Are you and your family considering a camping trip? Camping is fun for the entire family, including children. I would like to offer some suggestions to parents with small children who plan to take their children on a camping trip.

Prepare children for this new experience beforehand. Explain in detail what they will see, do, hear and eat.

There will be two main changes in a child's routine if you camp out under the stars. The children may be sleeping outdoors in a sleeping bag, and they won't have a bathroom. It is advisable to let children try the sleeping bag in the back yard before going on the trip. If they have never used anything but a toilet since they were trained, you might let them be less inhibited on a picnic or a Sunday drive. It they are used to a toilet seat, be sure to take it along.

It is also a good idea to dress children in bright clothes, because they will be easier to see from a distance. Along with this, be sure to remind them to stay still and not wander if they get lost.

A camping trip can introduce new and varied play ideas. The children can make dolls out of pine cones by inserting sticks, seeds or pebbles in a cone for eyes and nose. A bandanna wrapped around the bottom of the cone will make a gown. Flower chains are also fun and easy to make. Children love to collect twigs, rocks, pebbles and shells. And of course, there is always the joy of exploring new places.
