

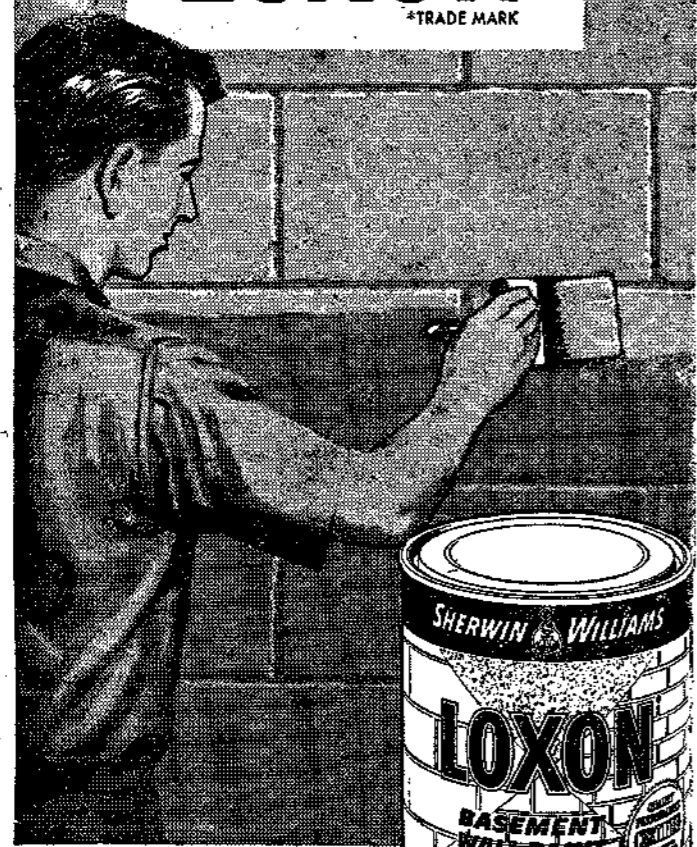

Since 1938 when the Conservation Department launched its public fishing site program, more than 700 sites have been acquired. Camping is permitted on approximately 475. 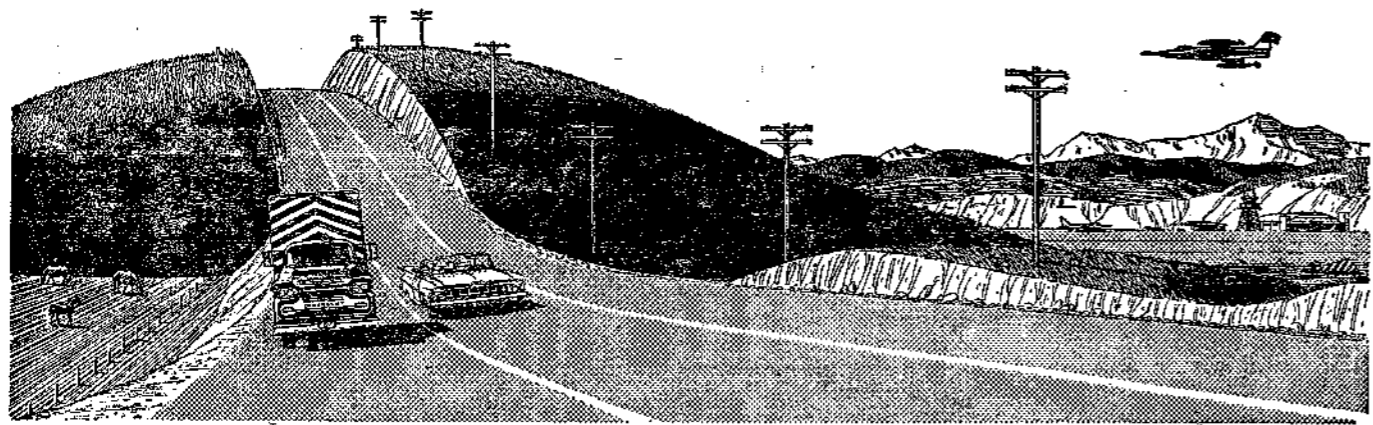

# Hearing Aids Offer Hope for Deaf

Hearing aids offer hope to deaf people whose difficulties can't be corrected by surgery, two specialists from The University of Michigan Medical Center relate.

Doctors Phillip A. Yantis and John E. Magielski of the Department of Otolaryngology explained that a hearing aid "is a device to help people hear better, not a cure for deafness."

Normally, they said, sound waves flow through several chambers to reach the inner ear. Auditory nerves then carry the signal to the brain.

Any break or interruption in this chain can create a hearing problem. Then a louder noise is needed to drive the sound waves into the inner ear.

A hearing aid's miniature amplifier increases the sound volume enough to force the waves through any obstruction.

Unfortunately, the U-M specialists report, not every deaf person can use a hearing aid successfully. Older people often have a "discrimination problem" — they can hear people talking, but don't understand what is being said. The hearing nerve isn't functioning properly in these cases and is unable to carry the sound to the brain.

Other people have a "distortion problem" built into the ear. Raising the sound volume simply increases the amount of distortion.

Some individuals buy a hearing aid without seeing their doctor, only to find it doesn't improve their hearing.

Consultation with a physician can determine the type of problem an individual has and whether a hearing aid can help. Special tests are sometimes needed to determine this.

At the U-M Medical Center tests are often given to see if surgery can restore hearing or if a hearing aid would be more beneficial.
