## Five Full Days Of Activities for Area Girl Scouts

For the past week, the Whispering Pines Girl Scout Camp has been the scene of activity as 222 Girl Scouts attended the annual Girl Scout Day Camp.

The girls from seven different communities were taken to the camp by school bus. Different communities represented are Cass City, Millington, Vassar, Unionville, Caro, Fairgrove and Tuscola.

The days started out at 9:30 with flag raising ceremonies. Then the girls divided up into fourteen units and departed to the woods. Once there, each unit had its own territory, where they conducted nature study seminars. The units were each given a name—Bluebird, Blackberry Lane, Raspberry Lane, Sunshine Camp, Busy Beaver and Brownie Palace are a few examples.

The girls did their own cooking and spent their time learning how to get along with nature and with each other.

Specifically, their projects included making nature notebooks and "Creatures," learning to tie knots and making "sit-upons" and picture frames.

The nature notebooks are handmade scrapbooks which the scouts filled with leaves, flowers and examples of nature. "Creatures" are faces made from newspapers. Knot tying classes were taught by three of the older scouts from Caro and picture frames were made from popsicle sticks. The unit programs also included a rest period and visiting other "camps".

The day ended at 3:30 as the flag was taken down. Once during the week, Mrs. Dorr Wiltzie gave a lecture on Indian Lore and the Rev. Willard Rohn, pastor of the Church of Christ in Vassar, gave a bird study program.

The camp, although in use by the scouts for the past three years through lease from the Cass City school system, finally became their own at dedication ceremonies Friday.

Since the doctors themselves could not be present, Mrs. Savage and Mrs. Merrill made the presentation for them.

The camp includes a cabin which once was an old schoolhouse, and an acre of land. The bell is still on the top of the building.

The property will be used to store equipment for day camps and will be available at any time to the Girl Scouts of Tuscola county for overnight troop camping.

The Rev. O. L. Ferris, pastor of the Church of the Nazarene in Vassar, gave the invocation and principal speaker was Mrs. Beatrice Berry, probate court registrar.

"Dr. Savage and Dr. Merrill have been friends of the Tuscola County Girl Scouts for 30 years. What finer thing could they have done as a living memorial than to give us this camp?" she said.

Also part of the dedication was the carrying of the symbols of fire, light and fire into the cabin. The Feast is to symbolize the Scouts will welcome any one who is hungry, the Fire is a symbol that everyone receives warmth of the hearth and the Light is a welcome to all nationalities and races.

## Local Contractor Receives Road Job

A local contractor was awarded a \$87,118 contract in Huron county which calls for 1.5 miles of 24-foot bituminous concrete surfacing on M-25, south from Main Street in Sebawaing, announced John C. Mackie, highway commissioner.

The contractor, C. R. Hunt, started the job July 8. Completion date is October 15, 1959.

## Gagetown Raising Needed Park Funds

The fund drive launched recently by the Gagetown Community Park Committee is progressing according to schedule with some \$1,100 worth of certificates sold, Mrs. Dennis Rocheleau announced this week.

With a concentrated effort in the next few days the goal of \$2,500 can be reached, authorities said.

Many of the drive captains have not yet reported and many prospects have still to be contacted. Committee members report that the captains have done an outstanding job and expressed appreciation for their aid.

Meanwhile, plans and work at the new park progress. The village council has approved the selection of an Akron concern to construct the multiple games court. Plans now call for the work to be completed in July. After the court is completed a series of dances will be held at the new court.

Definite completion of the court depends on how fast the certificates are purchased. They are available at the Gagetown post office and persons who plan to buy and have not yet done so are asked to make their purchase now so that the court can be built, authorities said.

In other activity at the court, the sign recently built and donated by Frank Sinclair has invoked praise from Gagetown area residents, Mrs. Rocheleau said.

## Swimming Classes Attract Over 150

Over 150 children are now enrolled in the Red Cross swimming classes at the Cass City Recreation Park which started Monday and will be held three times a week for a period of six weeks. The beginners classes were divided into two classes because so many enrolled. One has about 60 students and the other about 50. The intermediate class has from 15 to 20 and the swimmers class about 20. Eight are enrolled in the junior and senior life-saving class.

Of all the students attending the classes, 105 are from Unionville and only about 10 are from Cass City. The remaining students are from the surrounding communities.

The classes will be taught by Derek Romain for the first four weeks. Romain has taken instruction's courses and is on "loan" from the pool in Caro while Roger Parrish is attending summer school.

"The first two days went smoothly, with only one boy afraid of the water," said Romain.

## Harvest is Expected To Start This Week

Although no wheat has been brought in so far this year, experts at Farm Produce and Frutchey Bean Company are expecting the harvest to begin this week.

The Saginaw area started harvesting a few days ago and the Cass City area is always from a few days to a week behind them.

Reports have previously been that the yield will be below last year, but the granaries feel otherwise and say the outlook has been good.

One sample of certified Trail barley has been brought in to the Frutchey Bean Company. "It was a good sample even though it was too green. The moisture was 19.8 but the weight was good," said George Fisher.

Little interest was shown in an informative annual meeting of Cass City School district Monday night in the school auditorium when 12 persons heard several important issues discussed.

In the school election, Lester Ross was elected to succeed himself on the board of education. Sixteen votes were cast in the uncontested balloting.

The annual financial statement was read by Treasurer Mrs. W. E. Walpole and indicated that Cass City is one of the few districts in the area to operate in the black during the 1958-59 school year.

The report showed that there was a cash balance of \$15,719.69 as of June 30. Board authorities told electors that the money was not considered surplus but a necessary operating balance.

President Lester Ross told the members that since Cass City has become a fourth class school district it is not now mandatory to hold an annual meeting.

He asked for the opinions of electors present concerning the advisability of continuing the meeting when only some 12 to 15 persons attend and school board members are no longer elected at the meeting.

The sentiment was unanimous for continuing the meeting. One elector pointed out that things at the school are running smoothly and little interest is now evident. If controversial issues do arise the interest always increases and the annual meeting provides a spot for the issues to be aired.

On a motion by Glen Tuckey, the annual meeting was retained.

According to the financial report, teachers' expenses were slightly greater than in 1957-58. Instruction costs were \$217,112.29 last year and \$229,227.77 in the report issued Monday.

Administration costs were slightly less than in the previous year. A total of \$18,514.38 was spent last year and \$18,171.38 this year. The reduction in costs was in supplies and other expenses. Salaries of superintendent and assistants increased from \$8,901.92 to \$9,100.

**Tax Rate**  
Taxpayers in the district will pay at the same rate as they did last year. Operating millage was set at eight mills and debt at 2.5 mills for a total of 10.5 mills. The tax rate is the lowest in Tuscola County for a high school district.

**New Legislation**  
The bill in congress today asking that all rural school districts either consolidate with a high school district or operate a high school was discussed at length. It is because of this bill that residents of the Deford area are thinking of consolidating with Cass City, it was pointed out by Mr. Ross.

Electors discussed whether annexation or consolidation would be the proper procedure for Deford. Some electors favored immediate action if Deford agreed and others said that they felt it would be wise to wait until the law is in force.

Board members said that they had an open mind about the proposition and several attended the Deford meeting Monday to learn more about the issue.

**Other Business**  
In other items the electors approved transporting students who live a mile from the school. The state pays only for pupils who live at least a mile and a half from the school. The local district will pay for the portion of costs not paid by the state.

Willis Campbell said that 96,000 meals were served in the school cafeteria during the year. He also pointed out that the athletic program at the school cost \$2,217 more than net receipts.

**Officers Elected**  
After the meeting, the board named officers for 1959-60. All officers were re-elected. Lester Ross is president and Mrs. W. E. Walpole is treasurer. Serving as secretary will be Dr. D. E. Rawson. Trustees of the board are Luke Tuckey and James R. Gross.

## Lon Decker Buys Mobil Service

Lon Decker announced this week that he has purchased the equipment and stock of the Mobil service station on Main Street in Cass City.

The station will be known as Lon's Mobil Service. Mr. Decker previously had been manager of the station for Neeb Corporation of Bad Axe.

A formal opening announcement will be made next week, Mr. Decker said.



**BARN DEMOLISHED**—A fire of undetermined origin completely destroyed this barn and contents Tuesday evening at the Lee Hendrick farm, seven and a half miles east of Cass City.

Although there were no crops or livestock in the barn, several machinery items were lost including a one-year-old combine, plow, corn picker and other items.

Mr. Hendrick speculated that the blaze may have started from either the heat from his combine which had just been welded or from a spark from his tractor.

## Referendum Voting Scheduled July 23

Voting for the referendum on marketing quotas for the 1960 wheat crop will be held on July 23. Elkland and Novesta Townships will vote at Oliver Implement Store, Cass City, and Elkington and Elmwood Townships will vote at the Elkington Town hall. Polls will open at 8:00 a.m. and close at 6:00 p.m.

Farmers who are eligible to vote in the wheat quota referendum are all those who in 1960 will have more than 15 acres of wheat for harvest as grain on a farm, except those who are participating in the 1959 feed wheat program.

If at least two-thirds of the growers who vote in the referendum approve the quotas, they will remain in effect for the 1960-crop wheat and price support will be available to farmers who comply with their farm wheat allotments at least 75 per cent of parity. Farmers who exceed the larger of the farm allotment or 15 acres will be subject to a marketing penalty of 45 per cent of the wheat parity price on their "excess" wheat.

If the quotas are not approved by at least two-thirds of the growers voting, the quotas and penalties will not be in effect, and price support will be available to farmers who comply with their farm wheat allotments at 50 per cent of parity, as directed by law. At current parity levels, that would be about \$1.18 per bushel.

## Home Extension Agent's Corner

Frances T. Clark  
County Home Demonstration Agent

This is the last week that the homemakers who are planning on attending the full Homemakers' Conference can register. The program this year is very well planned and everyone attending should find it stimulating and interesting. You can get registration blanks from my office.

I was wondering, do you really know how long frozen foods will stay safe and keep their quality in your frozen food storage compartment or freezer? Have you attempted to freeze some foods without much success? Or have you wondered just what your freezer-storage compartment will do satisfactorily? It will depend, of course, on the temperature your storing unit maintains, plus the humidity and the amount of air that can get to the food.

Do you have a refrigerator frozen-storage compartment, an ice cube section, a freezer-storage compartment, or a freezer? These questions may sound alike, but there are definite differences in storage temperatures. You should first check the instruction book that came with your piece of equipment because this will give the temperature the frozen food storage unit should maintain.

The cool storage or regular refrigerator will hold unfrozen foods in a cool state with temperatures from 40 to 60 degrees F. An ice cube section will range from 20 to 30 degrees F. Many refrigerators have a 1 to 2 cubic foot frozen-food storage compartment. It may be one of two types: one has a temperature of around 15 degrees F; the other has a temperature of around 0 degrees F. In this latter dual purpose unit, the cool storage and frozen storage compartments are physically separated by an insulated partition and have separate thermostat controls and separate coils and refrigerator systems.

Frozen foods held at 15 degrees F. more than 2 to 4 weeks will show signs of loss of quality and have an off taste. Frozen foods held in the 0 to 5 or 10 degrees F. frozen-food storage compartments can be held somewhat longer. Frozen foods held in the freezer at 0 degrees F. and below, depending upon the food, can be held safely from 8 to 9 months.

Some refrigerator-freezer combinations, in an attempt to satisfy two needs, do neither job properly. Others are very satisfactory as frozen-food storage, for already frozen foods, but will not freeze any quantity of food well. An over-all summary might be, as for the freezing of foods, any major quantity should be done in a freezer holding temperatures of 0 degrees F. to 10 degrees F.

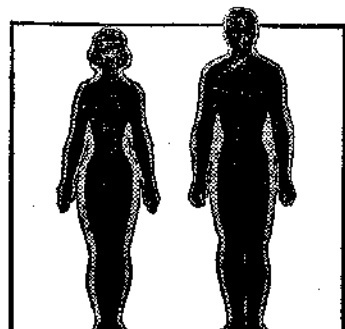

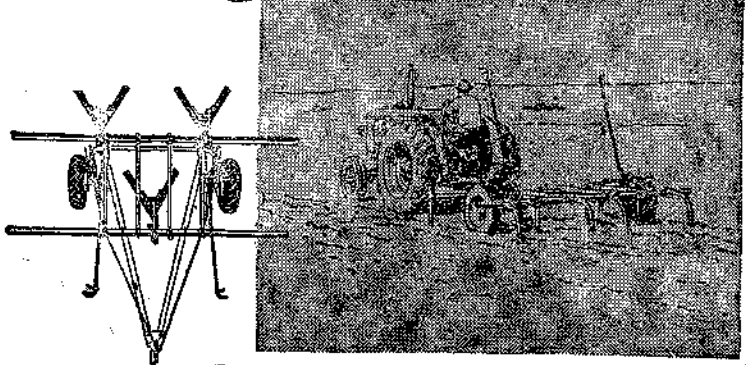

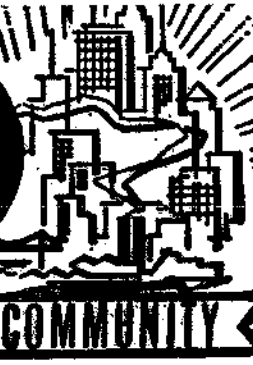

## Reapportionment is Disputed in Senate

Democrats are starting another statewide fight for reapportionment of the Legislature. The Democratic State Central Committee June 28 decided to form a committee to plan for reapportionment, a drive that has new significance for Democrats because of the 1959 deadlock in the Legislature over state finances.

\*\*\*\*  
The State Central Committee acted after party members in the 14th Congressional district adopted a statement blaming the legislative stalemate on "the undemocratic reapportionment system which permits Republicans to subvert the needs of the state to satisfy their own and their party's selfish ends."

Democrats claim areas for the Senate, a Republican stronghold by a 22-12 margin, are gerrymandered to Republican advantage.

\*\*\*\*  
The State Senate seats were put into the constitution in 1962 by voters.

Democrats are expected to circulate petitions to put the reapportionment issue on the ballot. It would take signatures totaling 10 per cent of the votes cast for governor in the last election. This would be 231,218 based on the Nov. 4, 1958, turnout.

\*\*\*\*  
There is little chance for Democrats to get the issue on the ballot through legislative action. It would require a two-thirds vote of both houses to submit the issue to the people.

Senate Democratic leader Harold Ryan, Detroit, said the proposal "wouldn't get to first base" in the Senate.

Democratic unhappiness with the present district lineup in the Senate was behind their refusal to endorse the proposal for constitutional revision that was on the ballot in November.

Delegates for the constitutional convention would be elected from present State districts.

\*\*\*\*  
Some Democrats would like to see outright abolishment of the Senate and creation of a unicameral Legislature.

A more likely proposal would be for the addition of seats that would be nominated by parties and elected at-large.

Democrats say the addition of at-large lawmakers would give the population centers a bigger

voice in the Senate without stirring up opposition by taking seats away from Republicans. But any attempt at reapportionment will be more than a struggle for power between Republicans and Democrats.

\*\*\*\*  
It boils down to a fight between urban and rural areas.

East and west Michigan settled differences and reached agreement on a proposal to give special names to North-South highway routes in Michigan.

\*\*\*\*  
The Legislature passed a bill to designate US-131 from the Indiana border to Kalamazoo as the Mackinac Trail; M-73 and M-66 from the border to Kalamazoo as the Green Arrow Route, and US-131 from Kalamazoo to the Mackinac Bridge as the Green Arrow Route-Mackinac Trail.

The highway designation proposals were among the first to be made in the 1959 Legislature. It took about six months to work out a compromise.

\*\*\*\*  
A bill to designate a West Michigan Mackinac Trail was defeated after East Michigan interests said it would not be historically accurate. The original Mackinac Trail used by Indians went north from Saginaw.

The original Green Arrow proposal was threatened in the Senate where backers of the Mackinac Trail bill said the state couldn't have one without the other.

\*\*\*\*  
But all differences were settled to enable passage of the package bill that combined the two designations.

All roads—including the Mackinac Trail and the Green Arrow Route—lead to the Mackinac Straits for Michigan sightseers. The heavy Fourth of July influx indicated the Mackinac Bridge is still a major tourist attraction.

Ever since the Bridge was opened in November of 1957, the docks used by the Mackinac Straits ferries have been considered surplus property by the state.

But the Waterways Commission, which assumes jurisdiction over the docks under a bill cleared by both houses of the Legislature, said the docks have big potential.

The bill gives the commission jurisdiction over the docks at St. Ignace and Mackinaw City. The two communities would retain portions of the docks for auto parking. The state would get a share of the parking receipts.

Commissioner director Keith Olson said the Commission plans to spend about \$100,000 in buying the \$4,500,000 docks, which have been deteriorating since the state ferry fleet was mothballed.

The Arnold Line and the Straits Transit Line, ferry lines to Mackinac Island, have been given leases to operate from the docks this summer.

The Straits Transit Line in-

cludes former state ferry workers who purchased one of the ferries for mainland-to-Mackinac Island service and tourist cruises.

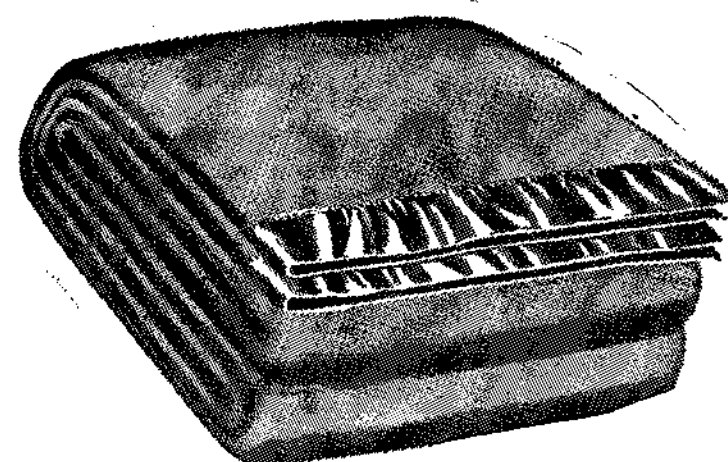

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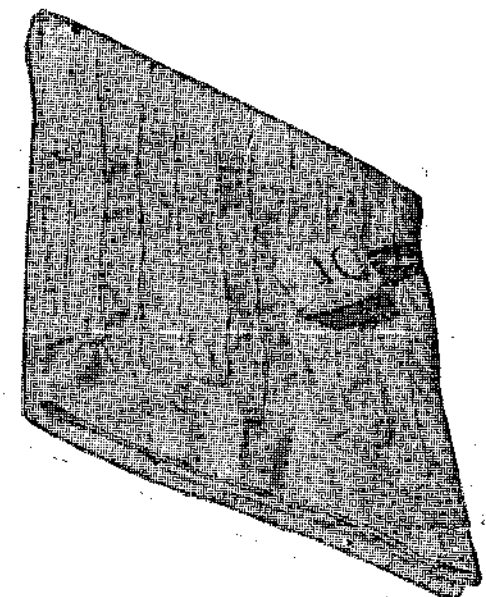

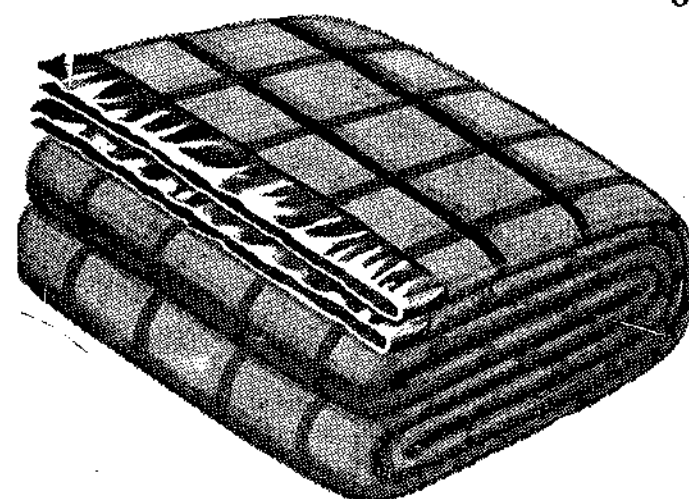
