Old-Fashion Flavor For Meat Dishes

nutmeg Soak bread in cold water. Press dry; crumble. Add remaining ingredients and mix well. Shape into small balls. Roll in flour and fry in drippings until browned. Add hot

water with a bay leaf, if desired, cover and cook slowly 1/2 nour. Thicken gravy in pan, if desired. Swiss Steak (Serves 6)

2 pounds round steak, cut in squares Salt and pepper

Flour to dredge 2 tablespoons fat

1 onion, sliced 2 bay leaves

1 can tomato sauce

1 teaspoon chili powder

2 cup water Salt and pepper to taste

6 petatoes, halved Sprinkle meat with salt, pepper

and flour. Pound in flour with meat hammer or the edge of a plate. Brown in hot fat and remove to balting pan. Place sliced onion over meat and add a layer of potatoes. Mix tomato sauce, chili powder, water, salt and bay leaf and pour over meat. Cover and bake in a slow (325°F.) oven for one hour.

Do you look beyond steaks and chops at the meat counter to find variety--and often money-saving values? Have you ever considered variety meats? These highly nutritious parts of beef, veal lamb and pork are sometimes called "fancy meats." "extra edible parts," "meat sundries" or meat specialties."

Baked stuffed heart is an conomical menu fare. Both veal and beef hearts require tenderizing. They are prepared for cookng by trimming off the outside at and cutting out vessels and thread-like cords from the interor of the heart. Beef heart is immered in salted water for about 2½ hours, veal heart for bout 1½ hours. After the simmering period, the cavity in the heart is filled with any well-seasoned bread stuffing. The meat is then placed in a covered pan and baked for 1/2 hour in a noderate oven.

Tongue is a popular, low-cost variety meat. It takes slow cookng and a long time to tenderize t. Local markets feature fresh,

smoked and pickled tongues, and the same recipe can apply to all. Only variation may be skipping the salt for smoked tongue.

Spiced tongue slices are prepared by covering beef tongue with water in a sauce pan and simmering for three hours with a stalk of celery, 12 whole cloves, 2 bay leaves and 12 whole peppercorns. Remove the skin from the cooked tongue and slice the meat

in 4-inch pieces. Veal tongue is more tender and requires a shorter cooking time. Figure 8 servings from a beef tongue, only 2 servings from a veal tongue.

To add the spiced flavor, cook together one cup of the strained meat broth, one cup sugar and one cup vinegar for 10 minutes and pour over the tongue slices. Let stand at least 15 minutes before serving. Cold spiced tongue slices are excellent for the buffet table or in sandwiches.



Set Interest Rate For '60 Crop Loans

U.S. Department of Agriculture recently announced that the interest rate to be charged producers on 1960 crop price-support loans will remain unchanged at 31/2 per cent per year on all loans repayments received on or before the regular nonrecourse loan maturity dates.

On recourse loans, which were authorized by recent legislation limiting nonrecourse price sup- sula. port to \$50,000, the rate will be six per cent per year, calculated from the date of original disbursement, on the balance of these loans not repaid by the regular maturity date.

The regular nonrecourse loans usually mature in the spring and summer, but the recourse advances do not have to be repaid until a full year after the last date for obtaining loans for each of the commodities. The recourse loans must be repaid with interest; but the nonrecourse loans can be satisfied by forfeiture of the collateral securing the loan, and interest is charged only on the principal repaid.

Extending the 3½ per cent rate to recourse loans if repaid during the regular loan period is designed primarily to encourse early repayments of these loans.


