Expect Two New U. S. Representatives After 1960 Census Completed in State

By Elmer E. White Michigan Press Association New voices in Congress and the Michigan Legislature will be among results of the 1960 census.

shifts recorded by the census may be too leisurely for proponents of redistricting. Adoption of a reapportionment amendment to the state constitution could change the schedule.

1952 stipulated that the House must be reapportioned in 1963 according to outcome of the census, with the new districting to take effect two years later.

Oakland-Macomb area can expect a louder voice ultimately in Washington and Lansing.

Michigan is expected to send two new Congressmen to Washington in 1963 because of a requirement that Congress must reapportion the House of Representatives after each federal census.

Senate districts created under the 1952 reapportionment amendment would remain frozen no matter what is revealed by the census—unless the 1952 provision is wiped out.

Census-takers are expected to find that Michigan has a population of about 8,000,000, or 1,700,000 more than she had when the 1950 census was taken.

Republicans will concede that Democratic Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie has had success with his ambitious five-year building program.

Under provisions existing as the nose count started, the census also will authorize additional representation in the Michigan House. But it would be 1965 before the legislative redistricting takes effect.

It is possible attempts will be made to revise the apportionment of both the Senate and House through a vote of the people before 1965 rolls around.

The big question is the boundaries for the new districts. But it's a cinch the populous Wayne-

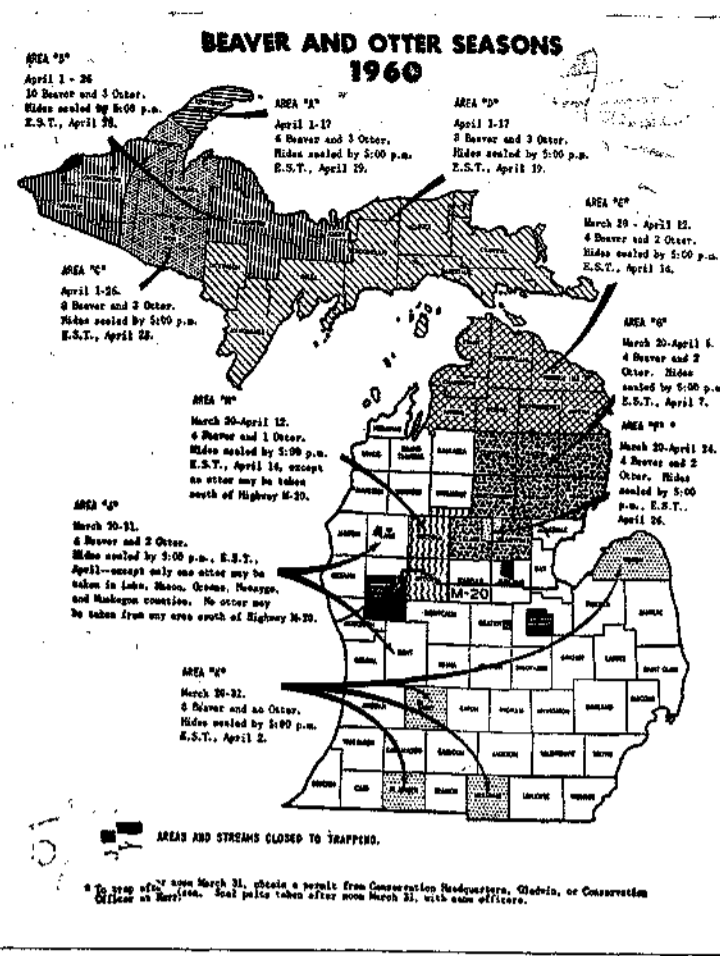

Home Extension Agent's Corner

It's no accident today's egg quality is so high. Egg producers have learned a lot in recent years about choosing chickens which produce highest quality eggs. Then by feeding and caring for them scientifically they held that "peak quality" standard. In selecting eggs, you can't judge quality by looking at the shell. Even an expert egg grader needs special equipment to judge quality. But the grade - and the size are always marked on the egg carton. Remember grade and size are not related! Grade gives you the "inside story" on egg quality. Grade AA and Grade A have thick, compact whites supporting the yolks so they stand up proudly tall. Grade AA eggs are scarce. Choose grade A eggs when you plan to poach, fry, cook in the shell, or want the "yolk-well" centered, for stuffed eggs. These are the "pretty-as-a-picture eggs in food ads. Grade B eggs always cost less. The white spreads out a little

more and the yolk is flatter. Grade B eggs are perfectly satisfactory in flavor and fine for use where they'll be "mixed" as in scrambled eggs, omelets, in baking, or thickening. Size refers to weight-per-dozen. Sizes are divided as: jumbo, extra large, large, medium, small and peewee. Since there is a difference of 3 ounces between each size, it pays to know which size is in most plentiful supply in Flint area, each season. The "cost-per-pound" is your key-clue in egg buying. If you are a figuring shopper, you can figure that eggs still represent an economical powerhouse of high quality protein food. A serving of two eggs will be around 8 cents. (Compare this to ground beef, which is 49c a pound this week, at around 12c a serving.) Remember in egg buying, to compare prices of two sizes, they must be of the same quality (grade). One woman writes, "I only buy white eggs." Another tells me, "I choose brown eggs." Remember shell color is a breed characteristic. Shell color is no clue to egg quality! Color doesn't affect flavor, nutritive value, or egg cooking. Neither is it a guide to yolk color. Yolk color may vary from light to deep yellow. Yolk color is influenced by heredity and diet. Most high-quality eggs have light yolks with a sweet nutty flavor. Color doesn't affect nutritive value. Concluded on page 12.

Kebler Tells How to Fertilize Corn

"Two by two" is the guide to go by in placement of fertilizer in the corn row. Translated, that's two inches to the side and two inches below the seed, according to Don R. Kebler, county extension agent in agriculture.

Many planters that don't place the fertilizer in these bands can be changed over with rewarding results. Old splitboot type applicators, for instance, don't do this and if the planter is operated above about 1 1/2 miles per hour, the fertilizer mixes with the seed and there is injury to germination.

Also, these type applicators often do not allow the use of more than 125 pounds of fertilizer per acre. Usually, much higher rates than this are needed. The fertilizer also is placed too shallow for good recovery by the roots.

Conversion kits are available for many types of planters and a farm equipment mechanic may

also be able to adapt the planter to a side placement arrangement if a kit is not available. This conversion more than pays for itself.

Kebler points out that a planter does its best job when operated at not over 3-3 1/2 miles per hour. There are at least two benefits from not going too fast - it insures enough plants per acre and makes even placement in the row by eliminating pile-ups and skips.

A word of suggestion is that unless the proper amount and balance of plant food nutrients are used, even band-placed fertilizer will not give the results which could be possible. A soil test based recommendation will be valuable here, relates Kebler.

It is expected that the townships served by the new Hills and Dales General Hospital will be asked for \$250 each to help finance the additional 16 rooms to the hospital at annual meetings scheduled Saturday.
The townships contributed \$250 each two years ago when the original construction was about to begin.
The contributions were made because the hospital will serve taxpayers in each of the area townships and no taxes will be required for its construction or maintenance.

Did you know that eggs will age 2 weeks in 48 hours at room temperature? Eggs left in the car while you finish other shopping, lose quality fast.
Choose eggs from a refrigerated case. Get them home quickly into your refrigerator. In using them, quality is preserved when you keep the carton in the refrigerator... removing only the eggs you are going to be using.
Do you have trouble remembering "which end is up" in storing eggs? Just think of a toe dancer... toe down... heel up.
In a quandry about how to save those left-over egg whites? Keep them up to 10 days in the refrigerator in a tightly covered container.
Left-over yolks can be kept, up to 3 days, in the refrigerator if they're covered with cold water.
In most families, a "good light" omelet is a favorite, because the delightful fillings, sauces and garnishes offer fascinating variations... as the bland delicacy of omelet is complemented by hot pepper sauce, cheese, creole sauce, mushrooms... or broiled tomatoes.
The secret of difference between the compact, classic French-type omelet and the fluffy American version... is low heat and the sprinkle of patience that's needed to cook the American creation just that little bit longer... before sprinting to the dinner table.
A poet called eggs "the cement that holds the castles of cookery together." The three-meal appeal of their golden-goodness extends the food dollar, too. Eggs are the only food which decreased in price in the past 40 years. They are 21 per cent lower in price than they were 10 years ago.
