Council Sets Lower Budget

For Cass City

The Cass City village budget for 1960 was set at \$106,731.72 Tuesday night by trustees at their regular meeting at the Cass City Municipal Building.
The amount is over \$1,000 less

than was spent in 1959 as last year the village spent more than it received and used much of its cash on hand to balance the bud-

In 1959, the village started with \$13,167.42 and this year with \$2,466.34. The increased expenditures in the village will be offset this year by a 10 per cent increase in village taxes. Last year \$39.860.50 was received. This year's estimated tax revenue is \$44,000.

Among major items in the budget this year are \$12,000 for curb and gutter and sidewalks, a new police car and radio budgeted at \$3,500 and \$1,000 for a possible new dump ground.


