Walbro Declares First Dividend For Stockholders

Walbro Corporation this week announced the first dividend payment in the history of the company as officials authorized 50 cents a share to shareholders of record Dec. 1. The checks were mailed today.

The dividend payment came a little over five years after the company began operations in Cass City. Since that time Walbro has experienced a rapid growth. Besides establishing a wholly owned subsidiary in Omro, Wis., to handle increasing carburetor orders and more than doubling the size of manufacturing space for carburetors in Cass City, the company purchased Autopulse electric fuel pump company.

The Autopulse division of the company required another building, erected by the Cass City Development Corporation, on Walbro property for manufacture of pumps and fuel lifters. Most recent addition to the company is the Arjay Manufacturing Company of Vassar, a plastics manufacturing plant.

Fox Receives ROTC Lieutenant's Bars

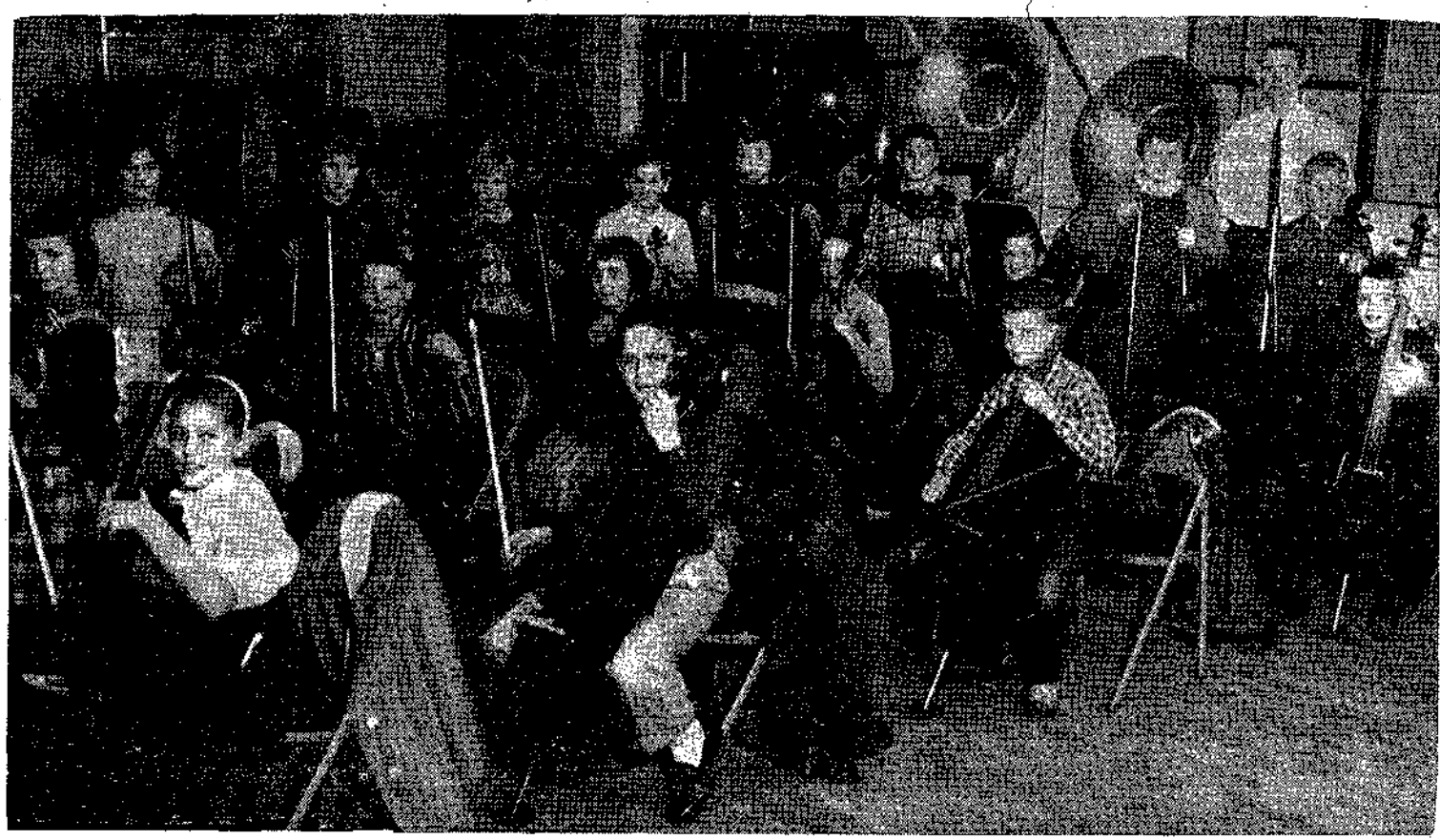

Former Resident of Cass City Buried

Frank R. Curtis died Wednesday, Dec. 2, at the Veterans Memorial Hospital in Dearborn where he had been a patient two weeks. He had been ill the past 10 years.

Mr. Curtis was born in Snover, Jan. 10, 1895, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. William and Elizabeth Lindsay Curtis. He married Miss Jennie E. Painter Dec. 21, 1921, in Snover. Following their marriage they made their home in Royal Oak for 28 years before returning to this community.

Mr. Curtis served in the United States Army, enlisting May 26, 1918, and being discharged July 19, 1919. He was a member of the Mizpah United Missionary Church.

Surviving are: his wife; one daughter, Mrs. Paul (Kathryn) Perreault of Troy; one son, Gerald Curtis of Royal Oak; one brother, Bruce Curtis of Applegate, and eight grandchildren.

Funeral services were held at the Mizpah United Missionary church Saturday. The Rev. Louis Sherrard officiated. Committal services at Mooretown cemetery were under the auspices of Tri-County Post 507.

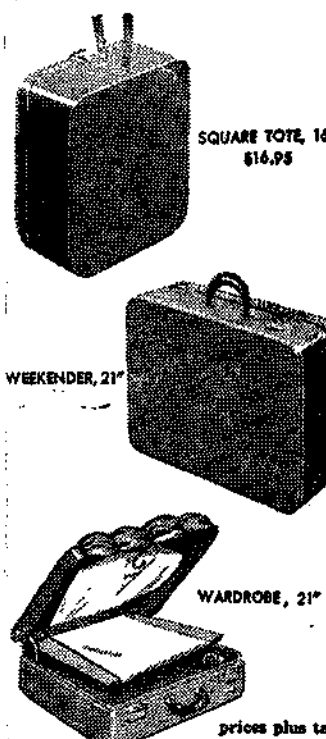



Michigan Mirror

Lobbying Causes Complaints in State Legislature

Lobbying activities in the Capitol this year have prompted more complaints than usual. More, in fact, than during any year since the mid-forties, when the Carr-Sigler grand jury investigated influence peddling.

The lobbyists insist there is no justification for making them scapegoats for Michigan's longest legislative session.

The 200-member "Third House" considers itself a part of state government—the voice of those taxed and regulated by government.

Big business took the brunt of complaints.

Gov. G. Mennen Williams blamed "the intervention of lobbyists for a few business interests" for Michigan's tax deadlock. He said they blocked a settlement months ago in the Senate.

Although acknowledging they

evaluated carefully information supplied by lobbyists, Republican tax experts said nobody dictated their votes.

A scare was thrown into the ranks of some cloakroom closeters when Secretary of State James M. Hare said "it has come to our attention that some of those promoting and advocating" on the sidelines of the tax battle were not formally registered.

Hare reminded that failure of a legislative agent to register is a felony, carrying a maximum fine of \$1,000 and a one-year jail sentence.

Under law, legislative agents must pay a \$5 registration fee and "keep a record of expenditures."

Protests were heard about the lobbying on key measures other than tax legislation.

Outraged opponents of passage of bills on horse racing, small loans, and reflectorized license

plates complained of lobby tactics.

But the protests were tame compared to the charges that set off the grand jury investigation of wholesale bribery in the forties.

Repeal of a controversial law requiring reflectorized license plates has been proposed and may be passed before the law goes into effect.

The law as written would not go into effect until 90 days after the 1959 Legislature adjourns. As the tax deadlock kept lawmakers in session longer than expected, the reflectorized plate law was not in effect as planned when license tabs went on sale Nov. 1.

Motorists who buy their tabs before the bill goes into effect will not have to pay the 85-cent fee designed to build a fund to buy the reflectorized material.

But the delay issue was not the main factor in the move for repeal. There were complaints of

"rigging" and "junktets" against the Minnesota Mining and Manufacturing Co., which produced reflectorized material. And some state officials were less than enthusiastic about the safety value of reflectorization.

The Minnesota firm complained "false impressions" were circulated in Lansing along with the complaints about lobbying on the reflectorized plate bill.

It denied writing specifications for the bill, and said there was no truth to reports that Michigan legislators were wine, dined and otherwise entertained by the company in St. Paul.

Poverty may be the rule in Michigan's general fund but there is wealth elsewhere in the state plagued by recurrent financial troubles.

A Michigan State University publication reports Michigan has more millionaires than Texas—in

fact more of them than all but four states.

The report came out about the same time the State Administrative board emptied the state's general fund by releasing available money for schools, payrolls and welfare.

Another example to counter reports that Michigan is a pauper state came from figures released by Business Week magazine.

The publication showed Michigan's personal income increase in September of this year when compared to last year was the third largest in the nation.

Michigan's increase was 11.4 per cent. Florida has 13.5 per cent and Alaska 12.7 per cent.

Government has been getting a big bite of this income.

The MSU report said Michigan residents in almost all income brackets pay a higher effective rate of taxes than do Americans generally.

Home Extension Agent's Corner
Francis T. Clark
County Home Demonstration Agent

I think that happy talk and happy times around the dinner table are more important for a child than forcing him to eat everything on his plate. A child most always eats better if mealtime is a pleasant occasion.

Of course, there are foods recommended for the small child to help him grow and develop best. I think parents can guide children to form good eating habits by understanding how children develop and how they normally react at various age levels.

For instance, a three-year-old may eat more of important foods if you save his milk until last. A whole glass of milk nearly fills him up, and he may not want to eat so much when he drinks milk first.

Children of all ages enjoy an attractive table, and food that looks colorful on the plate. They like to pour milk from their own pitchers and to eat with their own spoons.

The above points plus other points are given in an excellent bulletin that I have in my office. If anyone would care for this bulletin, entitled "Meal-time for Little Folks", call OS 3-3161 or contact my office. This bulletin also has a guide for planning a day's meals for children from one to six years old. It also includes suggested menus the whole family may enjoy.

I have an excellent recipe for Fruit-Nut Bread I would like to pass on to you for your Christmas baking:

2 packages dry yeast
1/2 cup warm water (110-115 degrees)
3/4 cup scalded milk
1/4 cup sugar
1 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons soft shortening
1/2 cup chopped nuts (or 1/4 cup nuts and 1/4 cup raisins)
1/2 cup cut-up fruits
3 cups sifted all-purpose flour

Add the yeast to the warm water. Let stand. Pour the scalded milk into a large bowl. Add the sugar and salt. Blend together and cool until lukewarm. Stir yeast mixture well and add to milk mixture. Add shortening, nuts, fruits and flour. Mix to blend well. Scrape down batter from sides of bowl. Cover and let rise in warm place 30 to 45 minutes or until doubled. Beat 20 to 25 strokes. Spoon into four No. 2 greased tin cans filling 1 1/2 full, or into one bread pan, 5x9x3 inches. Cover and let rise in warm place - until dough is within 1-inch of top of cans. Bake 30 to 40 minutes in preheated quick moderate oven (375 degrees). Re-

1 No. 2 1/2 can (29 ounces) IGA fruit cocktail
1 envelope Knox gelatine
1 1/2 cups commercially prepared eggnog

1/4 teaspoon salt
1 1/2 teaspoons IGA vanilla
1/4 teaspoon almond flavoring
1 cup whipping cream
1 9-inch baked pie shell

Drain fruit cocktail thoroughly; measure 1/2 cup of the syrup. Stir gelatine into syrup; place over boiling water and stir until gelatine is dissolved. Remove from heat; stir into eggnog. Add salt and flavorings. Chill until mixture mounds when dropped from a spoon. Whip cream; fold into gelatine mixture along with 1 1/2 cups well drained fruit cocktail. Chill again 5 to 10 minutes, until mixture mounds. Heap into baked and cooled pastry shell. Decorate with remaining fruit cocktail. Chill 2 to 4 hours. Makes 1 (9-inch) pie.



PEACH MINCE PIE

Spread mincemeat in bottom of pastry lined pan, and top with drained peach slices. (1 #2 1/2 can to 1 1/2 cups mincemeat). Bake in 425 degree F. oven 25 minutes. Cover with meringue and bake until brown. Serve warm.

OUR FRUIT CAKE

2 cups moist IGA mincemeat
1 1/2 cups coarsely chopped pecans
1/3 cup diced candied orange peel
1/3 cup diced candied lemon peel
1/3 cup diced candied pineapple
1/3 cup thinly sliced citron
1/3 cup halved candied cherries

3/4 cup chopped dates
3/4 cups flour
1 cup sugar
1 teaspoon salt
3 eggs, beaten
3/4 cup Kraft Oil
2 teaspoons vanilla
1 1/2 teaspoons soda
2 tablespoons boiling water
Lengthwise sliced Brazil nuts
Maraschino cherries

Combine the mincemeat, pecans and fruit. Sift together the flour, sugar and salt and add to the fruit mixture, stirring until well mixed. Combine the eggs, oil and vanilla and add to the fruit mixture. Dissolve the soda in the boiling water and stir into the batter, mixing until well blended. Pour into a 10-inch tube pan lined with heavy brown paper.

Bake in a very moderate oven, 300°, for 2 1/2 hours. Decorate the top with maraschino cherries and the sliced Brazil nuts.

1-2/3 cups candied fruit mix may be substituted for the orange and lemon peel, pineapple, citron and cherries. Makes 4 1/4 pounds of fruit cake.

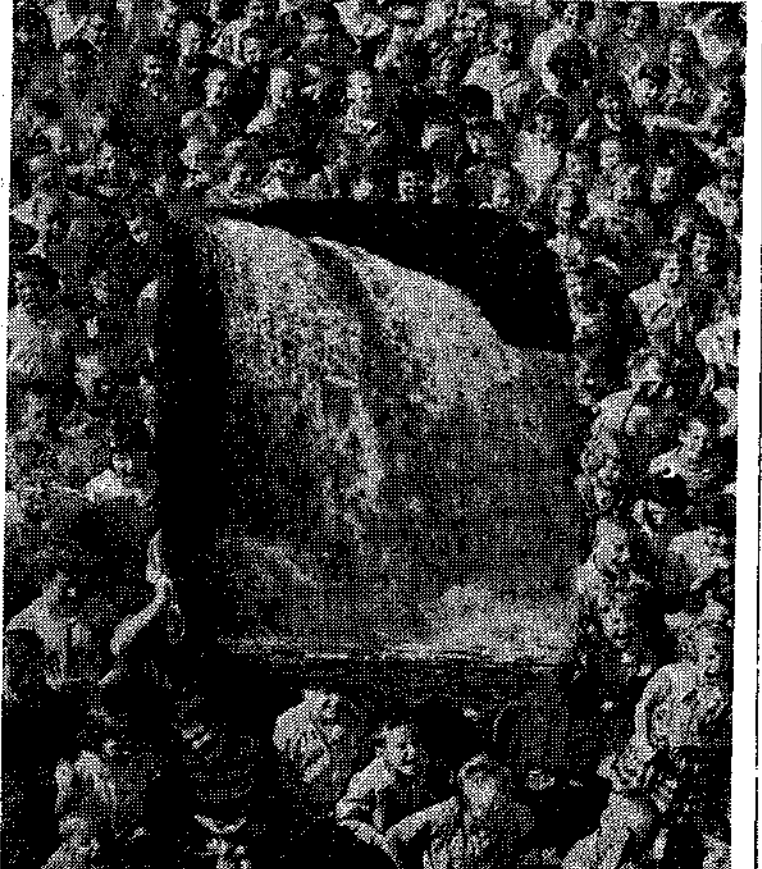



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Select Right Coat Says Home Agent

If there's one article of clothing you wear the longest, most often, and pay the most for, it's probably your coat. So one of the first secrets of dressing well is to select the "right" coat, says Mrs. Frances T. Clark, county extension agent in home economics. A good choice will help coordinate your wardrobe.

Many women have a "one and only" coat and expect up to five years of wear from it. In this case, Mrs. Clark suggests a classic style that goes well with suits, tailored dresses and special occasion outfits. The high-style coat is very quickly dated, and will not be fashionable for many years. It's safer to choose a classic style, then dramatize it with high-fashion accessories. These less-expensive items can be replaced to keep pace with fashion changes.

The woman who wears a coat to work every day may not expect her coat to last so long, and may choose more unusual style features. She can observe current fashion trends and select a style that's just coming in—rather than one that's been here for several years and is on its way out.

Color of the coat is one key to a coordinated wardrobe. Basic colors like beige, grey, brown or black get along with many colors. A little more limited is the soft, greyed blue or the cinnamon shades of brown being worn with either black or brown. Ladies young-or young-in-heart—often prefer a shade of red.

If you have children—or grandchildren—they may help determine the color of your coat. Small children often like to sit on your lap while riding in the car, and a darker shade shows fewer shoe marks than a light beige or gray. If there is a very small baby to hold, however, the very dark browns and black will show lint shed by baby clothes and baby blankets.

New violet shades include rich pansy purple, fuschia and gentian.

Greens range from emerald to pale nils or "lettuce" green.

Browns continue to reign high in the fashion picture and their range is from deep sepia to the palest beige which looks very sophisticated in sheers as well as heavier failles and satins.
