Milk Production Up in December

Milk production in the Detroit milkshed, after leveling off for the past few months, increased

moderately during December.

The monthly market report of
Michigan Milk Producers Association shows a total production for December of 173,-275,000 lbs., up 4½ per cent from the month before, and about 2 per cent above last year.

The increase came despite a continual drop in the number of shippers on the market. The Detroit market is losing shippers at the rate of 750 a year. At the end of December, there were 10,690 farmers shipping milk to Detroit, 1561 fewer than in December

Higher production per shipper brought average gross income per farmer to \$724 for December -a new high. \$67 of this income was a direct result of MMPA price negotiations which added \$720,000 to farmers' returns for

The negotiated base price in Detroit for December was \$4.54, Zmierski 212, P. Retherford 205, down 5c from November but up 7c from a year ago. Sales of Class I (drinking) milk remained strong, showing a 3 per cent rise from December 1958.

At a cost of \$1,575.00, equipment for moving food and dishes from the kitchen to the patient has been purchased. A pre-heated and pre-cooled food conveyor will maintain high, or low temperatures of food from one to two hours after leaving the power supply . . . assuring the taste and quality of the food will reach the patient as it left the kitchen. The carrier holds 48 meals and should bring substantial savings. in labor costs and storage space, Mr. Hudson said.

A soiled tray truck will be used for returning soiled dishes to the dishwashing section and prevent cross-contamination within the food system. A similar truck will remove the dishes from the main dining area.

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
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
