This sometimes happens right after your car has had a grease job. You start to drive and suddenly your car seems to be steering all over the road.

> When this happens don't take it for granted that someone has been monkeying with your steering system. Usually it is just the result of adding air to the tires.

Too many cars are being driven with underinflated tires -- so it is a good thing that pressure checking is a part of the customary grease and oil-change job.

However, especially with power steering, even the slightest bit of overinflation will cause too easy pivoting of your front tires.

So, if this should happen and you can't revise your steering methods to meet normal inflation of the front wheels the only thing to do is reduce the pressures a couple of pounds.

This will result in more secure steerage, which is certainly preferable to maximum tire mileage. However, aside from this, it is a wise driver who keeps his tires normally inflated. Good care of tires can mean real savings.

For instance, an expert driver can make tires last for 30,000 valies, while a poor driver can wear out tires in 10,000 miles,




A roadside park on US-16 at the Red Cedar River about 10 miles east of Lansing was the first fully-equipped roadside service area in the U. S.


There are 14 fully-equipped roadside parks on highway US-2 between Sault Ste. Marie and Ironwood.
