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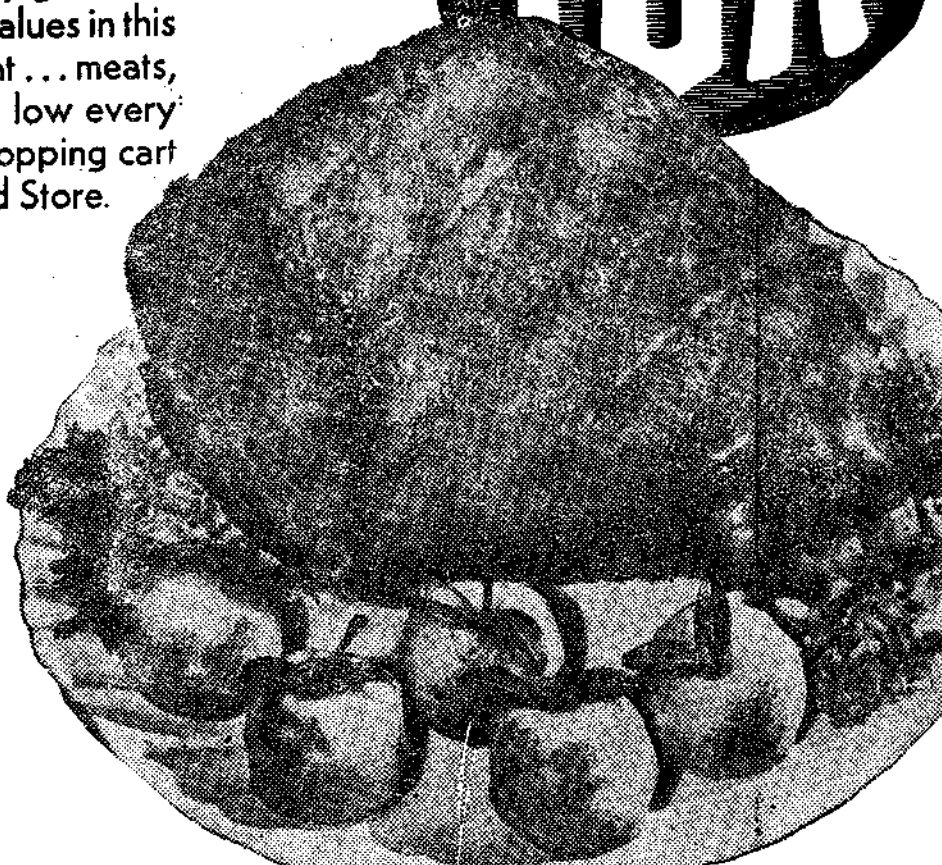

Home Extension Agent's Corner

This is the time of the year when clothes moths and carpet beetles are busy. Most of us can recognize a clothes moth, but can you recognize a carpet beetle when you see one?

Carpet beetles can do as much damage as moths, and their work is often blamed on moths. They feed on woolen fabrics, furs, feathers, down, bristles, mohair, or anything that contains wool or other animal fibers.

The carpet beetle is attracted to light and you may find them around the window sill. That is one sign of an infestation in the house. The beetles are small in size, measuring not more than one-eighth inch long and the color may be all black, or a mottled red, black and white.

The adult beetle does not do damage; the small larvae or grubs are the ones that do damage to carpets and clothing. The grubs have a hairy appearance with blackish or brownish bristles at the small end of the body.

The control of carpet beetles begins with good housekeeping. Regular use of the vacuum cleaner, especially under heavy pieces of furniture, removes lint on which larvae feed.

Insecticides are needed to eliminate an infestation of carpet beetles, and you can find good commercial preparations on the market. Be sure you buy one that is labeled for use in the home.

Read the list of active ingredients. Chlordane in a 2 per cent solution or dieldrin in a 1/2 per cent solution is recommended for carpet beetles. Spray the solution into cracks, around the edge of a room or closet, but do not spray throughout the room. An aerosol spray is not so effective since the mist is too fine, and very little deposit is left on any surface. A spray with a heavier mist leaves more concentrated deposits which are needed if the insecticide is to be most effective.

If there are places where it is difficult to spray, you might prefer to use a dust. Look for preparations containing a 5 per cent chlordane or a 1 per cent dieldrin dust. Again, this is used only around the edges of a room, or in cracks under the rug.

Good housekeeping again is the best way to beat the clothes moths. This means storing clean clothes in a clean place.

Let the vacuum cleaner help you dust closets, shelves, chests and even boxes in which clothes

will be stored. The vacuum does a better job of removing lint and dirt - food for moth larvae than does a dust mop. It also removes any deposits of insects and eggs that might be hidden under the baseboards. After the thorough cleaning, I would like to suggest you burn the contents of the vacuum bag.

After the storage place is thoroughly cleaned, spray the areas with a 3 per cent to 5 per cent DDT solution; be sure to follow directions on the package. Cover all cracks and openings in the walls and baseboards, and use enough spray to create a cloud or fog in the area.

Good housekeeping also suggests eliminating other breeding places for moths. These pests like to invade old clothes and feather hats stored in the attic. They like to find old wool rugs piled in the basement. Once moths get started in your home, it's just a short trip to the good clothes in your bedroom closet. Here's for a summer free from carpet beetles and clothes moths.

Attorneys Seek New Constitution

A new drive opened in Lansing to help Michigan get a new constitution.

A number of prominent attorneys want the Supreme Court to in effect order the State Board of Canvassers to rule enough votes were cast in November to call a constitutional convention.

In November, 821,282 voters favored calling a constitutional convention to rewrite the present Michigan charter, adopted in 1908. Only 608,365 opposed the proposal.

But, because of a 1949 ruling, the majority vote in November was not enough to call a convention. The State Board of Canvassers ruled that year a majority of all "those voting in the election," not just a majority of those voting on the question itself, was necessary to call the convention. The Supreme Court upheld the board's ruling.

Two figures in the 1949 case have new roles in the 1959 case. Both are from Port Huron.

Attorney General Eugene F. Black, now a State Supreme Court justice, carried the board's ruling to the high court in 1949, with an assist from his deputy, Peter E. Bradt.

Bradt, now a Port Huron attorney, helped draft the petition asking the Supreme Court to reconsider the 1949 opinion.

Bradt noted revision was approved five times between 1849 and 1904 by a majority of those voting on the issue.

James E. Haggerty, Michigan State Bar president, was among the petitioners seeking reconsideration.

Only two justices signing the 1949 opinion, John R. Dethmers and Leland W. Carr, are still on the court.

The petition they will consider argues the present constitution leaves Michigan in "governmental and economic helplessness."

One of the latest amendments to the constitution allows the Legislature to make provisions for continuity of government in event of enemy attack.

The Legislature, at the urging of Civil Defense officials, took advantage of the amendment and passed two continuity of government bills, one for state government and one for local government.

The governor would be required to appoint three "emergency interim successors" who would assume the governor's duties if the governor and the Administrative Board are "unavailable" because of enemy attack.

Administrative Board members and officers of local government would appoint five interim successors.

Sponsors of the legislation issued this statement:

"While we pray that it will never be necessary to function under these bills, if we do have to, then these bills may be the most important measures before the legislature this session.

"World tensions are mounting; atomic weapons are becoming more powerful; the means of delivering paralyzing destruction throughout the world are multiplying. There is no reason to panic or to become frightened. We do need, however, to plan and prepare insofar as human ingenuity permits for enemy attack and resultant disaster."

\$1,500,000 equals three minutes saved for thousands of drivers.

The name of Sen. John Stahlin (R-Belding) was not included in all of the advance publicity put out by the State Highway Department before ribbon-cutting ceremonies early in July for the new US-16 expressway that bypasses Portland, a community in Stahlin's district.

But what Stahlin said at the ceremonies made the department take notice.

"I checked the savings in time in traveling over the old highway through Portland as against traveling over the new \$1,500,000 limited access highway and I found that by observing all traffic regulations, including stopping at the traffic light at the foot of the hill in Portland, three minutes were saved in traveling over the new route," he said.

Stahlin, one of the most active and most quoted of the freshman lawmakers, devoted his maiden speech early in the legislative session to the Highway Department. He said he was amazed at the number of "drumbeaters" the department had on its public relations staff.

The Belding Republican recently was on the losing side of a floor debate, and returned to his seat, where he found a telegram that made him remark, "at least the people back home like me."

The telegram was from Dale Stafford, Greenville editor, who praised Stahlin for his fight for Freedom of Information legislation.

Much of the legislation passed in Lansing this year was designed to meet special problems in a specific community—but may affect other communities later on.

One such piece of legislation was a bill to permit Royal Oak to proceed with redevelopment of its central business district.

The bill, which has been signed into law, permits money borrowed to build present parking lots to be repaid with money raised through special assessments on business property.

Lawmakers said this bill may be used by other municipalities.
