

Ordinance to Have "Teeth"

A presentation of a new zoning ordinance for consideration and a discussion of provisions for clinics on Hospital Drive near the new Cass City Community Hospital highlighted the meeting day night.

George Vilican of Vilican-Le-man and Associates told the group that the community had operated well under its present zoning provision, but that he felt. that it should be revised now so that "more controls can be established and minimum standards increased.'

For instance, he pointed out, if a new plant were to come to the village and 200 new homes be required, under the present ordinance only 7,200 square feet per lot would be needed, while most homes in Cass City now have lots of 8,500 square feet or more.

The proposed ordinance will also definitely restrict the type of building that can be placed in the community and the distances the structure must be from the side and end lot lines. One of the most important features of the ordinance, Mr. Vilican believes, is that every residential dwelling will be controlled as to the percentage of the lot that can be covered with a structure . . .







Final Rites Friday For Everett Darling

Everett Darling, 63, died un-expectedly Tuesday morning, May 12, of a heart attack at his farm home.

He was born May 17, 1895, in Evergreen Township, Sanilac County, the son of the late George and Elizabeth Darling. His entire life was spent in San-ilac County. He attended the Mc-Hugh School.

May is the time of the year when the weather hints at our taking the family outdoors for meals. Food that is cooked outof-doors always tastes special The fresh air, the odors of the food cooking and the fun of cooking and eating together in the open makes everybody hungry.

I hope that everyone will always follow these simple precauions to insure safety along with the fun. The precautions are: you should avoid foods that spoil readily. Such foods are cream pies, cream-filled cakes, fish and egg salads, mayonnaise dishes, sauces, gravies and creamed

cold until they are heated or eaten. Fhat means packing them in ice so they will keep cold until you get to the picnic area and are ready to eat. Otherwise, plan not to use such creamed foods if you are in doubt about being able to

CAR TRICKS

Now and again I like to pass along a suggestion or two I've picked up that may be of some help to you with a particular car problem.

Take, for instance, shallow dents your car might have acquired. These can often be 'popped out' with a good sized plumber's plunger. It's worth a try anyway. All you have to do is stick the rubber suction cup firmly over the dents after moistening the edges of the cup . . . then give the handle a steady pull.

> Or, if acid corrosion forming on your battery posts and cables is your particular problem -- try this: Simply brush some ordinary milk of magnesia over them. This should halt corrosion and make the cables easier to remove, when necessarv.

And here's another trick that might prove valuable to vacationers or travelling salesmen. To keep clothes neat and wrinkle-free take a rubber ring (you know the type your wife uses on.



device to help people hear better, not a cure for deafness." Normally, they said, sound waves flow through several chambers to reach the inner ear.

Auditory nerves then carry the signal to the brain. Any break or interruption in this chain can create a hearing problem. Then a louder noise is

needed to drive the sound waves into the inner ear. A hearing aid's miniature amplifier increases the sound vol-

ume enough to force the waves through any obstruction. Unfortunately, the U-M spe-cialists report, not every deaf person can use a hearing aid sucessfully. Older people often have a "discrimination problem" - they can hear people talking, but don't understand what is be-

ing said. The hearing nerve isn't functioning properly in these cases and is unable to carry the sound to the brain.

Other people have a "distortion problem" built into the ear. Raising the sound volume simply increases the amount of distortion.

Some individuals buy a hearing aid without seeing their doctor, only to find it doesn't improve their hearing. Consultation with a physician

can determine the type of prob-tem an individual has and whether a hearing aid can help. Special tests are sometimes needed to determine this. At the U-M Medical Center

tests are often given to see if surgery can restore hearing or if a hearing aid would be more beneficial.






