## BULEN TALKS CARS

**THE HORSEPOWER CONTROVERSY**

Not long ago, before the TV people cleaned it up themselves, the Battle of the Necklines was raging. Just as furious, but not nearly so fascinating, is the Automobile Horsepower controversy.

On one side of the fence you have people saying it's scandalous to put a 100-mile an hour car in the hands of every half-wit. Or, on the other side, added horsepower is a safety factor, a reserve of quick power, the value of which you can appreciate only when you're in a tight highway spot and suddenly need it.

First of all, let's get a few facts. Two years ago the most powerful engine in each manufacturer's line averaged 160.8 horsepower, which was more than any single car had in 1956.

This year, horsepower is up again; there are cars giving 280 and 285 in the luxury class, practically everybody is up over the 200 mark. It was only in 1954 that every standard car offered for the first time at least one engine that passed 100 horsepower.

We have to ask ourselves this question: are the half-witted drivers twice as bad, twice as reckless as they were two, three or four years ago? Seems to me there was some driving that beat everything for foolishness when the 'coon tails fluttered from the Stutz Bearcats.

There are two great savings for the owner who has this increased horsepower. A car engine will last just that much longer when its highway speed is not its maximum speed, when it's not made to work at its very peak.

The second saving may be your life. An engine that's loafing even when it's pulling along merrily at highway speeds has that extra reserve of power to make passing safer.

The Horsepower Race has meant wonders for used car buyers, too. It's meant a good supply of way-above-average used cars, lots of top performers have become available at amazingly reasonable prices.

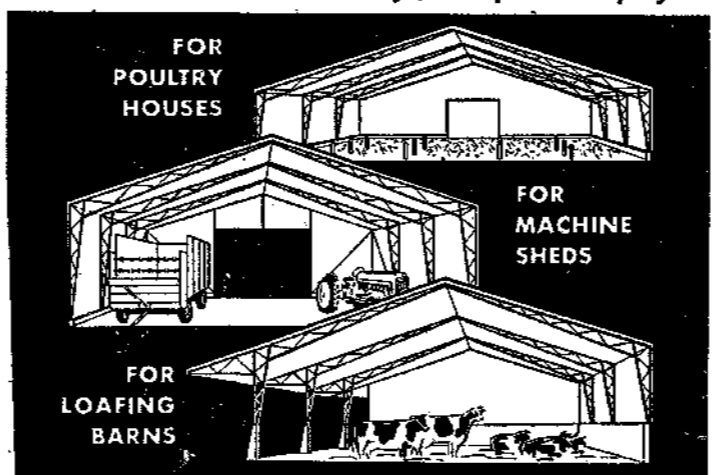

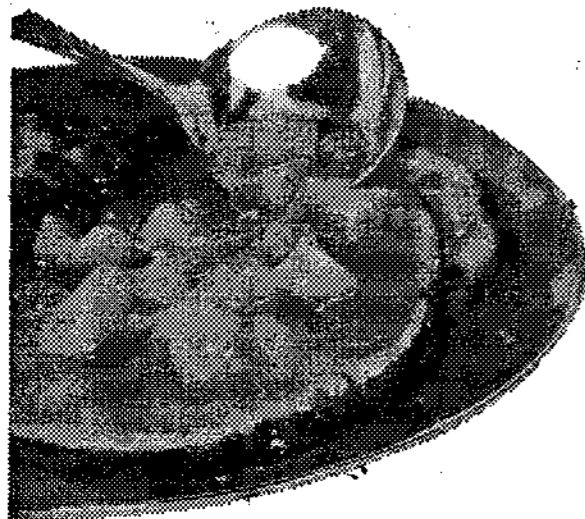

In third place is a registered Holstein cow owned by Carl Bauer, Reese, with a production of 106 pounds butterfat. Other dairymen with cows producing 85 pounds or more butterfat during March are: Dolan Sweeney, Uby; Quibro Farm, Caro; Ronald Opperman, Vassar; Charles Cook, Deford; Grover Laurie, Cass City; Don Koepfgen, Cass City; Henry Hohman, Vassar; D. E. McCrumb, Kingston; Dr. H. T. Donahue, Cass City; Jay Marr, Mayville, and Clarence Merchant, Cass City.

In the 305-day records class, a registered Holstein cow, Eve, owned by Clayton Rohlf and Sons of Fairgrove, took first place with a production of 823 pounds of butterfat and 21,233 pounds of milk. In second place is a registered Holstein cow owned by Ronald Opperman of Vassar, producing 678 pounds of butterfat and 19,275 pounds of milk. In third place is a registered Holstein cow owned by Blaylock and Rupprecht of Vassar, producing 648 pounds of butterfat; and in fourth place stands a registered Guernsey cow owned by Jackson Brothers of Caro with production of 613 pounds of butterfat. 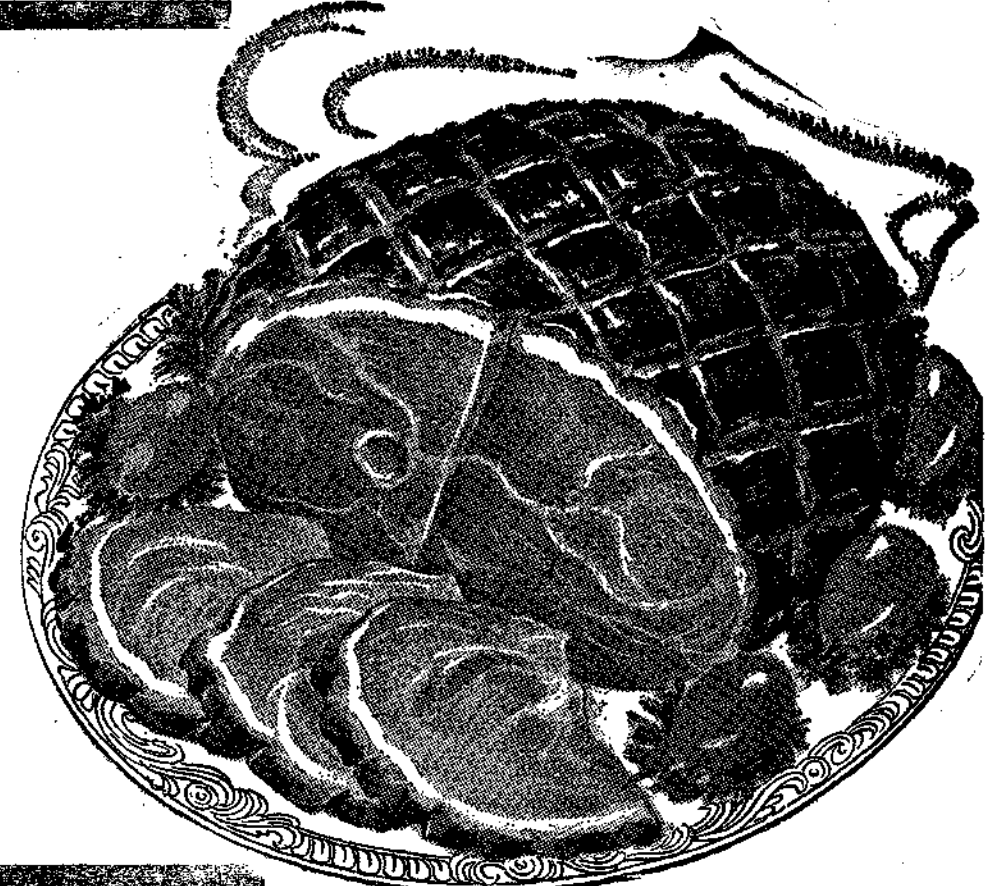
