

Fewer boll weevils took cover in woods trash near cotton fields this past winter than last in seven cotton-producing States. The number that survives the winter, combined with weather conditions during the early part of the cotton fruiting period, will determine this insect' potential for damage to the 195 cotton crop. Lowest average count for an area were found in soul! Georgia — 145 weevils per acre and highest in northeastern Louis iana-5,756 per acre.


Sample counts of live boll wee vils in woods trash near cotton fields were made last fall by coop erating State and Federal worker in North Carolina, South Carolina Virginia, Georgia, Mississippi, Tennessee, and Louisiana.

South-central South Carolina trash contained an average of 995 live weevils per acre as compared with 3,978 for 1957. The average in the Coastal Plains of North Carolina and South Carolina was 4,625. The 1957 fall average for this area was 11.347.

In southwestern Virginia, wee-vils averaged 511 per acre, less than one-sixth the 3.335 average found for the same area in 1957 Georgia's average was 1,133 live veevils per acre of surface trash This is lower than the 8-year aver

age of 1,279. In Mississippi cotton fields, the everage number of weevils per acre was 3,792, compared with 6,716 for 1957 and 2,091 for 1956. Highest counts were in the central delta countles, which averaged 4,909

Laying Nests



Laying nests made from cans are attractive, easy to clean. To make these nests, cut down one corner of 5-gal. cans. Next, cut out half the top and half of the bottom pieces. Wheat Quota Vote Slated July 23

As required by present law, a wheat marketing quota referendum has been announced for July 23, Chairman Howard McKenzie of the Michigan Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee announced today.

Marketing quotas for the 1960 wheat crop have been proclaimed by the Secretary of Agriculture, as required by legislation when-ever the available supply of wheat is more than 20 per cent above the normal supply. However, quotas will not become effective unless they are approved by at least two-thirds of the producers voting in the referen-

If quotas are approved for the 1960 wheat crop, it will mark the seventh consecutive year they have been used for wheat. Wheat quotas and acreage allotments apply only in the 39 so-called "commercial" wheat states, of which Michigan is one.

explained, states that, to be eligi- will be selected from each county ble to vote in the referendum, a grower must expect to have more than 15 acres of wheat for harvest as grain in 1960. A wheat grower who signs an application under the feed wheat provision permitting him to produce up to 30 acres of wheat as feed on his farm will not be eligible to vote. Every wheat grower will be informed of the individual wheat allotment for his farm in advance

of the referendum date. As usual, Chairman McKenzie says, the ASC committee will set up polling places throughout the county for the convenience of farmers in voting. Locations will be announced later by the county ASC office.

Two Bean Test **Plots in County**

Two bean variety test plots were again planted in two separate bean growing areas of Tuscola county, reports Alfred Ballweg, county extension director. Cooperating in the planting of these test plots with the local farmer or bean grower are the Farm Crops Department of Michigan State University and the local county Cooperative Extension Service.

The purpose of these navy bean variety test plots, according to Ballweg, is to learn more about the field performance of varieties in the bean growing areas of Michigan. The test plots contain five varieties planted side by side. Four rows of each 200 ft. long and planted in some distance from the side of the cooperating farmer's own field of

Varieties included in the tests are Sanilac, Michelite, "211", 211-V and Strain C. Cooperating growers are Everett Starkey, Fairgrove township, and Charles Cousens, Wisner township. Actual comparative yield tests will be made of each variety at har-

Performance of these test plots in bean growing areas of Michi-gan is a big help in appraising the over-all performance of individual varieties.

Summer time is salad time. Salad variations are limited only by your imagination. A salad in ample portions can serve as a hearty main course with just the addition of rolls and desserts, or they can serve as an accompani-

A tempting salad is a crisp, fresh looking one; so prepare the greens, ingredients and dressing of time and chill all Closed Thurs. thoroughly. Then toss with a light hand and you will feel just as cool as the salad looks. Why don't you try experimenting with some new greens? The tossed green salad can have an added variety of flavor and appearance by adding spinach, beet greens, young dandelion greens, even nasturtium leaves along with your lettuce.

Do you always use the same kind of salad dressing for your salad? Next time try adding any of the following to your dressing: a few dashes of bottled meat sauce, a little garlic or onion sait, chopped pickle, poppy or dill seeds or hardcooked egg slices. Any one of these will heighten the flavor of salads.

Or, garnish that tossed salad with a flavorable bit that is also colorful; items such as croutons browned in garlic-flavored oil, crispy bits of bacon, thin strips of meat, pimento, nutmeats or crumbled cheese.

If you have a pepper mill, freshly ground black pepper gives your salads a flavor and a fragrance that you just cannot duplicate in the package.

Remember always to taste

your salad to see if it has enough 'zip" before you serve it. Garnish or marinate the greens of salads with a little dressing, if your family hesitates to eat

Everyday cole slaw will appear different when used with other vegetables or fruit. Just try a mound of cole slaw in a hollowed orange shell or a fresh tomato cup. In combining fresh fruit salad, you can get both color and pleasing flavor combinations.

The next time you make fruit salad, you might like to try this recipe for the dressing: To ½ cup French dressing add 1 tablespoon honey, 2 teaspoons lemon juice and 1 teaspoon of grated lemon rind.
