



WOULD-BE INVENTORS

I was reading in a motoring magazine the other day about some of the fantastic invention ideas car manufacturers are always receiving from amateur inventors. I was quite amused by some of the suggestions and thought you might be, too. Here's a sample of some of the "Why don't they" ideas mentioned in the article:



Have rain catchers installed on the roofs of cars so that radiators could be supplied automatically with water.

Equip cars with a whistle or bell which would blow or clang when the speedometer registered 50 miles an hour.







> Deductions from the wool and lamb payments under the new cent per pound for shorn wool and five cents per hundredweight for unshorn lambs. These are the same rates that have been in effect each marketing year since 1955, when the wool program was started.

> If producers who have twothirds of the volume of production represented in the referendum approve, then the agreement will be extended for three years and the payment deductions will continue to be made.

This year, the Board has been to Michigan what the Joint Chiefs of Staff is to the Penta-

Urgency and secrecy prevail when the Board meets to decide how to meet the pressing problems it faces.

These are the men who, with Williams, exercise control over all | ment. state agencies and institutions:

Lt. Gov. John B. Swainson--He is acting governor when Williams is out of town and presides over the Administrative Board meet-

ings when the Governor is absent. Although he carries no vote as president and presiding officer in the GOP dominated Senate, Swainson has been a valuable liaison man between the Executive and Legislative branches.

Swainson, a World War II double-amputee; directed much of stall off creditors. the effort to cash in the 50-million-dollar Veterans' Trust Fund. Of all "cabinet members," the

Sec. of State James M. Hare--Although he directs a far-flung state. agency operation, Hare's role in the cash crisis has been confined primarily to committee sessions within the Administrative Board. He was assigned to help look out for employe welfare during periods of payless paydays.

Hare feels he has made an indirect contribution to easing the cash crisis through his efforts to inaugurate programs of government economy and efficiency.

His non-crisis duties include operation of elections and motor vehicle services. His 225 branch offices throughout the state provide the bulk of the patronage jobs available in state govern-

Hare's primary interest has been in the field of traffic safety.

Atty. General Paul L. Adams--The legality of the Board's unprecedented action in halting pay checks was carefully screened by Adams. He also has been called upon to review proposals to ease the cash crisis.

As chief legal enforcement officer of the state, his duties have been greatly increased during a time when the state has had to





Remove the silk from the ears. then pack the husks back tightly around the ears. Place husks on hot coals or on rack over hot coals. As the corn is roasting, turn often. Corn will be done when kernels begin turning slightly brown. It will take around 15 to 20 minutes.




