Push it or pull it if you can—instead of lifting a heavy object. Home economists at Michigan State University say that industry has set 25 pounds as the maximum safe lift for a woman who is well.

Freeze Turkey As Soon As Possible

Off the table and into the refrigerator or freezer for the left-over turkey. Home economists at Michigan State University say turkey shouldn't be left standing in a warm kitchen long after dinner is over. Quick chilling is recommended for handling the cooked meat.

If you plan to freeze some of the turkey, process it as soon as you can. Just enough meat for one meal is a good package size to use. Have a moisture-proof, vapor-proof wrapping.

Frozen turkey packed without gravy can be served in sandwiches, in turkey salad, or in turkey chop suey. Turkey may tend to be dry if frozen without gravy, so you may want to use it in a dish where a spread or a sauce gives added moisture.

The storage life of most frozen prepared foods is short, so plan to use the leftover turkey within a week or two.
