Shoplifter Pays  
Fine in Local  
Justice Court

A Caro woman was caught shoplifting in Cass City Saturday.

Mrs. Hazel V. Walker, 60, pleaded guilty before Justice Reva M. Little Saturday to being a disorderly person. She paid a fine and costs of \$19.30.

Police Chief William Wood arrested her after she had been observed taking merchandise valued at \$28.45 from Federated and H. J. Smith stores.

Przybycki Killed  
In Head-on Crash

Andrew M. Przybycki of Cass City was instantly killed in a head-on collision Saturday night on M-81, about two and a half miles west of Cass City.

Mr. Przybycki, 29, was driving east and Glenn McQueen, 25, was driving west when the accident occurred, according to a statement related to Sheriff's Deputy Carl Palmateer by a sister of Mrs. Przybycki, the wife of the accident victim said that she and her husband observed the McQueen car weaving down the road and slowed down. The car then went on the left of the road and the Przybycki car attempted to swerve to the opposite side of the road to avoid the collision. As they did the McQueen car started back towards the left and the two cars collided in the center of the road.

Mr. McQueen told officers that he didn't remember anything about the accident or about events leading to the crash.

Mr. McQueen suffered a front skull fracture, a broken rib, lacerations of the legs and shock. He is recovering at Pleasant Home Hospital.

Advertises One;  
Sells Three Calves

Lyle Roach got more than he bargained for when he ran an advertisement recently in the liner section of the Chronicle.

The ad was a Swiss deacon bull calf for sale. The calf advertised was sold as soon as the paper hit the news-stands Wednesday.

Time Runs Out  
For Earl Dibble  
In Circuit Court

Earl Dibble of Kingston found out Wednesday, Dec. 16, that there is a limit to even the patience of a circuit court judge.

Hauled before Judge T. C. Quinn in Caro for at least the fourth time on a complaint by the state fire marshal for not cleaning the site of a razed building in Kingston, he was sentenced to the Tuscola County Jail until the area is cleaned and graded.

"But Judge," the reluctant Kingstonite said, "I'll have the job done in two more days."

Judge Quinn replied, "In that case you won't have long to stay in the county jail."

Mr. Dibble's last of many appearances in court prior to the contempt sentence was Oct. 14 when Judge Quinn granted another extension in the time allotted for cleaning the property . . . this one for 30 days. It proved to be not enough for Dibble, but too much for Judge Quinn.

Hawks Post First  
Cage Win of Year

Cass City won its first game of the young basketball season Friday, posting a 46-20 decision over the Caro Tigers on Caro's spacious floor.

The win evened the team's record in Thumb B Conference competition at one win and one loss and served notice to the remainder of the teams in the league that the Hawks are still to be reckoned with in the championship chase.

In the first quarter it looked as if this might be the year that the Hawks were going to have the "bad" year that fans in other communities have been predicting for the last 10 seasons.

Unable to hit on shots relatively close to the bucket, Cass City converted only two field goals in the entire first stanza and trailed at the end of the period, 7-4.

Coach Irv Claseman sent his charges into a full court press in the next two periods and the Tigers were unable to cope with the defense and the Hawks salted away a victory in the two quarters.

Paced by Gary Hutchinson who caught fire on shots around the foul circle to pour in six buckets, Cass City roared to a 16-4 advantage and 20-11 halftime margin.

In the next period they continued to pull away as they netted 13 points on balanced scoring while holding the Tigers to six points.

The game was even in the final quarter as Claseman gave his bench an opportunity to play most of the final half of the last period.

Cass City netted 13 points and the Tigers, 12.

Cass City's percentage from the free throw line improved greatly compared to the team's effort against Mt. Pleasant. They hit only seven of 23 tries against the Oilers while they made eight of 12 attempts against Caro. The Tigers were also accurate from the charity circle, converting 13 of 17 attempts.

Gary Hutchinson was the leading scorer for the evening as he led both teams with 19 points on nine buckets and one of two free throws.

Despite their slow start, the Hawks finished the game with a creditable shooting percentage as they hit 33 per cent of their tries from the field. Caro hit just 28 per cent of its tries.

Reserves Lose

The Cass City reserves lost their third straight game of the season as the Caro reserves rallied in the last quarter to register a last second victory.

With the score tied at 32 all, Caro gained possession of the ball and then held the ball for a full minute before sinking a shot as the final whistle blew for the victory.

For Death of Parents  
Derings Awarded  
\$40,000 Damages

Sylvia Dering, 21, and her sister, Edwina, 16, of Deford were awarded damages of \$40,000 last week in Livingston County Circuit Court in Howell.

The money was awarded because of an auto accident on US-23 near Brighton Jan. 25, 1958, when the girls' mother and father were killed.

The verdict was against Dr. Hartley Holmquist, a Brighton chiropractor, whose office secretary, Alice Ruth Wright, was driving his car when it crashed with the Dering car.

The jury of six men and six women decided that William Walkiewicz, Deford, who brought the suit as executor in behalf of the two Dering daughters, was right when he contended that Mrs. Wright was attempting to pass another car in a no-passing zone when she skidded on ice and collided with the Dering car.

Speed Top Killer in  
Traffic Accidents

A survey of Michigan drivers involved in fatal accidents over a six month period showed that 1,035 drivers were involved in 750 accidents in which 850 people were killed.

James M. Hare, Chairman of the Michigan State Safety Commission, said that the study showed that twelve per cent of the drivers involved were women, 88 per cent were men.

"This is the first time we have done such a searching study into the backgrounds of the persons involved in fatal accidents," Hare said. "We found out a good many things we never were sure of before. For example, drivers over 60 years of age were involved in 105 fatalities while 99 were under 21 years of age."

Falling Limb  
Fatally Injures  
Vernon Whittaker

Vernon Whittaker was fatally injured Monday afternoon when struck by a falling limb while cutting trees for the Bursick Lumber Co. of Sandusky about 10 miles south of Yale.

The accident occurred as the lumbermen were felling the last tree of the day. The falling tree dislodged a limb from an adjacent tree and it hit Mr. Whittaker on the head. Despite a protective steel helmet, the impact knocked the victim to the ground.

He was immediately taken to a waiting ambulance and doctor and hurried to the Yale Community Hospital. X-rays showed no signs of pressure on the brain, but Mr. Whittaker never regained consciousness. His death at 8 a.m. this morning was attributed to a skull fracture.

Among the survivors are his wife and two small children, five and four years old.

Funeral arrangements are incomplete. The remains are at Little's Funeral Home.

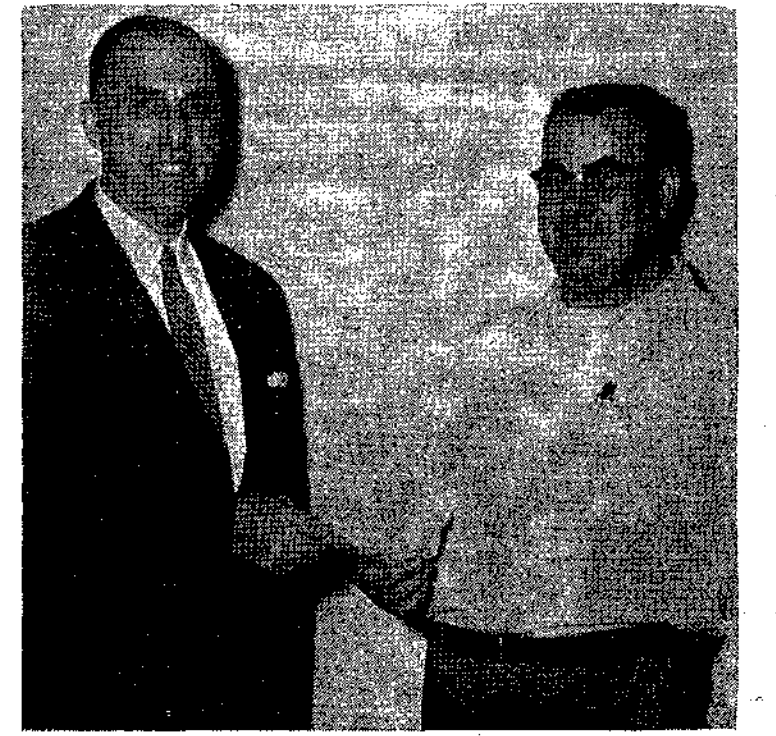

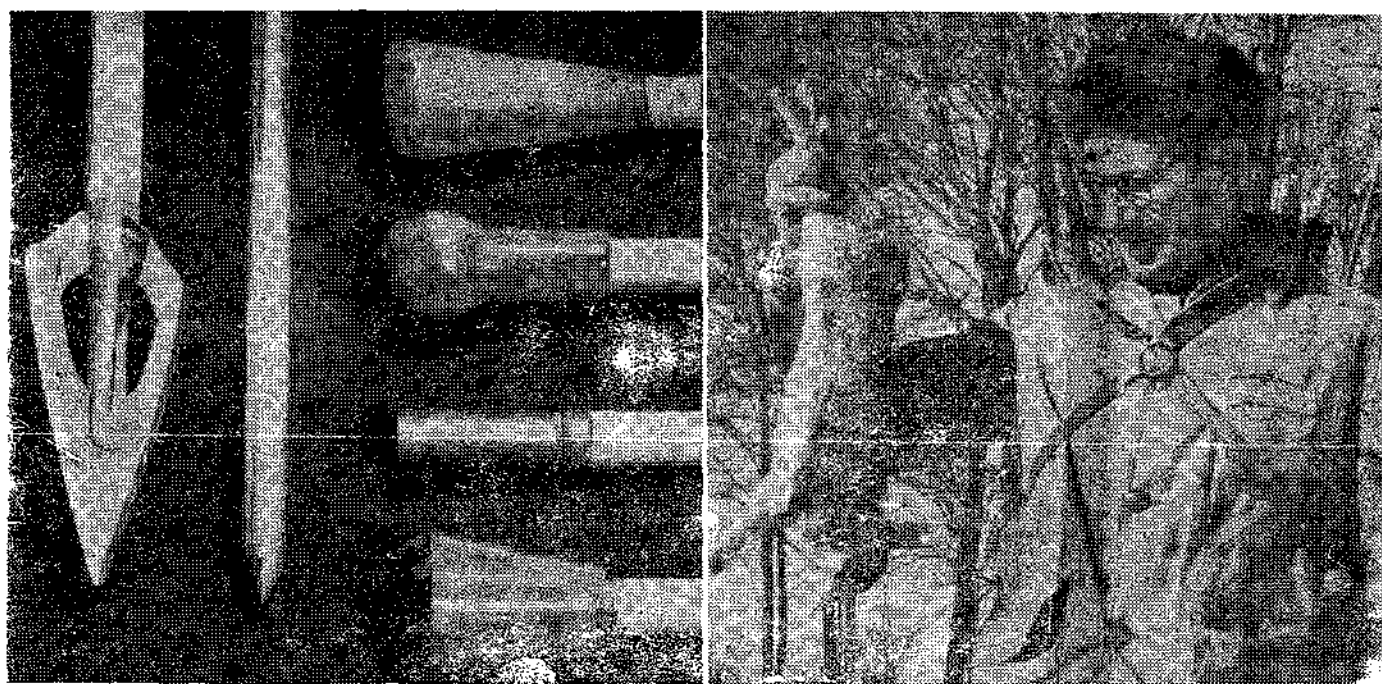

### Archers Find Rabbits Are Challenging Targets



Rabbits have moved into Michigan's hunting limelight, and many of the sportsmen who will be out during the next two months pursuing cottontails in the south part of the state and snowshoes up north won't be using shotguns. They will be after the furry cannonballs with bow and arrow. In fact, says the Michigan Bow Hunters Association, there are a surprising number of archers who will tell you that stalking bunnies with a bow is just about as exciting as hunting deer. It's not easy, either, and when

you bag a rabbit that way—like the bowhunter admiring a fine cottontail in the picture at right—you have every reason to be proud. Archers, when hunting rabbits and other small game, commonly use blunt heads on their arrows. The photograph at left compares four different blunts with a big game broadhead and an aluminum field arrow used for tournament and target shooting. The blunts, the Michigan Bow Hunters point out, are specially designed to kill instantly by concussion and shock.

## Planning Now Will Make Tables Merry For Christmas Time

IT'S TIME to begin planning for holiday tables should look in red and green finery. They'll be wearing red or green, mixed with silver bells, colored baubles, red carnations or red roses nestling among spruce, pine or hemlock branches.  
Decorations can be traditional or modern in theme, depending upon the table appointments and the type of decor used in the home. Plan the centerpiece in accordance with table size. Even small tables can be effective though the centerpiece is diminutive.

If the table is going to groan under a heavy load of food, forget the centerpiece and decorate the chandelier which hangs above it. If there's no chandelier, make a bauble tree to hang right over the table.

### Hanging Decorations

If you want to hang a bauble tree above the table select thin twigs and paint them blue, then place around a core of chicken wire. Trim the twigs, just as you would a tree, with pink, blue and mauve ornaments.



Christmas offers just about the year's best in picture material. The trick is to snap and save all the fun of the day, from those early morning moments and then right through the day. Have a chandelier you want to decorate? Clip colored paper (green or gold is a good color choice) around the shades. Hang glittering balls with bows on the brass arms which dip downward. If you have the room, decorate the chain from which it hangs with a large bow of red and some greenery.

## Quick Breads For Yuletide Gifts

Neighbors, teachers, friends—how many of these are included on your holiday gift list? They would be the very ones to appreciate a gift from your own kitchen.

Make it a quick bread this year. Either of these recipes can be doubled to take care of two friends with a loaf.

### Banana Nut Bread (Makes 1 loaf)

2 cups sifted flour  
2 teaspoons baking powder  
1/4 teaspoon baking soda  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 cup fully ripe mashed bananas  
1/2 cup corn oil  
1/2 cup sugar  
2 eggs  
1/2 cup chopped walnuts

Sift together flour, baking powder and salt; add walnuts. Combine bananas, oil, sugar and eggs in a large bowl. Beat with rotary beater until light and foamy. Add dry ingredients; blend with spoon until well mixed. Pour into a well-greased loaf pan (8 1/2 x 4 1/2 x 2 1/2). Bake in a moderate (350° F.) oven for one hour and ten minutes or until bread springs back when touched lightly. Let stand until cold before cutting.

### Apricot Tea Bread (Makes 1 loaf)

3/4 cup dried apricots  
Water  
2 cups sifted flour  
1 tablespoon baking powder  
1/2 cup sugar  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup coarsely chopped pecans  
1 egg, beaten  
1 cup milk  
3 tablespoons melted butter  
4 teaspoons grated orange rind

Cover apricots with water and simmer 15 minutes or until tender. Drain, cool, and chop fine. Mix and sift together flour, baking powder, sugar and salt in a large bowl. Stir in pecans. Mix together egg, milk, apricots, butter and orange rind; beat with rotary beater until fruit is thoroughly mixed in. Pour into sifted dry ingredients all at once. Stir quickly. Mix only enough to moisten. Pour into buttered loaf pan. Bake in a moderate (350° F.) oven for 1 1/4 hours. Cool bread for 10 minutes before removing from pan.

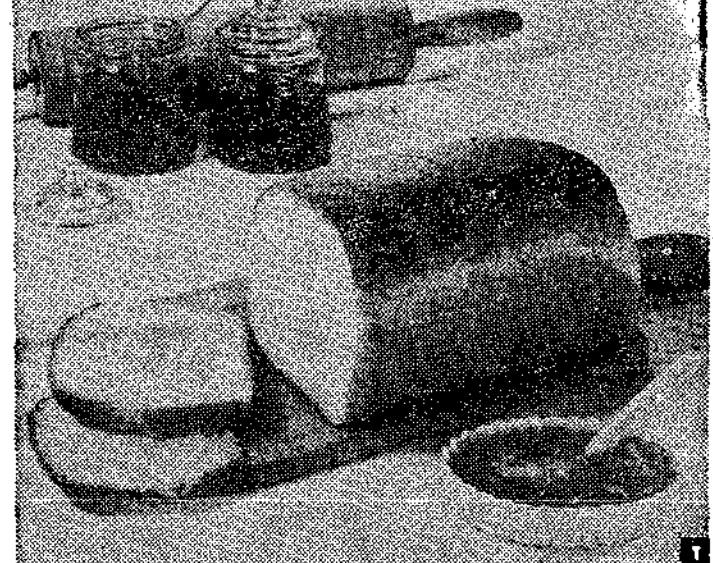

## MAKE A PERFECT LOAF OF BREAD



Add a bonus of good old-fashioned flavor to mid-winter meals with a loaf of fragrant, crusty home-baked bread. If the time-honored art of bread-making is new to you, don't be afraid to try it. There's nothing mysterious or difficult about yeast-raised breads. Just follow the directions and you'll be awarded the satisfaction of a beautiful loaf.

**YEAST-RAISED WHITE BREAD**

1 cup milk  
3 tablespoons sugar  
2 1/2 teaspoons salt  
6 tablespoons margarine or butter.

1 cup warm, not hot, water (lukewarm for compressed yeast)  
1 package or cake yeast, active dry or compressed  
6 cups sifted enriched flour

Scald milk. Stir in sugar, salt and margarine or butter. Cool to lukewarm. Measure water into large mixing bowl (warm, not hot, for active dry yeast; lukewarm for compressed). Sprinkle or crumble in yeast and stir until dissolved. Add lukewarm milk mixture. Add 3 cups of flour and beat until smooth. Stir in remaining flour to make a soft dough, and stir until smooth. Turn out on lightly floured board. Knead until smooth and elastic, about 8 to 10 minutes. Place in greased bowl; brush with shortening. Cover and let rise in warm place (85°), free from draft, until doubled in bulk, about 1 hour. Punch down and turn out on board. Divide in half and let rest 15 to 20 minutes. Shape into two loaves. Place in greased bread pans 9 x 5 x 3 inches. Cover and let rise in warm place, free from draft, until center is slightly higher than edge of pan, about 1 hour. Bake in 400-degree oven about 30 minutes.

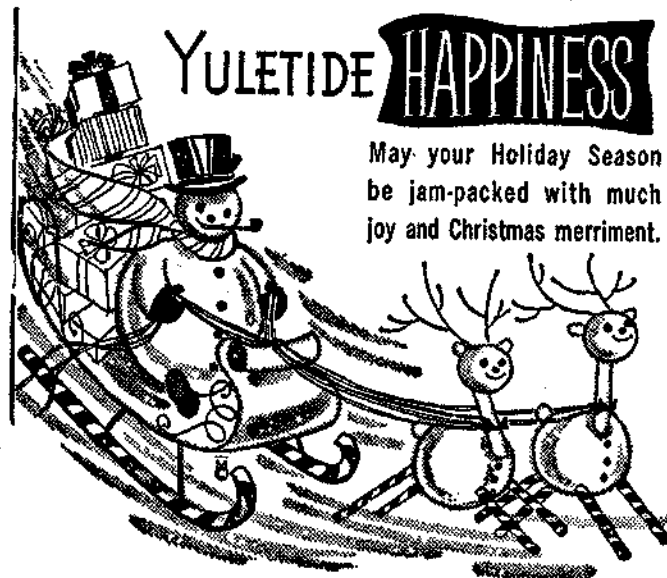

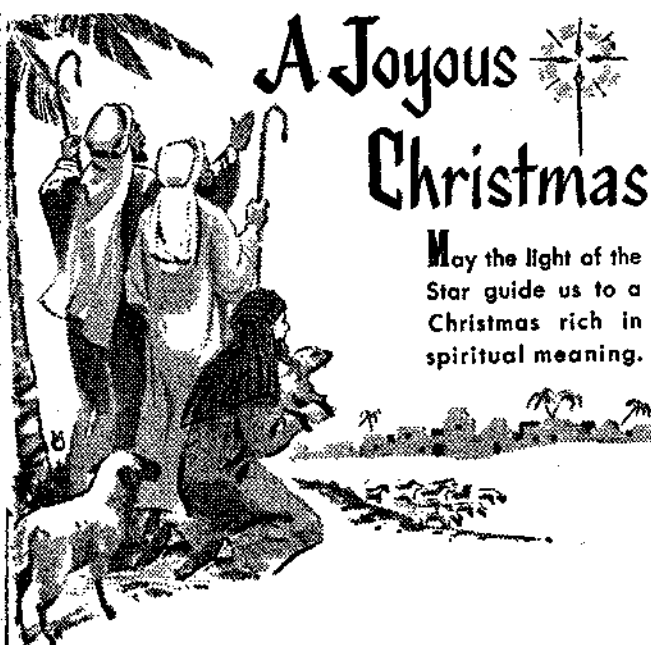

### Star Baked Ham At Festive Buffet During Holidays

IF YOU'RE entertaining during the holidays, there's nothing to make your table look quite as glamorous as a baked ham. Studied with cherries and whole cloves, the scored surface glistening with appetizing brown sugar crust, this is a meat that offers real feasting.

Team this with creamed potatoes in a casserole, a molded salad, assorted relishes and then a beautiful display of holiday cookies on a large platter.

**Cherry-Studded Ham (Serves 14-16)**  
1 9-10 pound pre-cooked ham  
2 tablespoons whole cloves  
1 cup maraschino cherries  
2 No. 2 cans crushed pineapple  
1 cup maraschino cherry juice  
1 cup vinegar  
1/2 cup firmly-packed brown sugar

Place ham on a rack in a shallow roasting pan. Bake in a slow (325°F.) oven for 1 1/2 to 2 hours. Stud scored surface with cloves. Place stem ends of cherries over cloves. Combine remaining ingredients; mix well. Pour over ham. Bake 1 1/2 hours. Baste ham occasionally during baking period.



Glistening and shining with a brown sugar-crusted pineapple crust, this baked ham is also decorated with cloves covered with maraschino cherries. Ham makes a beautiful meat entree to serve for holiday buffet.

**Holiday Apple Salad (Serves 12-14)**

2 packages cherry-flavored gelatin  
2 1/2 cup boiling water  
1 cup heavy cream, whipped  
1 cup mayonnaise

2 red Delicious apples  
1 cup canned light cherries  
1 cup pineapple tidbits  
1/2 cup chopped almonds

Dissolve gelatin in boiling water and chill until partially set. Fold whipped cream into mayonnaise and fold into gelatin. Core unpeeled Delicious apples and cut into medium-sized pieces. Add to gelatin mixture along with cherries, pineapple and almonds. Pour into a single large mold and chill until firm. Unmold and garnish with additional mayonnaise and chopped candied fruits.

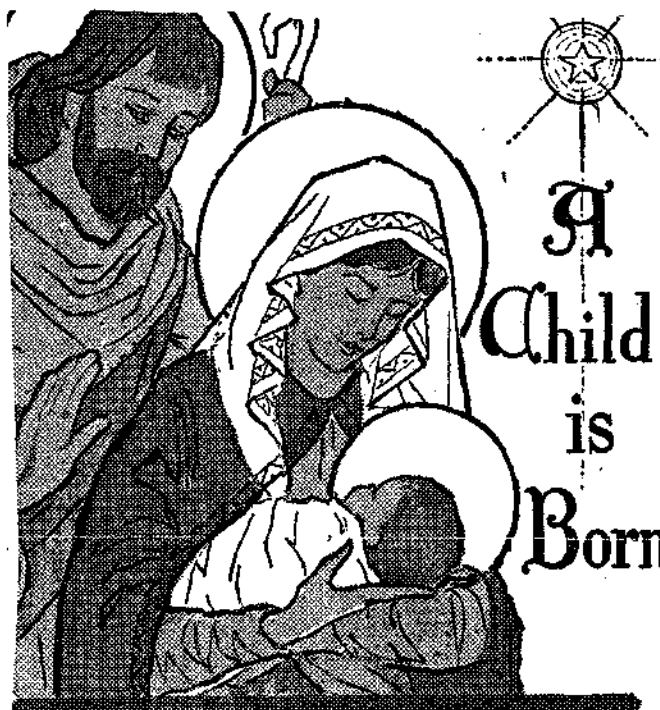



### Home Extension Agent's Corner

After the Christmas feasting, wouldn't it be nice to have some simple food for your family? The "wrinkled storehouse" of delicious dried fruit comes to mind. A composite of dried apricots, apples, pears and peaches is a nice combination. The dried fruit are made from fully ripened fruit, which has had 75 per cent of their moisture removed. That is why it takes 6 to 8 pounds of these fruits to make just one pound of dried fruit.

Prunes and raisins make up 80 per cent of the production of dried fruits in this country. If you will check the prune display at your markets, you will notice that prunes are graded for size. Extra large prunes are the most expensive. There will be 43 or less prunes per pound. Large prunes have from 38 to 43 prunes per pound, while the medium size prunes have 54 to 67 prunes per pound. Since there is no difference in food value or quality between extra large and the smaller size, you can economize by buying the small size prunes. It takes 2 pounds of fresh plums to make one pound of dried prunes.

Raisins are another fruit available in several forms. Thompson seedless grapes are used for producing 90 per cent of those raisins at your markets. They are labeled as "seedless", "bleached", or "unbleached". The bleached raisins have been put through a process that changes the dark brown color to a yellow or a brownish amber color.

Muscat raisins (seeded or unseeded) are larger, sweeter and more moist than the Thompson seedless variety. Some brands of Muscat raisins have been treated with raisin oil, which means they pour readily from the package. It takes 4 lbs. of grapes to make one pound of raisins. All raisins are rich in iron.

Currants are smaller, darker and more tart than the seedless raisins. Dates are known as the "baking-candy" that grows on trees. The word "unpitted" on the label means you will need to remove the seeds. Price does not vary much between pitted and unpitted dates.

## Citizens Groups Form; Seek Better State Government

Voices of an aroused citizenry are echoing Michigan's perils as state government ends a year of crisis.

The Michigan Chamber of Commerce, the Citizens for Michigan movement, the League of Women Voters, The Junior Chamber of Commerce, and organized labor have mobilized to attack Michigan's problems on varied fronts.

This linking of citizens to fill the gap of voter apathy may be the best thing that has happened to Michigan since the Mackinac Bridge filled a seven-mile gap by linking the state's two peninsulas.

\*\*\*  
The Michigan Chamber of Commerce hopes to give businessmen a vehicle for political expression in 1960 and years to come. But of more importance to the rest of the state, the chamber aims to become an organization that can tell businessmen in other states—in a language they understand—that it's great to live and work in Michigan.

joint nonpartisan campaign for better government through the Citizens for Michigan movement. Spurred to action by blunders of government in 1959, this movement will come up with recommendations for corrective effort in 1960.

The enthusiasm of active men and women is sparking a drive by the League of Women Voters and the Junior Chamber of Commerce for a new constitution. Even if they fail to get the 300,000 signatures needed to call for a referendum on holding of a Constitutional Convention, they will be stirring up citizen interest in government.

Supreme Court action started by the AFL-CIO to force reapportionment of senate districts has encouraged citizens in urban areas and aroused those in rural areas.

\*\*\*  
Time is needed before impact of the Chamber of Commerce and Citizens for Michigan will be felt.

It will be 1962 before a new constitution will be ready for ratification by voters if the Junior Chamber and the League succeed.

Developments could come fast, however, in the reapportionment drive started by state AFL-CIO president August Scholle. He wants the court to ban state senatorial elections based on present districts "until equal voting rights are restored to all citizens."

\*\*\*  
Reapportionment has been painted as something favored by Democrats and opposed by Republicans.

It's a complicated political question. In some cases it crosses party lines.

The struggle for legislative power is between big cities and suburbs on one side and rural areas and isolated population centers on the other.

\*\*\*  
Republicans opposing reapportionment will be at odds with their colleagues in Oakland County, which in 1960 would elect one senator to represent 700,000 people. One senator from the 32nd district in the Western Upper Peninsula would represent 49,000 under the present apportionment.

Democrats in the U. P. cannot be counted upon to support a drive that would give them less of a voice in Lansing. They can be expected to join outstate Republicans in contending geographical interests, as well as population interests, must be considered in Lansing as they are in Washington.

\*\*\*  
Struggles for reapportionment are not unique with Michigan. Florida, California, Maryland, Missouri, Minnesota and Tennessee are among the states where the issue is under heated discussion.

The arguments are the same everywhere: Cities claim they are hamstrung. Outstate areas say they need the same protections granted smaller states in the U. S. Senate.

Constitutional revision, per se, provokes less argument than reapportionment. The rub comes on how delegates should be selected. Who gets the biggest voice at the constitutional convention—the cities or the rural areas?

Both parties say there is a need for constitutional revision. But Democrats generally are opposed to the present method of selecting delegates by senate districts, at least under the present apportionment.

\*\*\*  
Candidates for governor in 1960 will be in the thick of the constitutional revision issue.

If, as expected, Paul D. Bagwell is the Republican candidate again, he won't have to hire a speech writer. He can pull out the same speeches he used during the 1958 campaign when there wasn't too much interest in the issue.

Bagwell campaigned in a 1958 model car to dramatize the need for revision of the document that had its last major overhaul in 1908.

\*\*\*  
A cumbersome and outworn constitution has been blamed by leaders of both parties for much of Michigan's financial troubles today.

"We could probably have managed our cash shortage with a fraction of the damage actually suffered, except for the shackles placed on us by the constitution in handling the State's fund," said Governor Williams.



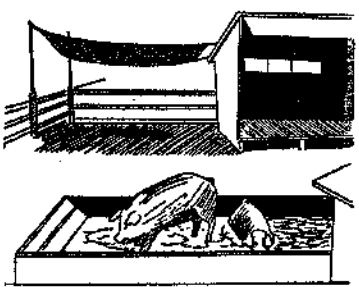
## Seek 'Missing' Hog Half-Pound

Cooling Is Important For Better Gains

Agricultural engineers are concerned about a "missing" half pound. In cooperative USDA-State tests, hogs living outside under varying conditions gained up to 1½ pounds daily. In contrast, test hogs living under favorable conditions in a psychometric chamber at the California Agricultural Experiment Station consistently gained 2 pounds daily.

Why the big difference? The researchers aren't quite sure. But one of the approaches they're investigating to pare down the difference is some type of outside protection or cooling that could enable hogs to gain faster.

Some kind of cooling is essential for hogs in hot weather because daily weight gains drop considerably when temperatures reach 75 to 80 degrees Fahrenheit. So far, however, none of the cooling methods used in the tests enabled hogs

but not that extra half pound. But the engineers did uncover some useful information on the comparative value of several outside cooling systems.

For instance, ordinary wallows in the sun, long a familiar feature of hog raising, were found to be as effective in increasing rate of gain as some other ways that were more elaborate and expensive.

Tests were run on 48 growing finishing hogs in temperatures ranging from 58 to 90 degrees F. Cooling methods used included wallows in the sun and shade, wallows combined with increased air motion from a fan, part-time access to a small air-conditioned house, and confinement to a pen inside a large hogbarn.

## Machine Rates Sheep's Clean-Fleece Weight

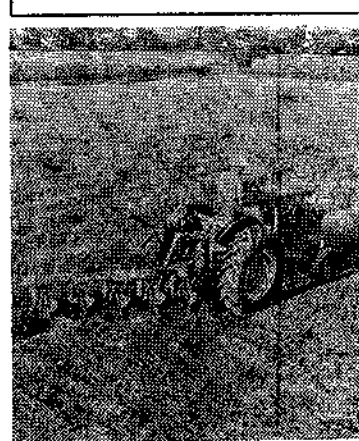
Western livestockmen normally raise "wool breeds"; eastern growers, "mutton breeds". Because of this distinction, a machine has been developed for rapid clean-wool measurements to help flock owners select superior sheep.

The "squeeze-box"—originally devised to calculate the weight of clean fleece of western range sheep—is being adapted to use in eastern farm flocks. The Agricultural Research Service has calibrated the machine to give eastern sheep producers a quick, accurate way of selecting animals on a clean-fleece weight basis. Without calibration, the machine is useful for ranking animals within a flock.

Simple to operate, the machine can be used on all sheep in any flock to give breeders reliable relative difference in clean-wool weight among fleeces at shearing time. This makes possible selection of individual sheep in a wool improvement program. In the past, measuring this important trait has proved costly, time-consuming, and often impractical.

Great variations exist in shrinkages even within flocks.

Extra weight can be added by removing cap at ends of tubular frame and inserting iron bars or scrap metal.

### Use Precautions for The "Old" Folks

Grandma and Grandpa need a little special care when they go visiting at Christmas time. So do little children.

Many families aren't used to having older folks around, observes Phillip Mielock, Michigan State University safety specialist. Such homes often have slippery waxed floors. Then, too, there's the danger of small throw rugs that can slide out from under elderly feet.

"Grandma and grandpa can slip more easily on ice and snow than they could when they were 'spring chickens,'" Mielock cautions. "It's a good idea to clean off the porch, porch steps and sidewalks often when older folks visit."

Quite young folks also demand special attention, particularly in houses that aren't used to having babies around. Mielock mentions these trouble spots: "Many farm homes have lye and other cleaning liquids around the barn or house. Don't leave these items lying around where youngsters can get at them."

"A startling number of youngsters shut themselves in refrigerators, trunks and other closed containers. A quick check around the house can make these hazards child-proof."

"Medicine cabinets hold a special fascination for kids. Trouble is, aspirins and other pills aren't meant to be taken a bottle at a time. Closing the cabinet securely is a lot easier than relying on a prayer and a stomach pump."

"Kids just learning to walk can climb a lot farther than they are often given credit for. A protective railing helps to prevent falls from lofty heights."

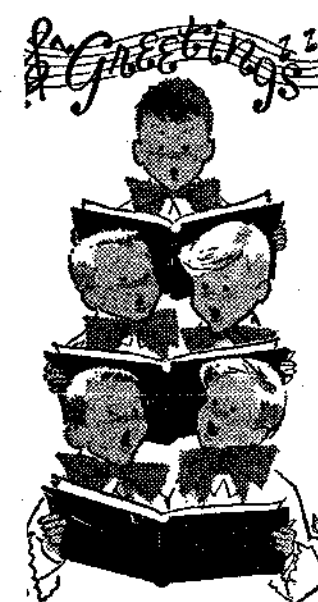

### MSU Looks for Best Way to Apply Fertilizer

Michigan State University soil scientists are trying to get at the bottom of this question: Which would be the most profitable for Michigan farmers—apply fertilizer in bands or broadcast.

Band applications refer to putting the plant food in select areas in the root zone. Broadcast means working the fertilizer throughout the root zone.

"Many farmers have been interested in broadcast applications of bulk fertilizer because they save on labor costs," remarks Dr. Ray Cook, head of the soil science department. "And many feel that they would like to get out of handling so many bags of fertilizer at planting time as is necessary with band applications."

"But just because it is easier to apply bulk fertilizer, it may not be as efficient in terms of plant response per unit of cost," notes Cook.

The Michigan State scientists are trying to determine just how much more efficient band applications are over broadcast treatments. "We want to know what portion should be applied broadcast and what part should be banded for the greatest return and lowest cost," says Cook.

A hundred pounds of fertilizer on the average is worth about \$4. "If a farmer can get just as good results from 500 pounds applied in band as from 750 pounds broadcast, he can make himself good wages filling hoppers on planters," thinks the researcher.

Scientists are now working on a series of experiments which will give them the answer to the relative effectiveness of band and broadcast fertilizer applications.



(Makes 2 pounds)

- 1/2 cup undiluted evaporated milk
- 1 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 1/2 cups diced marshmallows
- 1 1/2 cups semi-sweet chocolate chips
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 16 cowboy or animal crackers



### Farmers Advised to Keep Good Records

Farming like any other business requires good account and inventory records, and according to Don R. Kebler, county extension agent in agriculture, the need for good farm records has become more evident each year. This evidence can be seen from the decreasing percentage of the consumer dollar the farmer has been earning each year. Coupled with this known fact that farm expenses are increasing more rapidly than monies received for farm products.

The squeeze is on the farmer and it looks as if it is going to get worse before it gets better, believes Kebler. In fact the present parity ratio shows the nation's farmers to be in the poorest position in the price-cost relationship since 1940. Some farmers may be forced out of business if this trend continues.

Following good efficient production practices alone will not be the answer to farming success. A good farm account program will play a very important role in farm business analysis and decision making for necessary changes.

Many farmers will be taking a second look at their present record keeping systems, some will see their present system is adequate, while others will change. Others will see the need to start keeping adequate records for the first time.

Michigan State University has developed an easy and adequate farm business record keeping system. This system meets today's needs, and many local banks distribute these MSU farm account books free to their customers. All farmers interested in keeping a good adequate farm record keeping system can receive full particulars by contacting their County Extension Office. Also assistance in setting up this record system can be obtained at this office.

Mix evaporated milk, sugar and salt in saucepan over low heat. Heat to boiling, cook 5 minutes, stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Add marshmallows, chocolate chips and vanilla. Stir 1 to 2 minutes until marshmallows melt. Pour into buttered 9-inch square pan. Press cookies or crackers into fudge.

**Fruit-Nut Snowballs**  
(Makes 24)

- 1/2 cup shredded coconut
- 1 cup golden raisins
- 1 cup dried apricots
- 1/2 cup roasted unblanched almonds
- 1 tablespoon honey
- Confectioners' sugar

Toast coconut to delicate brown in moderate oven. Rinse raisins and apricots and steam 5 minutes. Drain. Put fruits and almonds through food chopper, using medium knife. Add honey and coconut and blend thoroughly. Shape into small balls and roll in confectioners' sugar.

### Finger Paint Holiday Papers

It's always fun to do something creative and original, especially when it comes to gifts for friends. This would, perhaps, be a good year to make your own gift paper with finger paints.

In case adults are too busy to do this themselves, there are always youngsters around who want to do something interesting when the holiday spirit moves them. If mother will cook the batch of paint, the youngsters can color and do the painting themselves.

**Finger Paint**  
(Makes 3 cups)

- 1/2 cup crystal laundry starch
- 1 cup cold water
- 1 envelope unflavored gelatin or
- 1 tablespoon glycerine
- 2 cups hot water
- 1/2 cup mild soap flakes or synthetic detergent

Home dye, colors as desired

Combine laundry starch and 1/4 cup cold water in medium saucepan. Soak gelatin in other 1/4 cup cold water. Add hot water to starch mixture and cook over medium heat until mixture comes to a boil and is clear, stirring constantly. Remove from heat; blend in softened gelatin. Add soap or detergent and stir until mixture thickens and soap is dissolved. Cool.

Divide dough into portions, using paper cups or jars. Mix the base and colors to desired intensity. (If glycerine is used instead of gelatin in the recipe, combine the full cup of water with starch before cooking. Stir in the glycerine when the base is removed from heat.)

### Making Gift Paper

Use paper with a coated surface such as glazed shelf paper. Place sheets on wet working surface. Moisten well with sponge. Add colors in dabs. Keep water at hand for extra moisture, if needed. Make tree designs, using holiday motif and typical finger painting movements. Place paintings on newspapers to dry. Press on wrong side with warm iron. Trim off rough edges.

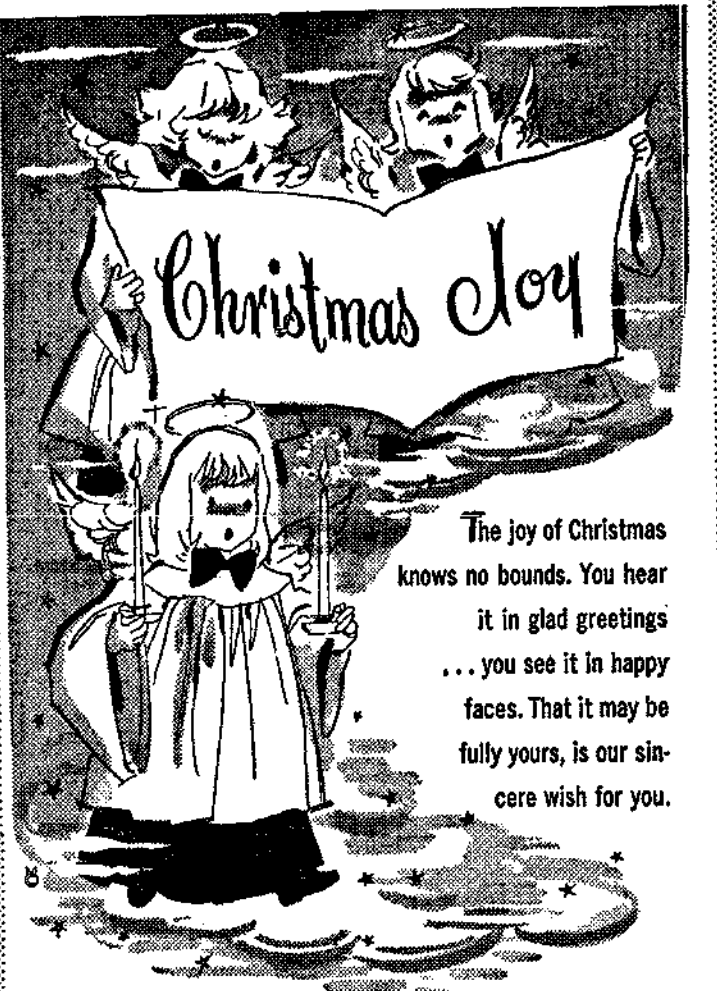

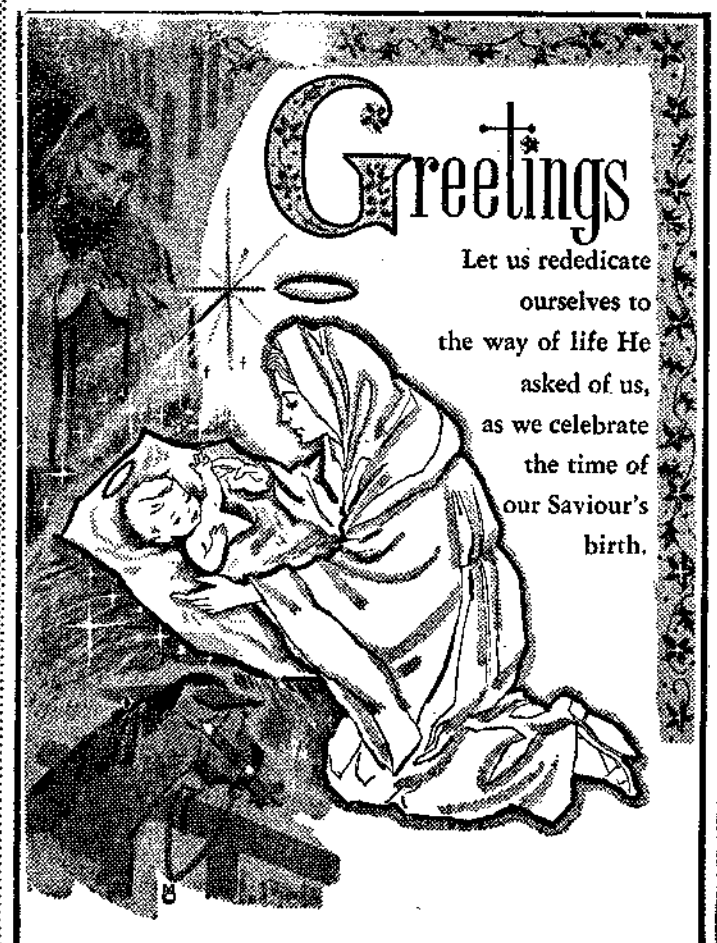

### Promote Certified Seed Through 4-H

The Tuscola County Association of Certified Seed Growers' board of directors met recently to review activities of the association during the past year and to lay plans for the year ahead, according to Clare Harrington, association chairman.

The association distributed certified Michelite and Sanilac beans and seed oats to 4-H club members on farms where certified seed was not used by the 4-H members' parents. The response to this introduction of certified seed into the 4-H club and community was very beneficial, according to Alfred Ballweg, county extension director.

The local association also sponsored a certified seed booth at the county fair along with a booth to advertise and sample cookies made from flour milled from soft white wheat (Genesee) grown in Tuscola county.

Some over 50 certified seed growers were members of the local association during 1959. The objectives of the local organization are to (a) sponsor educational programs on crops and soils, (b) keep abreast of new crop developments and, (c) to promote mutual understanding between growers and the Michigan Crop Improvement Association, Michigan Foundation Seed Association, the Farm Crops Department of Michigan State University, and the seed trade.

Plans are now shaping for the annual meeting of the association, scheduled for Wednesday, Feb. 10, said Harrington.



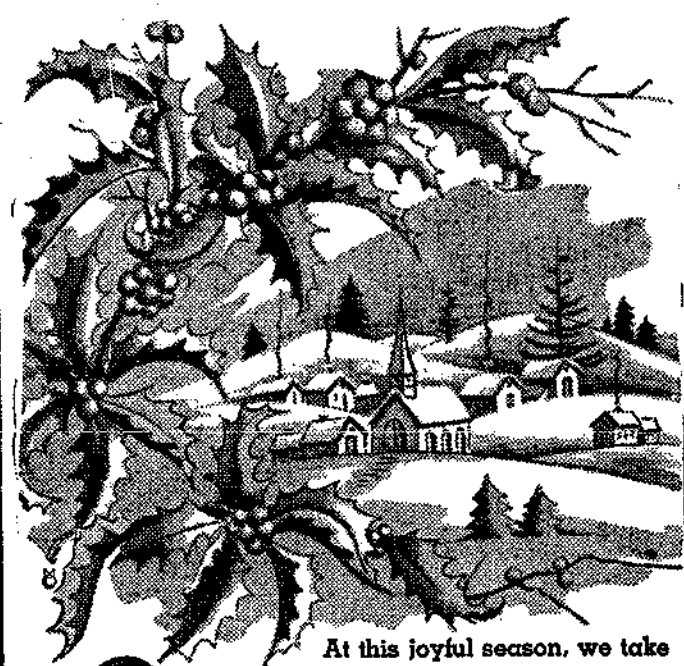

### Plant Nutrients Used More In '58

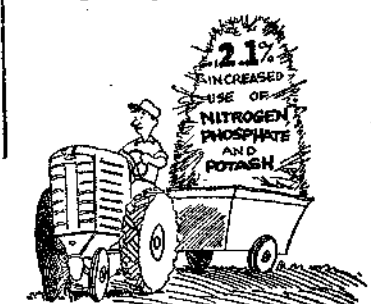
#### Despite Drop In Fertilizer Tonnage

Consumption of primary plant nutrients—nitrogen, phosphate, and potash—in the United States rose 2.1 per cent in the year ended June 30, 1958.

The increase occurred despite a slight drop in the tonnage of fertilizers used that contain these nutrients, indicating a continuing trend toward use of higher-analysis fertilizers.

The 6,512 tons of primary nutrients contained in the 22,515,763 tons of fertilizers used during the year was 135,185 tons more than the total or primary nutrients used during 1956-57.

The total tonnage consisted of 34.7 percent mixed fertilizers; 32.1 percent direct application materials also bearing one or more of these primary nutrients; and 4.2 percent secondary and trace nutrient materials which do not contain these primary nutrients.



Consumption of primary plant nutrients rose during year ended June, 1958.

Use of fertilizers containing the primary nutrients dropped 0.8 percent below the total used in 1956-57, and the total of materials containing secondary and trace nutrients was 0.4 per cent below the previous year.

The national decrease in total fertilizer consumption was due to a decrease of 394,784 tons in the use of mixed fertilizers, which was only partly offset by an increase of 160,051 tons in the use of direct application materials.

### Farms Of Future Not All Big Operations

There is no reason to believe that the future will be all large corporate units, but farms of the future almost certainly will make use of many techniques corporations employ to assure economical operation.

This, in fact, was the verdict brought in by four Pennsylvania State University economists who were asked to comment on the prediction that the day of the small farm is rapidly drawing to a close.

"It certainly does require a bigger investment today to run a modern farm," Dr. Robert F. Hutton volunteered, "but in Pennsylvania, and I think largely throughout the country, farming is still in the hands of the people who work the land."

Farms are getting larger, perhaps more so in other states than Pennsylvania, Dr. Jerome K. Pasto pointed out, but he believes this trend is more the result of the elimination of very small farms which produce little rather than the consolidation of several farms to turn the operation into a big business.

Dr. William L. Barr, in predicting continued mechanization of the farm, said adoption of modern techniques has sounded the death knell to the "hired hand" because it is now possible for the average family to operate a larger unit without outside help.

Dr. Robert H. McAlexander said dairy herds are increasing in size because there is not so much hand labor in dairying as in the past but there are still herds of 10 cows or less and many of 75-100 cows.

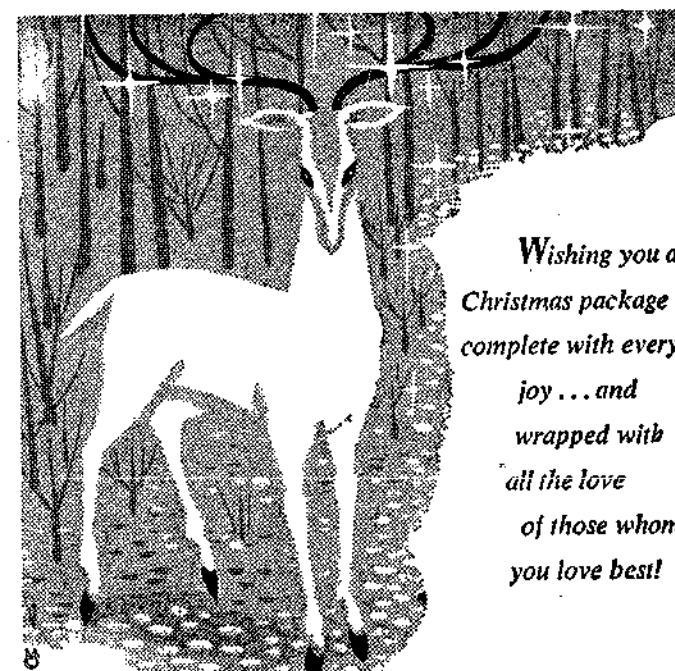

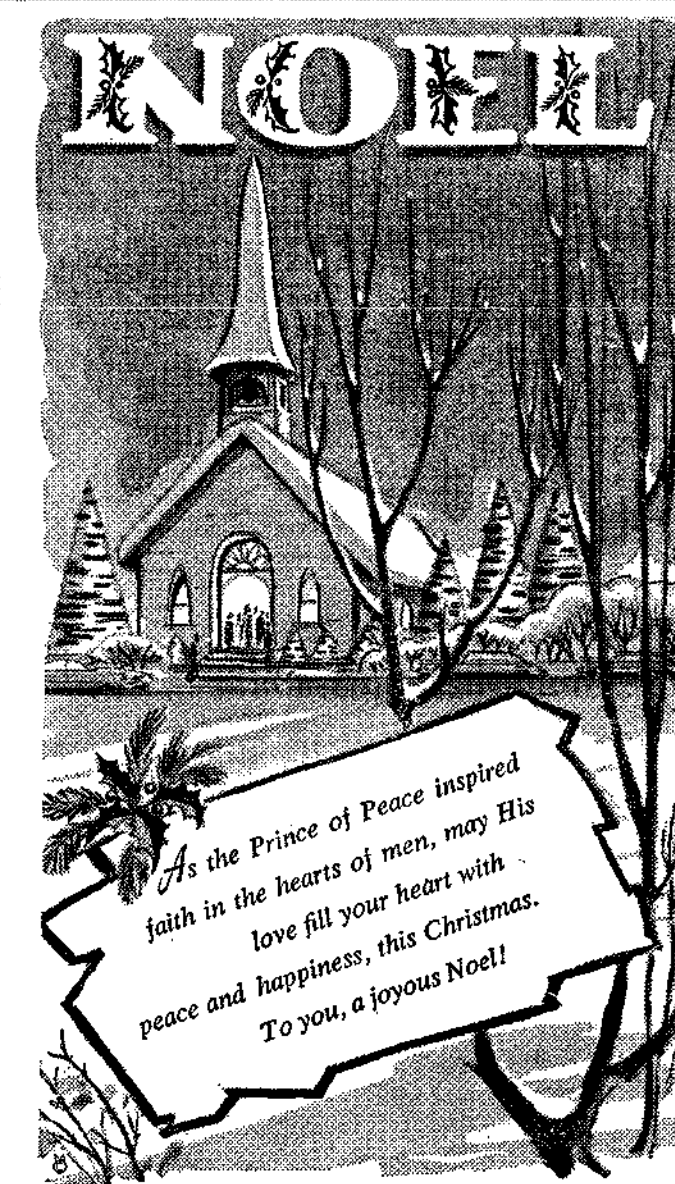
