





THE HORSEPOWER CONTROVERSY

Not long ago, before the TV people cleaned it up themselves, the Battle of the Necklines was raging. Just as furious, but not nearly o fascinating, is the Automobile Horsepower controversy.

On one side of the fence you have people saying it's scandalous to put a 100-mile an hour car in the hands of every half-wit. Or, on the other side, added horsepower is a safety factor, a reserve of quick power, the value of which you can appreciate only when you're in a tight highway spot and suddenly need it.

First of all, let's get a few.. facts. Two years ago the most powerful engine in each manufacturer's line averaged 160.8 horsepower, which was more than any single car had in 1950.

This year, horsepower is up again; there are cars giving 280 and 285 in the luxury class, practically everybody is up over the 200 mark. It was only in 1954 that every standard car offered for the first time at least one engine that passed 100 horsepower.

We have to ask ourselves this question: are the half-witted drivers twice as bad, twice as reckless as they were two, three or four years ago? Seems to me there was some driving that beat everything for foolishness when the 'coon tails fluttered from the tutz Bearcats.

There are two great savings for the owner who has this increased horsepower. A car engine will last just that much longer when its highway speed is not its maximum speed, when it's not made to work at its very peak.
