms.



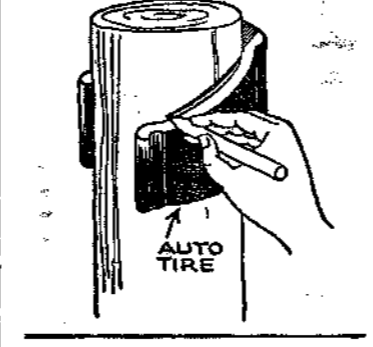
Microbes are the soil's primary crop.

I cannot make you resist high calorie desserts but I can remind you of two handy leaflets I have that will help you to get your waistline down before you buy your new Easter clothes. The names of these booklets are "Live Lean and Like It" and "Counting Calories."

Controlling body weight is the most common headache that the healthy adult faces. However, the fact of "misery loves company" is no help. In our present society, adult underweights are rather rare. You should know that extra pounds place a strain on the heart, arteries and knee joints. The real problem in weight control is to decide how much extra fat has been stowed away; then decide how much time you want to take those extra pounds off.

The bulletin "Counting Calories" lists foods within the five basic nutrition groups. The leaflet also contains a chart showing daily calorie needs of various persons and includes low and high calorie menus for the family. If you want a copy of either of these two bulletins, call or write me for a copy.

There is something new concerning food additives. That is, coloring, flavorings, and the like, that are added to processed foods, must be approved by the Federal Food and Drug Commission before they can be added for your use. You thought there was such a law already? It is true. There has been a law prohibiting the use of harmful substances in food, but it was different from this present one.

The first law left it up to the Federal Food and Drug Commission to discover the harmful substance (if there was one). The newer law is like this: before anything is added to food in processing, the processor must prove to the Federal Food and Drug Commission that the "anything" he is about to add is not harmful.

So, you see, food comes from the processor with colorings, flavors and the like, already guaranteed for your use.

In your struggle to reach the top don't place too much confidence in the elevator.

Tip to motorists: Drive as if you expected pedestrians to do the unexpected.

Carl Dewey Takes Eight Mink in 45-Day Season

The trapping season in Michigan is only 45 days long, but during the Dec. 1 - Jan. 15 season, Carl Dewey works hard to take as many of the area's fur bearing animals as possible.

Mr. Dewey runs a trap line at least 10 miles long and he visits his 45 traps at least once a day if weather permits.

This season, Mr. Dewey has trapped 37 muskrats, eight mink and six weasels.

The mink is the animal that all trappers want to see in their traps. Mr. Dewey sold the eight he caught this year for between \$8.50 and \$15 each. The eight pelts brought an average of over \$14. each.

Weasels are worth about 75 cents to a dollar.

One animal that Carl has caught a lot of that he wishes he hadn't is the possum. Worth nothing commercially, they are continually becoming trapped and making more work for the trapper.

The most unusual experience of the year was the trapping of a robin. "That's the seventh wonder of the world," Mr. Dewey explained, "and almost never occurs on a trap line."

Hurrah! Predict '59 Food Prices Lower

Food shoppers can look forward to retail food prices that are a little lower in 1959 than in 1958, reports Mrs. Frances T. Clark, county extension agent in home economics.

There is not any real hurry for getting all the menus planned for 1959, but a look ahead and let forewarned be forearmed. If you take note of foods that will be in abundant supply in 1959, you can (1) cut food buying expenses, or (2) you can save enough money by taking advantage of the abundant supplies to be able to treat the family to the extra eating pleasure of their favorite foods; foods that may be served more often than you were able to serve them in 1958.

Mrs. Clark reports that supplies of pork, poultry, potatoes and fresh vegetables are expected to be larger and prices lower than they were in 1958. This will be true at least during the first part of 1959. Since weather conditions affect the production of fruit, vegetables and nuts, forecast cannot be ventured much beyond the present marketing year which ends in mid-1959.

Still further decline in pork prices is expected. The 1958 fall pig crop was up an expected 14 per cent. Starting about the middle to the latter part of January, this crop will start to market.

Beef prices will stay about as they were in 1958. U. S. choice grade will be the largest supply of beef, and this has some special effects. For instance, ground beef will probably still be 49c to 59c a pound for ground beef cannot be made from top grade beef and still sell for 40c a pound. Since food costs are fairly low, farmers have held back cows (the source of 40c per pound ground beef) for "just one more calf" or restocking herds.

Increased broiler production for 1959 is not positive, but is expected, according to Mrs. Clark. Average prices will be about the same as in 1958, maybe somewhat higher in the last half of 1959 than in the last half of 1958. Turkey production will be slightly smaller, but will be balanced by the large end-of-the-year stocks on hand, so supply and price should be about the same as in 1958.

Supplies of dairy products will be ample to meet the needs of consumers at about the same level of retail prices as in 1958. Egg prices in 1959 are likely to average lower than in 1958. By the end of 1959, a moderate cut-back in replacement of laying flock is expected; with decreased layers, production will be smaller and egg prices a bit higher at the end of the year.

With the exception of citrus fruits, canned and frozen fruits and vegetables will see us through the early part of 1959. Processed stocks of citrus are low, but relief will come when the new packs start rolling to market.

Mrs. Clark reports that the predictions for fresh fruits are: more apricots, sweet cherries, tart cherries, plums and pears. Productions of grapes and cranberries are expected to be about the same as in 1958 with smaller crops of apples and peaches.

Since bad weather cut fresh vegetable production last year, it can be safely said that unless bad weather overtakes us again, there will be more fresh vegetables available in 1959. The 1958 fresh vegetable production was the smallest in a decade.

It does little to weigh your words if you are using a crooked scales.
