Consumers, quite willingly ap parently, pay one cent or more per ounce for soft drinks, the food value of which, in most cases, is limited to the sugar content. In some instances, dentists have been known to advise against consumption of soft drinks because of their heavy sugar content.

Smokers pay well over one cent, up to two cents, for each cigarette they smoke. In recent years some very serious questions have been raised about the smoking of cigarettes and possible relationships to lung cancer.

Beer sells for various prices ranging from two to ten cents an ounce, depending upon whether it is purchased in a cut-rate store or in a high-priced bar. Beer has never been sold as being especially beneficial to anyone.

Milk, which has been acknowledged to be nature's most nearly perfect food, sells, on the average throughout the country, for about two thirds of a cent per ounce. It is a good question to ask

One answer to this question ertainly must lie in the area of sales promotion. Many more dollars are spent each year to convince consumers to use soft drinks, cigarettes, beer and other

products than are spent for milk. The consumer is bombarded by sales messages. If milk and milk products are to hold their own in the food purchases, they are going to have to compete more effectively for consumer attention. Consumers must be led to think about milk as often as they think about soft drinks or cigarettes or beer. We cannot simply rest on our own knowledge that milk is truly greatest of foods.



The common law of business balance prohibits paying a little and getting a lot . . . it can't be done. If you deal with the lowest bidder, it is well to add something for the risk you run. And if you do that, you will have enough to pay for something better."
